Friona Teen Center Open House Set

Friona teenagers are busy preparing for the opening of the first Teen Center for the city in several years. On April 9, city aldermen approved paying rent and utilities for the youths to establish their center.

Scheduled for opening late this week, either Friday or Saturday, will be the Friona Teen Center, in the old Spring building across from Reeve Chevrolet.

GRAND OPENING
Kim Parr and Davey Hill, spokesmen for the coordinating group of youths, said open house for the general public will be held Sunday, May 6 at 2 p.m.

They specifically invited all parents and interested parties and individuals to attend the grand opening and see what facilities will be available to Friona area teenagers.

HELP WANTED
The youths are especially asking for financial aid or recreational equipment to help supplement equipment which will be installed later this week.

Kim and Davey said they would like for individuals or civic or social clubs to visit the center and consider offering some type aid.

Two ping pong tables are needed as well as office equipment, including two desks, file cabinets and chairs.

MEMBERSHIPS
All memberships will be available to all youths 14-25

years of age. Prospective members can check with the Youth Center to apply for membership.

Memberships will also be accepted from out-of-town youths as long as they are within the age bracket specified, according to the two temporary coordinators.

Non-members will be required to pay a door fee in order to use the facilities, added Kim and Davey.

GOVERNING BOARD
Governing board for the center will be the Friona City Council, although a panel of youth board directors will be named from among the members of the newly formed organization.

Permanent members of the board of youth directors are expected to be named following the official opening of the center this weekend.

VARIED ACTIVITIES
Myriad activities will be offered youths utilizing the facilities of the new center, including music, games and a place to meet with friends, according to Kim and Davey.

Both boys stressed that it was the thought of the youths that most parents would rather have their children in a youth center actively involved than out on the highway or driving at random up and down Main Street. "I sure know that's the way my parents feel," added one of the boys.

Church Schedules Open House Here

The First Baptist Church of Friona will be host to an open house at its newly-remodeled sanctuary on Sunday, May 6, according to Rev. Charles Broadhurst, pastor.

As a feature of the open house, a special organ recital will be presented from 3:30 to 4:30 Sunday afternoon.

The recital, to be given by Jerry P. Whitten of Pampa, will dedicate the new church organ, which was installed during the recent remodeling program.

Residents of the Friona area are invited to attend the special recital, and to attend the

reception following, in the church's fellowship hall.

Whitten, who is affiliated with Tolzien Music Company, is a well-known organist. He has a music degree from the Union Theological Seminary of Sacred Music, New York. The recently completed remodeling program included new carpet throughout, new pews, a new rostrum including choir loft, refinishing of the exposed beams, installation of stained windows and a new sound system.

Friona Youngster Named "TEXAS" Cast Member

Friona will be represented in the cast of the ever-popular 'Texas' cast this year as Carl Evans, senior at Friona High School, was notified last Wednesday that he has been accepted as a member of the cast.

Carl auditioned for the part at The Branding Iron Theater in Canyon in January with Carol Reeve as his accompanist. He first sang Rodgers and Hammerstein's "Surrey With A Fringe On Top" from 'Oklahoma' and did a three minute dramatic presentation from Andre Obey's "Noah."

He lauded Carol for her assistance in his audition and said he would like to personally thank Joy Morton and Eva Miller for this assistance in preparing for the audition.

Carl is the first person from Friona to be chosen for the 'Texas' cast and was the only

tryout from this area this year. At this time, Carl does not know what part he will be playing, but will graduate from Friona High School on May 25, sign his contract on May 26 and begin rehearsal on May 28. Rehearsal will be held from 1-5 and 6-10 p.m. each day. Carl plans to also take summer classes at West Texas State University in Canyon.

He said he will be living in a dorm at the college and will attend morning classes until performances begin on June 21, when he will attend classes throughout the day.

For his summer performance, until August 25, with Texas, Carl will receive three hours college credit.

Performers for 'Texas' are chosen on the basis of their command of the stage, facial expression and movement and voice.

Auditions for the summer production were held in Canyon, Oklahoma City, Dallas, Austin, Houston and Lubbock.

Next Tuesday, the Thespians will present a program at the Progressive Study Club meeting, and during that time, Carl will present his 'skit from "Noah" which helped him land the part in 'Texas.'

