## February 28 To Be "Heart" Sunday

There are 500,000 school children now affected by heart conditions as compared to 100,000 affected by polio, and that is why it is important that contributions are made to this cause on Heart Sunday, February 28. The committee members of the Heart Campaign in Castro County were told recently by Dr. Robert Moore, American Heart Association representative from New York and Richard F. Dini of the Texas Heart Association.

The goal of the Heart Association is to find an equivalent to the Salk vaccine. In 1958 diseases of the heart and blood vessels caused more than one half of all deaths in the United States. An effort to further heart research there will be 1,500,000 Heart Fund volunteers participating in the drive on Heart Sunday, February 28. A group has been organized in Dimmitt to make door-to-door calls on that day. Each contributor receives an envelope in which to enclose a contribution, as soon as it returns it to the volunteer. Where no one is at home the volunteer leaves an envelope for contributions to be returned by mail.

## Boyce Tate Named to College Honor Society

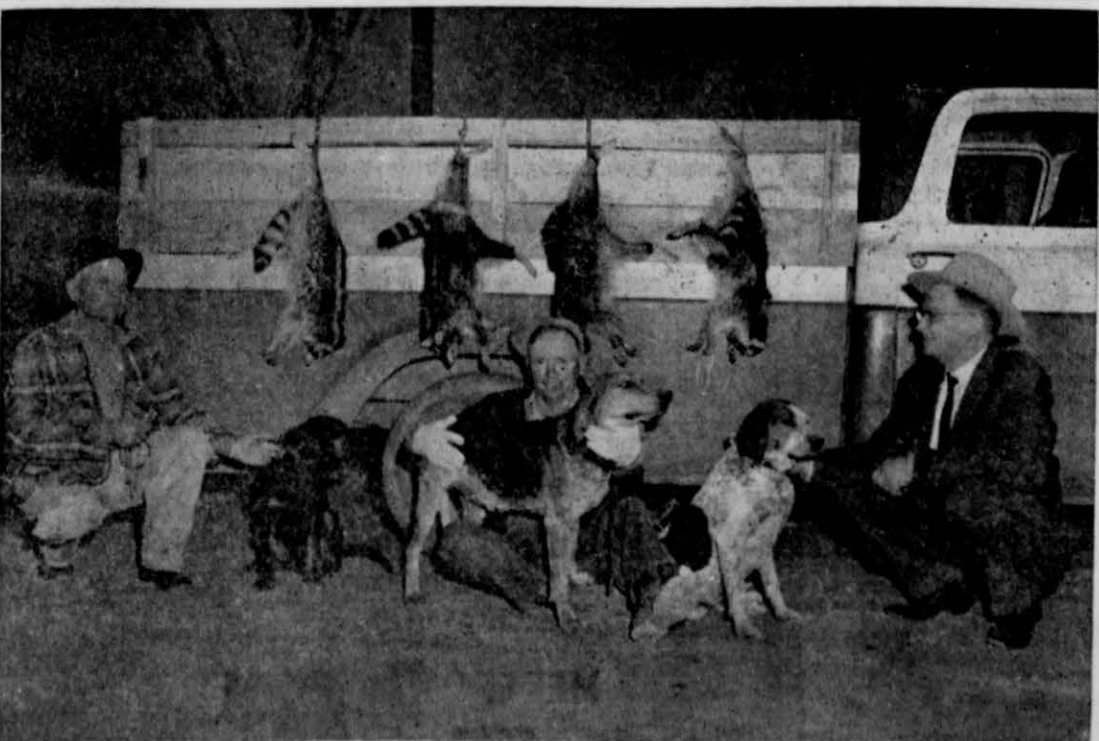

## Jerry Jones Completes Marine Basic Training

## DeKalb Lists Corn and Grain Growing Champs

In a recent Five Acre DeKalb Sorghum Growing contest held for Castro County farmers, Jack McCracken of Bovina was named winner with a yield of 9,270.8 pounds per acre. He farms in Castro County. Runner-up award went to E. R. Little of Dimmitt who had a yield of 8,933.38 pounds per acre. Worth Jones of Hart was third with a yield of 8,744.61 pounds per acre. In fourth place was Irvin Ott of Big Square who had a yield of 8,599.7 pounds per acre. All of these farms were irrigated.

