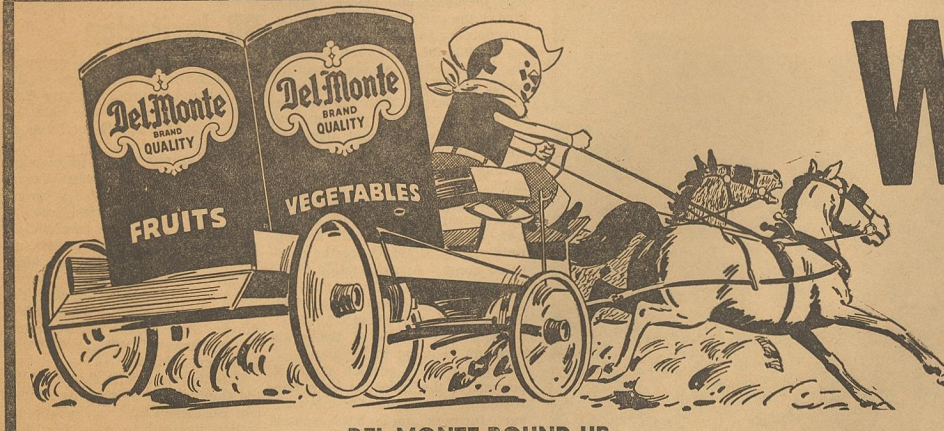

Texas Lumbermen Issue Subpoenas

Thousands of subpoenas were handed out by a posse of Texas "sheriffs" to witnesses of numerous gun-fights in McCormick Place, Chicago convention center, during the annual exposition of the National Lumber and Building Material Dealers Association held on Nov. 24. The subpoenas summoned the witnesses to appear in Dallas next November when 10,000 lumbermen attending the convention.

Included in the Texas delegation was Bob Meyers, Willson & Nichols Lumber Company, Dimmitt.

In addition to issuing the subpoenas, the Texas contingent manned a special booth and handed out promotional material about the Lone Star State to arouse interest in next year's convention.

Swifts Capture District Crown

Nazareth Swifts claimed the 1-B eight man district title Friday night as they defeated Smyer 44-18.

The victory sends the Swifts into Bi-district where they will meet the tough Wellman Wildcats on a date and place to be determined the latter part of this week.

Using a multiple offense with a mixture of I-formation, shotgun and single wing, the Swifts rolled up 367 yards of which 205 were in the air.

Marvin Hoelting, ace quarterback completed eight out of 13 passes in an outstanding aerial attack. Chief targets were ends Lester Schulte and Jimmy Hoelting.

In first quarter play Dennis Gerber, outstanding halfback for the Swifts, went over from 10 yards out after a 50-yard march. Extra point attempt failed.

Nazareth kicked short and recovered the ball. They marched 35 yards with Gerber going over from seven yards out for the second TD. Tommy Wethington plunged over for the conversion points. Nazareth took the ball later in the quarter and Gerber scored the third Swift touchdown from 10 yards out.

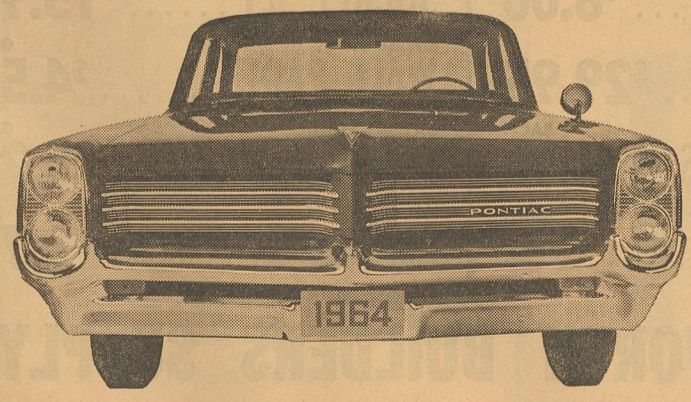

Mrs. Joe Benson acting as a saleslady from Dallas performed in a humorous skit with Mrs. Morton who was acting as a buyer.