Paul Green, who wrote 'Texas', which is a musical drama of Panhandle history is the director. The setting is the 1880s and there are 78 performers who reach into the past to reveal the struggles of the settlers, the strength of the cowboys, and land love of the Indians, and the burials, politics, business and celebrations.

On the first night of this year's production, the 500,000th person will enter the gates for the show.

Drake Retires As Elevator Manager

The Board of Directors of Friona Wheat Growers this week announced the retirement of Arthur Drake as elevator manager, and the promotion of Ronald Dean Smiley to the position of manager. The change was effective May 1.

Drake has been associated with the local elevator since 1937, except for a three-year period (1965-67) when he quit in order to farm.

Smiley, the new manager, has been with Friona Wheat Growers since 1969. He first was bookkeeper for the company, and later was promoted to assistant manager.

Drake was first employed by Friona Wheat Growers in 1937, and became elevator manager six years later, in 1943. He pointed out that when he first started to work, the company's storage totaled 30,000 bushels, in one 20,000 elevator and another holding 10,000 bushels.

Today, each individual tank at Friona Wheat Growers holds 30,000 bushels, and the elevator has storage at its original plant of 3,170,000 bushels. Currently completing a deal to purchase the old Continental (Goodpas-

ture) elevator, the added storage would make the company's total approximately four million bushels.

In addition to the company's managerial change, two new employees also have been added. Dale Williams has been added to the staff, and Mrs. Charles Scales is the new bookkeeper.

Smiley, a Friona resident since 1957, was first employed here by Carl Maurer. He worked six years for Texaco, two years for Kendrick Oil, and three years with Friona Motors prior to becoming associated with Friona Wheat Growers.

The new elevator manager has been active in the Friona Little League program since 1958, both as a manager and a board member. He was a member of the Friona Jaycees, and is currently president of the Friona Noon Lions and is a member of the Friona School Board.

Smiley also is an active member of the 10th Street Church of Christ. He and his wife Melba are parents of three children, Mitchell, Vickie and Cindy.

Parmer County Rates In Beef Production

Parmer County is second among 33 Texas counties listed in an area served by Southwestern Public Service Company in beef production for 1972.

According to the fed cattle industry report Parmer County produced 428,900 fed cattle as compared with first place Deaf Smith County which produced 574,108.

With a total capacity of 230,100 head among the seven listed feed lots in the county, the individual size at March 1 was Bovina Feeders, Inc., 30,000; Cattleman, Inc., 30,000; Far-Tex Feedlot, 8,000; Friona Feed Yard, Inc., 30,000; Peco Feed Yard, 37,000; Hi-Plains Feed Yard, 51,000 and Parmer County Cattle Co., 37,000.

In a four state area, including one county in Kansas, four in New Mexico, three in Oklahoma and the 33 Texas counties, a total of 4,679,098 fed cattle were produced in the past year. Castro County was third on the list with a total of 379,400. The 1973 report which was published by Southwestern Public Service Company listed feedlots and their capacity as well as packing plants in the listed counties and their location.

According to the report, the number of feedlots has declined since 1969, but the capacity and production has shown a great increase. From just above 1,000,000 cattle fed in 1966, the 1972 total had risen to more than four and a half million.

Library Family Award Presented To Gores

Two special awards were presented during the annual meeting of the Friends of the Library of the Friona Public Library on Monday afternoon.

Receiving a plaque as 'Library Family of the Year' was the Lewis Gore family who reside northwest of Friona.

The six Gores, including Mr. and Mrs. Gore, and their four children, Carolyn, 16; Larry, 14; Bryan, 13 and Sonya, 11, were said to utilize the facilities of the library to the fullest extent and were considered "to be fully and completely deserving of the award presented them."

Admitted history buffs, the Gores also expressed an interest in historical matters including local history.

Mrs. Gore is a Friona Junior High School teacher and Gore is a rural mail carrier.

A special award was received by Hugh Moseley as a 'Special Friend of the Library.'

Both awards were presented by Peggy Hamil, president of the Friends of the Library. She also expressed a thank you to several individuals who had assisted here in preparing for the annual meeting.

It was reported that \$277.10 was on hand in the treasury and it was hopeful to have the present 8,900 stock of volumes in the library built up to 10,000 by October 1974 in order to qualify for a federal grant to be used by the library.

