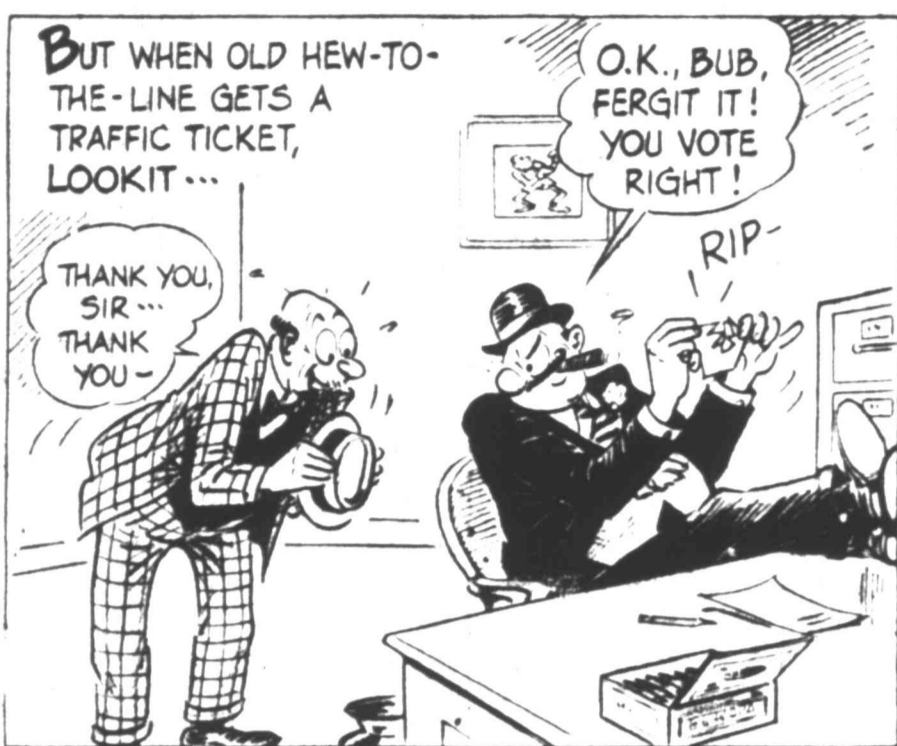

Acheson Pleads For Treaty Approval And Arms Aid To Allies

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Secretary of State Acheson pleaded with Congress Wednesday to approve both the North Atlantic Treaty and the proposed \$1,450,000,000 arms aid program to bolster "world-wide security."

Acheson appeared before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee at the opening of hearings on the pact which was signed here April 4. It requires approval by a two-third vote of the Senate before it can be ratified.

The cabinet officer termed the 12-nation security treaty and the foreign military assistance program parallel ways of building world security and said he believes both are necessary.

But he met head-on one of the biggest questions raised by some congressional critics by saying the treaty does not formally bind Congress to approve the projected military program.

Strength Against Fears
Both the treaty and the arms assistance program are aimed frankly at building up Western strength against fears of Russian aggression.

Acheson himself told the senators the two measures stem from Soviet foreign policies, declaring: "The sense of insecurity prevalent in Western Europe is not a figment of the imagination—it has come about through the conduct of the Soviet Union."

Nowhere in his 4,500-word prepared statement did Acheson mention the latest development in the cold war—Russia's apparent willingness to lift the Berlin blockade in favor of Big Four talks on the whole German problem.

