

## BANK REPORT

### Over \$30 Million Deposited In County

Deposits at three Parmer County banks amounted to more than \$30 million on June 30, according to official mid-year statements of the three banks.

The deposit totals were up by over \$6 million from the same date a year earlier, representing a 25 per cent increase for the time period.

Total assets reported by Parmer County banks stood at \$35.2 million on June 30, up by \$7.2 million from the same date a year earlier. A gain was also shown in the loan category. Loans reported on June 30 of this year totaled \$19.7 million, compared to \$16.6 million a year earlier.

Actual figures on deposits at the three banking institutions were \$30,386,549.88. A year earlier, this figure had been \$24,342,229.37, or a net increase of \$6,044,320.51.

In total assets, the June 30 figure amounted to \$35,210,952.68. A year ago, the comparative figure was \$27,722,609.69, up by \$7,488,454.08.

Loan figures were \$19,757,174.08 this June 30, and \$16,590,038.71 a year ago, an increase of \$3,167,135.37.

Bank officials at Friona, Farwell and Bovina credited the excellent crops of the past year, plus the much better than average farm prices with accounting for the tremendous mid-year totals. Also, cattle had played a big part in the totals on June 30, although officials were cautious as to what the future might hold, what with the current freeze on beef prices.

He indicated that the local shoppers seemed to be flattered that local businesses cared enough about them to ask their opinions on products and/or services which they would like to see added in Friona.

It will probably be about a month before the results of the survey are tabulated and presented to the Board of City Development leaders.

HUGH MOSELEY, County Tax Assessor-Collector, and chairman of the Parmer County Historical Survey Commission, announced during the historical marker dedication here on July 4 that Parmer County will be observing its centennial (100th) anniversary in 1976, the year the nation celebrates its bi-centennial.

Although the county was not organized until 1907, it was actually created by the Texas Legislature in 1876. Therefore, there are plans afoot to hold a gala county birthday celebration three years hence, in conjunction with the nation's bi-centennial.

As we understand it, there is nothing concrete as yet, but plans will be made on behalf of the county's centennial celebration.

Currently, each of the county's three major communities has their own individual celebrations. Farwell's Border Town Days is held in July, Bovina's Bull Town Days comes off in August, and Friona's Maize Days comes in September.

Whether or not the county's birthday fete could be held in conjunction with the local fetes, we don't know. However, if it could, this should add punch to each of the local celebrations and more or less give each one an added theme.

E.S. WHITE, whom we have referred to before as Friona's most avid baseball fan, would really be the kind of grandpa to have, if you were choosing your own grandpa.

Last Friday night, Mr. White took one grandson, Larry, and Bron Euler to see the baseball game at Amarillo. The added attraction was Max Patkin, the famous baseball clown.

One of the reasons Mr. White was interested in seeing the Amarillo team play Arkansas is the fact that Arkansas is the farm club of the St. Louis Cardinals, and he is a longtime Cardinal fan.

Back in the 1930s and 1940s, Mr. White was official score-keeper for Friona's "town team," which was the pride of local sports fans. His weekly stories about the Friona baseball team's fortunes were carried in the Friona Star.

WE HAD HOPED that the Community Center-Showbarn project would be completed in time for the Maize Days celebration, but apparently this will not be possible, since Maize Days is now less than 45 days away.

Our next concern is that the facility be completed in time for the annual Parmer County Junior Livestock Show, which is the main reason behind the drive to build the facility.

With the show only about six months away, we'll need everything to fall just right in order to be able to stage the 1974 livestock show indoors.

Main thing holding up the project, as we understand it, is legal work on the land deed, being carried out by attorneys for the KIS Development Corp. One thing about it, you can't rush people who are donating 21 acres of land to your project.

In her latest letter, which took only three days to reach her parents from Sweden, Kay recounted much of the life she has encountered while a summer student in the European country.

Kay told her parents in the letter, "Last Thursday we took a tour under 14 bridges in Stockholm and drove by the palace. Everything is very beautiful..."

"On Friday I went with Lars to his work. It was very interesting, and exciting. We went to an advertising agency and the headman there spoke English. It was nice. For lunch

Lars took me to a restaurant near the palace. It was underground and very cool." She described the foods served and said that for the most part, she enjoyed the food.

Also in the letter, Kay wrote, "Would you send me a pancake recipe, the one that uses oil. I don't think they have shortening. Also send me a good cake recipe."

Near the end of the letter, which had borne the salutation, "Dear Daddy, Mother and Cat," the Friona High School student wrote, "Pet the cat for me."

