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Coal Strike Brings Second Rail Cut

Labor Act Author Will Seek Stiffer Curbs For John L.

WASHINGTON (AP)—The 26-day-old mine shutdown forced the government Friday to order coal burning rail service cut to half of normal.

The reduction is effective at midnight April 15 and presumably would be cancelled if mining resumes before then.

There appeared no immediate prospect, however, of an end of the walkout despite a new threat of action against John L. Lewis and his United Mine Workers.

Representative Hartley (R-NJ) said that if the Taft-Hartley Labor Law which he helped write fails "to put the brakes" on Lewis, he will ask for stiffer laws. Hartley is head of the House Labor Committee.

West Europe Union Sure Of U.S. Aid

WASHINGTON (AP)—The projected Western European Union now seems sure of strong American military support as a way to strengthen the West against feared Russian expansion.

In the opinion of Washington officials, however, several major problems remain to be worked out, including the precise forms this support may take.

Belgian Premier Paul Henri Spaak, who has conferred here this week with President Truman, Undersecretary of State Lovett and other leaders, told a news conference that European nations will ask for military as well as recovery help later on.

First, Spaak said, they want to consolidate their new organization which so far has gone through only two stages.

The first nations which did the drafting were Britain, France, Belgium, the Netherlands and Luxembourg.

The United States, in statements by President Truman and Secretary of State Marshall, already is on record as approving the formation of this Western bloc.

Also, as Spaak reminded reporters Thursday night, Truman told Congress on March 17 that this country intends to back up the free nations of Europe in their struggle to maintain their freedom against Communist Russia.

He said it had no comment on a published report that the Administration has given up hope of ending the strike within the next 10 days.

Hearing Spak said, Lewis is scheduled to appear Monday to "show cause" why he should not face a contempt of court trial for ignoring a back-to-work order. The 26-day-old strike (Continued on page 9)

Military Measures Given Top Priority On Senate Program

WASHINGTON (AP)—Senate Republican leaders agreed Friday to place military legislation ahead of all business.

Senator Taft (R-Ohio) said the Senate will begin consideration of temporary draft, a larger Air Force, universal military training or any other defense measure as soon as its Armed Services Committee reaches an agreement.

Taft, chairman of the Republican Policy Committee, said it might take all next week and possibly two weeks to agree upon a bill.

Personally, Taft said he is willing to support increased funds for the Air Force and a temporary draft if the latter is necessary to fill up the ranks of the armed services. He still opposed DMT, he added.

Although major attention was centered on boosting the nation's Air Power, other moves followed the lines laid down by Secretary of Defense Forrestal. He cautioned Congress not to build up one military arm at the expense of any other.

Draft Bill Drawn
"National security demands balanced forces," the secretary declared, adding "dollars alone do not guarantee the delivery" of military goods.

These were highlight developments along the lengthening preparedness front:

1. The House Armed Services Committee drew up a draft bill requiring registration of all men 18 through 30, but making only 10 through 25 liable for two years' service.

2. The House Appropriations Committee raced into hearings on a bill to pour \$725,000,000 into a warplane expansion drive. Chairman Taylor (R-NY) is speaking action to have the bill ready for House consideration Tuesday.

3. The White House told the War Assets Administration to hold up final disposition of unsold industrial plants, machine tools and other equipment needed for war production.

4. Secretary of the Navy Sullivan said President Truman will ask Congress to boost merchant ship building funds from \$39,500,000 to \$100,000,000. The added money would be for new vessels suitable for troop transport and for an increased tanker fleet.

5. Truman asked Congress to increase the Export-Import Bank's lending authority by \$500,000,000 to finance further economic development in Latin America.

Although Truman's message did not specify the types of projects contemplated for the loans, dispatches from the Pan American Conference at Bogota, Colombia, indicated increasing United States interest in developing South American petroleum production.

Weather-Weary South Hit By Wind, Rain, Hail And High Water

A weather-weary South suffered through hail and high water, wind and heavy rain Thursday.

As a result, one life was lost and, properly damage was counted in the hundreds of thousands of dollars.

A heavy wind and rain storm accompanied by hail descended on Troy, Ala., Thursday night, toppling power lines and damaging roofs. At the height of the storm, a small wooden shack caught fire and a 65-year-old man was burned to death.

Police said the fire may have been caused by lightning or a fallen utility line.

Baseball-Size Hailstones
Floods were the chief cause of grief in Northern Florida. El Dorado, Ark., had trouble with hailstones the size of baseballs.

For 15 minutes the stones bounced off the pavement in the Arkansas city, battered roofs and dented automobile tops and fenders. Department stores and home windows were shattered.

