NEW BUSINESS BUILDING DAMAGED BY FIRE WEDNESDAY

A fire, of undetermined origin, gutted the attic of the locker room of the Dimmitt Food Bank building Wednesday at about 12 o'clock, resulting in an estimated \$3,500.00 damage, which was only partially covered by builders insurance. The building, which has been under construction for the past several months, had just recently been completed and was ready for installation of equipment. Work of installing insulating material in the attic, where the fire originated, was completed Tuesday. The fire was discovered by Mr. Glenn Youts who immediately turned in the alarm, and quick response by the fire department prevented the flames from spreading to other parts of the building. Although cause of the fire was not established it is certain that it was not due to defective wiring as the current had not been turned on in the part of the building where the fire orginated.


