# The Soviet Pattern

By the lopsided score of 7 to 0, Russia's Andrei Vishinsky and a team of Soviet stooges shut out the western world from most of the Danube River at the Belgrade conference. Thus the great and important river has become a private Communist stream for about two-thirds of its navigable course.

The conference was a depressing but interesting example of Soviet technique when the Russians have a large and obedient majority on their side.

All of the 10 delegations included experts on law, shipping, engineering and other technical subjects. But, as U. S. Ambassador Cannon pointed out, all discussions were steered down a political channel. Vishinsky brought the Russian draft of the convention, or agreement, to the conference. The western delegations were invited to take it or leave it. They left it, of course. And after some 20 days of fruitless talk, the Communist delegations signed the convention with scarcely a word, much less a basic idea, changed from the original draft which Vishinsky presented.

That, of course, is the Soviet pattern of government and diplomacy. At home they permit no deviation by the faithful, let alone any word of opposition. In their international discussions, such as the UN and foreign ministers' meetings, compromise is almost unheard of. When they are outnumbered they are inclined to veto or walk out. When they are in power, as they were in Belgrade, they steam-roller their program through with scarcely a pretense of the diplomatic amenities.

Thus the Danubian Conference has re-emphasized the fundamental and seemingly hopeless difficulty of settling any world problem in which Russia is involved. The closing of the Danube presents one of the major problems in the economic field. 

# Reported Flying Toward Moscow

Crewless B-29

FRANKFURT, GERMANY-(P)-The possibility that a crewless American B-29 Superfortress had taken off on a runaway flight in the general direction of Moscow held the attention of Air Force officials Saturday.



BUENOS AIRES (P)—Argentine meat shipments to Britain have declined some 8,000 tons a month because of cattlemen's reluctance to sell beef at present prices. Food ministry officials here say they believe the slowdown will be only temporary. But England nor-

mally buys about 33,000 tons of Argentine meat a month. Twenty months ago the Argentine government, which has a monopoly on meat sales abroad, fixed prices which packing houses should pay for cattle. Stockmen were willing to sell cattle at the time the price was fixed. But now, they say, their costs are going up. Ranchers have asked the government several times to raise the floor

Hold Cattle Meantime, cattlemen are not selling any more than they must to meet running expenses. The current sales are not enough to fill Argentina's domestic needs and still provide enough meat for normal ex-

price of cattle. The matter is now

under study.

ports. Government trade circles contend that the value of Argentine meat has doubled since 1939. When Britain began her wartime buying in that year, the price was 48 centavos per kılogram, or 6.6 U.S. cents per pound. Now Argentina wants Britain, which buys more than 60 per cent of her export meat, to pay one peso per kilo.



It has been estimated that proximity to a good school adds as much as \$1,000 to the value of a home. Inadequate schools adversely affect the resale value of a house because families with children will not be interested, thereby greatly narrowing the market. 





# The oil industry is producing more oil for you ... but it's a big job!



A SEISMOGRAPH CREW creates miniature earthquakes with dynamite charges and ments. The records are then studied to see if they reveal likely oil formations. The seismograph crows operate on the plains and prairies of Texas, on the ranges of New Mexico, in Mississippi's farm lands, in the bayou country of Louisiana, and in the open Gulf of Mexicowherever there is a chance that possible ellbearing formations may be found.

You have asked the oil industry to produce nearly twice as much oil in 1948 as we produced in 1941; that's what today's increased use of oil products amounts to.

To produce oil, it is necessary first to find it. And finding oil is not easy; it's not like looking for buried treasure; it's not a matter of old maps and digging with shovels in romantic spots. The search for oil is a hugely expensive undertaking. It is a scientific project on the grand scale. It involves a careful study of geology and such feats as measuring the difference in the pull of gravity at different places, and tracing the shock of the miniature earthquake created by setting off a small dynamite charge.

But with every possible scientific aid, the scientists still can't say, "Drill bere for oil." Instead, they say, "Drill here and you may find oil." And these days, about 90% of the exploratory wells find no oil-they are what the oil men call "dry holes"

Today, the industry is hunting and finding oil sometimes two miles and more deep in the earth.

Humble, for example, this year completed a producing well in Chambers County, Texas, that is 12,026 feet deep, and many exploratory wells are drilled even deeper. All this makes the search sometimes slow, always expensive; and it adds thousands of dollars to the cost of drilling a well.

But the industry is producing more oil than ever before in its history, and is finding enough additional oil to maintain its reserves. You can help this effort by making your personal demands for petroleum reasonable, by cooperating with programs designed to conserve oil products for the uses to which they are best adapted, by the exercise of patience as the oil industry acts to meet the need.



# Haiti Seeks \$3,000,000 Loan From Uncle Sam

By DAVID FERNSLER WASHINGTON —(AP)— The Re-public of Haiti is asking the United States for a \$3,000,000 "survival" loan to revive her once-prosperous agriculture.