In the same letter, Kay had told of her experiences with a sauna bath, the foods, visiting islands and Swedish attractions. Language seems to bear little effect on communication and the young woman has managed to travel around and is enjoying her visit in Sweden.

# Sr. All-Stars To NM State Tourney

Each team scored a run in the first inning, but Tucumcari came up with a big six-run fourth inning to forge a 7-1 lead. Tucumcari jumped on starter Robin Baize, knocking him out of the game with the six-run uprising. The visitors scored

two more runs in the fifth, for a 9-1 lead.

But Friona came back in the fifth inning, socking five consecutive hits and seven in all, to trim the lead to 9-6. The first five batters reached base, with Davy Carthel socking the big blow, a two-run double. Baize then plated Carthel with a triple that went over the center-fielder's head, and Edward Castillo's single scored Baize.

Still trailing 9-7 in the last inning, Friona was faced with a do or die situation. It turned out to be a weird inning.

Pinch-hitter David Barnett reached base on an error. Then another pinch-hitter, Mitchell Smiley, beat out an infield hit. With runners on first and second, John Seright dribbled a ball to the pitcher, who elected to go to second base. The throw went wild, and when the dust had cleared, the two base runners had scored the tying runs, although Seright was out trying to go to second.

## FCU Deposits In Increase

The Friona Texas Federal Credit Union has noted approximately a one-third increase in assets in 1973, with total assets moving upward \$389,907.90 from the \$721,341.33 as reported as of June 30, 1972.

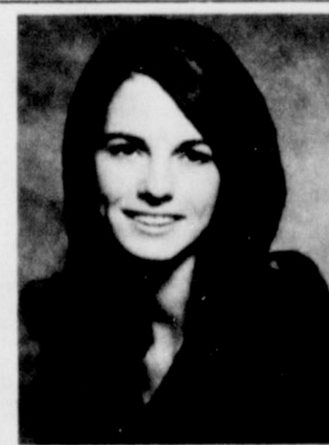
In a report issued by treasurer, Geneva Williams, the assets as of June 30, 1973, are shown at \$1,111,249.23.

As a result, dividend payments are up this year by almost \$8,000 for investors in the Credit Union. In 1972, dividends payable on June 30 were \$12,580.77 as compared to \$20,017.13 in 1973.

Land and buildings has increased from \$28,072.49 in 1972 to \$46,597.90 this year and shares are up \$347,265.98 this year, with \$893,810.36 in shares being recorded as compared with \$546,544.38 last year.

The week of July 25-31, 1973 agriculture, Farm Bureau has been proclaimed as Farm and Ranch Safety Week in Parmer County by County Judge Archie Tarter, at the request of Harry Hamilton, County Farm Bureau President. The local farm organization is joining efforts with other farm and ranch agencies to coordinate the special farm safety campaign within the county.

In his proclamation, Judge Tarter said "I urge all citizens to recognize this special period, and especially urge farm families of Parmer County to become more safety conscious, not only during FARM SAFETY WEEK, but to utilize the monthly emphasis topics and program guides to help make farm safety a round-the-calendar activity."

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

She smilingly calls herself 'Bicyclin' Bessie,' but Mrs. A.H. Boatman of 1209 Main Street is becoming a familiar sight on the streets of Friona as she pedals along on her three-wheeler.

"My age is no secret," confided the bright-eyed cheerful great-grandmother, "I will be 84 on October 7."

Since retiring as operator of Gib's Cleaners, Mrs. Boatman has by no means retired from a very active life, despite arthritis in both knees which forbid her driving a car and at times slow her down...a little.

Mrs. Boatman said she sold her car when she became unable to drive because of her knees, and is unable to stand for any length of time or walk but very short distances.

A long time supporter of Girlstown, U.S.A. at Whiteface, Mrs. Boatman said she first became interested in Girlstown

approximately 20 years ago. Since that time, she has made a total of 444 articles and the articles have included dresses, pajamas, robes, gowns, pillows, purses, sweaters and numerous other items for the young residents of Girlstown.

Although much of the materials she uses are contributed by various persons, Mrs. Boatman has bought many, many yards of colorful materials to use in her sewing. "I sleep good at night," she assured the Star editor when interviewed and asked to what she attributes her longevity and activity.

"Instead of going to the hospital most of the time when I feel ill," she added, "I just take a trip. I go to Oklahoma City or just where I take a notion to."

"I enjoy life and enjoy doing the things I want to when my knees let me," commented

the octogenarian.

Young at 83, Mrs. Boatman said she is a member of the Friona Women's Club and thoroughly enjoys her club work. At the present time, she has written a letter to President Nixon asking his aid in helping keep the 'Big Thicket' in East Texas. The club has adopted the Big Thicket as a project and her project was to write the President.

