Doctors, Parents On Alert Doctor Sadler said Saturday night he was keeping in touch with the State Heath Department in Austin and that the department was standing ready to take any steps deemed necessary to prevent spread of the disease. No reports of such a disease have come from Odessa or Big Spring, which are also under his supervision, he said.

"We hope the disease has reached its peak," he said, "but we don't know whether it has or not. Therefore, we must do everything possible to prevent unnecessary exposure of infants and young children."

The health officers emphasized that parents should call a physician as soon as they notice a child is ill. Early attention may mean the difference between life and death, during its first year, and Harvey

Instruments filed and recorded in the office of the county clerk of Andrews County, at the town of Andrews, reveal that J. W. 



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Britain Takes Over Nation's Railways

LONDON. - (AP) - Britain's labor government completed another major phase of its socialization of basic industry, by recently taking over the nation's four main railway lines and 54 other railways employing 600,000 persons.

The British Transport Commission, which will operate the system for the government, also took over 70 railway-owned hotels and 176 miles of inland waterways. The government is paying 1,000,-

000,000 pounds (\$4,000,000,000) for the railroads. The properties include 52,000 miles of track, \$0,000 passenger coaches and 1,200,000 boxears. Other Nationalizations

Nationalization of long distance road transport, also scheduled under the transport act, was delayed pending appointment of a road transport executive to the commission.

Other nationalization projects completed since the labor government came into power in mid-1945 include the coal mines, the Bank of England, cable and wireless and civil aviation. Still due to be nationalized un-

der the government's program are the iron and steel industry and Legislation for the nationalization of electric utilities was passed
