This venerable gentleman has visited Midland a number of times in years past and has many friends here who will be interested in reading the following interview which was had with him on this occasion of his 92nd birthday. It was published in a Wellsburg paper, and we reproduce

Optimism and temperance, said J. E. Curtis last night, are the secret of old age, but it is no secret. Yesterday Mr. Curtis celebrated his 92nd anniversary, in happiness and with the observation that the world is get-

Until ten years ago, when he was seized with wanderlust, Mr. Curtis was editor and owner of the Pan-Handle, Wellsburg, W. Va., surrendering the ownership and management to his son only a year ago.

Mr. Curtis has been a third degree Mason for sixty-five years. His grand father, also a Mason, sat in lodge meeting with General George Washngton before the latter was elected president. A silk Masonic apron, worn by the grandfather. John Curtis, is still preserved by the Lexington nohagenarian.

"I certainly do favor woman suffrage," sa'd Mr. Curtis, "and I count myself one of the original suffrag

More than half a century ago, when trustee of Bethany Christian College, West Virginia, he fought for lege. He is still a trustee of the college, in which there is now co-education, having held office for fifty-six





Students of Midland Had Interesting Contest and Won Victory by a Score of 27 to 12

Coach Hunter's fast football squad went to Big Spring Monday and place to the tune of 27 to 12. A large game was keenly contested throughout. Big Spring opened with a rush own goal line and raced one hundred and one yards for a touchdown with he whole opposing team after him. In the second quarter Tom Osburn, who had been in every play, received one of Morrison's forward passes over the goal line for the second touchdown. Osburn's blocking and breaking interference was a feature of the game. He is a sure tackler and good at receiving passes. The third touchdown came at the opening of the third quarter and was also a spectacular play. Perry, Midland's fast right tackle, received the kick-off on his own fifteen yard line and by dodging, twisting and sidestepping, added some excellent interference, ran for a touchlown. Perry is a hard and sure tackler on defense, and can always advance the ball when called back on his l'ne buck plays. The last touchdown for the local lads was Brown loose lagain. The speed marvel went back on kick formation and circled right end for eighty yards and touchdown.

Big Spring's two touchdowns came as the result of a couple of neatly executed forward passes. They could gain nothing with their line bucks and Midland's two fast ends spilled the interference spoiling their end runs. 


