We were at Tulaqui several days before we came aboard our ship and there wasn't any place to buy anything. Everyone was out of cigarettes and no place to buy any. Everyone lined up and as we passed we could get anything we neededcigarettes. candy, gum, nearly anything you could think of. I don't know where the Red Cross came has made my past donations look rather small."