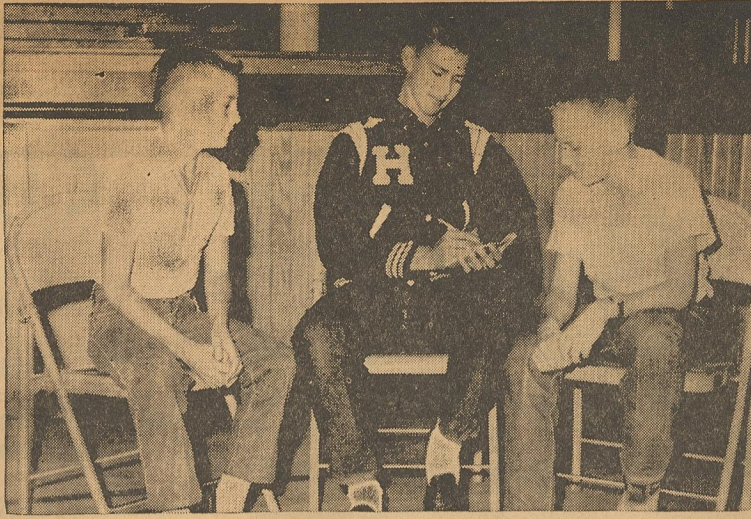

with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Animal Husbandry at Texas A & M University will do the instructing in the course. He is headquartered at Texas A & M University.

Mr. Tocquigny holds a B. S. Degree in Agricultural Education from Texas A & M College, and an M. S. Degree in Agriculture from Texas A & M. He has been a Hampshire breeder and commercial feeder for the past ten years maintaining a fifteen sow herd.

"Many swine short courses in various parts of the state have been taught by Mr. Tocquigny and all have met with outstanding success," according to Walter Labay, area supervisor of vocational agriculture Plainview, Texas. Arrangements for the adult education short course in swine husbandry and in other fields are made through Labay's office.

The short course at Dimmitt is

scheduled to begin Nov. 18 at 7:30 p.m. in the vocational agriculture building. Other meetings in the series of 4 will be held Nov. 19, 20 and 21. During the dates the short course is in progress, Tocquigny will be available to assist students with individual problems and to provide on-the-farm instruction, according to Otte.

Farmers interested in attending the short course should call the teacher of vocational agriculture, Otte at 647-3186. An entry fee of \$2 will be charged Swine Production Short Course Certificates are to be presented to each student who attends all the training sessions.

Tocquigny states that the short course will be adjusted to wishes and interests of farmers enrolled, but that he expects to cover such subjects as selecting and breeding, feeding & feeding requirements, management, disease and parasites housing and equipment, and marketing.

"Short courses in swine production, as well as in other areas, are now available to farmers throughout the state under the cooperative program between Texas Education Agency and Texas A & M University," stated Bob Jaska, associate professor, Department of Agricultural Education at Texas A & M University, who coordinates the program.

"This cooperative program," states Jaska, "is designed to make the services of specialist available to conduct short courses under the supervision of public schools. Such a program will enable teachers of vocational agriculture to provide improved educational services to farm people."

Specialists are now available in the fields of beef production, insect control, farm management, farm electrification, farm (are) welding, swine production, tractor maintenance, dairy science, pasture and oxy-acetylene welding.

Disease Control Conference Set

Insects and plant diseases, major creators of problems for rural and city dwellers alike, will be discussed in detail during the annual Texas Insect and Plant Disease Control Conference at Texas A & M University, November 12-13. The conference will be held in the Memorial Student Center.

The latest ammunition from research findings dealing with the control of these home and production problem makers will be presented by entomologists and plant pathologists of the University and by off-campus authorities.

