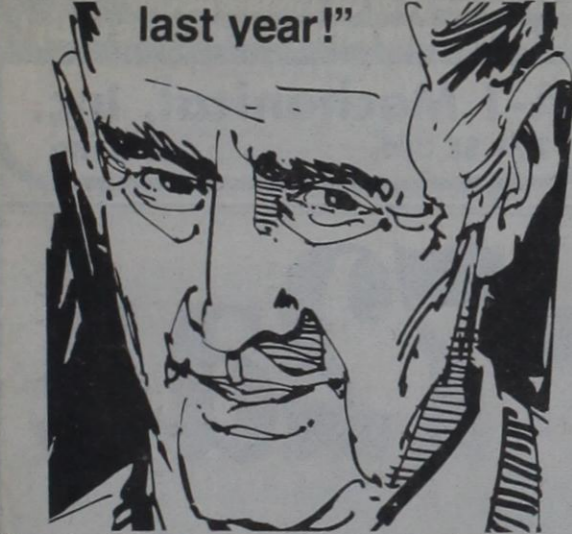

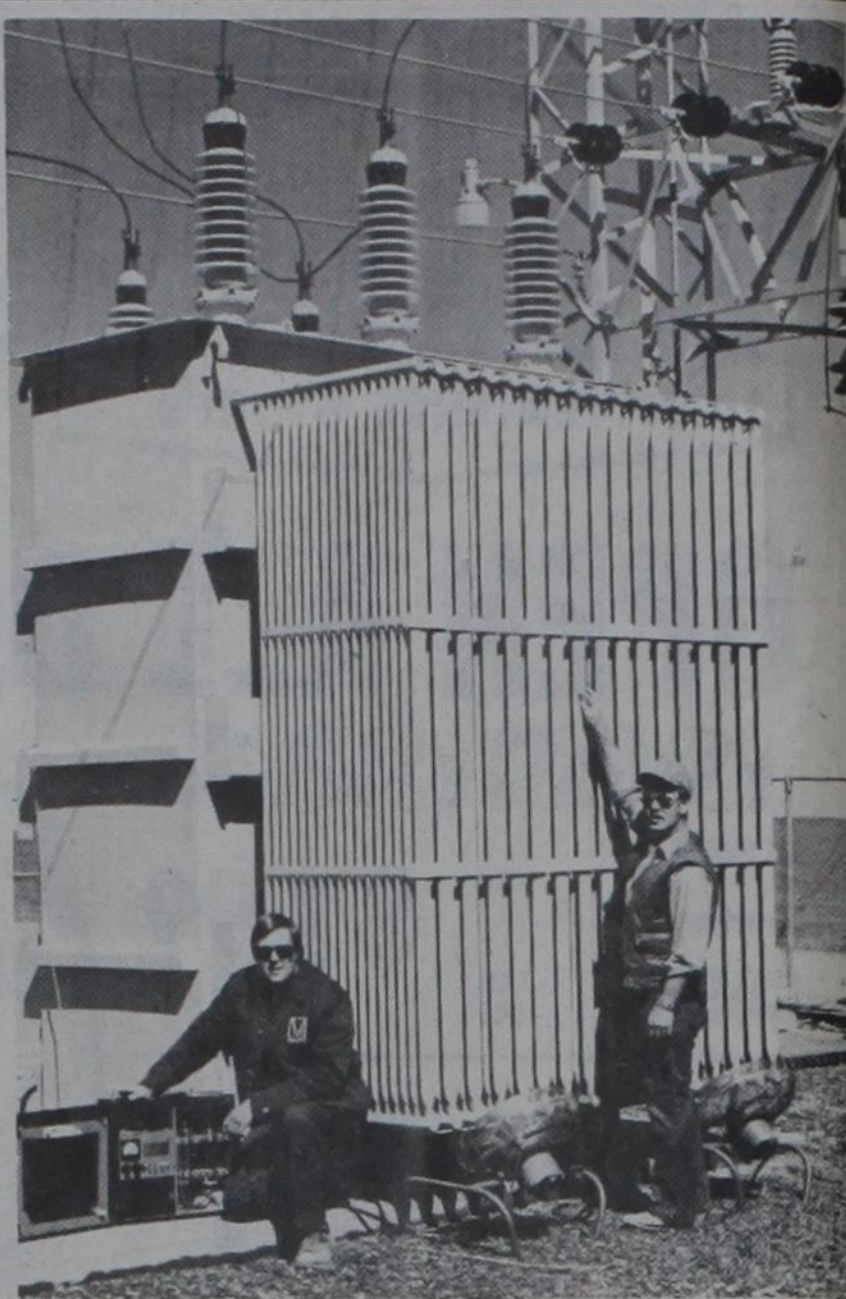

## Vandals plague electric co-op

Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative encourages everyone to report any peculiarities near substations or electric lines involving vandalism of any kind.

A substation transformer was the most recent victim of vandalism. On March 14 the transformer, 10 miles west of Friona, was shot with a high-powered rifle. The damage caused the oil to leak out, and a short caused the transformer to burn up.

The transformer was valued at \$70,000 and served approximately 584 homes, farms and businesses.

These costs are paid for out of revenue that otherwise would be returned to consumers as capital credits. The vandals are taking from all members of the REC, said James Hull, manager of Deaf Smith REC.

Gunmen shot three insulators south of Friona and the

expense of labor, materials and outage time was in excess of \$500.

Sometimes vandalism damage is not noticed until it rains, then the lights go out, Hull said.

Vandalism of electric property in Texas is measurable by up to a \$10,000 fine and imprisonment for 10 years.

## Group attends FLB conclave

Four persons represented the Federal Land Bank Association of Dimmitt at the 34th annual stockholders' meeting of the Federal Land Bank of Texas last week in Houston.

Attending from Castro County were Mr. and Mrs. Marlos May and Mr. and Mrs. Doyle Davis. May is manager of the local association, and Davis is one of the five board members.

The meeting, held at the Houston Oaks Hotel, was attended by 650 persons representing 64 FLB associations.

In his report to stockholders, President Thomas H. Benson noted an increasing demand for new loans in 1979. This was the largest year in the bank's history, with \$337 million in loans, and it appears the demand for loans will continue, he said.