Leo Witkowski of Nazareth was named county dryland grain sorghum growing champion. He had a yield of 3,630.48 pounds. DeKalb also ran a corn growing contest in this area. Forrest Collins, a perennial high corn producing farmer, won first with 93.69 bushels per acre and runner-up was R. L. DeRusha of Summerfield who produced an average of 89.47 bushels per acre.

## County Pioneer Dies In San Angelo Monday

Mr. Joe H. Elliott, 77, died in San Angelo Monday following a heart attack.

A pioneer Castro County resident, he once owned a farm several miles northwest of Dimmitt. He came to Dimmitt in 1917 and purchased the land from Joe and Archie Collins. He sold out in the thirties to Morgan Dennis and Ray Sheffy and moved to San Angelo. He was once a commissioner of Precinct 3. Buried at Sweetwater, Mr. Elliott is survived by his wife and two married daughters.

## Farmers Union Delegates to Tell of Trip

Mr. and Mrs. Dick Reinhardt and Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Youts returned Monday from a trip to Washington as part of a Farmers Union delegation.

While in Washington they visited with Senator Ralph Yarborough and Speaker of the House of Representatives Sam Rayburn, among other dignitaries.

They were also guests of the Farmers Union on numerous sight-seeing tours throughout the city and to special talks by the State Department, the Department of Agriculture and others.

The group, which annually lobbies for specific farm legislation, had as one objective the promotion of the Pogue Bill, which would provide for 100 percent of parity, a ten percent acreage cut with no payment for the land laid out and other benefits to farmers.

A meeting will be held Monday in the community room of the First State Bank where the two men will tell of their experiences and of some of the impending farm legislation before the house and senate. Copies of the Pogue bill will be available to those attending.

The public is invited to attend the meeting which begins at 7:30 p.m.

## Chamber of Commerce Banquet Hears Talk on Russian Situation

About 200 people—the largest crowd in years—attended the Chamber of Commerce banquet Monday night at the grade school cafeteria.

Musical presentations were greeted by enthusiastic applause and other items such as the introduction of new officers and directors preceded the highlight of the evening, an address by Dr. Floyd D. Golden, president of Eastern New Mexico University in Portales. Dr. Golden centered his talk around a trip he and a group of other educators took to Russia three months ago.

In opening his topic, Dr. Golden said "I will be speaking tonight of 220,000,000 communists and atheists who have nothing to worship, consider no life hereafter, and who consider human life so cheap that it can be sacrificed for little or nothing."

"The government owns and controls everything," he emphasized, "the land, the buildings, the air, the people and their thoughts and actions. The government is everything to Soviet Russia."

"The government is so strong," he said, "that the people live in continual fear. We could get one Russian to talk frankly to us but never two at once. If two were involved each was afraid the other would turn him in to the government if either spoke freely. Most individual Russians we talked to were friendly and wanted to know our side of the picture about the United States. But their government's attitude is not like that. Everywhere we looked we saw hate preached. More than half the news in the newspapers and on the bulletin boards is about the United States, but it's all the worst news about crime, racial hatred, and the like."

"The average Russian never had it so good," Dr. Golden said. "He lives in crowded, miserable apartments, he is dismal, depressed, weary and has very little personal ambition. But even at that he's eating regularly, can pay his apartment rent, and has a security of sorts which is all better than he has ever known. The Russian people have always lived in abject poverty."

"At age 16, everyone receives a work card. With this card he can get a job assignment, he can purchase his ration of food and he is entitled to an apartment. Without this card he is nothing. He must also have a passport which is presented to officials anytime he goes out of town or stays away from his apartment for the night. "One strange thing about life in Russia is that people are always milling around on the sidewalks, at all hours of the day or night. They are walking aimlessly in and out of shops and up and down the 36-to-40 feet wide sidewalks simply because this is preferable to staying in their crowded, dank apartments. A small family has a one-room apartment, a middle-sized family has two rooms and a large family has three rooms. Four or five families may share the same bath."

## Junior Stock Show Pulls Top Animals And Other Exhibits

One of the most outstanding Junior Stock and Project Shows of recent years was held at the fair grounds last week end with a record number of entries and good crowds on hand.

Grand Champion honors went to John Smith and his lightweight Poland China hog; Madelyn Smith and her heavy weight beef calf and to Chuck Lay with his South-down sheep.

Reserve Champion ribbons were awarded to Jerry Felder in the beef calf division and to Chuck Lay in the Sheep division.

