"Wouldn't Bergman pose in the nude?" she asked. "Would Wyman? Would Stanwyck?"

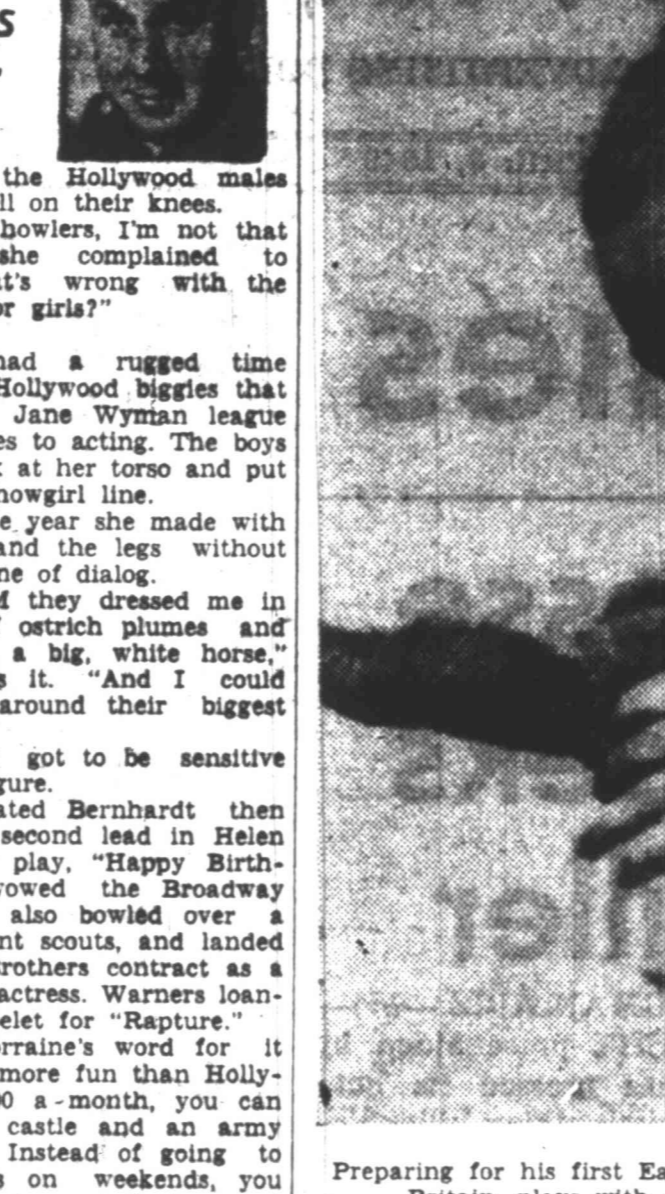
Lorraine finally used her gray matter—it won her a scholarship to the University of Michigan—and got Piaoff's artistic blood pressure back to normal.

WASHINGTON—Vice President Barkley, who more and more is becoming the balance-wheel of the Truman administration, gave a significant report to the President at last week's cabinet meeting.

The Truman program on Capitol Hill, Barkley told the cabinet, was in much better shape than the public realizes. Furthermore, he predicted that a considerable part of the program will be passed at this session of Congress.

Barkley listed the housing bill, aid-to-education, reciprocal trade, and school health as certain to pass. However, he was pessimistic about certain other important bills, especially the Taft-Hartley Act, which he said the Administration did not have enough votes to repeal.

He also was pessimistic about civil rights, minimum wages—which Truman wants increased to 75 cents an hour—and the national health bill. This, the vice president told the cabinet, could not be passed this year.

Noting that the housing bill of both parties is that no tax bill will be passed at this session—despite Truman's emphatic statement that he wanted taxes revised. Missing Russian Diplomat. Low Blood Pressure Usually Regarded As Favorable Sign

The blood pressure is the pressure, or outward thrust, which the blood stream exerts on the walls of the arteries through which it passes.

Past Aid To China Generous, But Further Help Is Doubtful

WASHINGTON—The opening of Peiping peace talks between the Kuomintang Nationalist government and the Northern Communists offers almost the only present hope for an eventual solution of the Chinese disaster.

In 1946, General Marshall, then U.S. Ambassador to China, told the Nationalist government that its proposed all-out war against the Communists was doomed to failure.

