Wilshire Is To Test Top Of Ellenburger Horizon

Wilshire Oil Company No. 1 McElroy, West-Central Upton County wildcat, five miles east of the shallow McElroy field, and 600 feet from north and east lines of the southwest quarter of section 144, block K, COBARRING survey, had reached 13,941 feet in Ellenburger line and dolomite, and was making more hole.

Operator plans to take a drillstem test early Thursday.

Top of the Ellenburger was called from samples at 13,900 feet. Elevation is 2,749 feet.

SE Mitchell Prospector To DST In Ellenburger

H. L. Hunt No. 1 Ellwood, Southeast Mitchell County prospector, topped the Ellenburger at 7,188 feet, on an elevation of 2,903 feet.

It has drilled to 7,214 feet, and is to run a drillstem test to check the top zone of the deep horizon. It has not reported having developed any free oil, up to now.

The venture is six and one-half miles northwest of the Jamison field in Northwest Coke County, about 20 miles southeast of Colorado City, and 600 feet from north and 1,800 feet from east lines of section 31, J. P. Smith survey.

Another Well Completes In Benedum Oil Field

Plymouth Oil Company and Slick-Urschel Oil Company No. 1 Wallace, northeast flanker to the initial producer in the Benedum field in East-Central Upton County, has been completed for a 24-hour, natural flowing potential of 520 barrels of oil from Ellenburger pay above the total depth at 11,500 feet. No water was shown in the fluid which was recovered. Gas-oil ratio was 3,820-1. Gravity of the oil was 59.2 degrees.

This well is producing from open hole between 11,480-500 feet. It is 600 feet from north and west lines of lot 1, P. B. Scott survey.

No. 1 Taylor & Sadler Flows Oil After Acid

Plymouth and Slick-Urschel No. 1 Taylor and Sadler, one location diagonally southeast of the discovery well of the Benedum field, and 600 feet from north and west lines of lot 4, section 50 1/2 P. B. Scott survey, kicked off after swabbing on the open hole at 11,476-502 feet in the Ellenburger, and was flowing at the rate of 12 barrels of oil per hour.

The pay section has been washed with 300 gallons of acid. The oil being recovered still has a shale-out of some drilling mud. No formation water is showing. Testing to cleanout and complete is continuing.

Vealmoor Stepout Flows Oil On Drillstem Test

Seaboard Oil Company of Delaware No. 1 D. C. Zant, stepout from production from the Pennsylvania line in the Vealmoor field in North-Central Howard County, about 18 miles north of Big Spring, recovered 58.32 barrels of oil, and no water during a 70-minute drillstem test in the top of the pay at 7,925-45 feet.

A one-half inch bottom hole choke, and a one-inch top opening were used.

Gas showed at the surface in three minutes. Drilling mud came to the top in nine minutes and the drill pipe started flowing oil in ten minutes. It flowed 48.3 barrels of oil in one hour and the tester was then closed.

When the drillpipe was being pulled it unloaded 5.5 barrels of oil. There was 675 feet, or 5.53 barrels of oil left in the pipe when it had all been pulled.

Operator is now preparing to run a 1/2-inch casing, preparatory to starting completion tests on the extension.

Shafter Lake Venture Has Water And No Oil Shows

Gulf Oil Corporation No. 1 State School Board, deep wildcat in the Shafter Lake area of North-Central Andrews County, about 10 miles north of the town of Andrews, and 1,979 feet from north and west lines of section 14, block A-36, psi survey, is shutdown for orders on a total depth of 10,700 feet in lime and chert, which is likely the Devonian.

It ran a one and one half hour drillstem test at 10,575-700 feet. Recovery was 558 feet of drilling mud and 3,945 feet of salty, sulphur water. There were no signs of oil.

Reports that the project was to plug back to about 3,000 feet, and complete as a gas producer from the Yates sandy lime formation have not been officially verified by official sources in Midland.