The Boatman's moved to Friona in 1927 from Anadarko, Okla. and the Boatman children grew up in the family home at 1209 Main. Two of the Boatman children live in Friona, as do two grandchildren. The local children are Gilbert Boatman and Lillian (Mrs. Joe) McLellan. Mrs. B.E. (Esta) Todd and Clifford Boatman live in Oklahoma City. Also in Friona are three grandchildren, Betty Louise (Mrs. Lloyd) Rector, and Ken and Joe McLellan. There are three grandchildren in Oklahoma City and nine great-grandchildren.

This week, Mrs. Boatman, who says she doesn't have enough time in the day to do everything she wants to do, started a diary to see where her time goes.

Interestingly enough, as she scanned her diary and read excerpts from the new diary, it quickly became apparent that much of Mrs. Boatman's time is spent talking and visiting with relatives and friends, as well as being jammed with her myriad activities that keep her younger at 83 than many (or most) individuals less than half her age.

As she pedals down the street on her three-speed three-wheeler, Mrs. Boatman is drawing the attention of Frionans...admiringly and perhaps some of them longing and wishing they were as young as she is.

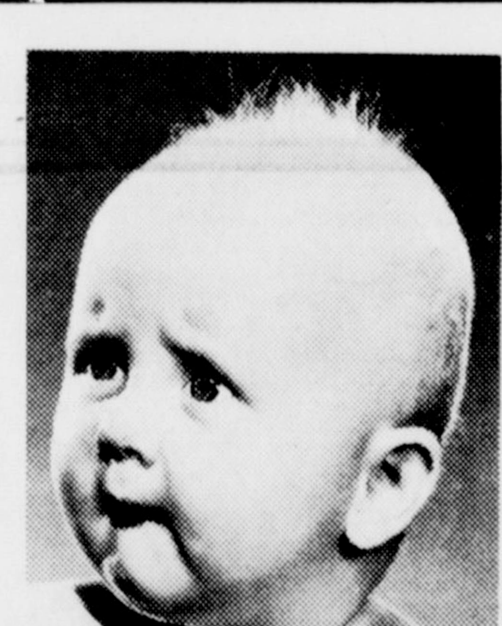

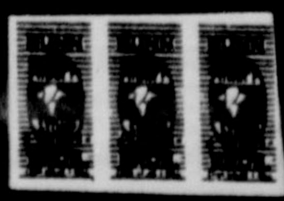
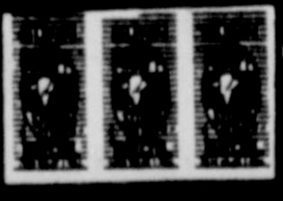

## Sheriff Checks Two Weekend Burglaries

Two burglaries in the north end of Parmer County were reported early this week to Sheriff Charlie Lovelace at Farwell.

Sheriff Lovelace said one burglary was approximately nine miles east of Friona at the farm home of Mrs. M.H. Hilly. According to the initial investigation, the break-in occurred sometime Sunday evening or Sunday night.

He added that Mrs. Hilly is presently staying in Lubbock with her mother who is critically ill in a hospital in that city and has been unable to return to her home to assess the missing items, although a large number of missing items from the home have been reported.

Neighbors found the home wide open Monday morning and notified law enforcement officers and a son-in-law of Mrs. Hilly, Marvin Troope.

Troope said that missing at this time are a RCA console 21 inch black and white television, one large chair, several lamps including two table lamps and one drop lamp, bed linens, including sheets, electric blanket, spreads, bed pillows, a pedal-type Singer sewing machine and several dresser and bureau drawers and their contents.

The sheriff said, "Whoever broke into the Hilly home left a lot of evidence around. There

were lots of footprints all over the yard, and they were of men, women and children. We think they were around the house for quite awhile and someone passing by probably saw them while they were there.

"We would like to ask that anyone who says around the Hilly home over the past weekend to please let us know."

Also, the sheriff said that whoever stripped the house had another chair on the front porch apparently ready to load and a divan had been moved out of place, near the front door of the home.

Food in the kitchen, including the refrigerator and deep freeze had not been touched.

Sheriff Lovelace said the front door had an old type lock and it was believed that a skeleton key had been used to gain entry to the home.

In the second burglary, Jack Nelson, who lives west of Friona reported as missing sometime Sunday afternoon or evening a Philco portable TV.

Seen in the area during the afternoon was a 1965-1966 light colored Chevrolet occupied by three males, however, they have not definitely been tied in to the burglary at this time, said the sheriff.