Insurance men in the town estimated the damage at \$1,000,000. It was at Hot Springs, Ark., that the hail storm whimsically sent stones in the shape of doughnuts plunking against the ground. Little damage was reported.

Lowest Carryover Of Cotton Forecast

AUSTIN (AP)—One of the lowest carryovers in 20 years was forecast for 1948 Friday.

Dr. A. B. Cox, University of Texas as professor of cotton marketing, said the carryover on July 31, the end of the cotton year, would be about 2,500,000 bales. The world supply of commercial cotton also is exceptionally low at 13,000,000 bales, Cox said.

Recovery was 105 feet of drilling mud, with no shows of oil, gas or water. This prospect is scheduled to about 5,800 feet to try to locate and test the Ellenburger.

SUN SPOTS SOUTH STEEPTO TO ARLEDGE DISCOVERY

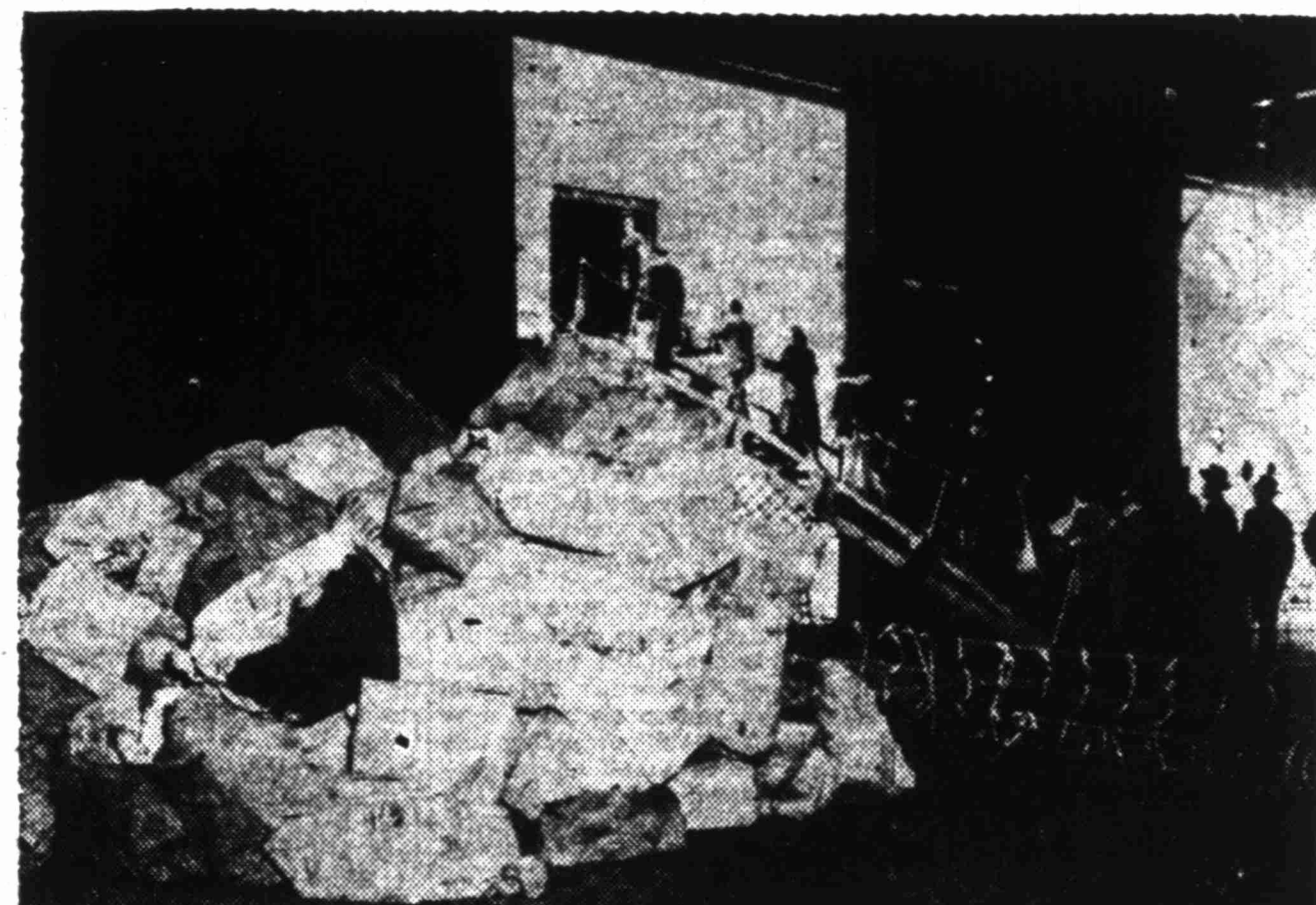
Sun Oil Company No. 3 J. W. Arledge is to be a 1,319-foot south steepout from the same company's No. 1 Arledge, the discovery well for flowing production from the Marble Falls lime, to open the Arledge field in North-Central Cooke County.

