# THE TIME IS SHORT THE FUNDS ARE LOW

A DOLLAR CONTRIBUTED TO DEMOCRATIC CAMPAIGN DOES WONDERS

# A HERO OF MANY BATTLES IS DEAD

ARTHUR NIXON SUCCUMBED IN HOUSTON ON WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON

Once more Midland is called upon to grieve for and honor the memory of another of her heroic dead. Ar-thur Nixon, who left here only a short while ago for Houston to enter an army sanitarium, died last Wednesday afternoon, and the body was expected to arrive here last night, when it would be taken in charge by the local camp of the American Legion and buried somtime this forenoon.

Young Nixon was twice gassed while in overseas fighting, and he was a member of that immortalized Rainbow or 42nd Division. His discharge

papers read as follows:
"W. A. Nixon, 117th Supply Train, Rainbow (42nd) Division. Born in San Angelo, Texas. Enlisted July 14th, 1917, at Big Spring, Texas. Age at enlistment 21 years and 9 months. Battles, engagements, skirmishes: R. E. F. Luniville Sector, Beaucourt Sector, Luvain Sector, Champaign, the Marne, Anise, Meuse, St. Mihiel, Essy, Pamese, and the Argonne. Overseas from October 10th, 1917, to April 29th, 1919. Character EXCEL-LENT."

Young Nixon son of our townsman, W. H. Nixon, experienced the horrors of all of those dreadful battles, but, as is usual with the brave, the heroic, he rarely mentioned his experiences, and never except when insistently urged to do so. Thus Midland is again deeply grieved, for a number of her sons have gone as this one has; and while we do honor today to his memory, all hearts are tender with sympathy to the bereaved father, sisters, brothers, and other relaeives.



#### **NOW UNDER-REAMING** · AT BRYANT NO. ONE

Some days ago at Bryant No. 1, nine miles south from Midland, that had reached a depth of about 2735 feet, the 8 inch casing had been set at about 2500 feet, and it was hoped the structure would hold Ar drilling to completion. It was not to be, however, and the process of under-reaming was started, on account of caving walls. This had not proceeded far when they "busted" the under-reame and had to send for another, to come out from Ranger. This was expected to get here yesterday, and if it did they are at work down there again. It has been suggested, rumored, that another month will probably tell the tale out here, and rumor further has it, those in authority have great expectations from this test. They al-ready have a "cap," that no oil may be wasted, and everybody is now waiting expectantly.

## **OUR MARKET REPORT** FROM KANSAS CITY

Though cattle receipts were smaller than a week ago, the decreased supply brought no urgency to demand and prices ruled about steady. Elsewhere markets were reported as dull and inactive. Some hogs sold slightly higher than late last week, but most of the offerings were no more than steady, top \$15.60. Lambs and sheep were quoted steady under

Receipts last Monday were 22,000 cattle, 8000 hogs and 16,000 sheep, compared with 26,000 cattle, 7000 hogs, and 17,000 sheep a week ago, and 44,775 cattle, 10,900 hogs and

9500 sheep a year ago.

Prices for killing cattle on Monday held about steady under a slow trade. Killers are waiting for eastern markets to absorb surplus supplies col-lected last week, and today no mar-ket had normal demand. Late last week prices were sharply lower, and the market Monday opened at that decline. A good many common to fair killing steers brought \$8 to \$9.25 and better grades \$9.50 to \$12.25. Wintered and fed steers were scarce. Cows in some cases were 25 cents lower, and veal calves about steady. Orders for cars to load Tuesday and later this week are being cancelled.

Prices for stockers and feeders were weak to 25 cents lower, with demand indifferent. Eastern feeders are holding back for still lower prices. Quotations now are than in several years past, and it looks as though no better buying opportunity will be offered this year than at the present time.

The hog market made a moderate showing of strength at the outset but before much trading was accomplish. the market was back to steady.

Sheep and lamb prices remained teady with trade rather quiet. Most of the western lambs sold at \$12 to \$12.50, and native lambs \$11.50 to Demand for feeders was quiet

at unchanging prices.

Receipts in the horse and mulé divisions were smaller than a week ago. Practically no westerns were here. Prices and demand were much the same as last week.


WARNINGS ISSUED




