Bobbies Take Slater Team to Win National Basketball Crown

F. F. A. Boys Win Judging Contest

Weldon Warren, Bobby Warren, and Jimmie Howell won first place in the Livestock and Dairy judging contests which were held Saturday, March 18, in Portales, New Mexico. In the Livestock contest Jimmie was 4th high man, Bobby 6th and Weldon ranked 8th giving the team a first place. In the Dairy department Weldon ranked 3rd, Bobby ranked 5th, and Jimmie scored high enough to keep the average up. Thus they won another first. These were the only contests entered by Dimmitt teams. We are proud of their fine work, and hope that other teams may do as well in the contests yet to be entered.

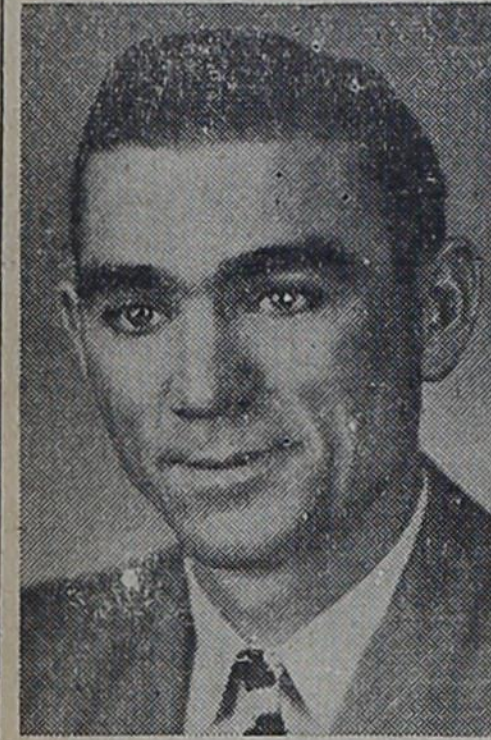
Wheat Producers to Organize Here

Chamber of Commerce Sponsors Game Broadcast

The Dimmitt Bobbies, apparently from the momentum gained in winning a fast-moving state tournament, all but routed a supposedly strong team from Slater, Iowa, in the current annual basketball classic staged between the championship teams of the two states. Gaining an 18 to 5 point margin in the first quarter, the Bobbies never seriously considered the corn fed girls from Iowa as competition during the remainder of the game. The Bobbies evened the series between Texas and Iowa teams by drubbing Slater 47 to 20, as Texas teams had lost to Iowa teams in two games while winning one. In the game Saturday night in Baylor gymnasium at Waco the Bobbies demonstrated conclusively that theirs is a championship team and the individual players probably turned in the best performances of their basketball careers.

Preparing For School Building Program Here

Members of the Dimmitt Independent School District board of trustees, made a trip to Lubbock and other South Plains cities Wednesday to study the work of various architects before employing one for the local proposed school building program. A number of architects made application for the local building job at a school board meeting on April 14, the board however delayed in making commitments until the actual work of the applicants could be studied. According to a statement by school officials this week, the board will probably meet and announce its decision as to the selection of an architect. Immediately following the employing of an architect the school board will receive a tentative estimate on the cost of the building project, and will in turn be petitioned by interested citizens to call an election for the purpose of voting a bond issue to finance the building project.

All the details available will be passed on to the citizens of the district as they become available, both as to amount of the bond issue and the effect that it will have on the financial structure of the district.