The new exploration will be 660 feet from south and 1,880 feet from west lines of section 261, block 1-A, H&TCo survey. It is due to start drilling at once and go to about 6,750 feet to test the Marble Falls.

The No. 1 Arledge was completed for a 24-hour flowing potential of 176 barrels of 47.8 gravity oil, from pay at 6,598-6,620 feet, which had been treated with 500 gallons of acid.

This venture drilled to 6,923 feet in the Ellenburger, and made water.

Jester Promises To Clarify Views On 'Instruction'

AUSTIN (AP)—Gov. Beauford H. Jester has promised to make clear his views on what it would mean if Texas sends an uninstru-cted delegation to the National Democratic Convention.

Jester and officials of the State Executive Committee, the Young Democrats of Texas and the Association of County Democratic Chairmen have been urging an uninstru-cted delegation.

"I'll make my position clear when they hold the big barbecue at Fort Worth," Jester said at Thursday's press conference. He said the executive committee also should clarify.

The barbecue costing \$5 per plate will be held April 20. Truman Democrats will compete by offering a free barbecue at Waco the same day.

Reporters tried to pin the govern-ment down to an immediate explanation.

Sixty-Four Dollar Question
"Do you think Texas will support Truman if he is nominated?" a reporter asked.

"That's the sixty-four dollar question," Jester replied.

Would the Texas delegation bolt the convention if the nomination went to Truman?

"Where would they bolt to?" parried the governor.

But Nebraska politicians who know their way around say there is some strong sentiment in the state for the chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee.

Last Call For Dewey
They contend he is likely to be among the top four. The three leaders generally are expected to be Harold E. Stassen, who walked away with the Wisconsin primary, Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York and Senator Robert A. Taft.

Besides Vandenberg, the names of Gen. Douglas MacArthur, Gov. Earl Warren and House Speaker Joseph Martin will appear on the Tuesday ballot.

Stassen appeared confident as he continued a series of speeches in which he planned to wind up his personal campaign at Fremont Friday night.

Dewey's supporters conceded privately that unless the New York governor tops the list here, he will be out of the running for the GOP nomination.

Bataan Hero Visits Scene Of Surrender

BATAAN (AP)—A husky, two-star general stepped out of the jeep, took a calculating look, and swung his machete at a tangle of undergrowth. Then he scrambled up an eight-foot embankment.

"If I'm right, the entrenchments would be about in here," he said. "This was our final line of resistance."

The rest of the group crowded up the embankment. There we found the foxholes of Bataan, all but buried now by the rank jungle growth.

Six years ago Friday, 40,000 American and Filipino soldiers and civilians—emaciated, malaria ridden and battle fagged—climbed out of holes like these all the way across the Bataan Peninsula. Resistance was at an end.

Among them was this same major general, Albert M. Jones, now head of the U. S. Joint Military Advisory Group to the Philippines. He had walked there—the only officer of his rank to do so—in what history calls the Death March.

Bitter Recollections
We found where the Japanese had dug themselves in. "We were woefully short of mortar ammunition and most of what we had were duds," Jones said.

"We had practically no hand grenades. The jungle was so dense you couldn't see more than 25 yards."

"This was our home, where we lived and fought and died..." Jones laughed bitterly.

Then our little procession of jeeps drove away, leaving the historic battlefield to Bataan's jungle—and the dust.

Texan Slated For High Post In Marine Corps

WASHINGTON (AP)—Maj. Gen. Oliver P. Smith, a native of Menard, Texas, will become assistant commander of the Marine Corps, succeeding Maj. Gen. Lemuel C. Shepherd, Jr.

General Smith is commanding general of the Quantico, Va., Marine Barracks, a post which General Shepherd will take over. The shift will occur about April 20.

Three Midshipmen Die In Plane Crash

CROWLEY, La. (AP)—Three Navy midshipmen were killed and a fourth was injured Thursday night in the crash of a privately-owned plane in the Louisiana coastal marshes just south of the town of Pecan Island.

The Civil Aeronautics Administration at New Orleans listed the dead as George Waters, Gordon Mayer and David H. Cobb, and the injured man was listed as R. A. Jacenski, all midshipmen from the Pensacola Naval Air Station.