The traveling showmanship trophy, awarded for the first time this year by Dimmitt Wheat Growers, Inc., was awarded to Jerry Felder, who had a field day winning top awards.

The sale had tremendous participation with 140 sales being made to almost as many merchants, businessmen and individuals. In the beef calf sale, Cash Way Food more than doubled the floor price to pay 55 cents a pound for the

grand champion and Homer Hill of Hart paid 42 cents a pound for the reserve champion. All over the floor price of 26.20 was premium.

Hays Implement Company paid \$1.10 per pound for the grand champion Lamb. The floor was 16.50 per pound. Shambek Motor Company bought the reserve champion for 66 cents per pound.

The championship hog was purchased by High Point Grain and Fertilizer for 70 cents a pound, 55.90 cents over the floor price of 14.10. Hart Grain Company paid 59 cents for the reserve champion.

"We would like to thank the merchants, businessmen and individuals who made the sale and the show such an outstanding success," general superintendent Bob Anderson said this week. "Their generous bidding and general interest went a long way toward making the youngsters and the show producers feel that all the work was well worthwhile."

## Ginner Dies After Mistaking Acid For Cough Syrup

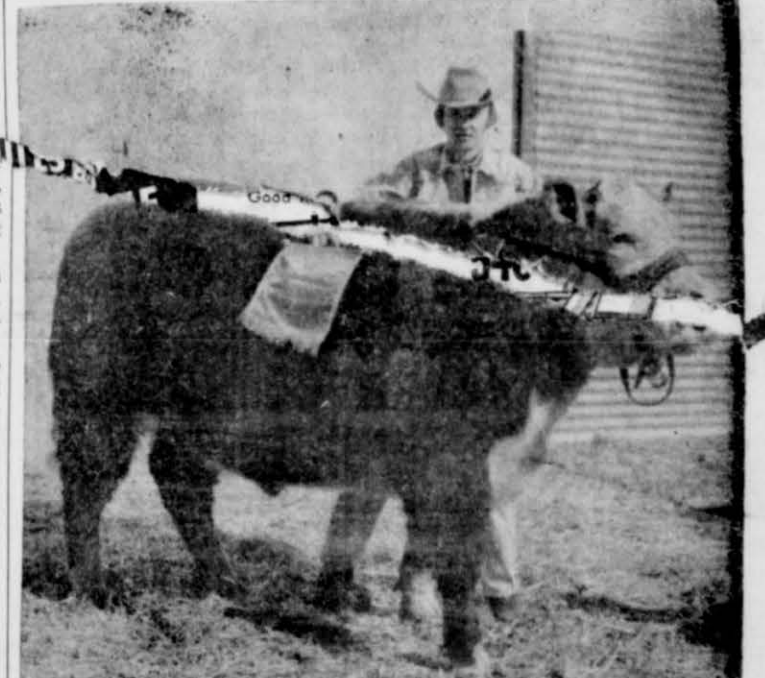
A Castro County ginner, William Cecil Parton, 57, died Tuesday after having mistakenly taken hydrochloric acid instead of cough syrup Sunday night.

Parton was admitted to the Castro County Hospital Monday. He said he decided to take cough syrup Sunday night. Some time later he became ill and drank some tomato juice before realizing he had taken the acid by mistake. He died about 2 a.m. Tuesday. The body was taken by Dennis Funeral Home ambulance to Durant, Oklahoma, where services were held Wednesday.

Parton had been the ginner at Tam Anne Gin west of Dimmitt for five years. He was a native of Oklahoma. Mr. Parton had led a colorful younger life, at one time having been a race car driver.

Survivors include his wife; two daughters, Mrs. Helen Wells, Denton, and Mrs. Wanda Weiger, Colbert, Oklahoma; his mother Mrs. O. E. Stringer, Mineral Wells; a brother, Otho Parton, Durant, Oklahoma; two half-brothers and two half-sisters.

