



This is the floor plan of the proposed new Dimmitt High School. It is expected to cost about \$1 million upon completion, counting equipment, furniture, and real estate. The auditorium will be on the west side and the gymnasium on the east. Allowance is made for the possibility of later adding more classrooms on the south (upper)) side of the building. The large center area is a patio, incorporated in the design to give both separation and lighting to the maximum number of classrooms. The gymnasium will be used by and large only for physical education classes and the band hall will take care of 150 students at a time. The auditorium will seat 1,000 persons and will be the largest place for a public congregation in the county. A complete vocational training program is envisioned in the shop at upper right. The cafeteria, in the upper left, will seat 225. The building will initially handle 350 students. At present there are 282 in high school and there is a yearly gain of 15 to 20. The 76,000 square-foot building is expected to cost between \$750,000 and \$800,000. This will be opened for bidding if the bond election carries.