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Cooperation Between Powers In Berlin Hits New All-Time Low

BERLIN (AP)—British sources said Friday Soviet Marshal Vasily Sokolovsky has left Berlin, possibly for consultations in Moscow.

Sokolovsky is commander of the Russian occupation zone of Germany and the central Soviet figure in the Berlin crisis of Russia and the Western Powers.

The British delivered Friday their reply to a Soviet note which refused to offer safety guarantees for air traffic between Berlin and the Western zones. Contents of the note were not disclosed.

Gen. Lucius D. Clay announced earlier there will be no meeting of the Allied Control Council for Germany Saturday, the regular meeting day.

This development emphasized the new low to which four-power cooperation has fallen since the Russians opened up their recent campaign to crowd the Western Allies out of Berlin.

Members of the cabinet and the Economic Advisory Council headed by Edwin G. Nourse watched with Truman. The ceremony was brief. There was no speech-making.

As ECA chief, Hoffman will administer the \$500,000,000 European Recovery Program. He sat in on the cabinet meeting because of the close connection of the domestic economic picture with aid for Western European nations in their resistance to Communism.

Hoffman Sworn In As Aid Director

WASHINGTON (AP)—Paul G. Hoffman, who thinks voluntary controls are better than federal regulation of industry, took over Friday as American foreign aid chief.

Immediately after he was sworn into office, Hoffman sat down with President Truman and his cabinet to hear the President's Council of Economic Advisers renew a call for standby rationing and wage-price controls.

Hoffman, president of the Studebaker Corporation, has full cabinet rank in his \$20,000 a year post as administrator of economic cooperation. Chief Justice Fred Vinson administered the oath to the 56-year-old automobile manufacturer in Truman's office.

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Homer L. Massey Dies At Residence Of Heart Attack

Ernst And Lory Wallfisch Recital Well-Received By Midland Audience

After hearing the fifth and final number of the 1947-48 season of the Midland Concert and Lecture Association, it is difficult to believe the viola rarely is used as a solo instrument. Ernst Wallfisch, young Rumanian violist with the Dallas Symphony Orchestra,

accompanied by his wife, Lory, a pianist of her own renown, played the rich instrument so deftly and presented such a beautiful program Thursday night in the Midland High School Auditorium that he earned himself a real place among music-lovers here.

In presenting this rare viola concert, the Civic Music Club operated with the concert and lecture association. Since Wallfisch made his debut in Bucharest in 1939, people have been quick to recognize his great musical ability.

The violist, brought him to America and introduced him to Antal Dorati of the Dallas Symphony, who signed him as a viola soloist. There is no doubt of his exquisite technique and the rich style which makes his viola speak to enthralled audiences.

Lory Wallfisch announced the program which began with William Flackton's "Sonata in G," a three-movement sonata written by an Englishman who is considered the father of viola-solo works. Luigi Boccherini's "Adagio and Allegro" was well received by the audience.

The first half of the program concluded with Franz Schubert's "Sonata 'Arpeggione,'" in three movements.

The violist began the second half of his program with a romantic composition, Henri Vietaemps' "Elegy op. 30," which encourages the loveliest tenor tones of the instrument, and the gracefulness of the artist. This was followed by the four rich Robert Schumann pieces, "Pictures from Fairy Tales." The program concluded with Georges Enesco's "Concertpiece," a composition written especially for the viola to prove to audiences that it most certainly can be used by the greatest of the instrument.

This piece, which Wallfisch first played in 1945 and won for his interpretation the most enthusiastic praise, offers the greatest challenge to a violist, for it brings out the richest qualities of the instrument and the greatest ability of the artist. Wallfisch will not be forgotten by those who had the opportunity to hear him Thursday night.—B. L.