The library board report was given by Mrs. Dan Ethridge, who said 12,833 books were checked out to 6,308 readers during the preceding year and 201 new readers had been acquired. Mrs. Ethridge also said of the 159 who registered for the summer reading program, 92 completed the program.

FRIONA AREA residents who have suffered through the area's worst winter in some 50 years need to visit with Mrs. K.E. Deaton, and they'll feel a lot better about any hardships or 'inconvenience' they may have suffered.

Mrs. Deaton, who has continued to live at the old Dorsey Mansion in Northern New Mexico since her husband's death two years ago, has some stories to tell about the winter of '73.

She was without electricity for more than two weeks at the old mansion, having to rely on candles and oil lamps for light during this period. Mail service also was interrupted during this time.

"That was a long, lonesome spell," says the former Friona resident.

The New Mexico state legislature has approved a bill, signed by the governor, to purchase the old mansion from Mrs. Deaton, and take over and preserve the historic landmark for posterity. The state is to take possession on July 1, providing all of the necessary "red tape" can be completed by that time.

BACK TO THE winter stories. Mrs. Deaton's daughter and family became stranded about three miles from the mansion, while enroute for a visit in early April.

This was the late blizzard that caused some concern locally. The Deaton relatives were stranded in their auto for some 19 hours, the better part of this time without heat.

Finally, a neighbor came to their rescue, in a four-wheel drive vehicle, and delivered them to Mrs. Deaton's home. They were all relieved following the ordeal. Mrs. Deaton, who had been expecting the children's visit, was almost "beside herself" by the time the children were found, she relates.

WE ARE GLAD to see the state of New Mexico purchase the old Dorsey Mansion from Mrs. Deaton, and express its interest in preserving the home.

The Deatons are to be commended for their years of hard work in snatching the mansion from the brink of extinction. When they bought the place some seven or eight years ago, it was in a pretty bad state of repair.

The action by the state of New Mexico will assure that the Deatons' efforts will not have been in vain. Being a history buff ourselves, we admire and appreciate the Deatons for helping to preserve this bit of Americana, something residents of this section of the country can continue to enjoy for generations.

ON OUR TRIP to the Dorsey Mansion last weekend, we were impressed by the dryland wheat crop northwest of Friona in Parmer and Deaf Smith counties, and across in New Mexico.

The wheat is undoubtedly the best at this stage than it has been in a number of years, with a good crop practically assured. Any additional moisture would just about cinch a "bumper" crop for the hardy dryland farmers, and if anyone deserves a break more than these, we can't think ofhand who it could be.

THE WILDLIFE was also out, in profusion during our trip of last week.

Our party was treated by being able to see closehand a number of herds of antelope. One herd numbered ten animals. Two other antelope were curious bystanders not 30 yards away while the group enjoyed a roadside snack.

We also were able to see deer and pheasants in the vicinity of Chico.

Near Boys Ranch we spotted big footprints that could have belonged to our area's mystery cougar. If not, they must have belonged to one of the biggest dogs we can imagine.

One of our bunch, Tom Lewellen, even saw some strange-looking yellow 'coons. Didn't look like 'coons to us, but Tom's an old coon hunter, so we didn't contradict him.

THE EXPORT SITUATION is the key to the longterm outlook for feed-grains.

If export sales continue at or near current volumes, above average prices are anticipated at harvest. However, if the U.S. returns to a low level of export marketing, prices of grains could be sharply reduced.

Massive grain purchases by the Soviet Union beginning last July are having a major impact on the current U.S. grain situation. Soviet wheat imports are projected to be four times that of 1971 and the U.S. will supply most of this trade. U.S. exports of corn, grain sorghum and soybeans are up due to production problems in many foreign countries.

Domestic grain usage has gone up as well. Increase in livestock numbers is the primary cause. Cattle on feed last fall were up 19 percent in the Southwest-30 percent in Texas.

Severe cold, wet weather this past winter also brought increased livestock feeding, thus adding to the demand for grain.

What about the supply situation?

Production should reach near record levels in 1973. Nationwide, feed-grain acreage should increase about seven percent. The U.S. Department of Agriculture's decision to reduce the 'set-aside' acres for the feed-grain program has promoted increased plantings.