Since V-J Day, the United States has poured \$2,000,000,000 worth of aid into China. It has sold China another \$1,000,000,000 worth of goods at a fraction of original cost.

Today the Chinese Communists apparently can go anywhere they want to. There is no force to stop them. What has prevented them from crossing the Yangtze River, taking Nanking, Shanghai and points south, is said to be simply the lack of administrative organizations competent to take over and control these big cities and commercial areas.

There is \$58,000,000 worth of U.S. Marshall Plan aid still undelivered to China. The Economic Cooperation Administration has asked Congress for authority to stretch this aid three months to June 30. The idea is to send these supplies into the big seacoast cities to keep their populations from starving till the new Chinese crops are ready for the summer.

## Wrangle Over Joe Louis Match May Wind Up In Court

DALLAS —(AP)— A wrangle over \$3,500 involving a Joe Louis exhibition boxing match here may go to court.

Joseph Ray, Dallas boxing promoter, was ordered Thursday to pay the sum to Louis under a guarantee to the retired heavyweight champion. The order came from State Labor Commissioner M. B. Morgan, who is state regulator of boxing and wrestling.

Ray said he would press a court suit to settle a dispute over division of the proceeds of the fight and would not abide by Morgan's decision.

In a hearing Thursday, it was brought out that Don Robey of Houston was the financial backer of the fight. Ray did the actual promotion of the fight.

\$3,500 Check Canceled Ray said Louis' manager, Marshall Miles, was tendered an offer of the \$3,500 guarantee in cash immediately after the fight; that Miles said he preferred a check from Robey; that Robey made out the check and Miles signed a receipt which is in the hands of the promoter.

Robey, however, canceled the check, he testified.

Robey testified the check was canceled because Ray refused to accept 1 1/2 per cent of the \$400 net profit from the fight for his services, and would not permit any money to be drawn from the joint checking account.

He said Ray claimed 50 per cent of the profit.

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## Questions and Answers about the Telephone Company's Improvement Program for Midland

- Q. What are the telephone company's plans for improving telephone service in Midland?  
A. The telephone company is proposing to install a new \$1,500,000 dial system in Midland and spend \$700,000 more for expansion and improvement of telephone service here. To justify this large expenditure the company has asked city officials to approve a new schedule of rates to help offset losses which are resulting each month from rates established in 1928.
- Q. How does the number of telephones in service in Midland compare with the number here in 1928?  
A. Present telephone rates were established in 1928 when Midland had only 1,100 telephones, as compared with 7,500 in service here today. Midland telephone users now have access to almost seven times as many telephones as in 1928, when it cost much less, per telephone, to furnish service than it does today.
- Q. With so many telephones, isn't the telephone company taking in more money than ever?  
A. Telephone revenues are up, to be sure, but costs of furnishing the service have increased even faster. During the first half of 1948, we collected \$116,102 for telephone service, but it cost \$131,641 to furnish this service. As a result, we operated the Midland telephone system at a loss of \$15,539 in the six-month period.
- Q. How have telephone costs increased?  
A. Telephone payroll, the biggest single item in the cost of furnishing telephone service, are almost six times as high here today as they were in 1941. Other telephone costs are up, too. Poles, cables, buildings, trucks, office supplies, and everything else required to furnish telephone service continue to cost high post-war prices.
- Q. How much more will telephone service cost when the new rates are in effect?  
A. Briefly, business telephones will cost about eight cents a day more. Residence telephones will cost less than two cents a day more.
- Q. When will work begin on the new dial system?  
A. Immediately after the new schedule of rates is approved. The intricate dial switching equipment, especially designed for Midland, will be ordered and plans will be started for construction of a new dial telephone building which will be completed in time to house the new equipment when it arrives.
- Q. Why is the telephone company asking for higher rates in Midland?  
A. Because present rates, established more than 20 years ago, are not bringing in enough revenue to pay the cost of furnishing service here. The telephone company cannot justify spending additional large sums of money to improve and expand telephone service until operations in Midland are placed on a more satisfactory financial basis.



