

Barnes Spots Ector 11,000-Foot Wildcat

Operations are starting at once on a 11,000-foot wildcat in Southwest Ector County by J. C. Barnes of Midland as his No. 1 Buchan-

The drillsite is 660 feet from west and south lines of section 15, block 45, T-2-S, TP survey, which puts it about six and one-half miles northwest of Penwell.

With combination rotary-cable tools, it is to drill into the Ellenburger. Nearest Ellenburger pro-duction is in the TXL field six miles to the north.

The venture is being supported by Shell Oil Company, Inc., Phillips Petroleum Company, Tide-Water Associated Oil Company, Skelly Oil Company, Standard Oil Company of Texas, Cities Service Oil Company, Magnolia Petroleum Company and General Crude Oil Company. These concerns have made acreage contributions to the drilling of the prospector. The wildcat is located on a 700acre block.

Pecos Failure To Be Re-Opened; Deepened

Richardson d Bass of Fort Worth are moving in on their No. 1 W. K. Heagy, Northeast Pecos County wildcat abandoned last March on 1,730 feet. The venture is be re-opened and deepened to 2,000 feet with rotary tools for further testing.

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He recalled that the Asiatic hordes had shattered the defenders of Europe in Poland and Austria, and that the continent seemed doomed. "But at the critical moment the great khan died," he said. "The succession was vacant and the Mongol armies with their leaders trooped back on their ponies across the 7,000 miles which separated them from their capital in order to choose a successor. They never returned-till now.'

He mentioned the incident in asking the question: "Is time on our side?" and answering himself with the opinion that "war is not inevitable." We do not think he brought in this bit of ancient history simply to give his hearers the wishful comfort that something may turn up to relieve the free world of its present anxieties.

The event he referred to was not the only one in which the unexpected has saved the day. It was not the only time before now that Europe has been threatened by forces from beyond the continent. Miss Vraz's home is Berwyn, Ill. Miss Vraz was planning to leave for the United States in the middle of May for a holiday. She told friends recently she was not certain she would return to Czechoslovakia.

The chief United States consular officer in Prague, Carroll Parry, saw Miss Vrag in prison Tuesday. He talked with her in the presence of a representative of the Czech Foreign Office and two police officers.



Altogether now the Senate has been talking about six weeks. Except for a couple of days spent on passing new rent controls, the Senate has used those weeks on just two main subjects: civil rights and the Marshall Plan. Everything else had to wait.

It used up between three weeks and a month in a filibuster on the civil rights program. That was shoved aside in the end and probably suffered a mortal blow for the rest of this session.

Then, after a brief pause to vote for 15 months more of rent controls, the Senate turned to the Marshall Plan and talked till last weekend. But even after all the talk, the last word hasn't been said on the Marshall Plan.