Grain sorghum acreage in Texas should be up 10 percent over 1972 while soybeans should show a phenomenal 56 percent increase. About 125,000 more acres will be planted to soybeans this year as a result of skyrocketing prices in 1972 and indications ahead. However, except for soybeans, acreages are still expected to be below 1971 levels.

Corn acreage will increase only slightly while the state's winter wheat acreage is reported to be up by about 9 percent. **ELM LEAF BEETLES** will soon be feeding actively on leaves of elm trees. This insect is a serious pest of elm trees in West Texas. Feeding from this insect skeltonizes the leaf surface of leaves and premature defoliation of the elm tree. This weakens the trees and makes them more susceptible to tree borers.

The adult beetles are oval and about one-fourth inch long. They are yellowish to olive-green in coloration with a black stripe along each side of the wing covers.

The female beetles are now laying eggs on the back side of leaves in clusters of 5 to 20. The eggs are bottle-shaped and yellowish orange in color. These eggs will hatch in a few days into small worms that are nearly black in coloration and are covered with short black hairs.

To protect the foliage of elm trees from feeding damage of the elm leaf beetle, trees may be sprayed with carbaryl (Sevin) malathion. Mix and apply sprays according to manufacturer's directions on the LABEL of the chemical container.

Thorough coverage of the trees with the insecticide spray is necessary to obtain satisfactory control of this insect.

To secure additional height and better coverage of the tree, a hose on sprayer may be tied to a fishing pole or other sturdy object, and raised up in the air and sprayed on the tree.

First Night**

Preceding the first performance at 8 p.m. of the Friona Junior Rodeo on May 18, a rodeo parade will be featured at 6 p.m. in downtown Friona.

Visiting riding clubs have been invited to join the parade down Main Street.

Evening performances will be Friday and Saturday, May 18-19 and a 2 p.m. performance is scheduled for Sunday, May 20.

Furnishing stock will be Halliday Rodeo Co. of Truth or Consequences, and deadline for entry in the events is 7 p.m. on May 19.

Events will be bare back bronc riding, bull riding, tie down roping, barrel racing, pole bending and ribbon roping. The rodeo is sponsored by the Friona Riding Club.

**Water Bills
Pending**

When the Texas House of Representatives adjourned for the Easter weekend more than 60 amendments had been considered to House Bill 139, the general appropriations bill. Rep. Clayton said, "When the House convened Tuesday morning there were still over 120 amendments to be considered."

Debate on the bill could consume the larger part of the week's activities in the House of Representatives. One of the amendments adopted last week to the bill would provide that every able bodied person over the age of 65 and under the age of 18 and who is not blind or disabled must present themselves for work and accept what work might be offered before they can be eligible for welfare payments.

The amendment also provided that this same age category of people could not be eligible for welfare payments if they participated in a work stoppage or strike.

Rep. Clayton's Subcommittee on Water will be recommending passage of a number of water bills this week. Clayton stated there were some 35 bills his committee would be working on this week. Most of these bills are ones recommended by the Governor and the Interim Water District Committee. One or two of the bills are related to water uses and priority with three or four bills relating to river authorities and ground water. "Hopefully these bills can be ready for full committee action within the week," Clayton stated.

**Disaster Loan
Available**

Farmers in Parmer County, Texas, who had suffered crop or property losses because of the drought and other natural disasters during the period January 1, 1972 through June 19, 1972 and who have not received an Emergency Loan to assist them in recovering their losses may apply for an Emergency Loan at the Farmers Home Administration County Office, 708 Avenue A, Farwell, on or before May 8, 1973. Applicants who apply by the deadline will be considered for Emergency Loans at 1 percent interest.

In addition, those who qualify will receive a forgiveness benefit on their loan of not to exceed \$5,000 based on losses that are uncompensated by insurance or otherwise.