Investigation into both burglaries is continuing.

When returning merchandise avoid making returns near closing time or during rush hours. If leaving an item for repairs—or if a refund will be mailed to you—be sure to get a receipt for the item.

In making a complaint be calm and courteous. Be

friendly, but firm, and don't be sarcastic or abusive.

Let the facts speak for themselves. State the facts clearly—where and when the product was purchased, its model number (if any), brand name, price and what is wrong with it.

Try to explain what went wrong, when and how the defect appeared.

If telephoning complaint, ask name of person receiving complaint. If writing a letter, include your name, address, zip code and telephone number on all correspondence and keep carbon copies.

Company addresses appear in "Poor's Register of Corporations, Directors and Executives" or "Moody's Industrial Manual" in most libraries.

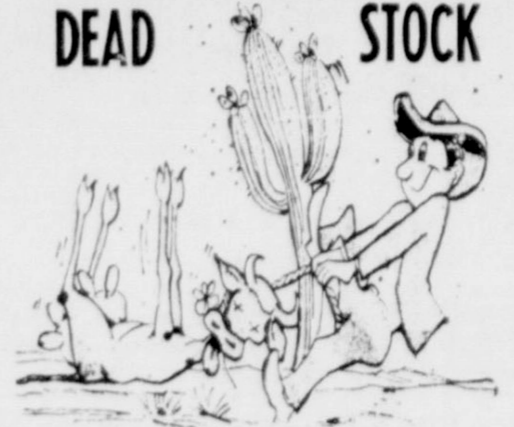

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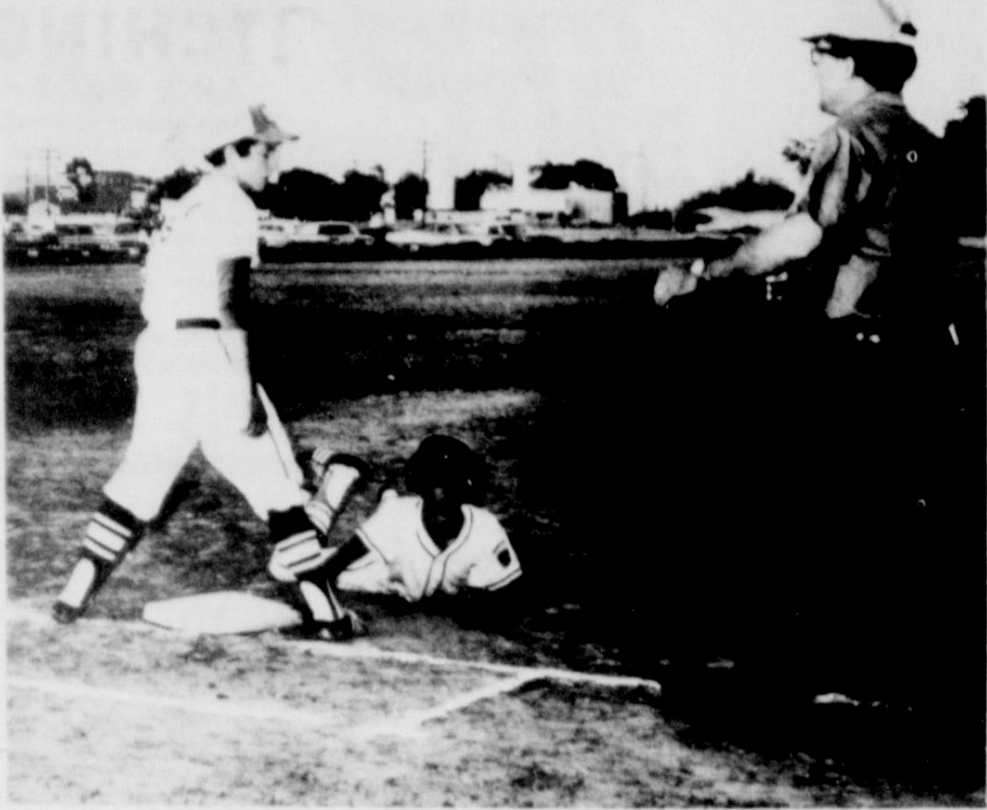

## Kindergarten Dates Set By School Board

Meeting in regular monthly session, the Friona Independent School District School Board established guidelines for kindergarten attendance for the ensuing school year, 1973-74.

Children who were five years of age between September 1 and March 1 will attend full days from August 27 to January 16. The other children who reached their fifth birthday between March 1 and September 1 will attend the second half of kindergarten from January 17 to May 30.