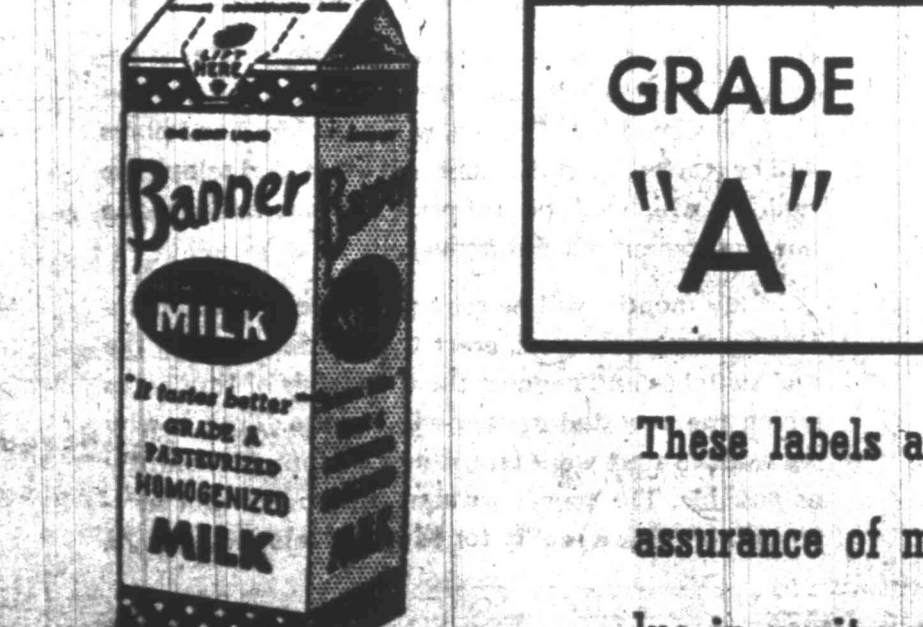

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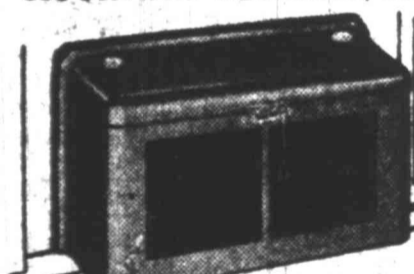
Pampa Youth Freed In Father's Slaying

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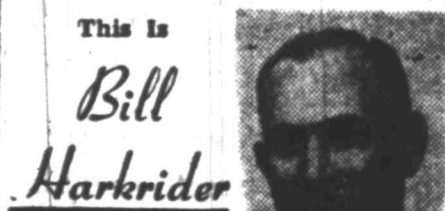

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Pioneer Official Surveys Facilities At Air Terminal

George K. Harris of Houston, Pioneer Air Lines official, Friday morning surveyed facilities at Midland Air Terminal as a possible headquarters location for the airline should its main offices be moved from Houston. Stanley Erskine, chairman of the Chamber of Commerce Aeronautics Committee; Delbert Downing, C. of C. manager, and City Manager H. A. Thomson, accompanied Harris on the tour of inspection. Harris is the chairman of a Pioneer committee appointed by company officials to survey facilities at cities served by the feeder-type airline. He arrived in Midland Thursday. Pioneer Air Lines recently was ordered to vacate its Houston headquarters facilities and the company immediately started a search for a new center of operations should it be forced to leave Houston. The Midland Chamber of Commerce promptly issued an invitation for the airline to locate in Midland, and the survey by Harris came as a result of the invitation. Houston civic leaders are attempting to work out a satisfactory arrangement whereby Pioneer will retain its headquarters in that city.

Manhunt Ends As Second Escaped Felon Surrenders

NACOGDOCHES, TEXAS—(P)—Willard Ward, 35, sought in a major manhunt in East Texas, Thursday night hobbled out of the woods and flagged a state patrol car near here. Ward had escaped from Clemen Prison Farm in Brasoria County Monday. He and a fellow convict, Walter LeMay, 41, kidnaped two oil field workers, took them to Houston, forced them out and escaped in the workers' car. The car was wrecked and Ward was injured. Ward told them he didn't want to give himself up to anyone but State Highway Patrolmen, because he was afraid he "might be injured" by any others. Hundreds of armed men had surrounded a wooded area into which Ward fled. LeMay was captured Tuesday near Henderson. Ward was convicted in Tarrant County in 1943 and given 50-year concurrent terms for five armed robberies.