"In this time of historic highs in interest rates, the advantages of our loans is apparent to the farmers and ranchers of Texas," Benson said. "Our borrowers have interest rates much below prime rate."

Speakers included Ralph L. Lewis Jr., coordinator of corporate communications of Gulf Oil Corp. in New Orleans, La; Barry Mahler of Iowa Park, vice-president of the Young Farmers Association of Texas; and C. T. Fredrickson, senior deputy governor of the Farm Credit Administration in Washington, D. C.

The Federal Land Bank of Texas makes long-term loans on farms and ranches, and currently has 36,000 loans for approximately \$1.6 billion outstanding.

## Hance amendment seeks farm price-parity tie

Congressman Kent Hance successfully amended legislation in the House Agriculture Committee Tuesday which ties farm commodity prices to parity.

The approval by the Agriculture Committee marked the first time in more than 30 years it has okayed legislation which based farm prices on the concept of parity. The bill, HR 6815, will now go to the House Budget Committee before facing a full House vote.

"This could prove to be one of the most significant votes in years by the Ag Committee," Hance said. "Tying farm price loan rates to parity is something we have needed to do to protect the farm industry."

Hance's amendment set loan rates for all farm commodities at 65 percent of parity.

Milk is the exception because it already has an 80 percent parity rate.

Simply defined, parity is the purchasing power of farm goods compared with a base established on the farm prices of 1914. One hundred percent parity would mean establishing farm prices in comparison with other manufactured goods using the prices of 1914 as a base of equality.