The superintendent said three rooms have been made available for kindergarten classes.

He also reported the tentative budget for the 1973-74 school year has been approved. The budget shows a \$171,525 over the budget for 1972-73. Superintendent Farr explained the difference with

most of the increase to provide a new Special Education Program for Parmer County. The Plan 'A' program will have the fiscal agent at the Friona Schools. Money will be sent to the Friona Schools for teachers and supplies.

The 1973-74 proposed budget is \$1,327,538 as compared to \$1,156,013 for 1972-73.

Employed will be 20 new school employees for the county, including one supervisor, one counselor, 11 teachers and seven teacher aides.

Also approved was the tax rate for the next year. The \$1.65 per \$100 tax rate will be unchanged, said Farr.

School lunches were increased by five cents. Kindergarten through eighth grade will now pay 45 cents and high school students will pay 50 cents.

Mobil Oil was awarded the

ticket price at \$1.50 each or \$7.50 for season tickets. There will be five home games again this year.

Travel expenses for school personnel has increased to 10 cents per mile and it was voted to keep the football home game

Approved was the resignation of Mrs. Tim Herring, second grade teacher and the employment of Lee Campbell for CVAE, mechanical skills.

Also, the board heard the tax assessor report that the delinquent tax roll now totals \$24,623.97. Routine bills were also approved for payment.

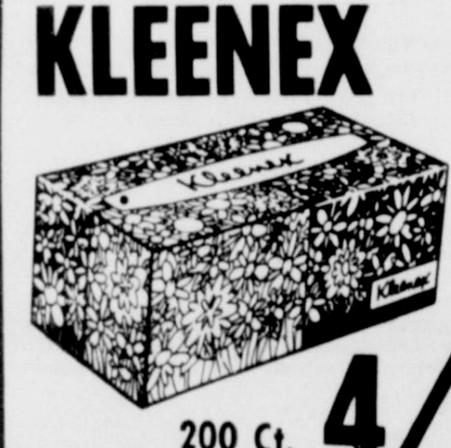

# Two Killed In OL Wreck

With the death of Eliseo Salinas, 47, around 11 p.m. Saturday night, the death toll was two from a noon accident Saturday at the intersections of FM145 and FM1731.

He was the driver of a pickup truck involved in the crash. Killed instantly in the accident was his wife, Mrs. Anita Salinas, around 50. She was pronounced dead at the scene by Parmer County Justice of the Peace Wilbur Charles of Farwell.

Six other persons were injured in the accident at the intersection about nine miles south of Bovina.

DPS Officer Bob Dorris of Friona said the pickup truck, which was driven by Salinas was southbound on FM1731 and the large cattle truck driven by William H. Carothers, 43, of Texico, was eastbound on FM145.

The Salinas family, reportedly living in Bovina, were enroute to a field at the time of the accident.

Hospitalized at Clovis Memorial Hospital were Carothers and his son, Charles Adkins, age seven. They were reported to be in good condition.

At the time of the mid-intersection crash, the pickup spun around on the highway and threw all six occupants of the vehicle out. The pickup did not overturn, although it was virtually destroyed on impact.

It was tentatively determined that several members of the Salinas family were perhaps riding in the bed of the pickup at the time of the crash.

On impact, the tractor-trailer rig, driven by Carothers, veered off the roadway to the right and ended up in a cornfield. The trailer of the empty truck overturned, but the cab remained upright, although the cab was torn apart when the truck struck concrete pipe stacked in the edge of the cornfield. Carothers and his son were injured at that time.

Five members of the Salinas family were brought to Parmer

injury. In the same hospital, his 13-year-old sister, Celia, is in fair condition with a head injury, fractured pelvis and

## Bovina Man Shot Sunday

Raul Rodriguez, about 19, of Bovina was admitted to the Parmer County Community Hospital in Friona Sunday afternoon, suffering from a gunshot wound in the back.

According to Parmer County officers, Rodriguez was apparently shot accidentally. Steve

Madrigal and another Bovina youth were handling a gun in the back seat of an automobile driven by Rodriguez when the gun discharged, striking Rodriguez in the back.

Deputy Sheriff Henry Minter and Highway Patrolman Glenn Fant investigated the accident.

At presstime, funeral services for Mr. and Mrs. Salinas were scheduled to be held at a funeral home in Corpus Christi. They were moved from Parsons-Ellis Funeral Home in Friona to the Corpus Christi funeral home.

Reportedly, the Salinas made their home in Alice and came to the county to work vegetable crops. They were reported to be working in the onion fields at the time of the fatal accident.

