

# Mahatma Gandhi Shot To Death

## No Rain, No Sleet, No Snow In Texas

Sunshine and rising temperatures spread across weather-beaten Texas Friday. The curtailment which the Lone Star Gas Company had ordered on industrial users and schools in the 333 Texas and Southern Oklahoma towns it served was lifted at 6:30 a. m.

No rain—no sleet—no snow. This was the report Friday. The forecast called for fair skies over the entire state Friday afternoon, Friday night and Saturday except for clouds near the coast.

Rising temperatures were reassuring words from the Weather Bureau.

The cold weather which hit the state a week ago however was hanging on stubbornly. Early Friday temperatures were still below the freezing mark throughout the state except for a 33-degree reading at Brownsville. El Paso and Salt Flat were the coldest with nine above zero.

At Austin, Gov. Beauford Jester announced the release of 3,000,000 gallons of butane gas from refineries and industrial users for domestic consumption.

All state roads were reported open but some were still dangerous because of ice.

Many schools which had closed to help conserve heating fuel for homes were reopening Friday.

The cold spell, longest in the history of weather bureaus in many cities, had caused 16 deaths in the state as icy streets and highways sent cars skidding and crashing.

The temperature dipped to one below freezing at Laredo Friday, but elsewhere in the Rio Grande Valley it hovered around or just above the freezing mark. The citrus crop was believed to have escaped severe damage.

However, tender vegetable crops in the valley were reported damaged extensively.

The line which coated portions of Texas caused extensive damage to timber also. At Palestine, County Agent W. T. Larue said he believed the damage would cost Anderson County timber owners \$2,000,000 during the next 30 years. He said small trees bent over for a few days with ice will never grow into straight timber.

## Texas Expects Record Number Of Poll Taxes

An Associated Press survey indicated Friday that poll tax payments in Texas will break all records.

Deadline for payments is Saturday.

The few counties which reported payments lagging blamed the curtailment of industrial workers, organizations sent their members out punching doorbells, pleading with prospective voters to make themselves eligible to mark a ballot.

The Junior Chamber of Commerce and women's clubs were promoting tax payments as a civic responsibility.

Even the bartender could tell you the tax deadline, show you his tax receipt and expound on the virtues of exercising the vote.

Many Issues  
Voters will have a great number of live issues this year.

One already creating interest is that of who will be junior senator from Texas. W. Lee O'Daniel's term ends. He has not announced whether he will seek the post again.

Prospective senators already are surveying their chances to go to Washington.

U. S. representatives also must be elected.

Besides, voters will have a chance to ballot on all state offices, including the governor.

## Assassin Is Arrested By India Police

NEW DELHI—(AP)—Mohandas K. Gandhi was shot to death Friday night by one of the Hindus he led to independence.

The frail and wizened little political and spiritual leader was the target of three bullets fired at close range at his prayer meeting on the lawn of the sumptuous Birla mansion, the estate of an Indian industrialist who long had supported Gandhi. He was 78 years old.

Police arrested the assassin immediately. They said only that he was a Hindu from Poona.

Sobbing bitterly, Gandhi's secretary, S. Kalyanam, told The Associated Press: "Bapu is dead."

Bapu is the affectionate name for Gandhi, meaning father. To millions of his followers, he was known as Mahatma, or great-souled one. His real name was Mohandas Karamchand Gandhi.

Bystanders said Gandhi slumped forward as the third shot rang out. He seemed unconscious as he was carried to his quarters in Birla house. The secretary said death followed within a half hour.

A crowd of several hundred persons formed about Birla house, many of them weeping.

Achieved His Goal  
Death came less than a year after he achieved his life's main goal of independence from Great Britain for India. Paradoxically, however, Gandhi considered his triumph a failure because India and her 400,000,000 people were divided into separate dominions of India (Hindu) and Pakistan (Moslem). The partition resulted in bloody, destructive communal warfare between Moslems on one side and Hindus and Sikhs on the other.

It was in an effort to end the bloodbath that Gandhi undertook this month the last of his many fasts. After five days in which he threatened to slay himself, he died. Gandhi broke his fast January 18 on the "pledge and counsel" of friends in both dominions. He said they had assured him of "complete unbroken friendship" between all communities.

During the tense days of his fast, some of the more militant Moslems bled in the streets and before his living quarters.

"Let Gandhi die."

But there was every indication that this was the view of a tiny minority, embittered by the communal warfare.

Bomb Is Exploded  
Shortly after the fast, a bomb exploded near by during prayer meeting, also in the Birla mansion estate, but did no harm. A Hindu was arrested.

