The National Garden Advisory mittee in conference in Washeighteenth made a survey of the Victory Garden Program for 1944 and transmits to you the followyou may consider appropriate. The surveys indicate lagging interest in Victory Gardens this year, whereas a definite need exists for all the food your state can grow in 1944 for the following reasons: First, because nearly fifty percent of the 1944 commercially ca vegetables and seventy per cent of the commercially canned fruits have been reserved for government the increased shortage of manpow er to grow food commercially and for family use. Third, because of greatly increased food needs of our allies. In some cases the need for food has doubled. Fourth, because the home grown food supply will help to hold living costs down. Fifth, because food grown at home saves transportation, manpower and scarce packing materials. Your aggressive leadership for more Victory Gardens would be a help the nation reach its goal of

Points have been reduced on spaghetti sauce; soups, grape and tomato jams and preserves; apple, grape, mint and plum jellies; bakers' jellies and fruit butters. Points have been increased on cranberries and cranberry sauce; tomato juice in large containers: canned or bottled chili sauce; raspberry and strawberry jams and preserves. Gardner Question

(By Miss Leila Petty, C. H. D. A. Q. Why doesn't my

A. There may be several read ons. Head lettuce is a cool se vegetable and should be planted 20 to 40 days before the last killing frost in the spring. Het wea-ther hastens maturity of lettuce plants and causes them to go seed before heading. Good he varieties, such as New York No. 12, Los Angeles and Dig Boston, will head if given ample room. If your plants are closer than six inches apart, thin them and keep

watered and cultivated. Q. My English peas have pow dery-looking leaves. What is the

trouble? A. This is the first sign of mildew. In the second stage, leaves a week with dusting sulphur.

Q. Last year I did not have good radishes. The tops were there, but nothing formed below the surface of the ground. Why?

A. The seed bed should be well

prepared, pulverizing the soil, before planting. If your radishes are already growing, try pulling some oose soil up around them. Q. One neighbor tells me that

Irish potatoes will not sprout if the eyes are not placed down when neighbor says the eyes should be placed up. Which is correct?

A. Actually it makes no dif-ferene whether the eyes are placed up, down or sideways. More often failure is due to seed pieces being cut too small, or besause heavy rainfall and cool weather cause rottening before they had a cher se to sprout. Seed pieces hal' of a hen egg, or large, are set During the period of sprouting and early growth, potato plants live almost entirely on the food material in the seed pieces. Therefore seed pieces should not be too

Q. My sweet corn was a failure last year. The first planting rotted in the ground, and the few

were badly damagged from worms. A. Sweet corn will rot if planted in cold ground. Wait until frost is definitely over and the ground has warmed. The Honey June variety, developed by the Texas Ex-periment Station a few years ago, has heavy shucks over the ear tip, which makes it resistant to dam

next time. Q. What is a "starter solution and how can it be used?

A. A "starter solution" is an aplication of commercial fertilzer mixed with water. Use 1/2 to 1 lb. of fertilizer to 5 gallons of water, dissolved thoroughly, and pour a pint of this solution around plants when transplanting into the garden. The treatment may be repeat-


ed in a week or ten days. Q. I do not get good from commercial fertilizers. What can I use on tomato plants?

A. Commercial fertilizers do not respond well in some heavy soils. Use 50 pounds of well rotted barnyard manure to 100 feet of row space, and add 4 to 5 lbs. of superphosphate for each 100 lbs. manure. Use twice as much superphosphate when sheep or poultry

Q. I have trouble in getting my seeds to sprout? What can I

Swiss chard seed can be broken with a rolling pin just before planting. Spinach and parsley seed may be soaked in water for a few hours just before planting. The soil may have to be irrigated well just before planting. Mrs. Woodon Brown of the Dimmitt Garden Club says she has a method that will make the seed "pop right up" She plants the seed as usual and tamps the soil well, then places a wet tow sack over the seed and keeps it wet. The sack is re moved when the plants are up. This same method was used this oring when Mrs. Charles Heck of Nazareth planted her celery seed in her frame garden.