### TWO INJURED

In a second car-truck accident in the county in five days, Mrs. Francesca Melendez, 23, of Friona, was hospitalized at Parmer County Community Hospital in Friona for treatment. She was reported to be in good condition.

The accident, which occurred Wednesday afternoon, around mid-afternoon, was approximately one-half mile south of Black on FM1172.

Mrs. Melendez was a passenger in a small car which was struck by a large truck-trailer as the car pulled out of a field onto the highway.

Driver of the Hereford Seed Store truck from Hereford was James Jesko, 19. He received injuries to his right arm and his back as the large truck overturned onto its side following the near broadside collision.

Jesko said he pulled to the right when he saw the car pulling onto the highway and hit the car on the right back instead of a straight broadside collision.

The truck spilled a full load of grain sorghum across the highway and the FM road was blocked entirely by the trailer and tractor. Spilled grain sorghum from the overturned trailer lay deep on the highway and into the east ditch.

The car appeared to be totaled and the truck received heavy damage.

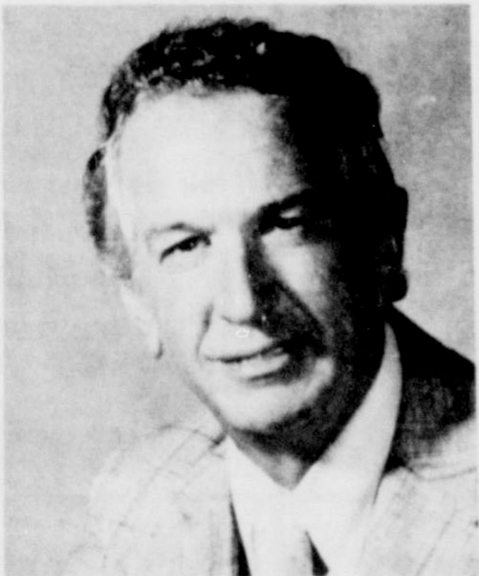

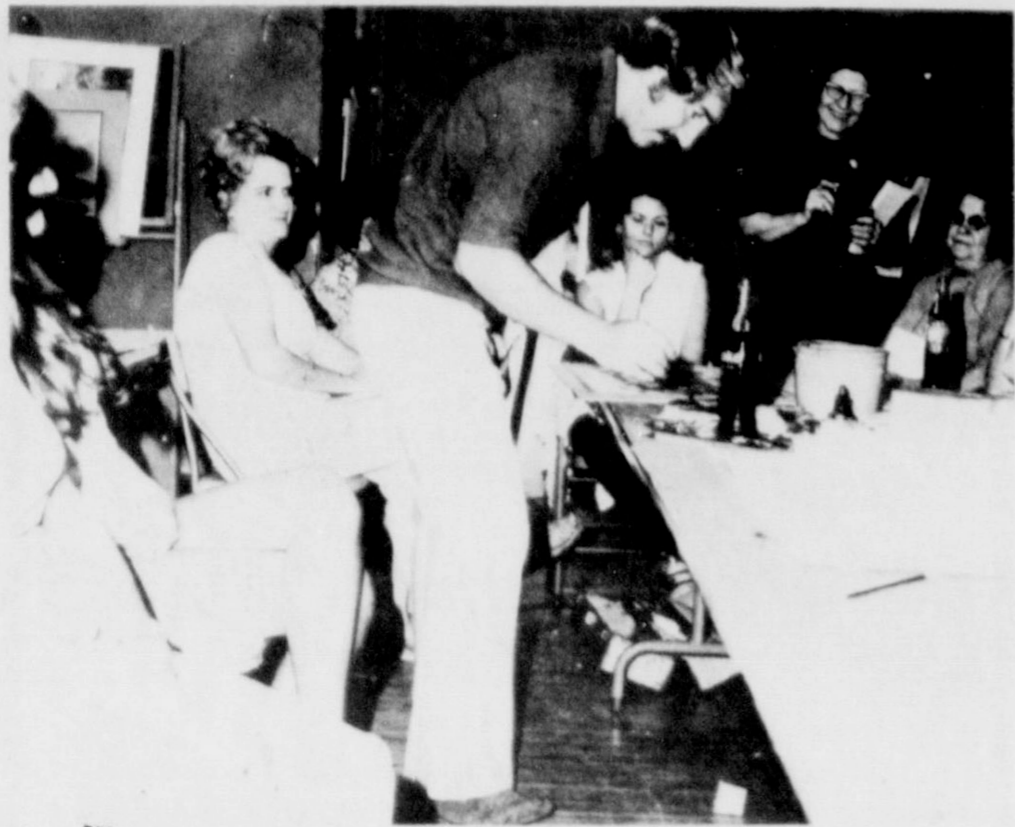

## Iris Dortch Enrolled In Special Education

Iris Dortch, graduate student from Friona, is currently enrolled in special education courses at West Texas State University in nearby Canyon.