Lion Is To Plug Wildcat Project In SE Sterling

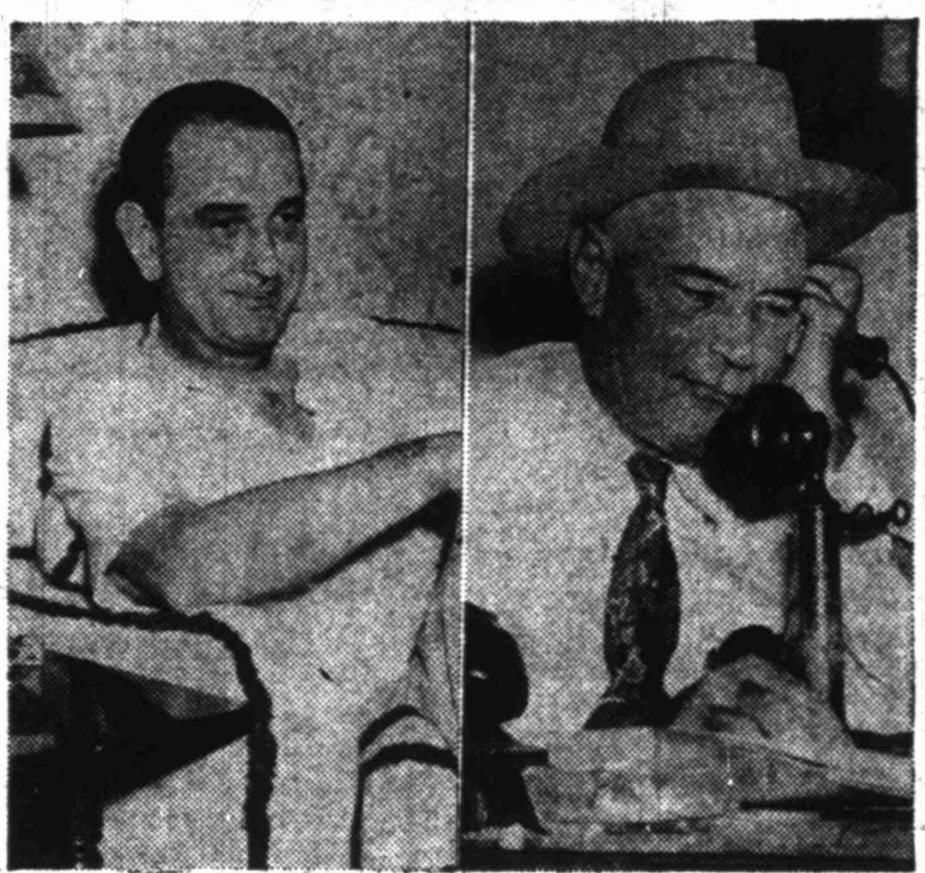
Lion Oil Company No. 1 Kendrick-Poster, Southeast Sterling County wildcat, one mile east of the discovery well for production from the Wichita-Albany section of the Permian, to open the Marvin field, and located 530 feet from north and west lines of section 8, block 18, H&TC survey, is to be plugged and abandoned on a total depth of 4,850 feet in lower Permian lime.

It took a two hour and ten minute drillstem test at 4,778-4,850 feet. Recovery was 1,930 feet of sulphur water, with a scum of oil. The zone covered by the latest drillstem test is possibly the Wolf.

Governors Confer On End Of Blockade

BERLIN—(P)—The four military governors of Germany opened their second conference on the Berlin crisis Wednesday, apparently armed with experts' findings on possibilities of ending the 70-day Berlin blockade.

The French licensed newspaper Der Kurier reported that the "technical difficulties" which the Russians have said caused them to block the only rail line from Berlin to Western Germany already have been overcome.

The newspaper quoted a leading official of the German Railway Administration at Magdeburg as saying "The double railway line between Magdeburg and the zonal border is capable of carrying all freight and passenger traffic."

The new session of the military governors began shortly after 5 p. m. (9 a. m. CST), in the main Allied Control Council conference room. Three groups of four-power experts met earlier Wednesday.

The groups—four-power experts on transport, finance and economics—were to report their findings to the military governors. Control of Berlin's currency appeared to be the biggest hurdle in the attempts to solve the crisis, and it appeared slated for prime attention at the meeting.

The experts were believed to have been assigned specific tasks by the four commanders after the military governors held their first meeting here Tuesday. The governors themselves are working on directives flown from the Moscow sessions of Western representatives with Soviet leaders.

New Lead May Knit Evidence In Spy Hearings

WASHINGTON—(P)—Congressional spy investigators Wednesday ran down a new lead they said may knit together claims that the Communists operated a prewar underground and wartime espionage rings in Washington.

Representative Nixon (R-Calif.) said the lead was uncovered in efforts to verify the statement of Whittaker Chambers that he got a government "boondoggling" job in 1937 while a Communist Party agent.

An admitted former Red, Chambers has testified he landed on the federal payroll with the help of two men recently accused of being part of the wartime Soviet spy network.

Committee Withholds Name
"A preliminary investigation," Nixon said, reports "that established that a man with exactly the same name as one of the superiors of Chambers has, in fact, a long record of Communist activity and worked in the government under Nathan Gregory Silvermaster."

The committee is not releasing the name at this time, or until it establishes beyond question that two men with the same name were not involved.

"If the inquiry does show that a Chambers superior and the individual whose record we have is one and the same, then an additional important link will have been established between the Chambers underground and the Bentley spy rings."

Appeals Court Frees Hjalmar Schacht Of Conviction As Nazi

STUTTGART, GERMANY—(P)—A German appeals court Wednesday acquitted Hjalmar Schacht, former German financial wizard, of charges that he was a major Nazi officer. He was ordered freed.

