Palestine's Truce Is Threatened

Russians Call Off

BERLIN - (A) The Russians did an abrupt aboutface Saturday and called off an hour-old rail traffic block which would have cut off food and coal from 2,000,000 Germans in Berlin's Western sector. The end of the crisis came when the Russians advised American and British authorities that freight

The first freight train from the American zone moved into the Russian zone from Helmstedt on the British zone border an hour later. Late Saturday night two trains, one British and the other American, had arrived in Berlin.

The Russians gave no explanation of their order or its withdrawal and gave no assurance for the future. More Propaganda

Meanwhile, the German Communist press beat the propaganda drum and hinted Germany could hope for a reduction in Russian reparations demands. Russia already has cut demands from Finland, Hungary and Romania.

Allied observers interpreted Saturday's hints as another step in trying to create counter-propaganda against the Marshall Aid Plan for Western Germany.

Saturday's crisis came to a boil shortly after noon. The Russians had refused to permit the Americans to move a freight train in the American sector freight yard at Anhalter. Railway officials had alerted American troops to move the train with their own switch enseize the signal equipment if settlement was reached.
Soon afterward the Russians issued the order to free the train.

Action Nullified In the Fall convention of the party, after Roosevelt had been nominated at Chicago for a fourth term, the state Democratic party was controlled by pro-Roosevelt forces who nullified the action of the May convention. GM-UAW Plan Nay Be Pattern

The new General Motors—UAW wage contract might be the blueprint for a brake that industry and labor can apply to the pressure of inflation. At least it gears the demand for cost-of-living increases to the cost-of-living index. And that makes sense.

No one can seriously deny the justice of advancing wages to meet higher living costs. But the approach to these adjustments has been on a hit-or-miss basis up to now. It followed the traditional pattern of one side's asking for the moon while the other set a rock-bottom figure. Eventually they compromised. But the compromise was often preceded by a strike which cost the workers far more than they won, and sometimes erupted into violence.

Now the union and General Motors have avoided a costly work stoppage and have come up with a solution which may set the pattern for the rest of the auto makers. If that happens, perhaps we shall eventually see the same formula applied to steel and, who knows, even coal.

The UAW statement announcing the agreement called the contract "a staggering blow" to the policies of the Chrysler and Ford Companies. Perhaps it is. But it also represents, we think, an achievement of industrial states-







Thomason pointed out the mu't'-ple details to be worked out before inviting bids. Districts must be created, ownership surveys made on blocks, legal angles checked, and plans and specifications prepared. The latter is by far the biggest job, he said. The city manager indicated, however, that the program has top priority in the engineering and street departments, and the program will be pushed as

rapidly as possible.

He said the actual paving perhaps could be started much sooner by letting a contract for 80 blocks. but that a better price can be obtained on a larger program. Several contractors already have indicated they will bid on the Midland job, Thomason said. All Sections Included

dual cannot be determined until a contract is awarded. The city will pay 10 per cent of the total paving cost, which includes the engineering and supervision. Property owners will pay 90 per cent of the total cost. The paving of intersections will be included in the total cost. Plans call for paving in all sections of the city, although the prin-cipal drainage streets will have first consideration. Much of the initial paving will be in the downtown section. Both east-west and north-

KISSIMMEE, FLA, —(P)— Are a thousand-passenger airplanes in the offing? They are if a municipal ordinance proposed as a joke by the mayor and city attorney of Kis-simmee nearly 40 years ago proves as prophetic in this field of aviation as it has in many others.

The measure, suggested in 1908 when there probably were less than 25 airplanes in the world, would have imposed a license tax on aircraft, required them to carry parachutes and regulated low flying. It would have licensed airports too a step which now has been taken by 39 states—and it even forecast airspeeds of over 200 miles per

The only catch in the Kissimmee ordinance is that it never was adopted. The proposal was printed in the Kissimmee Valley Gazette. The day after it appeared, the mayor declared he had been "ridiculed out of town" and planned to leave the next day for California. However, his mind was changed by the attention the proposal drew.

Scores of tributes were paid the "wise and farsighted" mayor and city attorney. Requests for copies of the ordinance came in from foreign countries. This still didn't make Rissimmee adopt its ordinance. But it wouldn't have to make many changes to put it into effect today—thought it might see fit to eliminate the pro-