WTSU exists as one of the few universities in the state of Texas where teachers can earn a special education endorsement for their teaching certificate says Dr. Wilma Jo Bush, coordinator of the special education program.

"Most teachers would have to attend school during the regular semesters to complete their special education requirements," said Dr. Bush.

"However, the WTSU Education Department tries to make it convenient and practical for teachers who are currently working during the fiscal year to gain their endorsements in one summer's work."

Special education endorsements may be gained in four areas at WTSU. They are mental retardation, teaching the emotionally disturbed, language and learning disabilities and early childhood education for teachers of exceptional children.

"Each of these endorsements requires 12 additional hours of study except for the language and learning disabilities, and that requires 15 hours," said Dr. Bush.

Dr. Bush stated that West Texas is also well known throughout the state as being a university that is able to offer its students a practical study of actual teaching situations.

There are several institutions near the university, such as Kilgore Children's Psychiatric Center and Hospital, Amarillo State Center for Human Development, Central Plains Mental Health Clinic, and Camp Wigwam, a summer camp for retarded children, where the students go for on the job training.

"These practicums are most beneficial to the students and to those being treated," said Dr. Bush.

West Texas State special education courses are teaching the Texas "Plan A" concept of teaching.

"This concept," Bush explained, "is a program to establish special education in a regular classroom situation."

"In other words, instead of having a special class that consists of only special education students, the trained teacher goes into the classroom and teaches the special children from plans that were drawn up for those children by individual analysis."

"Hopefully, the student will spend the greater part of his day in the regular classroom," she concluded.

Plan A concept is scheduled to be a reality in all Texas public schools by September of 1976, according to the Special Education and Special Schools Department of the Texas Education Agency.

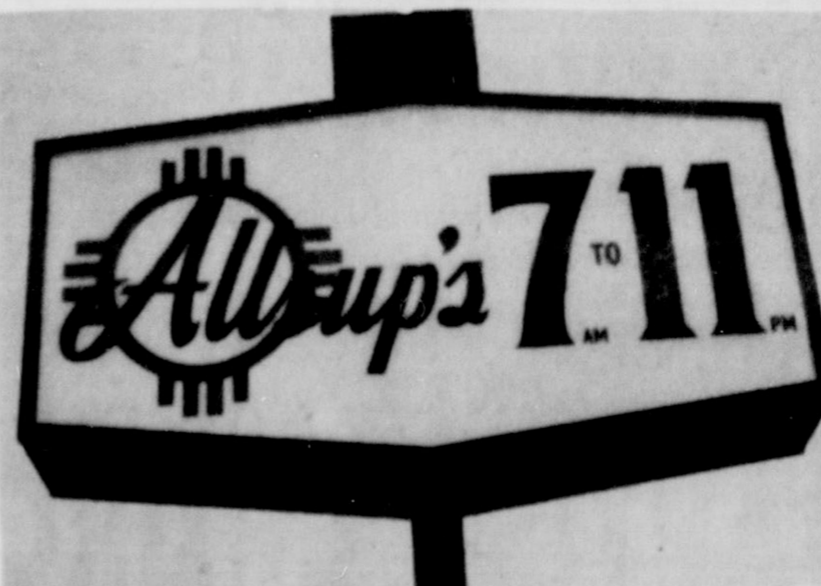

## Census Sets Survey Here

Information on the disability of individuals will be collected from a sample of households in the Friona area in a survey conducted by the Bureau of the Census. Percy R. Millard, Director of the Bureau's Data Collection Center in Dallas, announced the survey will be taken during the week of July 16-20.

The questions are in addition to the usual ones asked in the monthly survey on employment and unemployment conducted nationwide by the Census Bureau for the U.S. Department of Labor. The questions on disability are asked for the Social Security Administration.

The results of the monthly survey on employment and unemployment provide a continuing measure of the economic health of the Nation. For example, total employment in May held steady at its all-time high of 84 million-2.5 million more than 12 months earlier. And the out-of-work rate stayed at 5 percent, the rate held since late last fall.

Households in this area taking part in the survey are part of the 50,000 nationwide scientifically selected to represent a cross section of all households.

All information about individuals and families provided the Census Bureau is confidential by law and can be published only as statistical totals.

