Wheat Harvest Will Be In Full Swing by First of Week

Unless rains and hail prevent the 1934 wheat harvest will be well under way in Castro county by the end of the current week. Local grain men would not attempt to predict a price at which most of the grain would be sold, but local elevators were paying 70c per bushel Thursday.

First loads had been dumped and everything is in readiness for the harvest season which will be one of the earliest on record for this county. The bulk of the crop will probably be cut by July 1st.

Local elevators are in shape to handle the crop and can give as good marketing facilities as any point on the plains.

Alexander Bros. Deliver Initial Load 1934 Wheat

The first load of 1934 wheat was brought to Dimmitt Monday by the Alexander Bros. who farm 20 miles southwest of Dimmitt. The load was purchased by the Dimmitt Elevator company, C. W. Boothe, mgr.

The price paid for the grain which was A-1 and tested 60, was 73c plus a \$5.00 premium for the first load.

Alexander Brothers are very successful farmers having lived in Castro county for a number of years and farming a large amount of land.

El McPherson brought in a load of new wheat Wednesday to the Dimmitt Wheat Growers Elevator, which was believed to be the second load of new wheat brought to Dimmitt this season. The grain tested 59 and brought 70c a bushel on the local market.

Urge All Who Want Wheat Loans To Apply Early

Every farmer in Castro county who expects to make application for a wheat loan is urged to do so at once, according to John S. Andrews, field supervisor for emergency crop loans.

"Although Castro has not as yet had restrictions removed to permit loaning \$400, we expect to have this done and are accepting applications for this maximum amount with the understanding that if the county does not get the emergency relief the loan will revert back to the \$250 limit," Mr. Andrews said.

Every farmer who expects to apply for a loan is urged to do so at once. Applications may be obtained in the county agent's office and Mrs. A. S. Headley will assist with filling them out.

First Checks on New Cotton Plan Arrive Thursday

Eighty four checks representing the first half of the rental payments on fifty-six of the county's 99 cotton reduction contracts were received by County Agent E. W. Thomas today (Thursday). A total of \$4,755.81 was received. Returns on the balance of the contracts are expected at an early date.

Two and Half Inches of Rain In Seven Days

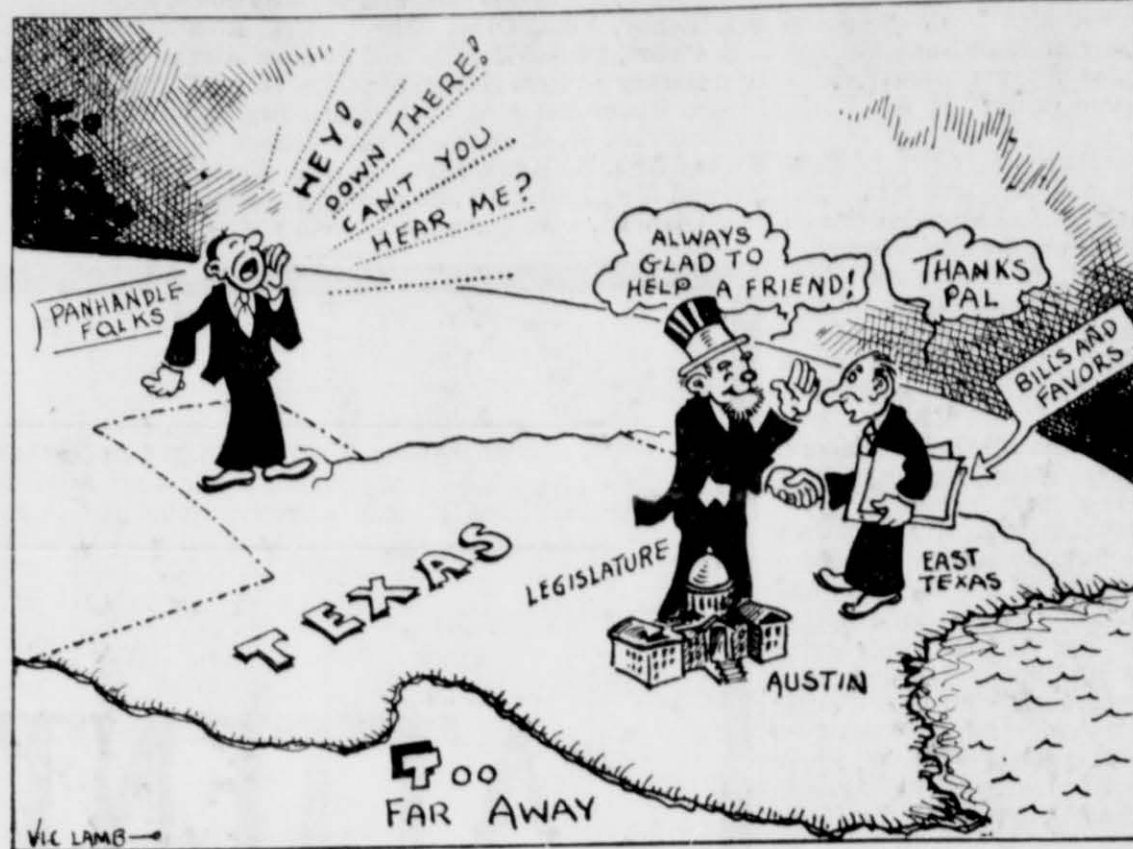