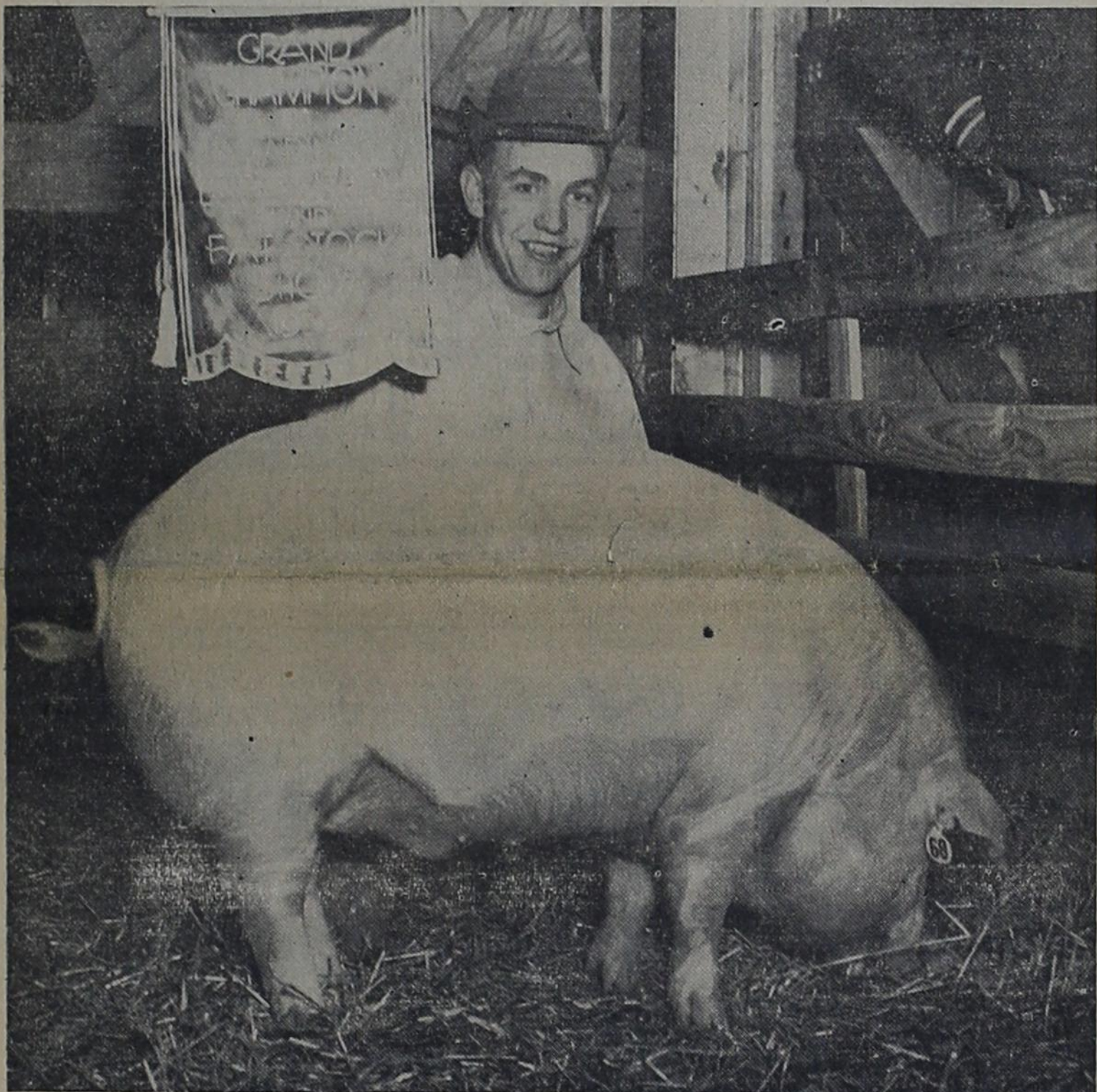

NEW THEATRE BUILDING UNDER CONSTRUCTION

The new home of the Rio Theatre is being constructed on the two lots adjacent to the Dimmitt postoffice. Construction of the new show building got underway Monday, and much of the excavating has already been completed. E. L. Brownlow of Hereford is the contractor and Harvey C. Allen of Lamesa is the architect. Building plans call for a 42x120 foot brick and tile structure, with 618 seating capacity. Mr. H. H. Carlile, owner stated that the new theatre would be modern throughout with all new equipment. The building contract was let at \$55,000.

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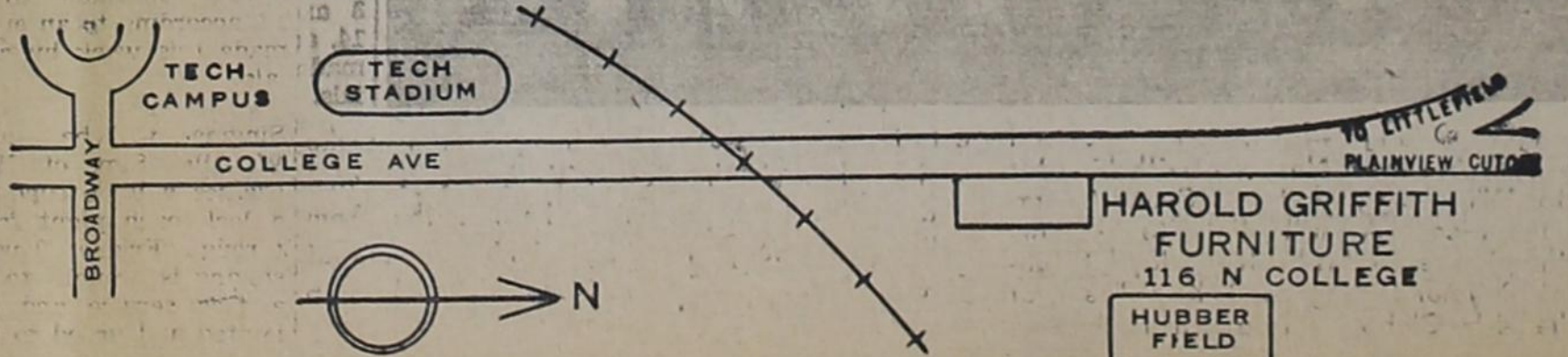