Two of the featured speakers will speak during the first session. They are Herbert F. Tomasek, chairman of the executive committee of the National Agriculture Chemicals Association, Kansas City, Mo. He will discuss the importance and use of chemicals in today's agriculture. He will be followed by a "Report of the Pesticide Control Activities of the Food and Drug Administration" by Sam D. Fine, Director for the Dallas District, FDA.

Research and Extension entomologists during the following sessions will present the latest research findings and control recommendations on nematodes, vegetable disease and insects, grain sorghum, forage, and rice insects and diseases and also those for fruits and nuts. Dr. Robert Harris from the USDA's Agricultural Research Service, Kerrville, will discuss "Recent Developments in Livestock Insect Research" during the final session of the first day's program.

Extension Entomologist John Thomas will follow with Livestock pest control recommendations for 1964.

Conference participants will have an opportunity during the Tuesday evening sessions—separate for insects and plant diseases—to get answers on specific questions and problems from University staff members. Of special interest to plant pathologists, plans are expected to be made for an organized program to combat southwest cotton rust damage in Texas. Cotton insects and diseases will get all the attention during the Wednesday morning session which will conclude the conference.

Common warts in cattle are caused by a virus and are infectious. The udder of dairy cattle is usually affected and infection takes place by contact of injured skin with infectious material. Normal sanitation measures will prevent the spread of warts and a vaccine is also available for immunization, prevention and treatment of the animals.

Meat Inspection System Discussed

Americans can have confidence in the meat they buy in today's markets, says Ed Uvacek, livestock marketing specialist at Texas A & M University.

It is examined for wholesomeness

by means of an inspection system and has been systematically graded to indicate quality differences, he says. Inspection and grading are the two most important areas in the marketing of livestock and meat in this country.

A new Texas A & M University Extension leaflet, L-585, explains each inspection stamp used in the state and the differences in the

U.S. Federal meat grades. The various inspection stamps are examined in detail and the meaning of the lettering on each is explained.

The publication also traces the recent changes which have occurred in the Federal grades for each species. A special section explains the USDA dual grading system which was in effect for a one year

trial period, from July 1962 to 1963. The USDA is presently proposing that the yield grade portion of the dual system be incorporated into the old grading system. A copy of this leaflet can be obtained from your county agricultural agent or by writing the Department of Agricultural Information, College Station, Texas.

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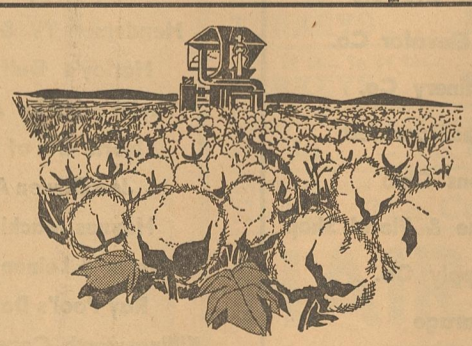

Farmers Union Elect Delegates

Castro County Farmers Union met at Hart Thursday night, Nov. 7. Delegates and alternates to the Texas Farmers Union Convention were elected. They are Carl King, Theron Morrison, R. A. Futrell and Ed Bennett. Alternates are S. L. Garrison, Wes Anthony, John Merritt and Norman Cleavinger.

The following resolutions were adopted.

"We favor continuing the present feed grain program on a long term basis. The price of feed grains should be maintained on the basis of relative feeding value."

"We recommend the enactment of the 1963 Voluntary Wheat Program on a long term basis."

"We recommend the extension of the Bracero Program without the amendment which requires the Employer to furnish transportation and job guarantee to Domestic laborers."

"We recommend future Referendums on farm programs be passed by a majority vote instead of a two third majority."

Castro County Farmers Union supports the Castro County and the High Plains Gas Users Association in their effort to obtain the right of appeal to the Railroad Commission concerning gas rates now being given cities.

These resolutions will be sent to The Texas Farmers Union Convention.

The convention is to be held at the Pioneer Hotel in Lubbock, Nov. 22 and 23. Hotel reservations should be made at the earliest possible date. A very large group is expected to attend. This is the first time the Texas Farmers Union has held its convention on the High Plains.