The Institute of Inter-American Affairs, a State Department Agency, says its a question of survival in Haiti. The Institute believes the loan sound.

Four hours by air from Miami. this country of 3,000,00, free since 1804, is beset by poverty, disease, despair, ignorance and suffering unmatched in other parts of the Caribbean. The nation has about 10.700 square miles of territory. Mountains and hillsides, long since stripped of timber that would bring dollars, make about 8,000 square miles unsuitable for farming.

Vexed through a quarter of a

century by \$24,000,000 in six per cent loans floated in this country, the little nation lifted itself out of the dilemma with shoestring bonds, got on its own financial feet and now offers a \$3,000,000 food production plan which the Institute says will pay out in 20 years. Haitians have endured long years of revolution, dictatorship and occupation. U. S. Marines landed in 1919 to protect American investments. They stayed until 1934. We regulated economic life to safeguard our bondholders. We controlled the customs. Our own rates of interest dropped, but Haiti continued to pay us six per cent.

The turn came in 1946. A people's government staggered out of the revolution which chased President Elie Lescot to Canada. The Communist Party there had been attacking the Good Neighbor policy as "the most cruel policy" in the world. But for the sake of naional unity the Communist party of Haiti disbanded.

Deumarsias Estime, a business man who had long been fighting absentee ownership-investments in Haiti by U. S. financiers—became president. He found his hands tied. On a 1922 loan floated by U. S. banks, the nation had already repaid \$17,000,000 as well as \$21.-000,000 in that six per cent interest. Amortization and interest took first cut out of the budget despite all sorts of claims of graft against us. The country could incur no new funded indebtedness without our permission. Argentina and the Dominican Republic were both extremely sympathetic, but we had tied a financial knot and we held

it tight. With his back against the wall, Estime asked the U.S. for a loan of \$20,000,000 and got nothing. He wanted to pay off the remaining \$7,000,000 of that six per cent debt. He wanted to put agriculture on its feet. He wanted to encourage industrialization, sanitation and education.

Raised Money Feeling against the U.S. flamed hot and high over that refusal. So hot and so high that the Haitians raised the money themselves. Taxi drivers and waiters bought 20-cent bonds. The rich threw in plenty. A prize team of Boy Scouts cancelled a trip abroad in order to buy

"Freedom bonds." "Our national income is less than \$10,000,000," Estime told me early in 1947, shortly after he had taken office. "From that is first taken \$2,000,000 for principal and interest on the old United States debt. There is too little left for sanitation, for national education in our land, where illiteracy is estimated at 55 per cent—and nothing for developing this nation which has so

long been exploited by everyone." In thumbing down Estime's proposal for a \$20,000,000 loan the U. S. left the door open. There was a soothing suggestion that something specific, well surveyed and authenticated, costing less money, might

be favored. Now Estime is standing in that door ajar. He is asking for \$3,000,-000 instead of \$20,000,000. The Institute of Inter-American Affairs says that his plan to reclaim 60,000 acres of land that was rich and productive in French colonial days is sound, that it will pay off easily in

20 years. The land which made money for the French now is covered with mesquite and cactus. It is choked with salt. But tests by the Institute indicate that nearly 70 bushels of rice a year can be produced against those handicaps. The Institute says that is good.

The 60,000 acres are in the valley of the Artibonite river. The Artibonite has been flooding the land for centuries. Flood control will cost more than \$500,000. On the other hand, there must be irrigation. The French built aqueducts and watering works in the old colonial days, but most of those things have crumbled. There must be roads from farm to market. Good. seed is needed. Haitians still thresh rice by slapping it over a log. Modern agriculture must be brought

All this is contemplated in the \$3,000,000 venture which the Institute approves. Granted the loan, Haitians may have a little more to eat. There will still be disease, suffering and illiteracy. Against these Estime can move only as he can move. Government income is increasing. It may be \$5,000,000 more this year. The bankers no longer get their \$2,000,000 cut. A new sugar mill to double output is in prospect. The only mill of importance is on the outskirts of Port-au-Prince, the capital. There are proscrafts are making their way in smart New York. Practical Training The course is said to be a practical and interesting study of current and future retail credit problems. It deals with successful methods used by many Texas business firms in handling charge accounts. happens to their kids. And there are boys from homes ling enough, just don't provide properly for their children.

Then there are boys from homes that have shiftless parents-they'd like for their kids to have a good home and an opportunity in life pass into the state's business life. but they're too lazy to try to pro-

Big Texas is meeting the problem in her own way. Not all kids. of course, are reached by civiclinquency.

