deliberate. The added significance in Molotov's action, therefore, was that it directly involved two of the four men who have been concerned for the last two weeks with trying to work out some formula for lifting the Berlin blockade. The other two are the British and French ambassadors to Moscow.

And while diplomatic informants here stress the distinction between the issues raised by the school teacher incidents and the problems involved in the Berlin talks, there seems to be no doubt that a new element of irritation is coming into Soviet-American relations. It may have a bad effect all along the line.





To build up the breeding stock so they could produce enough calves to supply the demand for meat in later years, the Department of Agriculture thought it necessary to advise farmers to reduce the number of animals sent to market in 1948. If this had not been done, there was danger that the supply of meat for 1950 and later years would be even lower

than for 1948. The pig story presented an entirely different set of circumstances. Last year, there was a corn crop failure. That meant a shortage of feed for fattening hogs. That meant it would be foolish for farmers to raise more pigs than they could feed. So the farmers were advised to reduce the Spring pig numbers from 53,000,000 to 50,000,000. As it turned out, they raised 51,000,000. This loss was more than made up, however, by advising farmers to farrow for a larger crop this Fall-34.000,000 instead of the 30,000,000 in the Fall of 1947. The number may not reach this figure, however, so for the entire year there may be a

Written for NEA Service Before a new treatment is tried on human beings, it has to be carefully studied and tested. It must be safe and should offer a reasonably good chance of helping.

If the new treatment is a drug or chemical, the first thing to do is to make sure that it is pure. This can be determined in the modern chemical laboratory. The next question is whether the

drug might do any harm to humans. kind of testing is what scientists call This risk is always present, so, instead of trying the new drug directly on people, it is first given to animals-mice, rats, rabbits, guines deal to make modern medical pracpigs or dogs, for example. Must Prove Value But, before giving a new drug, it is necessary to know whether it will really do what it is supposed to do. The only sure way to prove this is to study a certain number of animals which are infected with the germ against which the new drug is supposed to act.

These animals are divided into two groups. Half of the infected animals are given the drug and half of them are not. If the animals which receive the new drug recover and those which did not, perish, the value of the drug is established. This



Frustrated Teachers Named As Cause Of Pupil Frustration

LONDON -(A)- What makes a frustrated school child frustrated? Psychiatrists think it's a frustrated teacher.

That's what the International Conference on Child Psychiatry was told here Friday in a paper written by Dr. Gordin Stephens, chief psychiatric consultant at the Winnipeg

Child Guidance Clinic.

A frustrated teacher, he said, is like a bad apple in a barrel. The teacher's personality is taken up by the pupils. A drab teacher increases the drabness of an old school-house and many such teachers are incapable of paying even lip service to the modern concepts of human behavior, Stephens said. Such teachers, he declared, re-

gard spontaneity, humor or emotional disturbances — except their own—as highly immoral. The great concern of psychiatrists today, Step-hens continued, is the teacher who thwarts her pupils, their initiative and other evidences of growth "to the extent that pathological submission is the only acceptable behavior reaction." To Compel Obedience

Such a teacher, he went on, will kill initiative, enterprise and any other outward growth in a child in order to make the child obedient. They resort to ridicule and other means of deflation to compel such obedience, thus doing more harm Golfers Asked

to the child's emotional growth than a whipping would do.

One big trouble, Stephens said, is that the teaching profession is placed on the same "exalted" plane as that of the clergy and the mediatorial to the child's emotional growth than a whipping would do.

And why are teachers frustrated? Very probably, Stephens thinks, because their initiative is smothered by too-rigid supervison. Public meddling in a teacher's personal life also is a cause.


