Five Candidates Vie For 3 Council Seats

BEEF IS MUCH in the news these days, and that subject is vitally important to just about everyone living in the Friona area.

Personally, we hated to see the president involve himself in a specific sector of the economy such as this. Why should the president single out beef as a "villain" in our inflation-riddled economy?

President Nixon could have just as easily singled out building materials, automobiles, clothing, fuel—you name it, and it probably could have been tabbed as being too "high."

Fact is that prices on almost everything have risen steadily during the past few years. However, if most people will check their form 1040 when they mail it in (gad, what a subject), they will probably find that they made more money during the past year than they did when hamburger meat was 33 cents per pound.

PRESIDENT NIXON'S prize ceiling on beef is the latest example of the government's apparent jealousy of an industry over which big government has had little control—an industry which has done quite well, thank you, without any government assistance.

The cattle market has, because of not having been under the government's thumb, always managed to survive on the old supply and demand theory. Because of the differences in these quantities—supply and demand—the price of beef fluctuates considerably in a year's time.

If government had left the situation alone, I have no doubt but that the prices would have come down, and the situation would have worked itself out. As for the boycotters, if they had been ignored, the price situation would have improved faster than it now will.

Now that the news media has focused national attention on the price of beef, this could have an adverse effect on the production of beef. And, rather than decrease, the prices are likely to stay fairly high.

The administration has dedicated itself to eliminate farm payments, saying the farmer needs to be "self-sufficient." Yet, in an area (beef production), where the farmer-rancher has managed for a change to make some money, without government help, darned if the government hasn't stepped in again.

SATURDAY IS election time in Friona, and it's an excellent opportunity for local citizens to exercise their rights and duties as citizens.

This is government at the grass roots. You don't get any closer to your government than this—unless you're electing officers of a Sunday School class or some such.

Everyone needs to be interested in their city and school governing bodies. Someone has said that everyone should spend a term on one of these bodies at some time in their life. This would give them an eye-opening view of how the system really works—and would no doubt cut down considerably on the complaints about why such and such isn't done.

WE NOTICED in the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal of this past Sunday that the Lubbock County FFA and 4-H Livestock Show was proud of its show and sale.

The sale totalled \$41,885.95, and we'll admit that that is a pretty good figure. Why, if it had've been only \$10,960.94 more, this would have equalled our show total in Parmer County this year.

WE GOT SOME good publicity on the sad state of affairs on State Highway 214 last week in the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal. Danny Ellington came up and did a good investigation of the road, the bridge at Running Water Draw, and wrote a very comprehensive story on the road's inadequacies.

Perhaps this will help focus attention in higher circles on our road needs.

Also this week, the Senate took a step to make it unlawful for the President to impound funds collected for Highway use. Maybe...just maybe....

Five candidates are seeking three seats on the Friona City Council. The annual city election will be held on Saturday, April 4 at the Friona Fire Department.

Two of the candidates are incumbents on the council, and two more are former city councilmen. The other candidate is Martha E. Bates, second woman to be on the city's slate in the past two years.

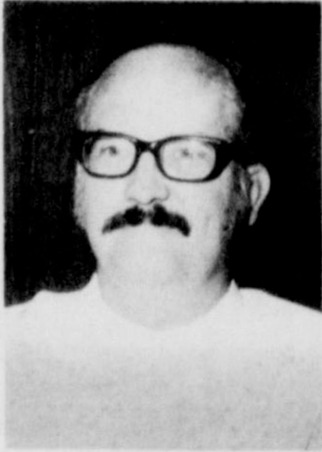
The two incumbents are Dr. Bob Alexander and Troy Young. The two former aldermen are Glenn E. Reeve, Sr. and Kenneth Williams.

Hearing Slated For New Bank's Charter

The proponents of a second bank for Friona, "The Texas Bank," received notice last week of the date their charter application will be heard before the Department of Banking in Austin.

The hearing date has been scheduled for Wednesday, April 25. The local group filed its application for chartering a bank in Friona last June 4.