He had been serving an eight-year prison term after conviction on the charge by a Stuttgart denazification court last year.

Schacht also went scot free from the courtroom at Nuernberg two years ago, when Hermann Goerring, Joachim von Ribbentrop and other close associates of Adolf Hitler were condemned to die for war crimes.

The court held that Schacht's participation in the Nazi opposition movement from 1936 onward more than outweighed his earlier support of Hitler.

Czechoslovakia Mounts Death Watch For Benes

PRAGUE, CZECHOSLOVAKIA—(P)—Czechoslovakia today mounted a death watch Wednesday for one of her heroes—former President Edward Benes.

The 65-year-old co-founder of the Czechoslovak republic lapsed into unconsciousness Tuesday and his doctors said they do not believe he will come out of it.

Truck Stoppage Halts Cargoes In New York

NEW YORK—(P)—A truck stoppage began in New York Wednesday and a union spokesman claimed it was halting the movement of all general cargo in and out of the city.

Union officials said some 9,400 members of Local 807 of the AFL International Brotherhood of Teamsters, which rejected a new contract Tuesday night, had stopped work. It claims 13,000 members.

Meanwhile the city's Division of Labor Relations said city, state and federal mediators would begin mediation efforts "early Wednesday afternoon" to end the stoppage.

Big Foot 'Baby' Needs New Shoes

FORT WORTH—(P)—One 24-year-old registrant was ready to jump feet-first into the new draft.

As he signed his registration card in the U.S. Court House, he calmly hoisted a heavy-duty foot into view.

"That takes a size 18 shoe," he stated. "This is the only pair of shoes I have and they don't suit other pair to be bought in Fort Worth."

"If Uncle Sam can fit me," he declared, "then I'm ready."

Manila—(AP)—The Times reported 5,620-foot Camiguin Volcano on the island of the same name erupted Wednesday and grave fear was felt for the safety of the islanders.

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The State Department said Wednesday it is studying the Chinese refusal to allow American aircraft to fly to Tihwa to service U. S. consular offices there.

WASHINGTON—(AP)—CIO President Philip Murray said Wednesday the CIO Political Action Committee has decided unanimously to support President Truman in the November elections.

HAVANA, CUBA—(AP)—Juan Arevalo, anti-Communist labor leader, was shot to death Wednesday in suburban Lawton by unidentified men who escaped. Police said Arevalo was shot as he left his home.

Stevenson Clings To 348-Vote Lead In Senate Contest

DALLAS—(P)—Coke Stevenson's lead was 348, a loss of one vote, in Wednesday's noon report from the Texas Election Bureau on the U. S. Senatorial primary.

The new count was Stevenson 494,296, Rep. Lyndon Johnson 493,948.

The last previous count, made Tuesday night, gave Stevenson a lead of 494,555 to 494,206—or 349 votes.

The bureau said it did not expect to make another count until Wednesday night.

Wednesday's report still did not include an estimated 40 votes still not counted from Borden County, only county still incomplete.

Both candidates lost votes from Tuesday night to Wednesday on the basis of the Election Bureau report.

This was principally because of revisions in the tallies from Dallas County.

Secretary J. A. Wynne of the Dallas County Democratic Executive Committee said the new Dallas County count subtracts 43 votes from Stevenson's total and 103 from Johnson's. The new count in Dallas County was Stevenson 26,150, Johnson 17,576.

Johnson Clies Errors
The Election Bureau said other changes were: 10 more votes from Mason County; Stevenson 43 more for Johnson from Hardin, (where totals of both candidates also were reduced, but Johnson was the net gainer), four more for Johnson in Grimes County, four for Johnson in Baylor County, four for Johnson in Donley County and five for Johnson in Jeff Davis County.

Tuesday, Johnson cited in a formal statement "alleged errors and recaptulations" which he described as steadily offsetting his gains.

He said that "Ever since the big city returns were in late Saturday night, my vote has increased steadily—except for alleged 'error' and recaptulations," adding:

"It is not meant to question the Texas Election Bureau, but the fact remains that my gains have been in votes counted, and my gains have been steadily offset by 'corrections.'"

The bureau, although it cannot actually elect an officeholder on the basis of its unofficial returns, has been consistently accurate during the 32 years of its existence. It has never missed naming the eventual winner.

China-Red Treaty Bars U. S. Planes

NANKING—(P)—All foreign airplanes except Russian have been barred by China from the air over its Western border provinces.

The step was taken secretly and became known here when U. S. Minister Lewis Clark's plane was grounded and turned back at Lanchow.

In 1939, China, then yearning for Russian support, gave the Soviet exclusive foreign rights to fly over the Western provinces for 10 years.

The pact is still carried in the Chinese Foreign Office secret files.