Prominent in these enterprises are the Boys Ranches, Granddad-Amarillo. Rich Project

The Copperas Cove project is the oldest of all. It was started 12 years ago by Mr. and Mrs. R. E. Dawson. Three years ago it passed to the Variety Clubs of Texas, an organization maintained by the people in show business. It is a rich project indeed. Each year the showmen get together at Dallas for a turtle derby. Some of the nation's glamorous names in the theater and of the screen participate. The events have valued as much as \$100,000. Not only has the ranch been broadened and enriched, but a foundation has been established that will mean perpetuation of the project.

Boys Clubs San Antonio has three Boys Clubs, each affiliated with Boys Clubs of America. Current total enrollment at the three clubs is 2,750, there being 1,000 Latin Americans, 900 Anglo-Americans and 850 negroes. The first such club was founded in 1932 by Porter Loring, O. P. Schnabel and Evans Fitch, business men. Since that time the organization has grown to a \$35,000 per year operation with 25 staff employes. In command are 75 outstanding business men serving as a board of directors. The current president is M. C. Gonzales, an attorney, recently reelected to a fourth term. Funds are raised by contributions through the Community Chest.

Hillsboro's Junior Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring a recreation program with co-operation of the city, service clubs, The Booster Club and the Senior Chamber of Commerce. The Lake Worth Sports Club serves approximately 70 boys ranging in age from eight to 18. Le-land Mayfield, a resident at Lake Worth, started the club. There are many other such pro-

ects in Texas, including the boys home founded by the Optimist Clubs at Houston in the former Ross Sterling residence, Boys Harbor at LaPorte and the many play programs and Boy Scout projects that give the boys a chance to build themselves physically and morally and become upstanding citizens of their communities.



# Tips Teach You Care Of Girdles

By ALICIA HART NEA Staff Writer

Top requirement for Summer care of girdles when hot weathlife expectancy are frequent sudsings and prompt repairs.

Laundering a girdle after every wearing is not too often if a garment is dampened by perspiration. To preserve the lines of the garment and the stretch of the elastic, wash your girdle in mild, luke-warm suds. Soiled spots yield to gentle brushing with a softbristled brush or soapy turkish towel. Three rinsings in clear lukewarm water are recommended for flushing all traces of soap out of the fabric. Wrap girdle in a turkish towel and knead gently to

blot up as much water as possible. To dry, ease garment back into its original shape smooth out shoulder straps and garters, stuff bust cups with tissue paper. Lay flat on a towel or hang evenly over a rod for drying. Never hang up by the garters. Don't try to speed up drying by exposing girdle to direct heat or sunlight, because this will damage the elastic. Fabric sections may be pressed with

a warm iron but elastic sections should not be ironed. Patch holes in elastic with new elastic if possible, sewing with ziz-zag stitches. Don't lap under the edges of the patch which may create an uncomfortable bump. New elastic or strong tape may be used to replace worn sections. If tape is used, cut it the same length as the elastic section fully stretched.

# You Can Live Cheaper Than In 1939

By DOUGLAS LARSEN WASHINGTON—(NEA)—If you could keep body and soul together just on oranges, apples, electricity and commercial gas, you could really lick today's record-high cost

Electricity and commercial gas are the only consumer items which have gone down in price since 1939, according to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics. The drop has been approximately one per cent. And oranges and apples are the only foods which the Bureau

# LANCASTER, PA.—(P)—Revenge on Oranges, Electricity, Apples, Gas is sweet, said the former Air Force

war-apples about one half cent a pound and oranges about seven cents a dozen. Those figures are national averages and of course vary widely among communities. But they do

show that the word "down" still exists to describe some prices. None of the 50 key foods which the Bureau checks regularly is pelow 1939 prices. And only oranges and apples have come down since 1946 when most price controls were lifted. The total average increase of food prices has been 129 per cent since then

Have Risen The Least Since 1939 the important foods which have risen the least, not including oranges and apples, are milk (up 79 per cent) and spinach and canned peas (up only 25 per cent). Those items are also on the small list of foods which have dropped in price since last March. That list includes wheat flour, salt pork, fresh green beans, dried prunes, sugar, navy beans, onions, canned tomatoes and frozen fish.

The Bureau reports that prices went down slightly since last March on a very few items such as men's shirts and pajamas, some radios and refrigerators and on some other electrical appliances.

It must be remembered, the experts point out, that a dollar and cents decrease in a price is actually a much greater decrease in comparison with generally higher wages throughout the country. Many items which don't show an actual money decrease, really have decreased in price in terms of increased purchasing power. So the price situation

Thanks to new glass fiber weatherstripping, for example, Mrs. A. can plug up cracks around windows, doors and baseboards implemented by only a kitchen knife. In this weather - stripping, glass fibers are pressed together into a soft, pliable half-inch wide rope. All Mrs. A. needs to do in order to seal up a crack is to push the rope in place with the back of a knife. The glass strip is impervious to moisture, cannot rot and offers no food to pests. Patching up cracks in the cement floors of a basement, porch or garage with a minimum of muss and effort is the job assigned to another newcomer. 