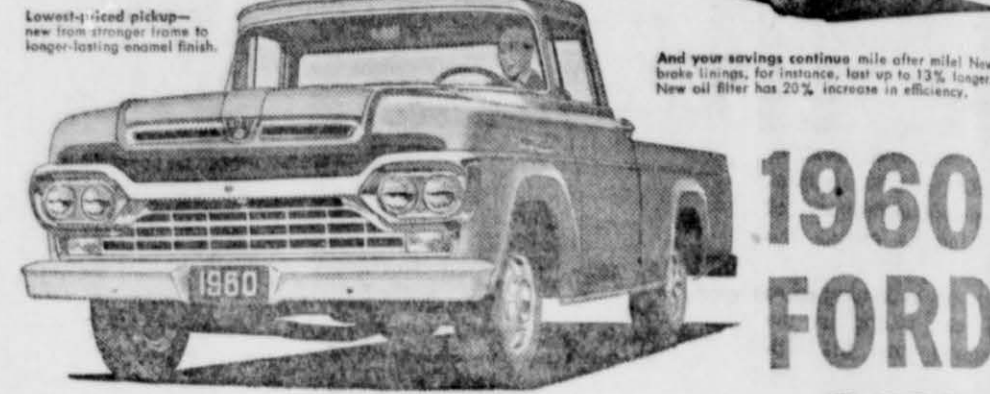

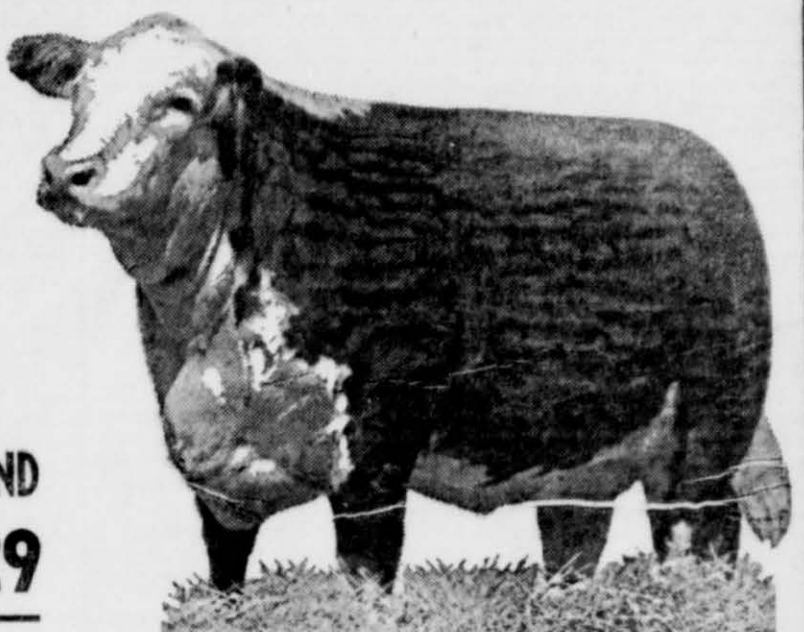

## Mrs. Walker Tells Book Club of Trip To Mediterranean

"American influence is becoming world-wide rapidly" and it is a little frightening," said Mrs. J. W. Walker of Plainview Wednesday to the Dimmitt Book Club. "Culturally" she continues "we are a little green around the edges. We need deeper cultural roots of our own. It would be better if we had a little less money."

Mrs. Walker and her husband were abroad during the summer and she spoke to the Book Club on phases of her trip, emphasizing mostly the island of Malta in the blue Mediterranean and countries of Lebanon, Israel and Jordan.

In describing the Maltese, Mrs. Walker called them warm-hearted, direct, out-going, sincere people who in their habits of living and thinking are the very opposites of complexity with practically no crime rate. One big reason for these characteristics is the fact that they live in a small area, 1/10 the size of Hale County with 80,000 people and their society is closely interrelated, and they must depend upon themselves for partners. Another reason for the lack of complexity in their lives is the fact that they are steeped in tradition. Mrs. Walker explained that Maltese tradition is a society governed by tradition, he lives by rules that are never violated and so he is never at a loss for a course of action, a rule of behavior and the result is a more orderly pleasant way of life with fewer complexities, Mrs. Walker pointed out.

She described the English who are largely responsible for the pattern of life as very glib and admit with their language, stable, refined, cultured, straight people of character who have developed the art of conversation to a very high degree. Conversation in English circles is an intriguing game of keeping it centered on the person one might be addressing, Mrs. Walker said.

"The island of Malta has been a strategic stronghold of the English for 160 years and although the English love the island and many retire there, they will eventually give it up. The national spirit is increasing, affected to a great extent by the people of Cyprus who are now on a probationary na-
