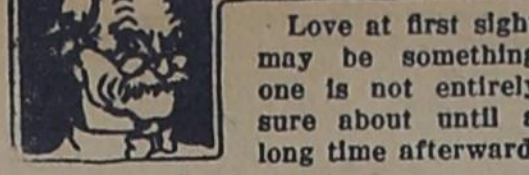

There will be many additions to Texas' 1170 hotels with their 79,410 rooms and \$213,544,000 investment during 1930. Preliminary work on a half-million dollar hosterly at Brownwood has started. A \$1,000,000 apartment hotel is projected at San Antonio. Palestine is to have a \$300,000 hotel on its former city hall site, given as a bonus to its builder. The new Hotel Gregg at Longview will formally open this month. The El Paisano at Marfa is under way. Sterling is to have a new 40-roomer. A new 600-room hosterly for Dallas, to cost \$4,000,000, is the projected stage. And 1929 was probably a record-maker for new hotel construction in Texas.

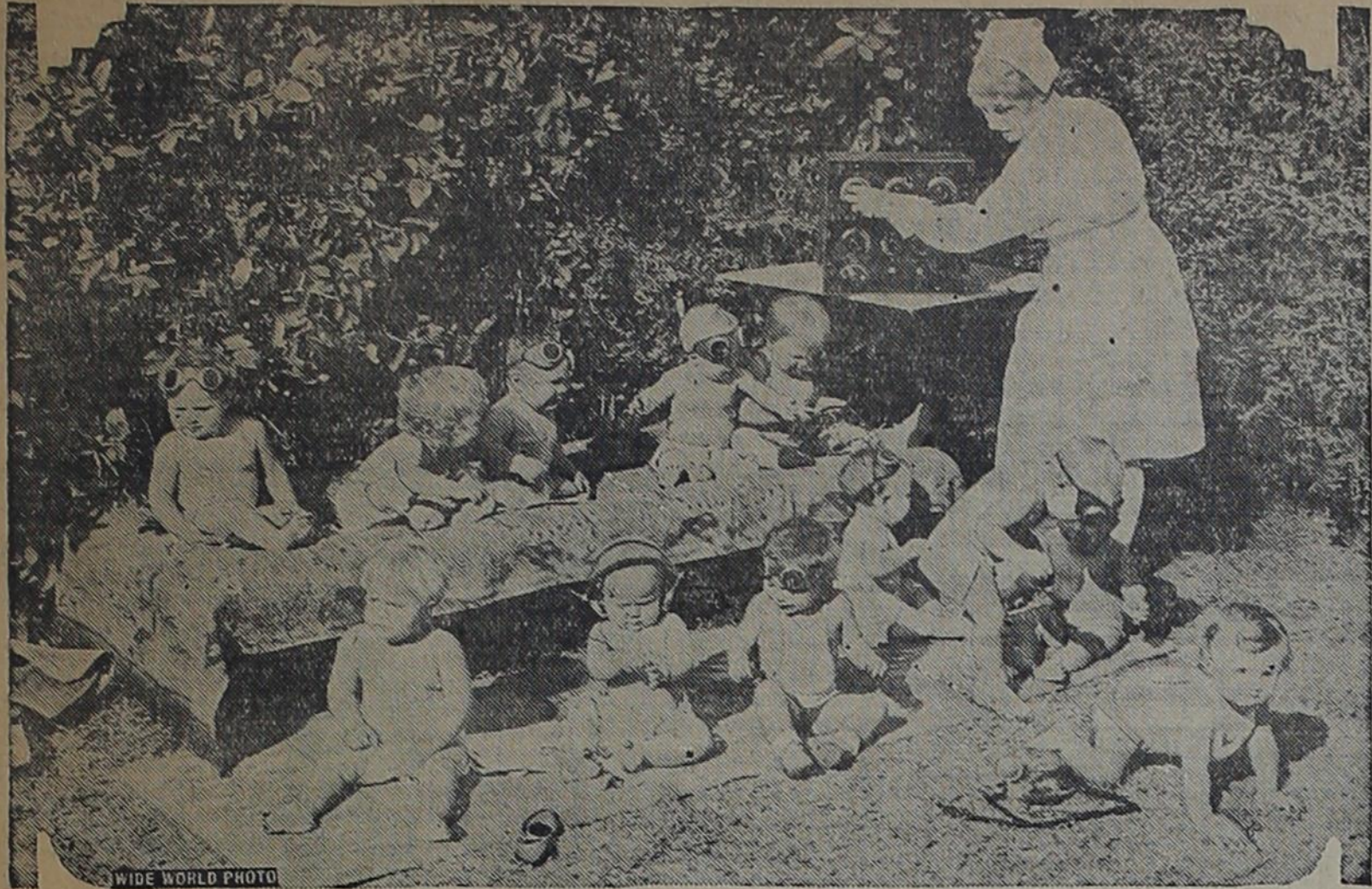

25, along with about twenty other citizens of this county. He will be furnished with advertising matter, and will distribute it among the thousands of visitors at the meeting.

Committees to be Named

The directors will meet again next Monday night, at which time the president will present a list of eleven committee chairmen, all directors, for the approval of the board, after which they will complete the rosters, by the selection of from three to five members for each committee. This system, adopted in the new by-laws, will give practically every member of the organization an active work to do, and will place all work on a systematic basis, all activities being handled thru the proper committee, all of whom will be permanent. The following subsidiaries will be named:

Finance, Membership, Publicity, Highways, Free Fair and Agriculture, Municipal, Educational, Charities, Entertainment, Health, Industrial.

According to the Constitution and By-Laws recently adopted, the next general meeting will be held on the second Tuesday in April, at which time it is expected by the officers to have a detailed report of the program already outlined, and a report on all activities of the directors up to that date. Large supplies of short fed cattle are proving a heavy burden on the market. Beef cows and heifers are lowest they have been in two years. Strength in the beef market need not be expected until the early winter rush to market with half-finished animals is passed.

**Sheep**  
According to recent estimates of the United States Department of Agriculture there is a larger number of lambs and sheep on feed for market than this time last year. They estimated that with the larger numbers on feed, and probably, no improvement in demand for dressed lamb, prices on lambs are likely to be lower to average during the next four months, somewhat lower than the same period last year.

The Chicago average for this the same period two years ago, period last year, was \$16.60; for the average price was \$15.35; and for this period three years ago, the average was \$14.10.

**Hogs**  
A survey of factors affecting the swine industry gives promise of profitable prices for 1930-31. We are now at the bottom of the productive cycle and the trend for the next two years should be upward. Some people estimate that the prices, month by month, for 1930, should average fifty cents to a dollar above corresponding prices for 1929.

**Wheat**  
There is little in the wheat situation in the United States and other countries at present to 1930 crop in the United States indicate that the prices for the will be much different from those prevailing from the 1929 crop, unless fall-sown wheat suffers severe winter damage or the spring wheat acreage is reduced.

**Poultry**  
The present outlook for poultry and eggs does not justify any increase in production of chickens in 1930, either for eggs or meat, unless producers are willing to face the prospect of reductions in price levels.

**Feed Grains**  
There is no material improvement in neither domestic or export demand for oats in prospect, whereas more active competition from larger supplies of other feedgrains is probable. Feedstuff prices are expected to continue lower than a year ago during the next three or four months. A further increase in the acreage of legume hays is expected this year.