The order barring all foreign planes, except Russian, from the border provinces was confirmed by the Foreign Office. However, a spokesman denied having any knowledge of the reasons for the action, apparently taken by the Defense Ministry under instructions from China's highest authority, President Chiang Kai-Shek.

Clark and his pilots, Lt. Col. A. T. House, Jr., of Long Beach, Calif., and Maj. Kenzie Berry of Austin, Texas, spent two days at Lanchow, attempting to unsmash the orders which halted their previously cleared flight. They were finally forced to return to Nanking.

Embassy sources confirmed that the Chinese government here refused permission for subsequent flights of the embassy's plane to Tihwa to inspect and supply American consular offices there. It was indicated that any further action on the matter would come from Washington.

Reports in Tihwa during previous visits by American aircraft there said each flight was followed by bitter Russian protests that the flights were for the purpose of "spying and photographing" areas well within the Russian sphere.

148 Register At Draft Headquarters Tuesday

Midland County Draft Board headquarters in the courthouse announced Wednesday that 148 men registered Tuesday, opening day for registration of men born in 1923. Registration of this age group continues through Wednesday.

Thursday and Friday, men born in 1924 are scheduled to register, and those born in 1925 will register Saturday and Monday. The 1926 class will register September 8 and 9.

Nation's Hot Spots Get Cooler Weather
CHICAGO—(P)—Most of the hot spots in the nation's recent heat wave got thoroughly cooled off early Wednesday.

The mercury dipped to near freezing in Central Pennsylvania. Cool air extended over the North and Middle Atlantic states, the Ohio River Valley and the upper Great Lakes region.

Long Has Lead In Louisiana Voting

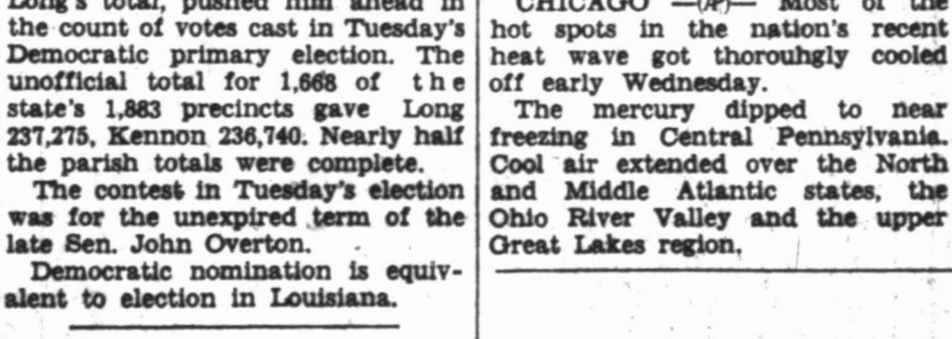
NEW ORLEANS, LA.—(P)—Russell Long, 29-year old son of the late Huey P. Long, Wednesday spurred ahead of Judge Robert F. Kennon by 336 votes in the race for the United States Senate.

Rural returns, steadily increasing Long's lead, pushed him ahead in the count of votes cast in Tuesday's Democratic primary election. The unofficial total of 1,668 of the state's 1,883 precincts gave Long 237,275, Kennon 236,740. Nearly half the parish totals were complete.

The contest in Tuesday's election was for the unexpired term of the late Sen. John Overton.

Democratic nomination is equivalent to election in Louisiana.

Wallace's Alabama Reception Peaceful

DECATUR, ALA.—(P)—Henry A. Wallace's first appearance in Alabama Wednesday was peaceful and he drew scattered cheers when he said, "I do not come South to preach disunity."

The Progressive Party candidate, who was met with a barrage of tomatoes, eggs and boos in North Carolina, spoke to an orderly crowd of 600 from the front of the Morgan County Courthouse.

"I do not come South to preach disunity," he declared, "but to advocate that we all pull together. There is too much hatred in the world and I say it is possible to develop Christian cooperation."

Wallace spoke briefly on international relations. I say the cold war must end if we are going to reduce the cost of living. The cold war can end and we can stop sending hundreds of millions to Greece, Turkey and China to back Fascist regimes."

"Then," Wallace added, "we could spend billions for more TVAs."

Presence Not Desired
The Morgan County Courthouse, between 1931 and 1936, was the scene of the Scottsboro rape trials.

Bringing his campaign into the Deep South, Wallace faced an icy reception from municipal officials. One Alabama mayor even wrote him, "Your presence is not desired here."

Other city officials warned him they would strictly enforce segregation laws. Mississippi and Arkansas refused to permit the former vice president to speak from the steps of their state capitols.

Alabama, Mississippi, Louisiana and Arkansas all promised state highway patrol escorts, although Gov. James E. Polson of Alabama said he didn't "believe anyone in Alabama will physically harm Mr. Wallace." Wallace was scheduled to speak from the courthouse steps in Birmingham at 4:30 p. m.