Some Hindus, their womenfolk violated in the communal upheaval, had resented Gandhi's pleas for peace with the Moslems.

Gandhi, born to the upper Hindu caste, espoused the cause of the (Continued On Page 5)

## Plane, Train Crashes Take Heavy Toll

Two airplane accidents in the Atlantic and Europe and two railroad mishaps in the United States took a heavy toll in lives and injuries Friday.

A British South American Airways plane with 29 aboard and eight hours overdue at Bermuda from the Azores was believed lost. The passengers included Sir Arthur Coningham, a retired British air hero of the recent war.

At Frankfurt, Germany, the U. S. Air Force announced the crash of a plane, presumably a B-17 aiding in the search for a DC-3 transport missing since Tuesday. The number aboard the B-17 was not immediately learned.

Soldiers' Dependents Aboard  
The Air Force said the wreckage of a plane believed to be the DC-3 had been sighted in the lower French Alps. The DC-3 had 12 persons aboard—four crewmen, three American women and five children, dependents of U. S. soldiers in the Trieste area. The transport was en route from France to Italy.

The B-17 crashed about 20 miles east of the DC-3 wreckage.

The Union Pacific streamliner City of San Francisco was derailed near Ogallala, Neb., with 25 persons injured. Seven required hospitalization.

Another rail accident involved the Louisville and Nashville Railroad's streamliner Hummingbird, which collided with a freight train near Mitchellville, Tenn. Fourteen persons suffered cuts and bruises.

## Republicans Hope To Get Vote On Tax-Cut Monday

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Democrats and Republicans in Congress were scrapping Friday about taxes, grain and foreign aid, among other things.

The Republicans planned to shove their \$6,500,000,000 tax-cut bill through the House Monday under a rule which would allow no changes, but would permit one substitute bill to be offered.

As a substitute, Democrats were thinking of putting up a measure something like the GOP bill, but with smaller tax cuts and an added \$3,200,000,000 tax on corporation profits.

Republicans are sure they can pass their bill, but Democrats say the bill will have to be changed before the GOP can get the two-thirds majority needed to override a veto.

The Republicans continued to talk of slicing down President Truman's request for foreign aid money.

The President made it clear that he thinks the \$6,800,000,000 he asked for the first 15 months of the Marshall Plan is a rock-bottom figure.

Senator Taft (R-Ohio) said "I don't think the President's suggestion changes the situation."

Taft is chairman of the important Senate Republican Policy Committee.

"There certainly will be a cut in the amount," he said.

Truman Wins Round  
At least one point in the political fight this election year seemed to be going to Truman.

Republicans in Congress admitted the President had put them in a tough spot by using their own anti-inflation law against them. It was passed during the special session last fall.

That law gave the President power to ration grain used for making (Continued On Page 5)