"Putting farm prices on parity ties them to other segments of the economy and would eliminate much of the uncontrollable situation farmers have faced with farm

prices which are out of balance with today's economic indicators," Hance said. "This bill will still face strong opposition in the House and possibly from the Administration. However, it is a significant step because it is a totally new direction for Agriculture Committee policy."

## St. Jude's bike-a-thon needs more volunteers

Volunteer workers and riders are needed for the St. Jude Children's Research Hospital "Wheels-for-Life" bike-a-thon to begin April 19.

The bike-a-thon is to raise funds for the world-famous research center and its battle against childhood cancer and other catastrophic childhood diseases.

This year's bike-a-thon chairman is Jo Parks. This year's ride is being dedicated to Lisa, a leukemia patient at St. Jude, Mrs. Parks said.

"By riding for Lisa, we'll really be helping all stricken children since research is the only way these illnesses can be conquered," she said.

"We're looking for people who will contribute some of their time and energy to help children live. We really need bike riders, since they are the ones who can make this bike-a-thon successful."

Riders enlist sponsors who donate a sum for each mile completed. The riders who raise \$25 will receive a St. Jude T-shirt and those raising \$75 will receive a back pack.

Prizes for other riders will also be given.

"You can put your muscles to work for a child's life in this bike-a-thon," Mrs. Parks said. "We need every bike and every rider."

St. Jude's Hospital was founded by entertainer Danny Thomas and operates primarily from public contributions.

