## Tugwell's Tale Seems Illogical

It was clearly evident that Communists had a major part in devising the strategy and tactics of Henry Wallace's presidential campaign last year. Even so, it is interesting to have that evidence confirmed by Prof. Rexford Guy Tugwell, the old brain-truster and more recently platform chairman at the Wallace third-party convention.

Dr. Tugwell acknowledged the Communist influence in an article published by the Progressive magazine (no connection with the political party of the same name). He deplored that influence. But his suggestion of how it might have been avoided is open to question.

"The reason Communist workers were so prominent in the Wallace campaign," he wrote, "was that the Progressives were—well, where were they? Sitting it out; wringing their hands, and wailing about the wickedness of the Reds.'

At the same time. Dr. Tugwell seems to contradict himself with an explanation of one of the third-party can-

didate's "fatal errors:" "Mr. Wallace's extremism was—and is—his own. It is explainable. As fast as he occupied a forward trench, he found Mr. Truman in it with him and felt compelled to go on to another. This finally landed him in a no-man's land which most Progressives felt was much too far advanced. And presently he was out there pretty much

The first forward trench that Wallace occupied was his policy of appeasement toward Russia, which he disclosed in his famous Madison Square Garden speech. With that trench he dug himself right out of the cabinet. Truman did not get into the trench with him.

## Holy Week Services Texas Negro Thinks **Trapped Girl Could Have Been Rescued**

DALLAS-(P) - A Texas man, now 39, is alive because he was saved from a well by a negro 36 years ago. Elbert Gray, the negro who rescued the white child, believes Kathy Fiscus might have been reached in the same way he pulled the white child to safety.

Gray said he rescued Albert Calvin Stepp from a well 64 feet deep.