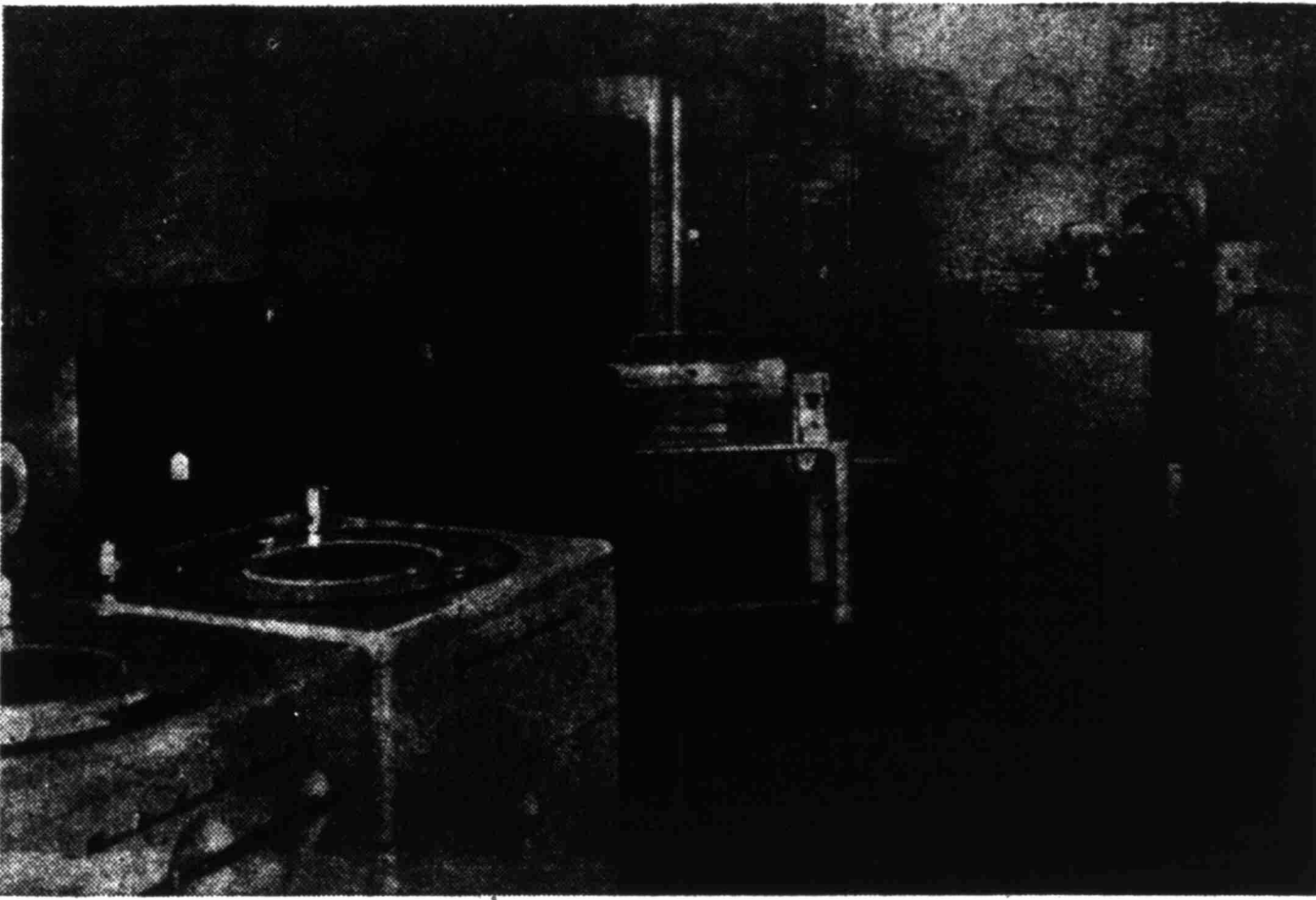

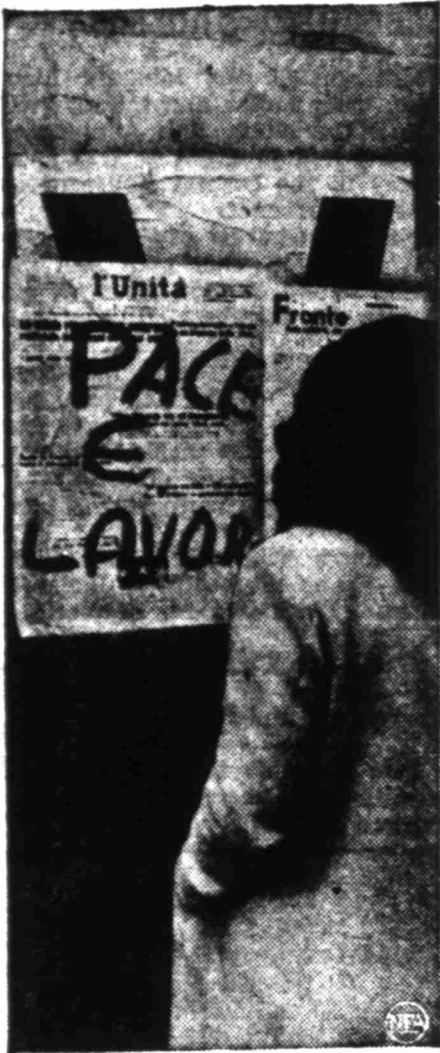

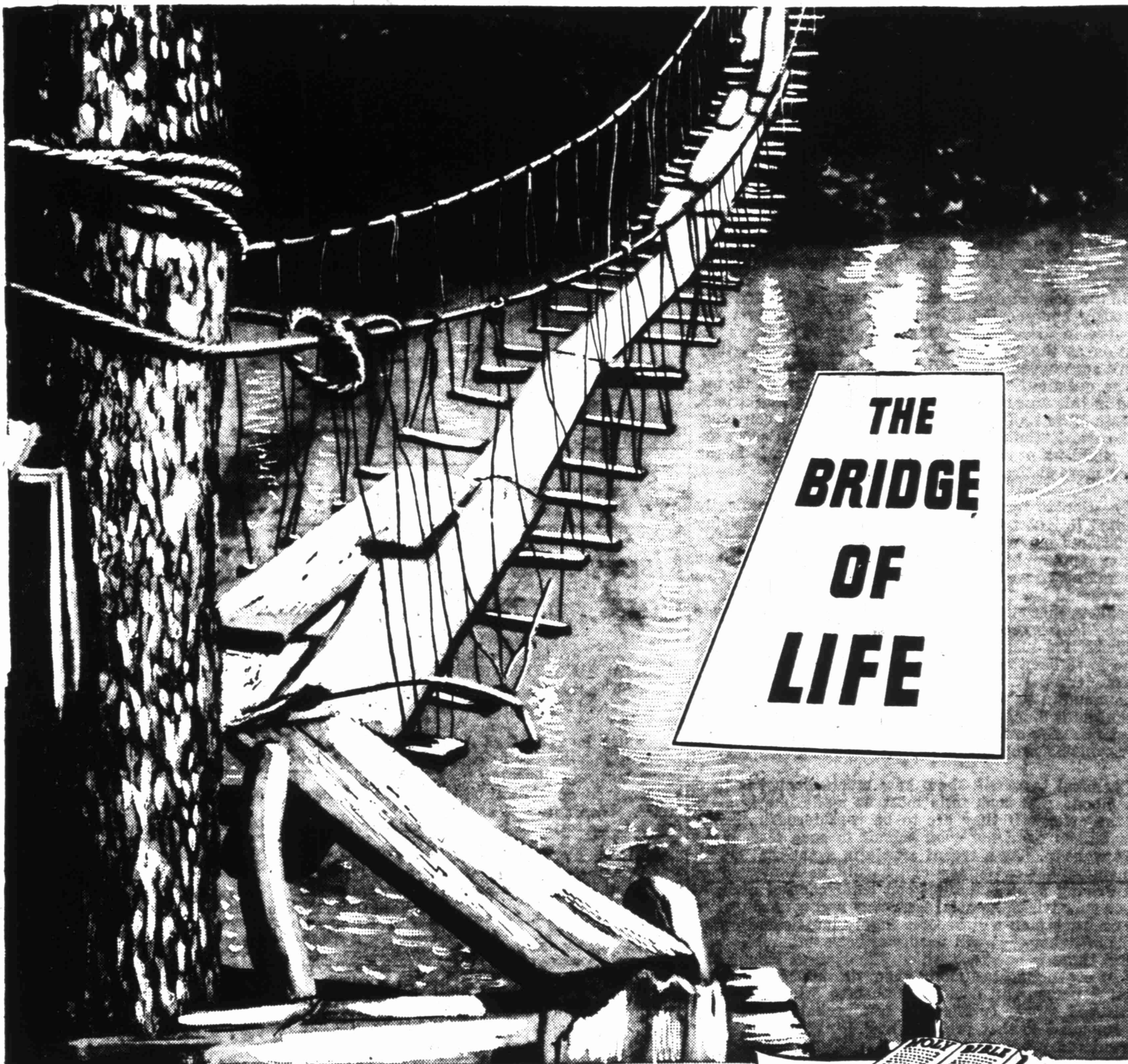

Distinction Is Necessary

Recently there appeared in West Texas newspapers a syndicated article dealing with chemical tests which would enable peace officers to determine the degree of intoxication of a person suspected of having taken too much of the cup that cheers.

On the same day a courtroom hearing in Midland was enormously complicated by the fact that witnesses not only were in disagreement regarding a defendant's intoxication at the time of his alleged offense, but they couldn't agree even on a definition of intoxication.

The question, "Was he drunk?" was repeatedly answered in this wise: "Well, I wouldn't say he was drunk. He was a little tight." For purposes of casual conversation the word "tight," meaning "intoxicated to some extent," might be precise enough. Where justice is in the balance, more distinction is necessary.