"We are very optimistic about our chances," stated Leroy Johnson, spokesman for the group interested in the bank. "Of course, you never

know for sure until your case has been heard and you are notified of the results, but we feel that we have a very excellent application," Johnson continued.

He pointed out that the current state of the economy of the local area should certainly be considered favorable.

Johnson indicated that it was possible that a decision on the charter might not be forthcoming on the hearing date. Sometimes it takes as long as a month following the hearing for the ruling to be received, he said.

"Beef Boycott" Not Affecting MBP Here

The affect of the "beef boycott" by Eastern housewives has not been apparent at Friona's Missouri Beef Packers' plant.

The plant had a "regular" day on Monday, killing over 1400 head of cattle.

Tuesday's kill schedule was hampered by a power outage caused by the snowstorm which caused several miles of lines to be out for a time. The plant was shut down from 10 a.m. Tuesday until 6 p.m., but still managed to kill over 400 head.

Plant manager Jim Kofford said he expected Wednesday to

be back to normal, and the trend should continue through the rest of the week.

"I don't think the beef 'boycott' will make much headway in this area. People in this section of the country realize what is involved in the production of beef, and what causes prices to fluctuate," Kofford said.

The Friona manager said that due to adverse weather in the midwest which has hampered marketing operations, he expected the local plant production to continue unabated.

Showbarn Fund Now Stands At \$44,866

The Community Center-Showbarn fund continued to edge slowly upward during the past week.

A report Tuesday from Jerry Hinkle indicated that as of that date, the fund total stood at \$44,866.15.

Helping the total grow during the past week were gifts of \$1,180 from the Farwell Community, a drive spearheaded by Gilbert Kaltwasser, and \$250.00 from the Progressive Study Club of Friona.

Hinkle indicated that he could add up another \$9,000 in solid pledges which the drive should yet receive. This could put the drive to near \$54,000—still some \$21,000 short of the total goal, but enough to assure construction of the facility.

Members of the showbarn building committee indicate that they will be advertising for bids on the facility in the near future.

Moisture Tally Hits 4.47 Inches For '72

The City of Friona has measured 4.47 inches of moisture thus far during the calendar year of 1972.

Moisture for the first three calendar months amounted to 3.60 inches, but an additional .87 inch was registered on April 23.

It's the wettest start for a year in many a moon locally. Farmland in the area is the wettest it has been at this time of the year in many years.

Official records showed that .69 inch was recorded in

January, and another .69 inch in February. March rang the bell at 2.22 inches, and three days in April already had logged .87 inch.

WINTER CONTINUES

April Fool! 6-Inch Snowfall Hits Area

The "Winter of '73" just doesn't seem to want to give away to springtime. Not just yet, anyway.

Almost two weeks into spring, by the calendar, the Friona area was hit by a wet, five-inch snowstorm on Monday, a fast-moving storm that snarled traffic and caused local motels to fill up early in the day.

The snow began in earnest about 2 p.m. Monday, and by 4:30 p.m., a total of 4.5 inches had been measured—in the space of two hours and a half.

Early-leaving and blooming trees were laden with the white stuff. Some tree limbs were lost due to the extra weight caused by the addition of the extra-wet snow.

Once again, however, an absence of high winds prevented any bad drifting, and averted what could have been a major blizzard, what with all of the snow.

As it was, traffic in and out of

Friona after 3 p.m. Monday was stalled to a snail's pace. There was one report of a trip from Hub to Friona taking 46 minutes for the eight-mile trip in mid-afternoon.

Several travellers stopped in local motels. One couple, enroute to San Diego, decided to call it a day's journey when they arrived in Friona about 4:30 Monday.

Apparently the Friona-Bovina area received the bulk of the snow. Hereford, by comparison, received hardly enough to cover the ground.

The snow caused power lines in the surrounding rural area to go down. Farm houses east of Friona were without power for about three hours Monday night, and those in the Rhea area also experienced an outage.