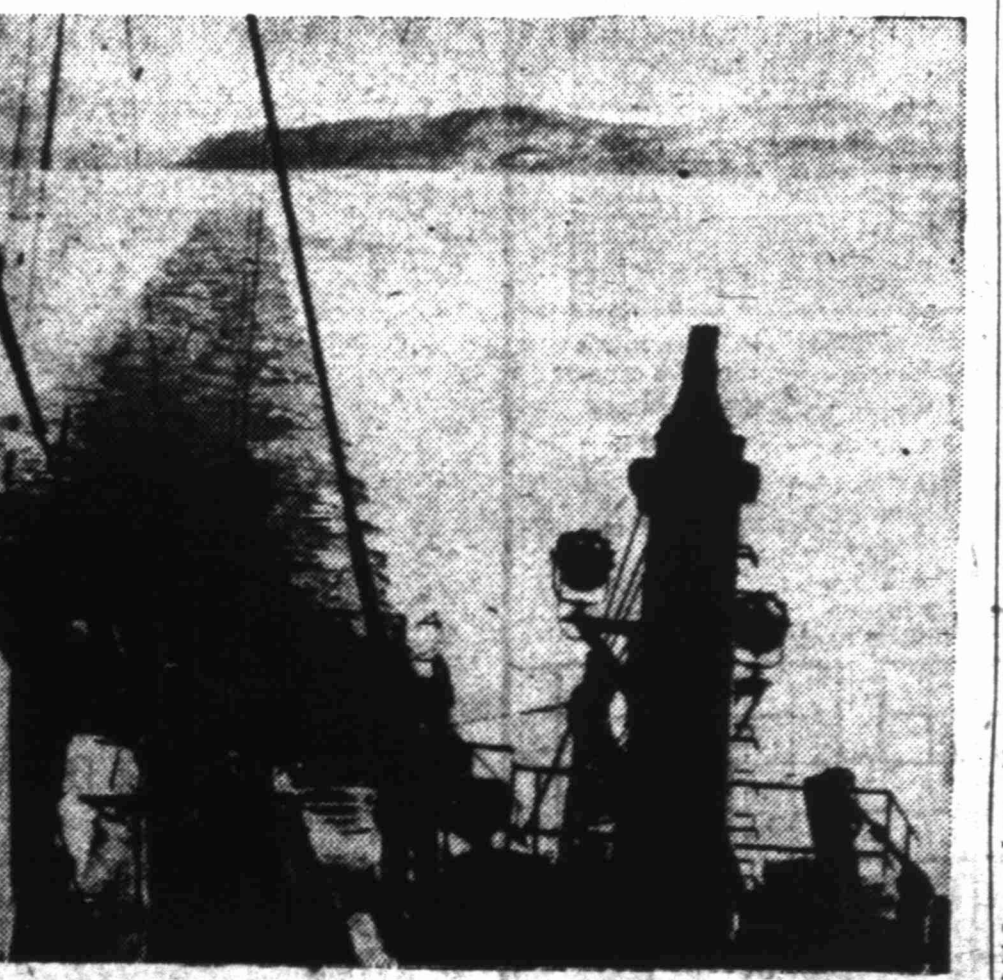
## PRODIGE BASEBALL FIGURE DIES FRIDAY

ENNIS—(AP)—Practically a block of Ennis main business district was destroyed by fire of undetermined origin early Friday.

An unofficial estimate placed the loss at a half million dollars.

The fire was on Main Street, the block facing the railway station. It started at 1:10 a. m. in either the White Auto Supply store or the McKee Supply Company.

Firemen, aided by fire fighters from Christians and Waxahachie, fought the flames for more than six hours in sub-freezing temperatures.

Only three businesses in the entire block escaped damage.

Buildings destroyed housed the two supply companies, the Louis Cafe, the Socona Shoe Shop, Curry's Studio, the Novy Grocery, the Ennis Watch Shop, Kelsey's Drug Store, Everybody's Store and Neicy's Cafe.

The rear of Crumley's Hardware store was damaged.

## HOWITZER JOYRIDER TO BECOME 'TEETOTALER'

PORT BILL, OKLA.—(AP)—T. A. Donald S. Williams, who mixed his alcohol with a 21-ton self-propelled howitzer and nearly panicked the city of Lawton, was pledged to a life of teetotaling Friday.

"I will never touch another drop of whiskey as long as I have control of my senses," the 24-year-old soldier, from Decatur, Texas, told Army investigators.

## Three Missing In Vermont Hotel Fire

ST. ALBANS, VT.—(AP)—Two women and one man were reported missing Friday when a sudden blaze destroyed the Jesse Deming Inn forcing 100 guests to flee, some of them by jumping out windows into 16-to-freezing-cold.

Fire Chief R. H. Sweeney said firemen were unable to get into the smoking wreckage in a search for bodies. There was confusion as to survivors because the hotel register burned.

## Poll Tax Payments Near 5,000 Mark As Saturday Deadline Approaches

Tax Assessor-Collector J. H. Fine and his helpers in the courthouse were optimistic Friday that at least 5,000 poll taxes will have been paid in Midland County when the payment deadline arrives Saturday at midnight.

The total Friday morning was 4,371. Thursday, 436 citizens paid tax, and if Friday's and Saturday's payments merely equal those of Thursday, the 5,000-mark will be passed. However, workers in the collector's office counted on Friday and Saturday being their busiest days.

Poll taxes this year for the first time are rendered separately from property taxes. It costs \$2.75 to vote in Texas this year, regardless of how much other taxes the citizen has paid.

Persons who have reached 21 years of age since the last election, or who will reach 21 before this year's elections, are entitled to apply for exemptions from poll tax payments. They must receive an exemption certificate from the collector's office.

Payments By Mail  
Citizens who reached the age of 60 before January 1, 1947, are entitled to free votes, and they need not have exemption certificates in Midland County.

Mailed poll tax payments will be accepted at the collector's office if they are postmarked not later than January 31. Postmaster N. G. Oates said, Friday such mail would have to be in the post office by 8:30 p. m. Friday to get the January 31 postmark.

## Magnolia Engineer Hurt In Explosion

SEMINOLE—Harry Richman, engineer of the Magnolia Pipeline Company, received serious injuries in a fire and explosion Thursday which destroyed a trunk station two miles from here.