Questioners for the state in the trial here patiently attempted to resort to the jargon of the streets in prying information from witnesses. But before the trial ended it became apparent the court was not disposed to continue such undignified and futile rigamarole indefinitely. This is as it should be. There should be no expectation from lawbreakers that our courts will labor over the difference between "loop-legged" and "sociably full."

There is a suspicion that eventually a crime will be held to have been aggravated by any drinking at all on the offender's part. One or two drinks may not make a man so maudlin he will shoot his neighbor without realizing what he is doing—but this much liquor might dull his perception and slow his reflexes enough to cause him to run over his neighbor's child in the street.

Chemical tests will show how much alcohol is in a man's blood. But such tests must be made immediately after the offense if they are to be considered accurate. And a citizen need not even submit to such tests if he doesn't want to. As a recent article in a national magazine pointed out, a citizen can hardly be convicted of drunk driving if he employs good legal counsel and demands a jury trial. Medical testimony and common sense agree that one man will become highly intoxicated on an amount of liquor that will hardly effect another.

But there is one fact which stands firm among the winds of conflicting testimony about drinking and drunkenness: A person can decide whether to drink or not to drink. And sooner or later the law probably will have to be amended so that proof of any drinking at all may be considered prima facie evidence of drunkenness.

Eisenhower's Golfing Remark Basis For Much Discussion

WASHINGTON—(NEA)—Just about the only person who is not getting all excited about the renewed "Eisenhower for President" boom seems to be the general himself.

Since he retired as chief of staff of the Army, he's been taking life pretty easy. Most of his time has been spent leisurely dictating his book, based on his war memoirs. Words flow so easily from him, the first draft is almost finished. Before it goes to the publishers, however, the facts are going to be checked against official Army records. The general is a stickler for detailed accuracy.

In addition to writing, he's done a little portrait painting. His touch isn't bad, they say. He has avoided public appearances as much as possible and has courteously but firmly refused to give newspaper interviews or pose for pictures.

He's had a great deal of fun playing golf with his good friend, Maj. Gen. Floyd Parks, Army information chief. Both shoot in the high 80s. It was a conversation on the eighth hole of the Army-Navy Country Club course several weeks ago which led to the controversy over the recent claim that the general wouldn't accept a Democratic draft as presidential candidate under "any conceivable circumstances."

After he had holed out one over par Ike said, "By the way, Floyd, don't bother calling me every time you get a call about this President talk. You know how I feel and what I have always said. You know what to tell them."

In the meantime, Leonard V. FINDER, publisher of the Manchester (N. H.) Evening Leader, the man who got the now-famous "I Won't Run" letter from Ike, believed that he had gotten new information on the general's stand, in light of recent events.

FINDER prepared to issue a statement that the general could be drafted. General Parks, hearing of FINDER's intentions, to release a statement, called FINDER and ordered him not to do so.

FINDER replied that he felt justified in issuing such a statement, as long as it expressed his own opinion and didn't quote the general in any manner.

That same afternoon, a reporter called Parks and asked him the same question about whether Eisenhower had changed his stand in light of recent events. It was to this query that Parks made the flat statement that Ike "under no conceivable cir-

Speakers will include M. C. Ulmer, Frank Stubbeman, James C. Noland, Dr. David M. Ellis and B. O. Graff.

