A Constitution, under which the club will operate, is drawn up by a committee. As soon as it is com-pleted and adopted by the group, a copy will be published in the News. Some rules to be included in the Constitution are those against drinking and smoking, and that adult supervisors are to be on hand whenever the club is open.

A survey of available locations and buildings is being made, and an appeal for help, both financial and personal, is made to all organizations and individuals in the community. Though the beginning must necessrily be slow, it is hoped eventually to build a club with room and facilities for all types of wholesome recreation.

This is a movement originating with the young people of the community, who realize that they must be willing to work to build the right type of recreation center. Once built, however, it will be of great valve, not only to the group now in High School, but to other generations of boys and girls to come after them. How about it?