The Midland office of Magnolia reported another employee received only slight injuries. Richman was carried to a Seminole hospital.

The nature of the explosion was not disclosed.

## Schuman Money Bills Approved By Legislature

PARIS—(AP)—Both houses of France's Legislature approved Friday the government's bill withdrawing all 5,000-franc notes from circulation.

The Finance Ministry announced that everyone holding the 5,000-franc notes will be repaid.

Another administration bill, to free the gold market, hopped a preliminary hurdle. The Assembly turned down the unfavorable recommendation of its own finance commission, 328 to 240.

Withdrawal of the 5,000-franc banknote, worth about \$23.50, is aimed, the government says, to cramp black marketers and hit hoarders. They are reliably reported to hold half of all such bills.

The step also may cut down the total amount of money in circulation and strike at inflation—high prices.

## Obligation Must Be Met!

The willing and prompt cooperation of citizens and business firms of Midland and other West Texas cities in conserving natural gas Wednesday doubtless prevented what might have been a major disaster in this fast-growing and prosperous area.

Citizens, firms, schools and other organizations are to be commended upon their immediate response of the West Texas Gas Company's plea to conserve the fuel in every way and to shut down completely if possible. Public schools and most business houses in Midland and elsewhere closed immediately to avert the disaster of a complete gas stoppage. The response of the citizens in general was excellent. Gas company officials expressed sincere appreciation for the areawide cooperation.

The situation Wednesday was desperate indeed, and residents perhaps do not realize just how near Midland and other West Texas cities came from being entirely without gas—a precious commodity in this area which depends upon gas almost entirely for heating and industrial purposes.

Gas company officials said that if the conservation appeal had not been heeded immediately, the cities served by the company would have had no gas by the middle of the afternoon. And if the stoppage had come about, it would have taken several days, perhaps a week, to get gas back in the mains and turned on again. It was a critical moment.

But the disaster was averted by the cooperation of users of the fuel, and the gas pressure built up Wednesday night.

The important thing now is to see that such a condition does not again arise. Surely the weather was colder and more prolonged than usual, but one of the main factors was that this section has developed faster than has its service facilities.

Midland, Odessa, Lubbock and other cities served by the concern have grown more rapidly perhaps than the gas company realizes, although some steps reportedly have been taken to enlarge facilities. The gas company now surely is aware of the rapid growth and development of West Texas, and must realize its obligation to provide adequate service. It is true of course that materials have been difficult to obtain, but supplies generally are reported to be loosening up, and every effort must be made by it to obtain materials to meet the urgent demands.

In the meantime, the cooperative citizens of this region will continue to conserve fuel in every way possible during emergencies.

## AMERICAN WOMEN UNDERRATE STYLE, SAYS FRENCHMAN

How does the middle-aged woman in America look to a Parisian dressmaker? Such a viewpoint may give an interesting insight into our habits of dress and suggest possible improvements.

During an interview I had with Pierre Balmain, famous Parisian couturier, whose extensive travels in this country have given him ample opportunity to observe us, he was induced to make these suggestions which ranged from eye-glasses to clothes.

Many American women, he observed, tend to value the quality of fabric over the importance of style in selecting clothes. We should remember, he suggests, that the impression of smartness a dress gives depends upon line as well as fabric.

The woman over 50 can command her share of attention by wearing clothes that emphasize her gray hair and her quiet dignity, says Balmain. Asked what he considered a good choice of dress for her, Balmain said, "She is the best type of woman to wear the so-called afternoon dress. For her, I like black crepe softened with drapery. Black, however, should be relieved by 'sweet' colors. A hat, perhaps, in a soft pastel shade and a not too fussy style is charming with black."

Rosy shades, candy colors and pale tints are, especially flattering to gray-haired women, says Balmain.

As a parting observation, Balmain added that he noticed too many middle-aged women wearing glasses that pinch the nose. "Bolder, simpler frames such as the tortoise shell type which my mother wears look so much more youthful, I think, than the pince nez," he said.