Although lights "flickered" several times, the city never was without power.

Monday's snowstorm was accompanied by lightning and thunder, and tornado funnels were spotted north of Clovis. It was a rare sight to behold.

Bearing out the wetness of the snow, a total of .84 inch of moisture was registered—indicating that if some of the snow had not melted, the depth might have been eight or nine inches.

MBP Closing Holton Plant

Missouri Beef Packers, Inc. announced today they are closing the facility leased by the Company in Holton, Kansas. The plant has a beef slaughtering capacity of 2,500 head per week and employs 100 people.

The plant is being closed due to a short supply of fat cattle in the Holton area.

45 YEARS AGO—APRIL 6, 1928

J.B. Scott, superintendent of the Texas Utilities Company at Plainview, and Fred Oberthier, superintendent of the Hereford plant, were in Bovina Wednesday afternoon and made arrangements with the people of that progressive little city to install a system of electric lights. The system to be installed there will be very similar to the plant and method of operation that is installed here.

35 YEARS AGO—APRIL 8, 1938

F.W. Reeve was re-elected as mayor of Friona in the city election here Tuesday. Reeve received 42 votes, to 34 for J.A. Blackwell, F.L. Spring and Carl C. Maurer were elected as members of the city commission. Votes were 60 for Spring, 45 for Maurer, 25 for T.J. Crawford and 20 for O.F. Lange. Spring and Reeve have each served two terms on the city council.

30 YEARS AGO—APRIL 2, 1943

The War Bond sale drive which was sponsored here last Tuesday by the American Legion and Legion Auxiliary resulted in sale of \$15,000 worth of bonds, it was announced this week.

The big Army bomber plane which made a forced landing in a wheat field about 13 miles southeast of Friona some four weeks ago and which has been guarded while awaiting parts for repair, was pronounced air-worthy again last Saturday, and soared away under its own power.

25 YEARS AGO—APRIL 2, 1948

Maurice Gaede of the Friona 4-H Club showed the grand champion calf in the Parmer County FFA-4-H Club fat stock show at Farwell on Saturday, March 20. Clyde Hays of the Black 4-H Club showed the Grand Champion pig, a Hampshire. Hays' pig also placed first in its class at the South Plains Junior Fat Stock Show in Lubbock.

20 YEARS AGO—APRIL 2, 1953

The Friona track and field team took high point honors this week in the District 19-B track and field meet held on the local track. The win rounded out a year of championships in football, basketball and track for the local athletes.

Mary Tatum of Black exhibited the grand champion steer in the Parmer County Junior Livestock show last weekend. Truman McKillip of Farwell had the grand champion barrow.

10 YEARS AGO—APRIL 4, 1963

A total of 219 persons attended the annual conference of District 8 Parent-Teachers Association in Friona last Thursday. With no opposition and no organized write-in campaign, Tuesday's city election passed almost unnoticed in some corners. Three new councilmen, J.E. (Ed) Hicks, Glen C. Stevick and Joe Talley were elected with only 55 persons casting ballots.

CHARITABLE AUTOMOBILE MILEAGE DEDUCTIBLE?

QUESTION: Glenda Goodheart is an ardent churchgoer. Although she lives next to the church, every Sunday morning she starts out an hour early in her station wagon and picks up elderly members of the church. After the services she takes them home again. Does Glenda get any deduction for her forty mile round trip?

ANSWER: Yes, if Glenda itemizes her deductions on Schedule A of form 1040. In addition to the amount that she drops into the collection plate, she can also deduct, as a charitable contribution, her actual gas and oil expenses or her mileage at the rate of 6¢ per mile.