Robert Mitchum Is Arrested On Narcotics Charge

HOLLYWOOD — (P) — Movie actor Robert Mitchum was arrested with three other persons in a narcotics raid on a Hollywood home early Wednesday.

Mitchum, real estate agent Robin Ford, actress Lila Leeds, 20, and dancer Vickie Evans, 25, all were booked on suspicion of violating state and federal narcotic laws.

The screen leading man and Ford, also 31, were cast in the unglamorous role of marijuana smokers by arresting officers.

Detective Sgts. A. M. Barr and J. B. McKinnon of the Los Angeles Narcotics Detail said both men were smoking reefer (marijuana-containing cigarettes) when the officers broke into the home.

Mitchum surrendered a package containing 13 more of the cigarettes, Barr said, and Miss Leeds, a blonde film hopeful, gave up several.

The home was rented by the young woman, the officers said. At another apartment which Miss Leeds maintains, Barr said he found another reefer.

Maid Follows Investigation
The raid, Barr said, culminated an investigation of more than six months. It was conducted with the aid of informants.

Andrej Zhdanov, Reds' No. 2 Man, Dies In Moscow

MOSCOW—(P)—The death of Andrej A. Zhdanov, removing one of the most powerful forces in international Communism, placed Moscow in mourning Wednesday.

Tens of thousands of Russians lined up to view the body of the Cominform leader lying in state in the Hall of Columns, with indications that close to 1,000,000 will see the bier before the body is interred in the Kremlin Wall Thursday night.

Zhdanov, known to Russians as "the closest associate of the great Stalin," died Tuesday at 62—after a serious illness, the Communist Party's Bulletin said, although there had been no inkling of this in the Soviet press. Five surgeons announced he had heart trouble and hardening of the arteries.

Zhdanov was regarded as a leading candidate eventually to succeed Stalin, but Moscow correspondents apparently were unable to speculate Wednesday on what the death meant in this connection.

Stalin's health is a forbidden topic in Russia. He is 68.

Prime Minister Stalin probably will be one of the pallbearers when Zhdanov's coffin is carried from the Hall of Columns to Red Square for funeral services.

Red flags edged in black fluttered above the streets for the first time on such an occasion since former President Mikhail L. Kalinin died in June, 1946.

In addition to being one of the 14 members of the vital policy-making Politburo, Zhdanov was a driving force behind the activities of the Cominform (Communist International Information Bureau). He was present when that nine-nation organization was founded in Poland last year and participated in a Cominform meeting only two months ago at which Premier Marshal Tito of Yugoslavia was denounced.

Weathermen Watch New Tropical Storm

MIAMI, FLA.—(P)—A new tropical storm in the Caribbean was being watched as an Atlantic hurricane swept harmlessly to sea off Nova Scotia Wednesday. A disturbance in the Gulf of Mexico was removed as a possible threat.

The Caribbean storm was discovered Tuesday some 1,950 miles from Miami as September—the "hurricane month"—was arriving.

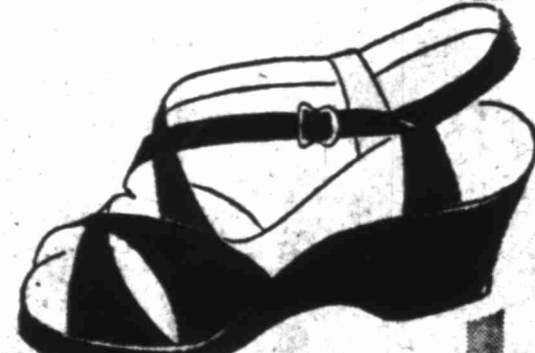

Assorted pundits have been telling us for years that we are living in an age of doubt and confusion. They were probably right all along. But certainly the last week or so has compounded standard doubt and everyday confusion to a point where people can be forgiven for double-checking on their own names.

Take the budget, for instance. President Truman came up with a revised estimate and said that, thanks to the taxcutting Republican Congress, we'd wind up the fiscal year with a deficit of \$1,500,000,000.

Then of course there are Whittaker Chambers and Alger Hiss. Chambers told the Thomas Committee that Hiss was a busy borer from within in the prewar "Communist underground," and that he had visited Hiss and pleaded with him to break away from the Communist Party.

Likewise we have the case of Mrs. Kasenkina, the Soviet school teacher. This is the prize bloom on our bouquet of confusion. There were, at last count, three different "official" Soviet versions of the unfortunate woman's leap.

There may be some comfort, though little enlightenment, in the thought that the President and the Congress may be making honest mistakes in billion-dollar book-keeping. And there may be enlightenment, though little comfort, in the knowledge that Soviet policy often cuts the facts to fit the propaganda pattern.