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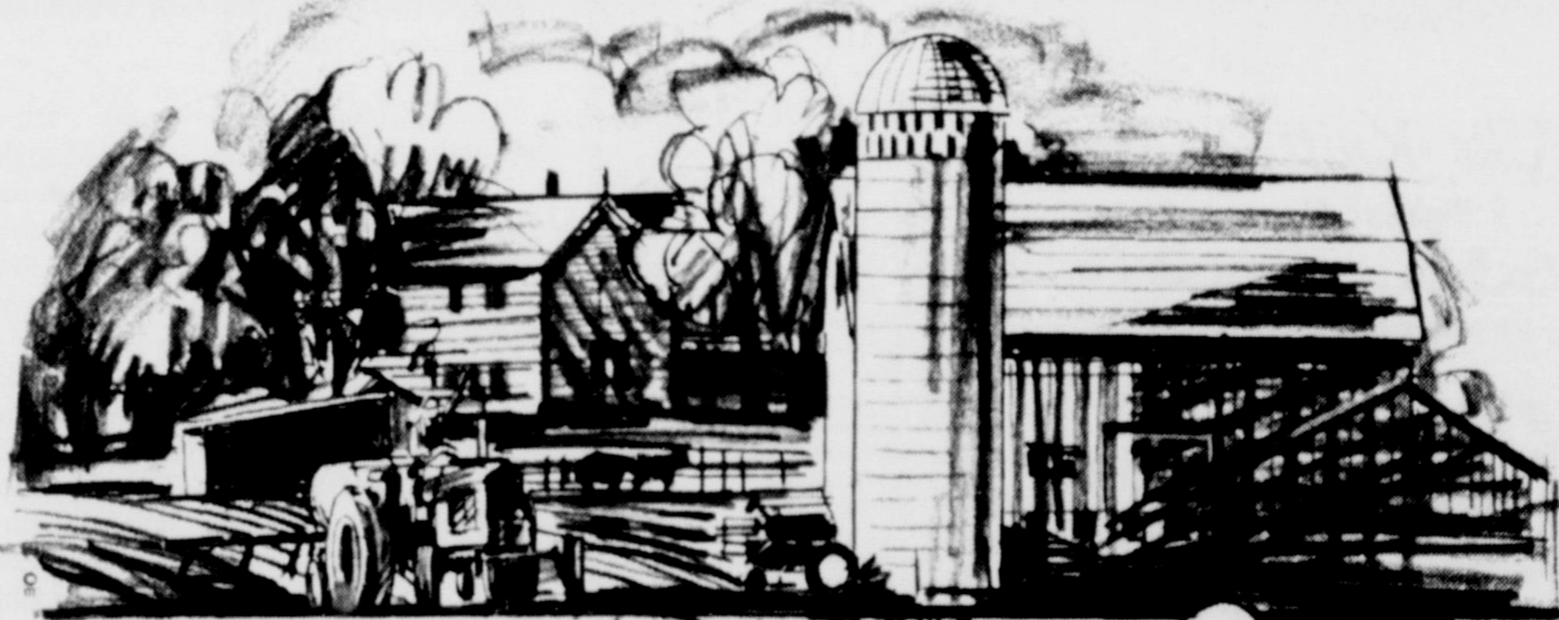
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## Darla Hawkins, Ray Peace Exchange Wedding Vows

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## The Truth Will Make You Free

When one picks up a copy of a Catholic Bible, he sees that there are several additional books included in its Old Testament section which are not found in Protestant Bibles. These extra books are generally known as the apocrypha. Apocrypha came into the English language from the Greek and basically means hidden. We use the word "apocryphal" to refer to non-canonical books.

The titles of some of these apocryphal books are as follows--I and II Maccabees, Susanna, Tobit, Judith, The Wisdom of Solomon. The contents of these books covers a broad range of subjects and represents varieties of literary form. They may be classified under the following four divisions--Historical, Legendary, Prophetic, and Ethical writings.

Should these books be received or rejected as "Scripture"? On what grounds are they to be rejected? First, these books were never included in the Hebrew canon of the Old Testament. Second, these books were never accepted as canonical by Jesus and His apostles. Third, early Christian writers like Philo and Josephus did not accept these books as Scripture. Fourth, since the books contain errors of history, chronology, and geography, and contain portions that are legendary and fictitious, they were not the result of Divine inspiration. Fifth, the books have been shrouded with continual uncertainty about their authority.

There also exists some apocryphal books written under assumed names of apostles. They contain fanciful stories about Jesus and the apostles.

These books [the Old and New Testament apocryphal books] have been erroneously described as "the lost books of the Bible." This is a misleading title because these books were never a part of the Bible.