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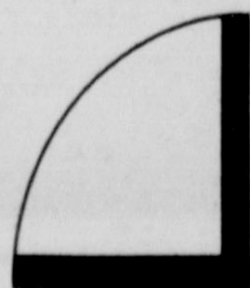

The Friona group joined more than 500 other delegates representing the 77,500 Texas members throughout the state. Leader of the Texas Woodmen was Jurisdictional President

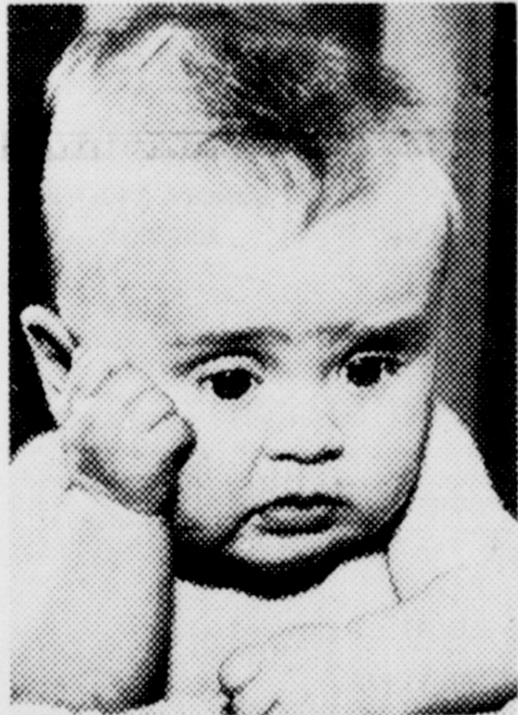
James R. McKinney, Littlefield.

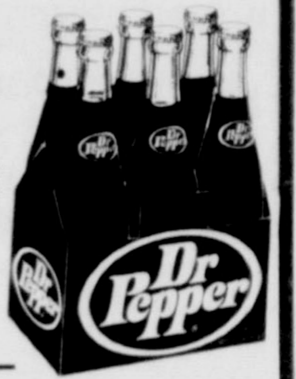

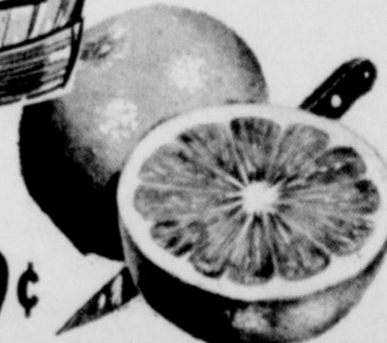

Clayton Opposed Teacher Measure

By Bill Clayton

Educators won what they considered a victory in Austin last week when their bill passed the House that allows teachers a lifetime job until retirement after a three year probation period, under most conditions.

However, I could not support this bill, for I think it totally unnecessary. Good teachers will never have to worry about employment. Their contracts are always readily renewable. This law will only lower the teaching profession, I believe, for it will protect the bad teachers at the expense of the good teachers.

Also, it will take still more power away from local school boards. I will always believe that the best government is the government nearest the people. The greatness of this country is built on the predicate that government should come from the grass roots, and if we erode the principles of local self control of the educational process, we are losing much of

what has made this country great.

In other legislative action last week, two bills which I introduced passed the House. One of them would allow banks that stay open on Saturdays to close for legal holidays on Friday in years when Jan. 1, July 4, or Dec. 24 fall on Saturdays.

Another bill institutes truth in lending, which is similar to the federal truth in lending bill. This simply makes the law applicable to the State of Texas.

Part of my week was spent in Washington, D.C., where the Intergovernmental Relations Committee of the National Legislative Conference was meeting. This committee, of which I am chairman, was briefed at the White House on the President's budget, and on the budget controls he has imposed. Many members have been quite alarmed by the impoundment of funds in certain programs, and this meeting answered some questions which have been raised. I was pleased that a bill to reinstate the death penalty for certain heinous crimes came out of committee this week, and will be ready for floor action soon.

A HERBICIDE MEETING is being conducted in Farwell on April 12, 1973 in the District Courtroom on the second floor of the Courthouse. Starting time will be 8 p.m. CST. This meeting is geared for both the irrigated and the dry-land farmer. It will deal with weed control in crops grown by both types of producers.