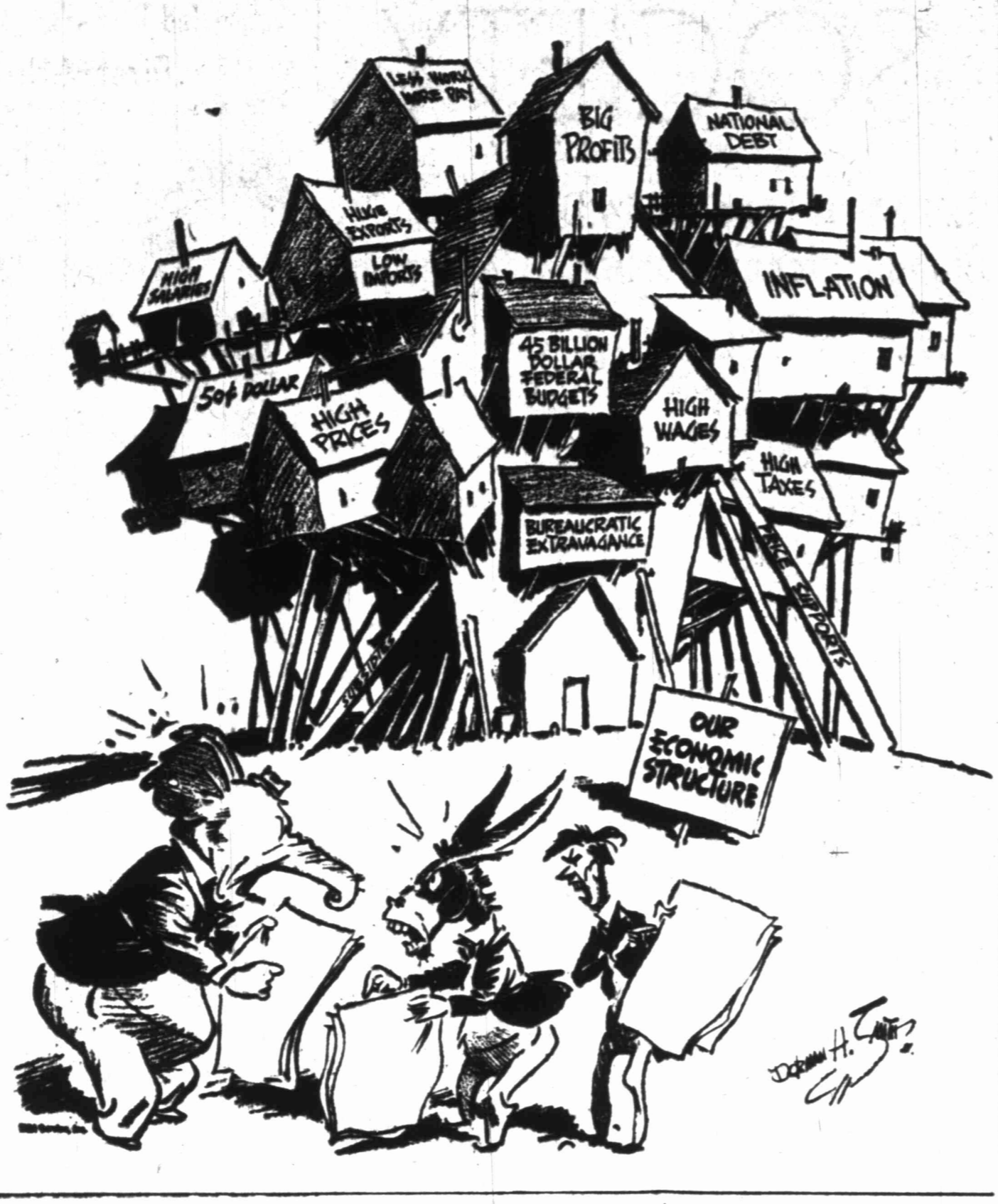

Is Chambers Or Hiss Lying? Easy To Ask, Hard To Answer

WASHINGTON—Issuance of the House Un-American Activities Committee's first interim report on the Washington spy case will end temporarily the Whittaker Chambers-Alger Hiss affair.

The five Republicans on Chairman J. Farnell Thomas' committee lean heavily towards wanting Hiss alone tried for perjury. They are afraid, however, that the Democratic Department of Justice may also proceed against Chambers, their prize witness.

Designated party members were assigned to this propaganda work. They were formed into what became known as "white-collar" groups. Their members were known only to the top, trusted functionaries of the Communist Party.

Two years ago, when American public opinion began to shift sharply against the Communists, a meeting of party officials for the Maryland and Washington, D. C. districts was held in Baltimore. A new line was laid down, and white-collar Communists were further restricted.

