


HOW PHONY ARE YOU? By RONNIE PARKER

New area mental health center is for 'anyone who needs help'

The new mental health-mental retardation center in Plainview, which serves Castro and eight other counties in the area, is intended "to treat people on an individual basis instead of having them warehoused down to the state institutions in Austin, Abilene or Wichita Falls," the Kiwaris Club of Dimmitt was told Monday.

SPEAKING to the local Kiwanians was Mrs. Elizabeth Woodley of Plainview, coordinator for the new center which carries the formidable name of "Central Plains Comprehensive Community Center for Mental Health-Mental Retardation.'

The new mental health center is part of the multi-million-dollar Central Plains General Hospital complex, which was recently ded-

The center is staffed and equipped to cope with virtually every type of mental or emotional problem and to tailor the treatment to the individual's schedule and needs, Mrs. Woodley said.