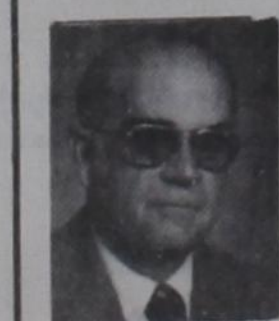

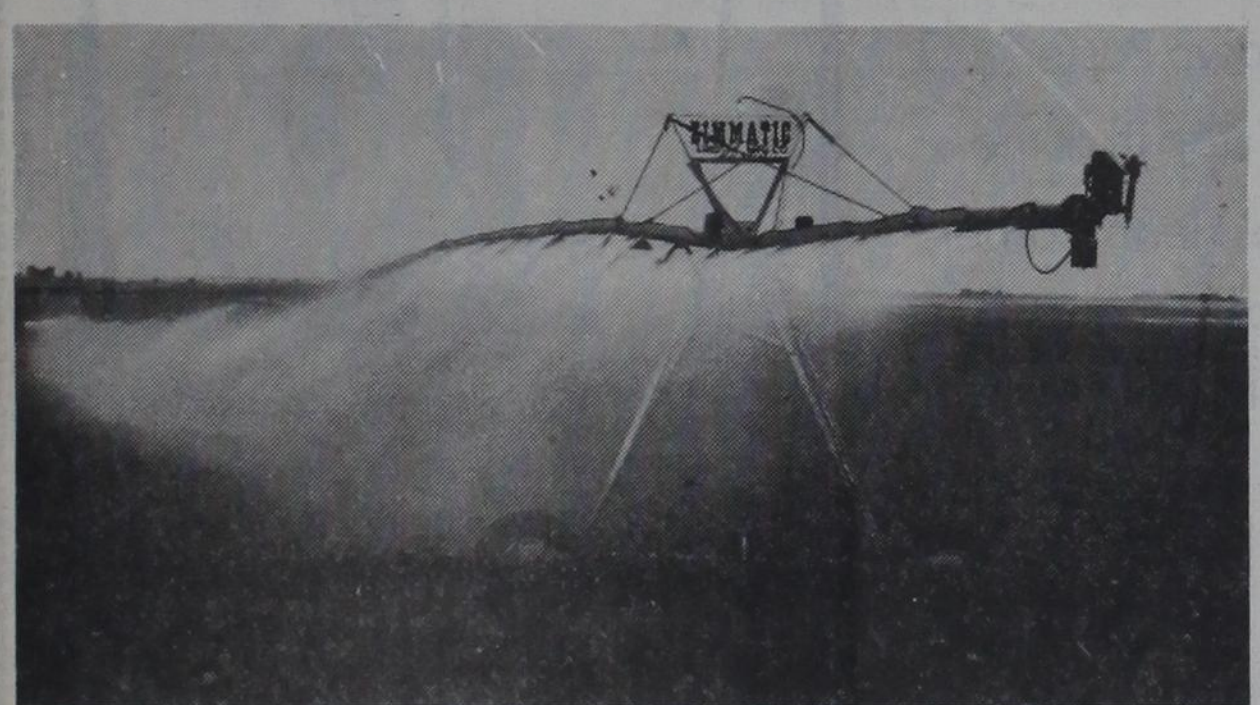

## Social Security in Castro County

By JANICE B. ULMER



In Castro County we have over 1091 people receiving social security benefits. There is an additional 103 people receiving supplemental security income, also administered by social security. In order to provide the best possible service, we must have the help of our beneficiaries.

Receiving a check carries certain responsibilities. Events that could affect payments must be reported. These events include:

- Change of mailing address.
- Expected earnings in 1980 over the exempt amount - \$5000 for people 65 and over and \$3,720 for people under 65.
- Planned departure from the United States.
- Work outside the US.
- In addition, dependents and survivors should report:
  - Marriage.
  - Divorce or annulment.
  - Adoption of a child.
  - Child leaving the care of wife, widow, or widower.
  - Child nearing 18 who will continue as a full time student.
- People getting checks because they are disabled should also report:
  - Any work, no matter how low the earnings.
  - Any improvement in their condition.
  - Any change in workmen's compensation.

Someone also should report if a recipient is no longer able to handle funds, and when a beneficiary dies.

All of these changes can be reported by phone. In the Dimmitt area the toll free number is 1-800-392-1603.

More information about these events is contained in the pamphlets, "Your Social Security Rights and Responsibilities" and "What About You." We will be glad to mail you a copy or you may pick one up when the Social Security Representative is in Dimmitt on the first and third Thursday of each month from 10 to 12 noon.

## Little League tryouts start at 10 Saturday

Dimmitt Little League will sign up players from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. this Saturday and next at the Rhoads Memorial Library meeting room.

Each player is required to pay a \$10 player fee.

To be eligible, a player must reside within the established boundaries of the Dimmitt Little League - the same as the Dimmitt School District.

A player must have been born between Aug. 1, 1967 and July 31, 1972 to be eligible.

A list of players who will be required to attend tryouts will be posted at the schools.

Tryouts dates will be Saturday, April 19, and Saturday, April 26, at 1 p.m. in Little League Park.



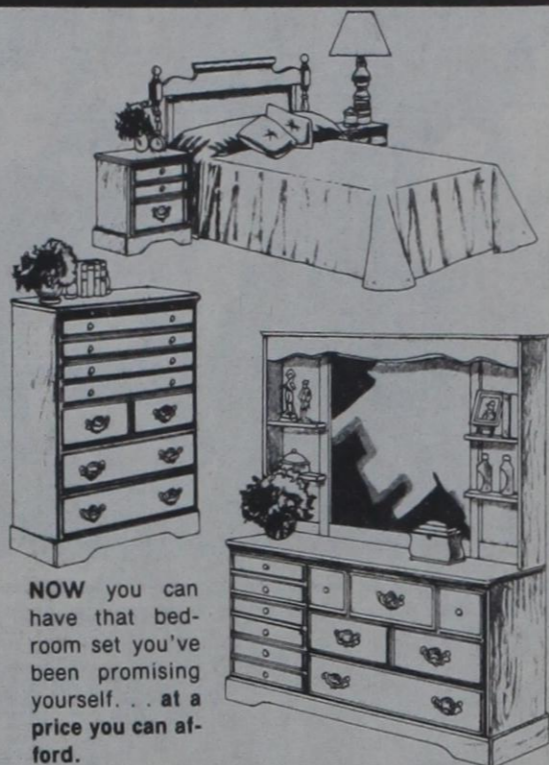

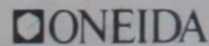

## Legal Services president stays low-key in remarks

If there are legitimate concerns, we will address those concerns, but so far I have no evidence that any laws of Congress or regulations of Legal Services are being violated," the president of the Legal Services Corp. said last Thursday after checking into the activities of Texas Rural Legal Aid, Inc., in Dimmitt and Hereford.