Many government officials, who worked with this group in agriculture at that time, say they do not believe they were Communists. All were smart young lawyers, caught up in the enthusiasm of the New Deal reform wave which was trying to help the underprivileged in depression.

Hiss has sworn that he never was a Communist. Pressman, Abt, Collins and Kramer have testified before the Un-American Activities Committee. Exercising their constitutional rights, they have declined to answer whether they are or ever were Communists, or whether they ever even knew Hiss.

Plane Crash Near Seymour Kills Two

WICHITA FALLS—(AP)—Two people were killed late Tuesday when their light plane crashed on a burned six miles northwest of Seymour, Texas.

The dead were identified as Ollis A. Shumate, 29, Seymour, and Mrs. J. D. Webster, Lindsay, Okla. Witnesses said the low-flying plane suddenly dived into a stubble field about 5:30 p. m. Both bodies were burned beyond recognition.

If Heart Beats Irregularly, It Is Wise To Be Examined

By EDWIN F. JORDAN, M. D. Written for NEA Service

One of the most common causes of an irregular heart beat is a condition called extra systole. This condition is quite frequent, and many people have it at one time or another during life.

Another fairly common type of heart irregularity is paroxysmal tachycardia, in which the heart beats too fast at irregular intervals. Many people have this for years without apparent harm.

There are other types of irregular heart actions, some of which are serious. The nature of the heart irregularity can be discovered by physical examination, and by the use of an instrument called an electrocardiograph, which measures the electrical impulses through the heart.

Exact diagnosis allows the physician to select the proper treatment. Drugs are used in some cases. These must be used with care, however, as they can produce harmful results if the dose is not adjusted to

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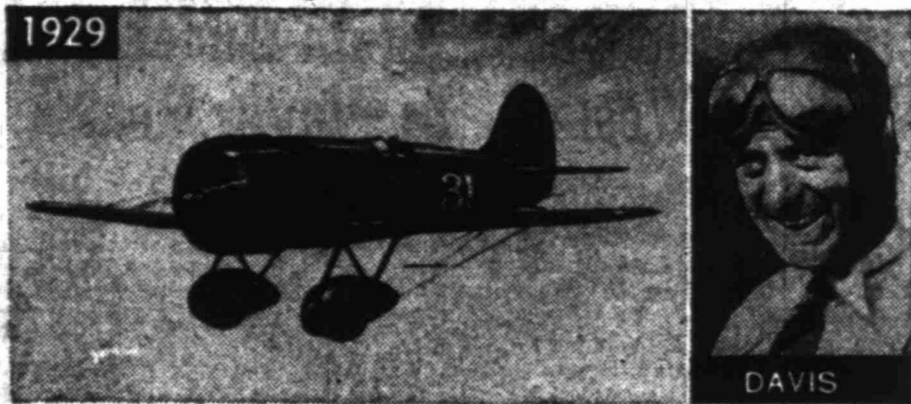

America's Most Famous Air Race Has Long History Of Thrills



The three-day National Air Races at Cleveland, Ohio, over the Labor Day weekend, will be climaxed by the famous Thompson Trophy whirl on September 8. Favored to win the 300-mile, \$40,000 grind is Cook Cleland, who won last year in his war surplus P-30 Corsair. If he comes through, he'll be the second pilot to capture the event more than once—Roscoe Turner won in 1934, 1938 and 1939. The only foreigner to win was Michel Detroyat, a Frenchman, in 1936. His plane pioneered streamlining and retractable landing gears. Jimmy Doolittle, who led the first air raid on Tokyo in World War II, zoomed in ahead of the field back in 1932. The first winner was Doug Davis, in 1929. Davis' speed, then considered phenomenal, was 194 miles per hour; last year, Cleland hit 306 around the pylon-marked course.

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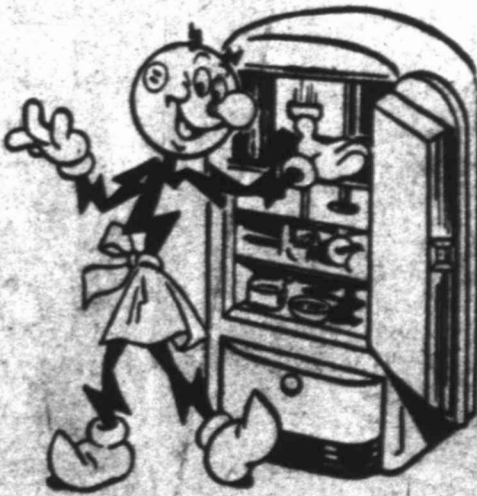