Featured speakers on the program will be Dr. Allen Wiese, USDA, Bushland and Dr. Wayne Whitworth, New Mexico Experiment Station. These men will discuss various types of herbicides, their uses, formulations, hazards and precautions. Various techniques and methods of weed control will also be discussed. In addition, the Texas and New Mexico Agriculture Departments will be represented to discuss State Laws and regulations as well as answer any questions that might arise.

If you had weed control problems last year, this could be the meeting for you. Remember, the time and place is April 12, at 8 p.m. CST in the District Courtroom in the Courthouse in Farwell.

REDUCE COTTON DISEASES....The two keys to reduce disease losses in cotton are to purchase high quality acid-deltined seed treated with a fungicide and to plant early. Early planting is important where cotton root rot is a problem. Three new cotton varieties-TAMCOT SP-21, 23 and 37-have been developed by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and are multiple disease resistant and can be planted earlier than standard varieties.

A NEW VACCINE is now available to reduce newborn calf losses resulting from a form of diarrhea caused by a reo-like virus.

Known as reo-viral calf diarrhea vaccine, the new product has been licensed by U.S. Department of Agriculture and is available to cattle producers through local veterinarians.

The vaccine was developed and patented by the University of Nebraska.

The new vaccine is not a cure-all for all types of diarrhea in young calves. However, vaccination could be especially helpful if a farmer has had previous trouble with calf losses from diarrhea during the first week of life.

The key to successful use of the new vaccine is to vaccinate calves as soon as possible after they are born. Vaccination after the first day of life probably won't stop diarrhea.

To vaccinate, the vaccine is mixed with a diluent in a syringe, the syringe needle is removed, and the vaccine is sprayed into the back of the calf's mouth.

The reoviruses (short for respiratory-enteric orphan viruses) which cause diarrhea in calves are common disease agents in both man and animals. They infect the digestive as well as the respiratory system but have not been definitely classified.

Bovina Farmer Is Accident Victim

A Bovina farmer was crushed to death last Tuesday as he attempted to hitch a blade plow to a tractor.

The victim Robert F. Wilson, 54, had been a farmer in the Bovina area for about 10 years. The accident occurred about 9:30 a.m. last Tuesday on the Wilson farm, four miles east and two miles south of Bovina.

Department of Public Safety officer Glenn Fant of Farwell said Wilson was attempting to hitch a blade plow to a tractor when the accident occurred.

Fant said it appeared the tractor slipped into gear and rolled back, crushing the farmer between the plow and the tractor. He said Wilson

apparently was killed instantly. The DPS officer, who arrived at the scene shortly after the accident, said a farmhand working with Wilson witnessed the accident.

Peace Justice Wilbur Charles of Bovina pronounced the farmer dead and the body was removed to Parsons-Ellis Funeral Home in Friona.

Funeral services were held last Thursday.

Born in Anson, Tex., and reared in Ralls, Tex., Wilson is survived by his widow, Ruth, and two grown children, Mrs. Rita Jean Carlisle of Lubbock and Preston Wilson of Leveland.

Singing praises to God was a normal part of worship for the early Christians. Paul told the Ephesians Christians, "Be filled with the Spirit, addressing one another in psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs, singing and making melody to the Lord with all your heart." Ephesians 5:19 Singing praises to God was emphasized in many of the Psalms of the Old Testament. (Notice Psalms 33, 68, 81, 92, 95, 98, 135, 149). Thus, singing our feelings of praise to God has always been pleasing as worship. It is understandable why singing would be a natural part of man's worship to God. It is so personal. Each individual sings differently. Some have beautiful voices, while others may have voices that are not beautiful. But the beauty of one who sings is determined by his own attitude. God is concerned primarily with the heart of a man, not his vocal cords.

One notices a basic difference when he reads about singing in the Old and New Testaments. Singing was often done using a musical instrument in the Old Testament. However, the references to singing in the New Testament mention only singing. There is no reference to playing a musical instrument to worship. An investigation of church history reveals that musical instruments did not play a part in early Christian worship.