In the face of mounting resentment by local authorities over TRLA's class-action suits and other actions here, Dan Bradley of Washington, D.C., spent the day visiting with the TRLA staff in Hereford and with attorneys, business and community leaders in Hereford and Dimmitt.

Bradley heads the corporation that oversees federally funded legal-aid offices throughout the US.

In a press conference Thursday afternoon, Bradley emphasized that he was not here to make any immediate decisions, but to "visit and listen."

Bradley's visit was requested last fall by Congressman Kent Hance, but was delayed because of illness. Hance had charged that the TRLA was creating a "circus atmosphere" through its legal actions and resultant statewide publicity.

The Legal Services Corp. is funded by a \$300 million congressional appropriation, and in turn funds 1,200 local legal-aid offices in all 50 states.

Resolutions by Castro and Deaf Smith County Commissioners' Courts and the West Texas County Judges' Association have asked that funding for TRLA be cut off. In addition, petitions are being signed by individual citizens protesting the actions of TRLA and the use of tax money to support the defense of illegal aliens.

Bradley said there are restrictions on the aid that can be provided to those who are in the country illegally, but that illegal aliens have human rights in the US too, and that Legal Services may represent people "with immigration problems."

"I can appreciate the philosophical conflict of one arm of the government suing another," Bradley said, "but I can accept this as necessary to secure justice for poor people."

It is not unusual for new programs such as TRLA to generate community concerns Bradley said, and similar problems exist with other programs elsewhere in the country.

Bradley said he had a speaking engagement with the Texas Bar Association in June, and at that time would return to this area for further investigation.

Jeff Carlile of Hereford, who coordinated Bradley's visit, said he appreciated "his taking his time to listen."

"I feel he heard two sides — maybe four — and the meetings were good," Carlile said.

County-District Attorney Jimmy Davis said the lawyers

who met with Bradley tried to stress their concern over the "performances of TRLA staff members as attorneys."

"Those of us in this area thought of this as anything but a routine trip," Davis said, "and we appreciated his visit."

TRLA Attorney Bill Beardall told the News, "We were happy to have him visit, and feel the visit will benefit our operation and Deaf Smith and Castro Counties."

## Crop insurance cheaper than extra year's interest

Dollars invested in planting and producing crops have always been called the "riskiest dollars in farming." But with production costs going up from one week to the next and interest rates at the highest level in history, the risk is greater than ever, according to Carey Johnson, district director of USDA's Federal Crop Insurance Corp.

"This isn't to say that the likelihood of losing a crop is any greater than in past years, but the financial impact of a loss is certainly far greater," Johnson said.

He pointed out that most farmers will have more money invested in each acre this spring than they have ever had before, and if they should lose this money and have to replace it with borrowed dollars they will pay interest rates that have gone up almost twice as fast as the rate of inflation.

Due to the recent increases in home mortgage interest, many veterans are now expressing concern about their entitlement to GI home loans. A veteran's GI loan eligibility remains good until it is used. There is presently no deadline date for veterans to use their home loan entitlement.

Eligible to participate in the GI home loan program are veterans with honorable military or naval service during World War II, the Korean Conflict or the Cold War and Vietnam Era. Also eligible are persons serving 181 days or more (honorably) during the Post-Vietnam Era, which began May 8, 1975, and continuing until such time as the Congress changes the laws.