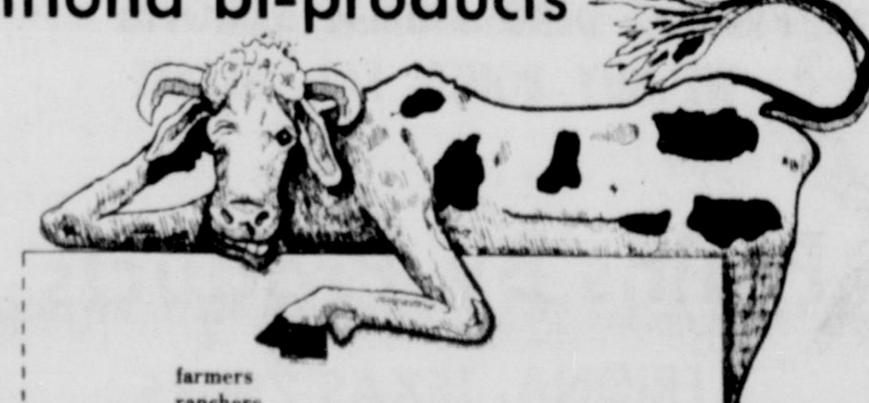

Food Price Facts Given

Everyone is talking about food prices so the Parmer County SWCD thought a few hard facts would be appreciated.

The average person spent 8.2 cents more per day for his food in 1972, compared with 1971. Of that increase, slightly more than half (4.6 cents) was spent for meat.

The average retail price of Choice beef—the "Cadillac" of food—increased 9 1/2 cents per pound in 1972 over 1971. Since people eat an average of 3 1/2 ounces of Choice beef per day, the 1972 increase in Choice beef cost the average shopper about 2 cents more per day. Since some of this increased cost

went for higher marketing costs, the average shopper paid farmers 1.3 cents per day more for Choice beef in 1972 than in 1971.

There is an extremely strong demand for food. We are eating

more meat than ever before and we are bidding up the price.

We are eating more prepared, convenience foods with more of the kitchen work already completed and built into the food.

On March 1, 8 percent more beef cattle were on feed in the major feeding states than a year earlier.

Prices for all consumer items rose by 58 percent between 1952 and 1972; retail food went up 47 percent; housing prices climbed by 64 percent.

The price of medical care increased 123 percent during the same 20-year period, while transportation climbed 55 percent.

Sewing notions—popular recycling tools—transform old garments into style-conscious wearables. Examples include replacement pockets, zippers, new belt fasteners, trims and iron-on patches.

Some patches, especially designed for jeans, add new dimensions, promising teen approval.

With iron-on patches, follow directions carefully. Success requires the right pressure and heat—otherwise the patch will fall away after cleaning.

Texas To Keep Fuel At Home

Texas is exporting seven of the eight billion gallons of fuel oils she produces, while home owners, industrial and agricultural consumers in Texas are facing immediate and severe shortages, sponsors of a resolution told members of the Natural Resources Committee this week.

Rep. Bill Clayton of Spring Lake co-sponsored the resolution, which would ask the Texas Railroad Commission to protect the rights of Texas citizens over the exporters of Texas-produced products.

The committee acted immediately by pushing for emergency consideration of the resolution in the House of Representatives.

Forty percent of jobbers who supply gas in Texas are facing severe cutbacks on May 1, while five percent are going out of business for lack of gas and fuel oils to sell, according to Lowry M. Carpenter, vice president of Texas LP-Gas Association. Rationing began last December to keep heat in homes, schools, cotton gins, tractors, oil rigs and other users of gas, he said.

Roger Brown of Big Spring, representing the jobbers of that area, stated that the crisis is immediate, adding that clients have been notified they will be cut off on May 1 from gas. He estimated a million people in rural homes would be affected by that cut.

Rep. Clayton's resolution recognizes the critical situation and asks the Railroad Commission to give a high priority to the solution of the problems.

Civil Defense Group Meeting Scheduled

In an attempt to organize a Civil Defense unit in Parmer County, a meeting has been scheduled in Farwell at 7:30 p.m. today (Thursday) in a vacant building adjacent to the Rose Drug Store.

The attempt is being made by James Fritz, a five month resident of Farwell, who said he is a former assistant civil defense chief in Elkhart, Ind. Fritz says he is a qualified rescue instructor with 13 years experience and is also the founder of the new group to be called Parmer County Civil Defense.

According to Fritz, the new unit would supplement existing rescue operations and provide additional trained weather spotters in the county.

He also said the service would bolster the limited ambulance service in the county and set up a communications system to

assist county law enforcement agencies during times of emergencies.

Citing that storm cycles are becoming more frequent and severe in this area, a civil defense group could provide 100 more people trained in first aid and rescue work, according to the head of the new unit.