Today, if we want to be like Jesus' church, we will try to restore its worship. This means we will worship God with songs by singing.

Farmers Reminded Of ASCS Signup Deadline

Prentice Mills reminded Farmer County farmers this week that those who signed their farm up showing a set-aside acreage equal to 25 per cent of the farm's feed grain base are now required to set aside only an acreage equal to 10 per cent of the farm's base.

"This is the only change in the program," Mills said. "The program payments are unchanged. This is true regardless of whether you chose the

25 per cent or zero for set-aside," Mills continued.

This change simply means that those who signed under the 25 per cent option will have some additional land available to use as they choose, Mills added.

"If it's too wet to plow or plant, why not come by and report your wheat acreages? The deadline for this is May 1," Mills reminded wheat farmers.

Getting Nowhere

Is A Bad Habit

Read Deuteronomy 2:1-7; Mark 9:1-9

"You have been going about this mountain country long enough." (Deuteronomy 2:2, RSV)

Preparation, careful preparation, is essential in any important undertaking. It can be tragic to be unprepared. But God is forever calling His people to move, and He does not want us to settle down in comfortable stagnation. Discipleship means decisive, carefully planned action.

PRAYER--Thou God of great causes, call us to venture into new, thrilling experiences in the Christian life. Keep us from living on a treadmill, getting nowhere. Help us to not to lose sight of promised lands. We pray in the name of Christ. Amen.

"THE LORD'S SUPPER"
All of the worship services of the Lutheran Church are centered around the proclamation of the Word of Jesus Christ or the Sacrament of Holy Communion. Often both are focal points because when Jesus is proclaimed and the Lord's Supper distributed the Holy Spirit uses these to bring people to faith and to strengthen the faithful.

BENEFITS. We believe that in some divine way God gives us Christ's real body and blood; "This is My body...This is My blood...which is given and shed for you" (I Corinthians 11). When we receive Christ's body and blood we receive the forgiveness of sins (that's why Christ died) and we are united with Christ (I Corinthians 10). That means not only forgiveness of sins in Holy Communion but also a strengthening of our faith and also the assurance of life with God both now and forever because the sin barrier has been removed in Christ's death and resurrection.

CLOSE COMMUNION. Lutherans believe communion is very important and since they do not want anyone to misuse God's gift and commit a serious sin they ask only those who confess the Lutheran faith to participate with them. The reason is Paul's statement about the unworthy communicant in I Corinthians 11.

WORTHY. The worthy communicant is one who realizes he is a sinner and needs God's forgiveness, realizes he receives Christ's body and blood, and accepts God's promise of life for now and forever.

PLEASE VISIT US. We remember Christ's death often in Holy Communion, we preach Jesus Christ who conquered death and sin on Easter morning, we celebrate His goodness within His Body, the Church. We believe that Jesus Christ removed the barrier between us and God and how the Holy Spirit gives us faith and the ability to live lives of worship and praise.

She is the wife of Friona High School Principal John R. Cook and the family home is at 609 Arrah Street.

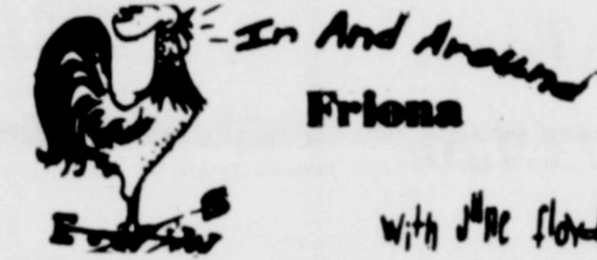

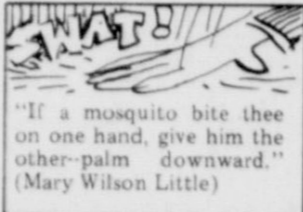
Local Students Attend District Contest
