## THE SITE FOR MIDLAND COLLEGE SELECTED YESTERDAY


#### Abstract

The site for Midland College was finally determined yesterday afternoon by the committee repr senting Texas Christian Univer sity. This committe was compos d of Chalmers McPherson, of Ft . Worth, Charles W. Gibson of Waxahachie, and Colby D. Hall of Waco. The other members of the ommittee, T. E. Shirley of Hereord and T. E. Tomlinson of Hillsoro, were unable to be present. Of the several sites offered the one determined upon was chosen for several reasons which appeared to the committee as best dapted for the location of a college. One of these was the paricularly high elevation of the land. The accepted site comprises o hundred and twenty-five acres ill in one body, lying west of town, mostly in the H. N. SEC'TY HARDWARE JOBBERS ADDRESSES COMMISSIONERS.

Contends That Higher All Rai
Rates Could Be Counteracted in Texas.

Austin, Texas, Nov. 30.--R. F. Bell of Fort Worth, secretary of the Texas Hardware Jobbers' As sociation, appeared before the Railroad Commission today, ac companied by local jobbers, to discuss the matter of a petition for lower rates from Galveston and Texas City to Texas interio points, the idea being to take ad vantage of the low water rates into Galveston, and thus offset the recent advance in the all-rail rates
from Mississippi River crossings from Mississippi River crossing: and territory adjacent to Texas points. While they were interested
in all articles of hardware, paints in all articles of hardware, paints,
etc., they advocated the genera prisciple of lower rates via Texa Gulf points.
It was pointed out to the commission that the only place i Texas where water competition is met is to Houston, although Galveston has the Gulf on regular steamship lines. Mr. Bell insisted that the old basis of the rail rates fixing the total charges betwee Atlantic seaboard and Texas point was wrong, and that the Gulf
might as well not be in existence. might as well not be in existence.
He pointed out that even if the ates from Texas ports to inland towns were reduced the Texas roads would be by far heyainers because the tonnage would be inoved via water and Texas ports, and the locals from Galveston out amount of the present divisions where the tonnage moves all rail. Railroad Commission today, accompanied by local jobbers, to discuss the matter of a petition for Thes from Galveston and T2 OFCity to Texas interior poimts, the idea being to take ad vantage of the low water rates into Galveston, and thus offset the recent advance in the all-rail rates from Mississippi River crossings and territory adjacent to Texas points. While they were interested in all articles of hardware, paints, etc., they advocated the general principle of lower rates via Texas Gulf points.
It was pointed out to the commission that the only place in Texas where water competition is met is to Houston, although Galveston has the Gulf on regular steamship lines. Mr. Bell insisted that the old basis of the rail rates fixing the total charges between Atlantic seaboard and Texas points was wrong, and that the Gulf mirghe swell not be in existence.