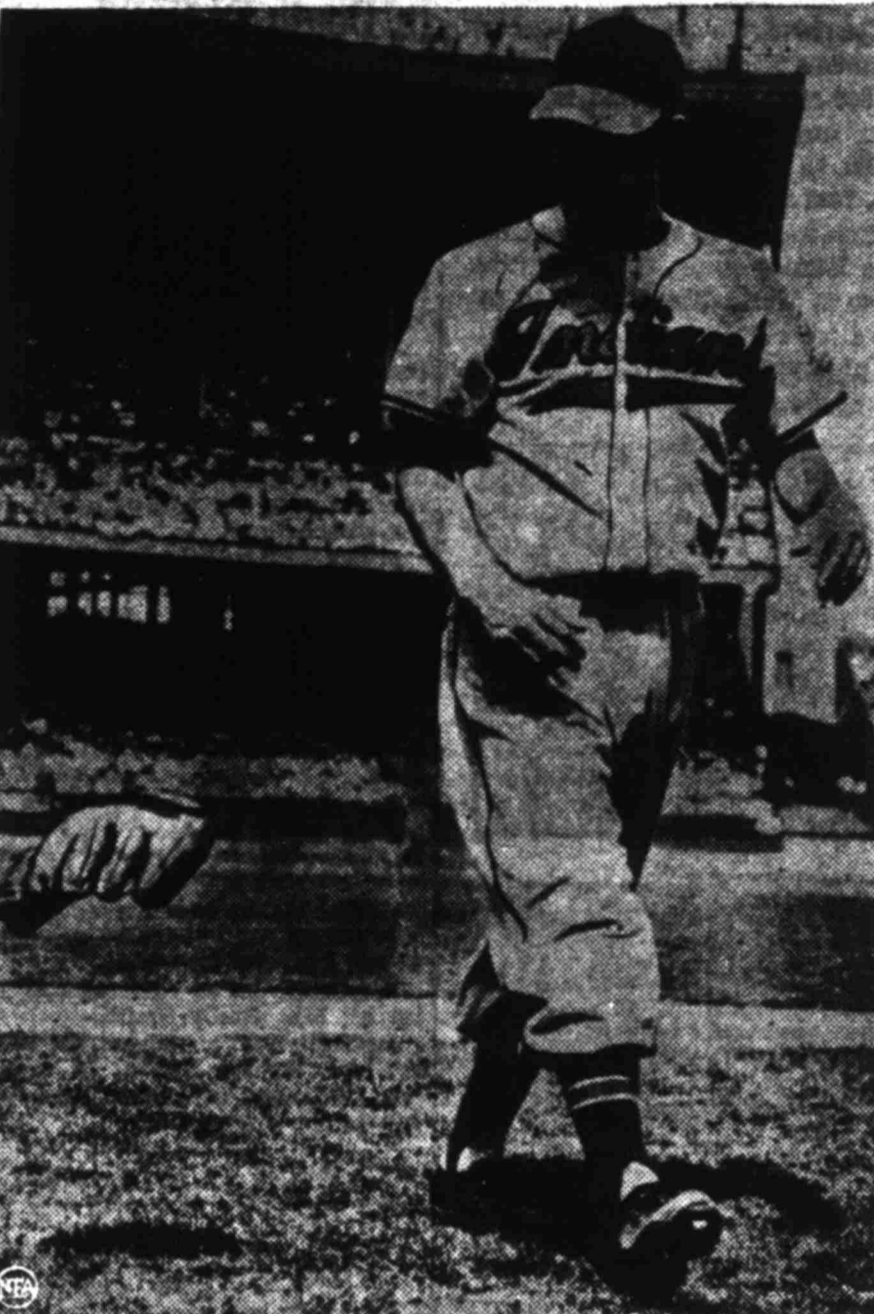

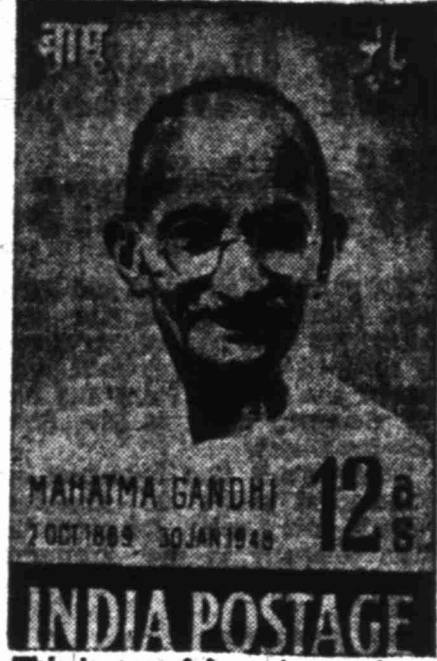

If he had correctly read South for the king and jack of diamonds, and recalled South's heart bid, East would have known that he should lead back the ace of clubs. That would have brought a high club from West, clubs would have been continued, and, before South got in the lead, East and West would have cashed four clubs and the ace of diamonds, setting the contract one trick.
