





A short news dispatch recently, based on a Moscow broadcast, announced that the Soviet government had decided to cut in two the balance on reparation payments due from Hungary and Romania. The announcement came four days after the U.S. House of Representatives had de-cided to cut the requested appropriation for European aid by more than a quarter.

This was the latest indication that Russian policy is taking a new tack. Earlier Moscow had reduced the demand for Finnish reparations and had raised wages and increased rations in the Soviet zone of Germany.

In other words, Uncle Joe Stalin has put on a broad smile and is trying to look even more benevolent than benevolent Uncle Sam. And it must be said that the House action gave Uncle Joe a brilliant assist on the play. This raises again the question of whether the House leaders had the least idea of what they were doing when they put through that cut or if, indeed, they comprehend its effect even now.

The average European cannot be expected to know the story behind the cut. He doesn't know that this slash was largely the work of John Taber, perennial pennypincher and head of the House Appropriations Commit-tee, and of Speaker Joseph Martin and Majority Leader Charles Halleck.

Take the woodpecker-finch of the Galapagos Islands. It searches and probes for insects. But it has a short, thick bill shat handicaps it wien the finch suspects a good meal lies hiding in some small crevice.

To remedy this, the finch picks up a short siender stick or the spine of a prickly pear, Austin L. Rand, curator of birds, writes in the Chicago Natural History Museum Bulletin. To finch pokes this probe in to the crevice and grabs any insect routed out.







Downfall Of Smuts Leaves Longview Oil

Well Contractor Cold LONGVIEW-(AP)-The fall of Jan Christian Smuts' government and the apparent lessening of South Africa's ties with the British Empire leave E. A. (Dutch) Kliewer, Sr., Long iew oil well contractor and in ventor, cold as a wedge. Kliewer, at the ripe age of 13 years, was a Boer War soldier. He enlisted in the British army, he said, because he liked to eat. One stretch of his soldiering was spent in jail. Charged with being an American spy, he said he was haled before a general court martial presided over by Gen. Sir Redvers Buller. Also on the board was Field Marshal Lord Roberts.

When Buller, a mere five-foot oneinch warrior himself, saw Kliewer, minus down on his face and learned that the boy was the son of a Baptist minister in Tacoma, Wash., he reprimanded . him and ordered him returned to his regiment.

"Shucks," said Kliewer, "I wasn't interested in preserving the British Empire. I didn't care what happened to the Boers or the British joined the Tommies to eat. I was hungry. You see, it was this way: "I had signed on a four-masted alling ship laden with lumber at T.coma. This German craft was bound for Falmouth, England. 