Army Units Control Guatemalan Revolt

GUATEMALA, GUATEMALA—(P)—Army units fighting to quell Guatemala's 19th revolution in four years claimed the upper hand Friday. Foreign Minister Munoz Meany said at least two persons have been killed in fights along the Mexican border with groups he accused of a "Fascist" plot to depose President Juan Jose Arvalo. 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School Bills Left Dangling As Solons Take Weekend 'Rest'

AUSTIN—(P)—The Legislature quit work for the week Thursday with the Gilmer-Alkin school bills still hanging fire in the House. In the most decisive action of the day, the House apparently cinched abolition of the elective office of state superintendent. It turned down Rep. Jimmy Horan's proposal to keep the elective office 76 to 59. Jim Taylor's bill, first of the G-A measures passed by the Senate, replaces the superintendent with an appointive state commissioner of education. The Senate accomplished less than the House so far as disposition of legislation was concerned. It debated the bill to set up a Texas citrus commission for an hour before adjourning until Monday. Ultimate Victory Conceded Ultimate victory for the Gilmer-Alkin reorganization bills has been conceded by many of the opponents, but it looks like a long battle. The initial measure got nowhere fast in the House Thursday. One amendment was hung on the bill in the face of strong opposition by its backers. By Rep. Deno Tufares of Wichita Falls, it provides for election of state school board members in the general elections. Seven of the 21 members would be elected every two years, thus giving them six-year terms. The Taylor bill calls for their selection at the local school trustee elections. Tufares said all state officials should be chosen on the general election ballot. The House agreed 95 to 45.

Senator Criticizes Whitewash Report On Longoria Case

CORPUS CHRISTI—(P)—The state senator whose district includes Three Rivers, Texas, Thursday night sharply criticized a House committee report on the Felix Longoria rebuttal incident. The senator is Rogers Ekley of Edinburg. Longoria was a Latin American killed in World War II. Members of his family charged a Three Rivers funeral home refused to allow his reburial service in its chapel. They said it was because Longoria was a Latin American. The funeral home director said he "discouraged" the use of his chapel because of "serious trouble" between the widow and the soldier's parents. A House committee investigated the incident and Thursday a majority report said it found there was no racial discrimination involved. Rep. Frank Olcott of Marlin filed a majority report disagreeing with the other committee members. Thursday night, Senator Kelley said here the minority report gave a better picture of what happened.

Young Crime Veteran Captured By Officers

AMARILLO—(P)—Bobby Craig, a veteran of crime at 17 years of age, was captured in Corpus Christi Thursday night after escaping officers Wednesday. Craig Wednesday was leading officers to look taken in a \$6,000 burglary of an Amarillo jewelry store. They stopped by Craig's home and Craig escaped through a bathroom window. The youth was arrested Thursday night at the home of an aunt about an hour after Corpus Christi officers had been asked to look for him. Craig is a three-terminer at Gatesville Reformatory.

DALLAS—(P)—Albion Monroe Fraser, former Hill County attorney and former regional counsel of the Home Owners Loan Corporation, died Thursday at his home here.

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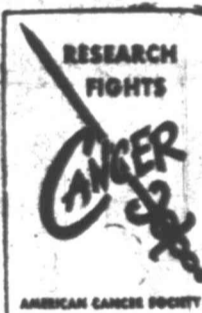

Lazarus, Rooster Without Head, Is Legal Fuss Center

LOS ANGELES—(P)—The legal fuss over Lazarus the rooster is so thick it would make his head swim—if he had a head. Lazarus, alias Butch, has been moved to a pet hospital pending court action from several directions. Mrs. Martha Green, who bought the rooster, says head, April 2 and then found it was still alive and crowing, charged Thursday that the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals took Lazarus from her home without her consent. She sued the society and the pet-hospital operator for \$2,500 unless the bird is returned forthwith. The SPCA, however, contended it was acting in conformity with an order by Justice Stanley Moffatt. The same jurist, acting on the SPCA's complaint, has ordered Dr. Alan Ross, a veterinarian, to appear Saturday and explain why Lazarus should not be put to death. Dr. Ross had been advising Mrs. Green and helping to keep the rooster alive by milk and mush feedings with an eye-dropper. Lazarus, he contends, may be valuable for research.