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Grain Sorghum Chat

Association, said that if the applications had been approved, grain sorghum growers possibly would have lost their California and Arizona markets and the Japan market.

"Nearly 25 per cent of our total grain sorghum production goes to the West COAST," Nelson said "and Japan is the largest single importer of milo in the world. This year she imported 500,000 tons and next year will import nearly 800,000 tons. If the rate reduction had gone through, milo growers stood to lose these two markets."

Nelson added that "all transcontinental rail carriers, after consideration and evaluation, concluded the present rate structure was not in the best interest of all concerned."

changes was spearheaded by the GSPA. The Omaha Grain Exchange filed its application on July 24 and the USDA filed on Aug. 1.

"The application by the Omaha Grain Exchange was on obvious attempt to 'dump' corn on the West Coast in competition with grain sorghum," Nelson said. "The OGE openly stated their motive in the application — 'the problem is to find ways and means of placing this tremendous surplus of Nebraska corn on the market particularly in Lower California in effective competition with Texas milo.'"

Nelson added that the railroads had been asked to undermine their established producer and trade customers in order that the Exchange could compete even though they were much further from lower California than the Texas points whose rates are affected by truck competition.

The USDA application attempted to establish that revenues of the

participating railroads would be increased, however, Nelson said that the application "very carefully failed to point out the losses in revenue to carriers of grain sorghum to the Gulf and West Coast export points."

In the government application, the USDA said that "the Japanese like to do business with us and we like to do business with them. As one of the desirable dollar markets, the administration wishes to keep them as satisfied customers for our agricultural commodities."

Nelson commented that "this happy business arrangement could be continued equally as well with grain sorghum as with corn."

Accent on Health

Common colds and influenza cases increase during the fall, reaching a winter peak. Underlying causes pose a perplexing problem for scientists.

One thing they have determined is that a high standard of health promotes disease resistance.

With this in mind and a look at the calendar we are reminded that it's time to take an individual fall health inventory.

Separable elements of a healthy life are a balanced diet, plenty of sleep and adequate exercise. Persons who have chronic diseases or other health problems are exceptions to the rule and should - of course - be advised by a physician.

Panaceas proclaimed by health and food faddists vacillate from vegetarian to carnivorous diets - from taking an early morning swim to drinking warm mineral water. The list is vast, but a balanced plan for daily living, boasts modern health authorities' stamp of approval.

A balanced diet, according to nutritionists, includes daily consumption of the basic four: protein, green and yellow vegetables, milk and eggs, bread or other wheat products. Contrary to some popular theories, an inadequate diet supplemented with vitamin pills does not satisfy body needs.

The average person spends over 8,000 24-hour days, or between a quarter to a third of his life, in sleep. Physiologists are still trying to formulate a scientific definition of sleep. The need for sleep, however, is apparent. Fatigue forces the body to work harder performing tasks than it would during ordinary circumstances.

Physical exercise—a change-of-pace activity or recreation - is the most frequently overlooked aspect of personal health. Regular, temperate exercising enhances bodily functions.

Persons who consistently stay indoors in cold weather are most susceptible, statistics show, to the common cold.

Modern scientific research has provided man with vaccine for such diseases as smallpox, polio, diphtheria, whooping cough, tetanus and influenza. The individual bears the responsibility of keeping his immunizations up-to-date.

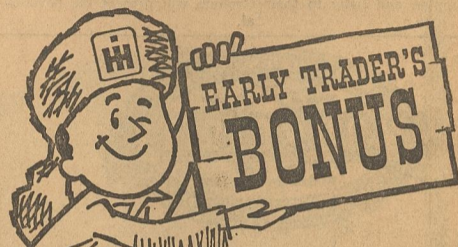
She was the Castro County 1963 Dress Revue winner and attended 4 Round-up in Share-The Fun Contest and District Electric Camp.