Fritz also commented that the new Civil Defense unit has been endorsed by the Parmer County Commission, but that funding will come from individual contributions.

Parmer County is one of the three counties in the State of Texas without a Civil Defense unit, although in Friona, Fire Chief Ralph Shirley said the Friona Fire Department and the Friona Law Enforcement Agency has a plan which is coordinated by Friona City Manager Jake Outland.

The Friona plan would provide emergency operations if necessary, explained Shirley. Fritz has invited all interested individuals to the Thursday night meeting in Farwell.

Wires Backing Beef Sent To Washington

In view of the recent price freeze on beef as imposed by President Nixon, the Friona Chamber of Commerce board of directors adopted a resolution. The resolution was wired to the 26 member Texas delegation, including Senator John Tower and Congressman Bob Price in Washington. Another wire was sent President Nixon.

The wire stated--"The Friona Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture Board of Directors has unanimously passed a resolution calling for the defeat of the amendment rolling beef prices back to January levels. We feel this amendment, if passed, will have disastrous effects on the agricultural economy of West Texas and the nation.

"If the beef industry is allowed to operate under free enterprise conditions, the American housewife can be better assured of a plentiful supply of high quality meat for her family's diet."

C of C President Dale Cary, who also signed the telegram, said a letter was received from Congressman George Mahon thanking the Friona C of C for the telegram and stated he was "strongly opposed to the rollback" and pledged to continue his best efforts to have the measure defeated.

Cary also said that he and Mrs. Cary and Mr. and Mrs. Clarence W. Martin, the president of Hi-Plains Feed Yard, Inc., had attended the West Texas Chamber of Commerce annual meeting in Abilene last weekend. He said Martin was instrumental in getting the West Texas Chamber of Commerce to also pass a resolution opposing the beef rollback in prices.

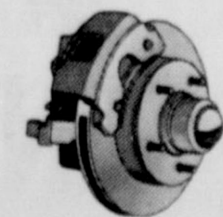

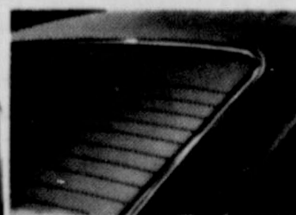

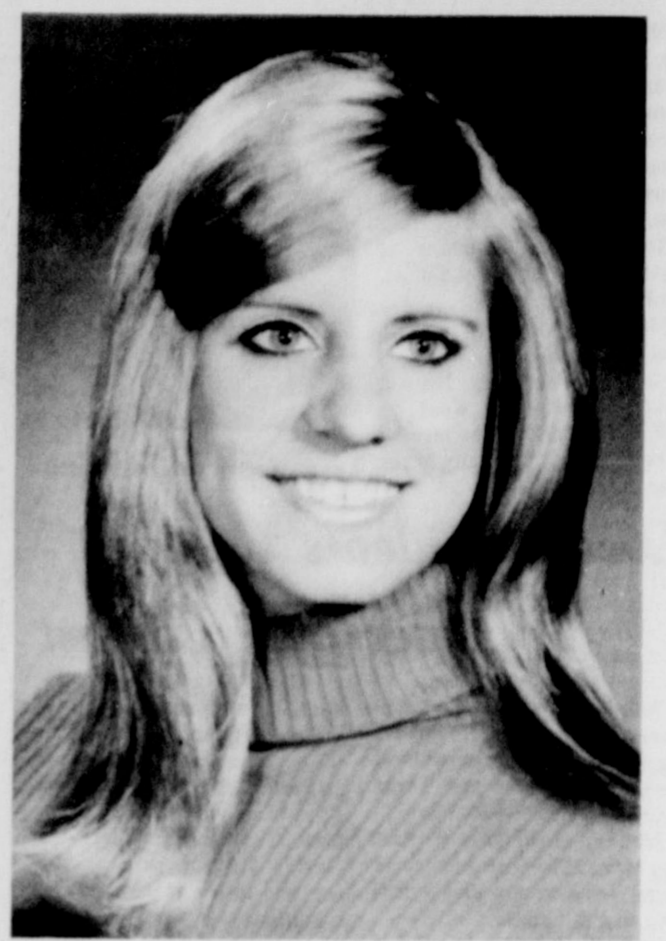