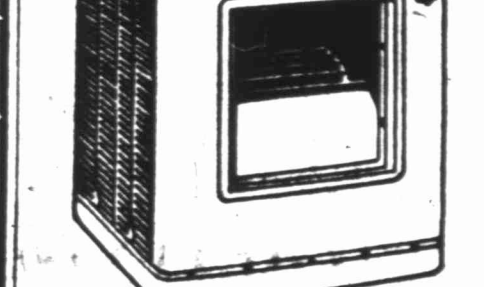

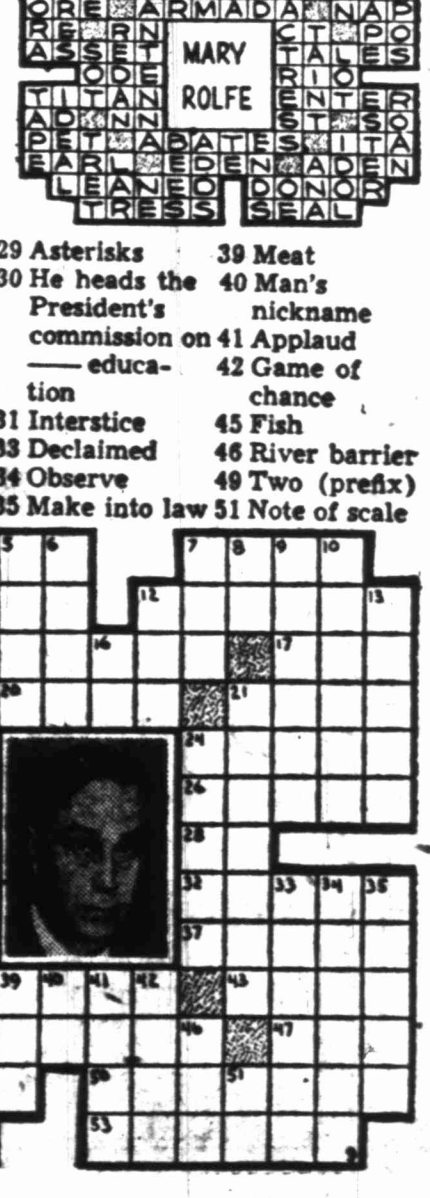

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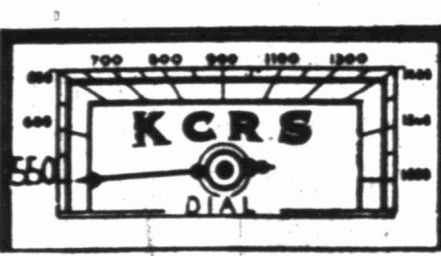

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Tornado-Torn City Rebuilds

WOODWARD, OKLA. (AP)—A year ago Friday, the people of Woodward had just finished supper.

Mothers were doing dishes in the kitchen, or listening to the radio with their husbands in the front room. School children squirmed over their homework. Older girls and their young men were sipping malts in the ice cream parlors.

They did not know it, but 103 of them were doomed, and would die within a few minutes, or a few hours.

For nature's most savage storm, the tornado of the Great Plains, was about to lay its hand on this farm town of 5,500 and rip it apart. It was the worst tornado in the history of the United States.

It is Spring again in Woodward and the green grass is pushing up from the year-old graves. There are memorials to the dead, but perhaps the finest one surrounds them on all sides: the reborn and rebuilt city itself.

There are 10 new buildings worth at least \$100,000 each, and a score worth \$50,000. There is a new school system, a new radio station. A new fire hall. New city offices. There are 500 new homes for a population that has not only filled the ranks of the dead but swelled beyond them.

And there are five churches, with a sixth going up.

Prosperous with money from the nearby wheatlands, busy on the come-back trail, the people of Woodward sent thanks to all the people of the United States who sent them comfort and relief in the hour of disaster.

Their optimism is real, but tempered with soberness. Where tornadoes have come once, they can come again.

While court action and possible new congressional moves hung fire, new trouble built up for Lewis and the UMW under the Taft-Hartley Act.

The Southern Coal Producers Association formally accused Lewis and the union of breaking the law by refusing to recognize the association for bargaining purposes.

Would Invoke Sherman Law
As for the present Taft-Hartley Act, President Truman told his news conference late Thursday the Administration will enforce that law to the letter in an effort to end the coal strike.

Hartley said that if he decided a tougher law is necessary, his committee's first move will be to act on a proposed amendment to apply the Sherman Anti-Trust Law to labor unions.

"There's no reason why the anti-trust laws shouldn't apply to labor monopolies exactly as they do to business monopolies," he said.

This would take in industry-wide strikes, the lawmaker added.

Good Fortune Proves Too Much; He Faints

WEST FRANKFORT, ILL.—(AP)—When Janitor Les Burke got to work at a movie theater Thursday morning an unidentified man was waiting for him.

"I think I lost my billfold in the movie last night," the man told Burke. "There was \$700 in it."

Burke took the man to where he had sat the previous night. The janitor picked up a bulky wallet and handed it to the man.

He promptly fainted. After Burke had doused the man's face with water, reviving him, he staggered out of the theater mumbling: "I must have fainted—it's too good to be true."

U. S. Files Protest Against Polish Action

WARSAW (AP)—(AP)—Ambassador Stanton Griffis has protested to the Polish government against the recent detention of two assistant military attaches.

Griffis said Lt. Col. Frank Jessie of Beaumont, Texas, and Weirton, W. Va., and Capt. Nicholas Rudziak of Maynard, Mass., were taken into custody April 1 while on an automobile trip in Lower Silesia. Both carried diplomatic passports.

Jessie and Rudziak were taken into custody at Kepno, northwest of Wroclaw (Breslau). They then ran a one-hour driftnet test in a lime zone at 4,890-4,940 feet.

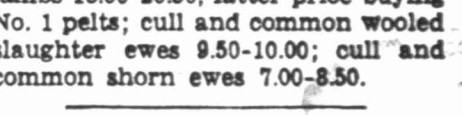