## A TOO-PALE POWDER EMPHASIZES AGE

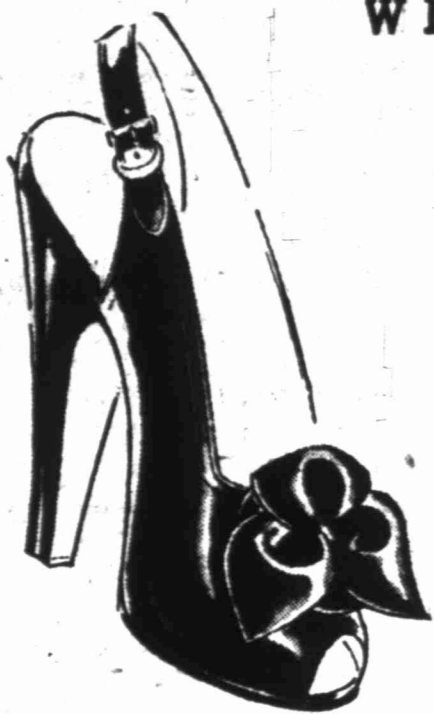

Joe Louis Gives Boxing Lesson To Bob Foxworth

By CHARLES DUNKLEY CHICAGO—(AP)—"Just how far has Joe Louis slipped,"—the big question which has been puzzling the boxing world for the last two months—remained as puzzling as ever Friday with this exception: The brown bomber, at the age of 33, is no longer the devastating bomber of old when he knocked out 22 in 25 title defenses over a 10-year span. Age is catching up to him very rapidly.

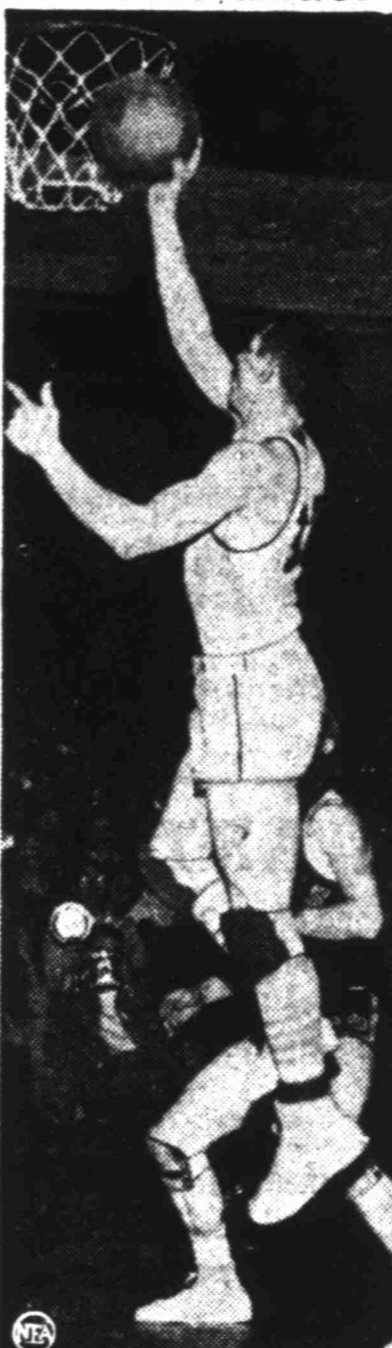
The world's heavyweight champion Thursday night engaged in his first test with the gloves since his disputed split decision over Jersey Joe Walcott in New York last December 5 by giving Bob Foxworth a one-sided boxing lesson in a four-round exhibition.

Foxworth is outclassed. Foxworth, 24 years old East St. Louis, Ill., aspirant to the light heavyweight championship, had won 16 out of 18 bouts, 14 knock-outs. However, he offered no line on Louis since he had never met him before; was outweighed by 43 pounds; lacked height and weight to match Louis'; was outclassed and obviously scared stiff.

Louis won every round easily although the Illinois State Athletic Commission would not permit a decision. The timid Foxworth was always in retreat, aiming to keep out of danger.

Louis said he weighed 220 pounds. He certainly looked it. There were tiny rolls of fat rippling over his mid-section, but he plodded in from the opening gong and delivered his punches like lightning flashes. He didn't move fast, but his hands did. They wore the big 16-ounce gloves. Foxworth, who weighed only 177, said Louis possessed the fastest pair of hands he had ever seen.

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Neurologist Says 'Sinus' Less Prevalent In South

SAN ANTONIO—(AP)—A Cornell University neurologist has a theory that sinus trouble may be less prevalent in the Southwest and South than in the bustling, highly competitive North.  
Dr. Harold G. Wolff of New York told the International Post Graduate Medical Assembly of Southwest Texas here that San Antonio's popularity as a resort for persons afflicted with sinus trouble may be due to the easy-going and genial way of life as well as to its equally balmy climate.  
He said he had noted in his hospital practice in New York that persons suffering from complaints of a more or less "nervous" origin frequently dated the beginning of their symptoms back to the time of their arrival in "Yankee land."  
So called "sinus infection," he said, is often the result of nervous tension and general dissatisfaction with life.  
Doctor Wolff said it is quite possible that nervous trouble in general may be less prevalent in the Southwest and South than in the bustling and highly competitive North.
