MFC MAY HAVE DEVONIAN DISCOVERY IN N-C ANDREWS

Discovery of another oil field from the Devonian in Andrews County, has been indicated at Mc-Alester Fuel Company No. 1 M. M. Fisher estate, about 12 miles north of the town of Andrews, and three and one half miles east of the

Shafter Lake-Devonian field. That prospector called top of the Woodford shale at 10,912 feet, and top of the Devonian at 11,020 feet. Elevation is 3,163 feet.

Columbia Joins Chile, Brazil In Breaking Relations With Russia

BOGOTA, COLOMBIA - (P) Colombia became the third Latin American nation Tuesday to sever diplomatic relations with Russia. A break has been expected ever since President Mariano Ospina Perez blamed international Communism for the bloody April 9 revolution. The Colombian Cabinet decided

on the break late Monday. A short time later a note announcing the action was delivered to the Soviet Legation. Its contents were not disclosed.

The government radio broadcast in English an announcement of the believed the government would inform Colombian citizens of its decision Tuesday.

Colombia's action followed the suit of Chile and Brazil. Both broke with the Soviet Oct. 21, 1947.

Riverside Man Is Charged In Bank Robbery

HUNTSVILLE, TEXAS —(P)— Charges of armed robbery were filed Tuesday against William Carl Sullivan, 24, of Riverside, Texas, for the robbery of the New Waverly State Bank Monday.

Sullivan gave himself up three hours after the robbery, and \$1.924 was recovered. Bank officials indicated this was within approximately \$120 of the loss. The charge was filed in Justice of the Peace R. E.

Franklow's court. Sheriff Lloyd Farris quoted Sullivan as saying he took the money to try to make up for money he lost going broke in the cattle business.

The bank was robbed about noon. Farris said Sullivan walked up to Highway Patrolmen Elmer Nichols and A. L. Bouldin here about 3 p. m. and told them he understood the

The mark of 104 short forms, smith said, exceeded the previous record of 75 filled out by an individual. 

Look who gets squeezed!

Union leaders representing less than one-tenth of railroad employes reject recommendations of President's Emergency board—refuse to negotiate except on their own terms—threaten to paralyze nation by strike!

THE LEADERS of three railroad unions, representing less than one-tenth of all railroad employees, have called a railroad strike that would paralyze the nation. These leaders refuse to accept a 151/2 cents

an hour wage increase retroactive to November 1, 1947. This increase was recommended by an impartial Emergency Board appointed by President Truman. This increase of 151/2 cents already has been

accepted by the 19 other railroad unions. But the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Enginemen, and the Switchmen's Union of North America won't accept what more than 90% of all railroad employes have accepted. They have called a strike to get more!

Unions refuse rules discussion Certain rules changes demanded by these union leaders—which would increase wages still further - were recommended by the Board. But the union leaders want morethey demand that the railroads put into effect ALL the changes they asked for, including

those the Board felt should be denied. On top of this, they insist that certain rules changes proposed by the railroads be with-drawn—in spite of the fact that the Board recommended them! These union leaders have refused to negotiate except upon these arbitrary terms.

Greater wage increase not justified Engineers and firemen are among the highest paid of all employes in America, as figures in the box show. This strike threat doesn't justify giving a greater increase than other railroad workers received.

Emergency Boards are a means provided by the Railway Labor Act in the public interest to avoid strikes. The President's Board, after hearing evidence for 33 days, made recommendations based on all the facts in

Who's to blame?

Although they deplored so large an extra cost burden, the railroads accepted the report of the Board because they felt it was in the public interest to uphold the spirit and intent of the Railway Labor Act.

In contrast, this small group of railroad union leaders are attempting to flout the intent and spirit of the Railway Labor Act, and dictate their own terms.

They have dictated a paralyzing railroad

You will be the victim!

How long will the American public stand for the undemocratic, arbitrary, and abusive use of the right to strike and the disregard of the obligation to provide transportation? How long can the American people permi. a few dictatorial union leaders to dely the processes provided for peaceful settlement of disputes?

Force seldom produces settlements that are either fair or lasting. Moreover, a point is often reached when personal interests must be held subordinate to the greater public welfare. That is why the railroads have accepted the Emergency Board recommendations. That is also why the leaders of these three unions should reconsider their decision to call a paralyzing strike.



TN AN ENDEAVOR to aid in halting further advances in living costs, U. S. Steel decreased certain steel prices on May 1, 1948, to the extent of \$25,000,-000 annually, these price reductions being applicable so far as possible to steel products related to the cost of living.

Announcement of these price reductions was made on April 22, 1948, concurrently with the denial by U. S. Steel of the request of the United Steelworkers of America (CIO) for a "substantial wage increase."

United States Steel believes that costs and prices in general are too high for the good of the nation. It shares the firm conviction that American industry and labor should cooperatively do everything in their power to avoid further increases in costs, which, if permitted to occur, must result in higher prices for almost everything we buy. Certainly the best interests of all of our people will not be served by a further lowering in the purchasing power of the dollar.

We are hopeful that our action in reducing the prices of a number of steel products associated with the cost of living may have a beneficial effect throughout the nation and may be helpful in bringing about an early stabilization or reduction in the cost of living. If this should prove to be the outcome, everyone in this country will benefit. If, on the contrary, costs should continue to advance, then in fairness to our employees and to our stockholders we will have to consider at some later date the adequacy of both wages and steel prices under then-existing conditions.

Our answer to the Union was that the granting of its request for a "substantial wage increase" will not in the long run bring benefit to anyone, as it will lead to similar substantial wage increases in other industries and to higher prices generally. Such a wage increase would make necessary a general advance in our steel prices. We are unwilling so to increase steel prices at this time, as we believe this would be contrary to the best interests of the nation.

The Union's demand for a "substantial wage increase" was based on increases in the cost of living. The index of the Bureau of Labor Statistics, U. S. Department of Labor, records an increase of 67.2% in the cost of living between 1940 and February, 1940. During that same period, average straight-time hourly earnings of our steel workers rose 73.3%; their average actual hourly earnings advanced 81.3% and their average actual weekly earnings advanced 91.7%. These advances are substantially in excess of the increase in the cost of living during that period.

If there is to be a halt in the surge of rising costs, there must be full and effective cooperation to this end on the part of every segment of our economy.

Agreements Not Banned By Segregation Ruling

WASHINGTON - (AP) - White home-owners who want to keep colored residents out of their neighborhoods may no longer look to the courts for help.

The Supreme Court said so in two 6 to 0 decisions Monday. But the tribunal at the same time told the white owners:

1. They can get together among themselves and make all the private restrictive agreements they wish so long as the purposes are Royal, but Regular carried out by voluntary means

2. No matter how discriminatory or wrongful such private agreements may be, those excluded because of them can expect to find no redress in the 14th amendment to the constitution.




