AUTO FEES APPLIED TO BUILDING ROADS

According to Government Statistics \$16,000,000 Applied to That Purpose During 1916

Ninety per cent of the registra -tion and license fees paid in 1915 by automobilists to the States, or \$16,-213,387, was spent for the building and maintenance of county and State roads, according to a compilation just published by the Office of Public Roads of the department. In all, 2,ed in that year, and their owners paid a total of \$18,245,713 for registrations and drivers' and dealers' licenses. This is an increase of \$5.863. 760 over 1914, and an increase of 734,325 in the number of vehicles registered. Automobile fees now defray nearly 7 per cent of the total amount spent on rural road and bridge building, whereas in 1906 the income from this source was less than three-tenths of 1 per cent of the total expenditure.

The growth of the volume of fees and registrations is noted by the fact that in 1901 New York, the first state to require fees, collected only \$954. In 1916 only 48,000 cars were registered throughout the entire United States: By 1915, however, the number had jumped to the figure given so that there is slightly more than one motor car registered for each of the 2,375,000 miles of road outside of the incorporated towns and cities.

The relation between cars and road mileage varies widely in different sections. There is only one motor can for every 6 miles of rural road in Nevada, but nearly six motor cars for every mile of such road in New Jersey. There is an average of one motor car registration for every 44 persons in the United States. Iowa apparently leads, however, with one motor car for every 16 persons while only one for every 200 persons s registered for Alabama.

It must be understood, however, that the figures of registration do not necessarily represent a total number of cars, as some of the States do not require annual registration, others group pleasure and commercial cars and motor cycles in their accounts, while still other States do not require registration of motor cycles.

There is great inequality in the registration fees charged by the different States. The average for the United States was \$7.46. The State of Vermont, however, secured in 1915 a gross revenue of \$18.10 for each motor car, while Minnesota received car. In Texas and South Carolina no annual registration fees are collected, the only requirements being RANCHMEN OR OTHERS a county fee of 50 cents and \$1, respectively, for perennial registration. this adds importantly to the public

In the use of fees, however, there seem's to be a general policy of applying the major part of the money collected from automobilists directly to road betterment. In 42 of the States of the Union all or the major portion of the motor vehicle revenue must be expended for the construction improvement, or maintenance of the State highway department. In 20 States, all, or the major portion, of the net motor vehicle revenues are expended by or under the supervision or direction of the State highway department. In 7 States one-half to onefourth of the State motor vehicle revnues are expended through the State highway department, and the remainder by the local authorities. Many States, in addition to applying license fees to road construction, expend for WILL LOCATE HERE this purpose a large part of the fines and penalties collected from owners.

In the number of registrations New York State led in 1915 with 255,242; Illinois was second with 180,832; California third with 163,797, and Pennsource, however, California led with \$1,991,181; Pennsylvania third with \$1,665,276; while Iowa, with 145,000 cars registered, came fourth in point of revenue, with \$1,533,054.



There was something over \$259.00 in premiums paid to the poultry exhibitors last fair, and to our sorrow, most of it went away from Midland. Now friends, lets get busy and keep this premium money at home. We have the best climate on earth in which to raise good poultry, and why let people come here from a distance and get off with all our premium money. We sent premium money year to El Paso, San Angelo, Abilene, Stamford, Hillsboro and other places over the State, when if WE had done our part in the preparedness work we could have kept this money at home. Of course if we sit ldly by and say "Oh there is no use for me to try" the other fellow will certainly get the premium money. Some who exhibited at last fair and failed, said they were not going to try any more, when they should have said, "I'll bet these out of the County people don't beat me next year, for I'm going to prepare by buying the best I can find, and I'll show 'em a trick, and they'll have to bring better birds than these next fall, or I'll win the premium money." It isn't in the Midland people to say fail, so once more I say, get busy. If you haven't got birds good enough, buy some, and let's not send two or three hundred dollars in premium money out of the county this fall.

Here is our premium list, look it over, and you will see our premiums are worth trying for, "and if

at first you don't succeed try-try-again." I am giving my time to this cause, because I am interested, and want to see our people come up to the standard along poultry lines, as well as other lines, and will be glad to give any information I have to any one who is interested, and while I have no ill feeling to any one away from here, it certainly would do me a whole lot of good to see every dollar of our premium money won by home people. The far-away cowman, the far-away horseman, the far-away hogman, nor the far-away farmer has no edge over our local people, but it seems we are willing to let the far-away poultryman come in here and get off with all, or nearly all, of our premium money. The judging will take place on Tuesday, September 26th, as the judge has to leave for Louisiana to judge a show

on the 28th. The association will furnish coops and give birds proper feed and attention, but will not be responsible for any loss or damage that might occur from any cause whatsoever. Shipping coops must be marked

with the number of birds, breed and sex, and the name and address of the exhibitor to insure prompt return of birds after the show. All birds sent by express must be prepaid by the exhibitor.