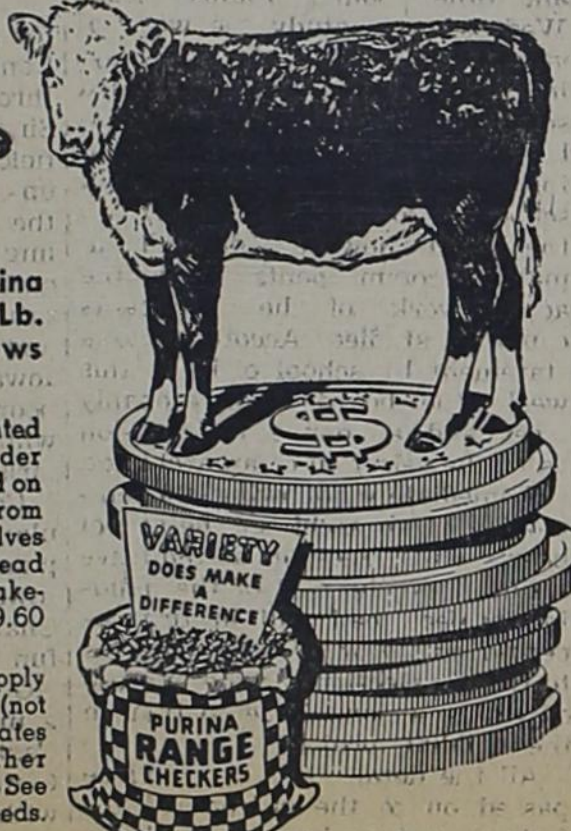

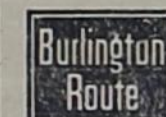

All-stater Maurine Smithson, Phyllis Behrends, and Lanelle Walthall proved they have one of the best revolving defenses ever witnessed in state girls competition by holding a usual high-scoring machine to 5 field goals.

FARMERS TO GET CENSUS QUESTIONNAIRE IN MAIL

Between March 22 and March 27th, copies of the 1950 Census of Agriculture questionnaire will be placed in the mailboxes of all farmers in Castro County, Walter S. Shaller, Census District Supervisor, said today. Farmers are requested by the Census Bureau, U. S. Department of Commerce, to fill in the questionnaires in time to have them ready to give to Census takers who will call on and after April 1 to take the Census of Population and to collect the Census of Agriculture reports.

Distribution of the Agriculture questionnaire is being made in advance of the Census enumerator's visit to afford farmers time to consult their records for information about their farms and farm production during the year 1949. Mr. Shaller said. This method, he pointed out, will save time for both the farm operator and the Census enumerator.

All farmers in this county should receive the questionnaire by March 27, allowing them about a week in which to fill the answers in to questions before Census takers start their rounds on April 1.

The average farmer can complete the Agriculture questionnaire easily. Many of the inquiries may be answered merely by checking a "Yes" or a "No", and most of the other inquiries can be answered without reference to records. However, some questions will require a little more time, namely inquiries on crop yields and receipts from sales, on the production of livestock and livestock products and income from their sale, on farm expenditures for selected items, and on other inquiries about the farm business which cover the 1949 calendar year.

Did you know that in many countries the taking of the census is a public duty combined with the spirit of a national holiday? You see the head of each household consider it a solemn duty to go to the government centers and there supply the information specified by law. In Turkey, people are required to stay at home on Census day until the enumerator calls. America has always approached the census in another way. Every effort is made to avoid regimentation or unnecessary interference with daily lives. Instead, the Census taker makes a house-to-house canvas to obtain the necessary information, with as little inconvenience to you as possible. The system of self-enumeration by farmers is being employed by the Census Bureau for the farmers' convenience. If the farmer has his agriculture questionnaire filled in when the census enumerator calls, he will save himself time and trouble by having to stop work or come in from the fields to give the enumerator the information he must have.

You are urged to cooperate.