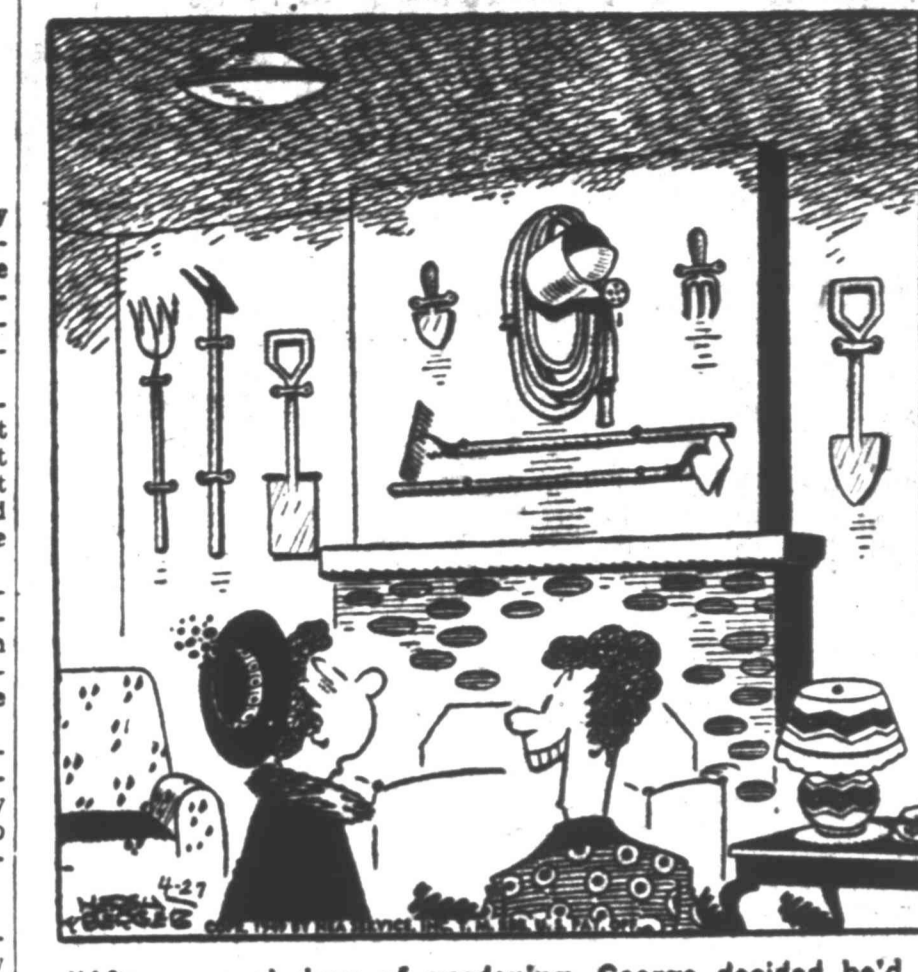
Cost Figures Cited
But even in advance of his appearance, there was no sign in the Senate that the drive for ratification of the North Atlantic Treaty would be slowed, even if the Berlin airlift can be abandoned.

Acheson gave out the cost figures on the arms program for the first time so far as the Administration is concerned although they previously had come from members of the Senate committee. Those figures are \$1,130,000,000 for the Atlantic Pact countries and \$320,000,000 for other countries such as Greece and Turkey.

Acheson reviewed the development of American foreign policy to meet the situation created by Russia. He described the Atlantic Treaty and the military assistance program, as well as the European Recovery Program and help for Greece and Turkey, as "all designed to this end."

Senate Fight Over Pipelines Brewing

AUSTIN—(AP)—A Senate floor fight over exporting Texas' natural gas was brewing Wednesday.

Senators Wardlow Lane of Center and George Moffett of Chillicothe told the Senate Committee on Oil and Gas Tuesday night they would fight a House-passed resolution opposing any further development of pipelines out of the state.

The committee approved the resolution and sent it to the Senate floor for the showdown.

By Rep. W. R. Chambers of May, the resolution calls on the Railroad Commission to oppose future pipeline permits before the Federal Power Commission.

Chambers told the committee Texas must conserve its gas to attract new industry to Texas. He said there was only 22 1/2 years supply remaining.

Definite Policy On China Aid

As the Nationalist cause in China moves swiftly toward total defeat, Secretary of State Acheson is being criticized in the Senate for what one member called the Administration's "fumbling and bumbling China policy."

Probably the criticism is water over the dam. But it may bring a fuller explanation of what was and was not done for China, and why.

Senator Bridges has accused Acheson of "what might be called sabotage of the valiant attempt of the Chinese Nationalists to keep at least a part of China free."

The letter had recalled the \$2,000,000,000 already given China since the end of World War II.

Acheson probably chose that word "capability" with care. The Nationalists did not seem to lack manpower.

The China aid bill had proposed that, in return for the loan, this government should supervise our military aid, China's tax administration, and custom collection in Chinese ports.

All this may represent a negative and belated policy. And it can be interpreted in two ways, depending on one's political sympathies.

But some things appear certain. The Chiang government used American aid unwisely and in some cases, it appears, dishonestly.

Whether this represents the "valiant attempts of the Chinese Nationalists" is again a matter of opinion.

For the present, the Acheson letter and the secretary's refusal to increase Chinese aid seem to reveal a new and definite policy of assistance.

DREW PEARSON ON THE WASHINGTON MERRY-GO-ROUND

Drew Pearson says: Senator Bridges challenges Vandenberg on bi-partisan policy in China; Senator Bricker limits anti-segregation; Malmady trial investigation has interesting backstage story.

WASHINGTON—It wasn't officially recorded, but New Hampshire's Senator Styles Bridges recently struck a sharp blow at the bipartisan foreign policy by demanding that the Administration does not stand on foreign affairs—particularly in China.

He shot the challenge squarely at Michigan's Senator Arthur Vandenberg, the Mr. Big of the bipartisan foreign policy, during a secret meeting of the Republican Policy Committee.

The debate got so heated that at one point Vandenberg snorted: "Now, this is within these four walls. There aren't many here, and if this appears in Drew Pearson's column, I won't have too many to check with."

Bridges called upon the Republicans to stop echoing "Me, too," to everything the Administration does and to focus a "little sunlight on the mistakes and questionable policies" of the Democrats.

He charged that China was being forfeited to the Communists and he urged Vandenberg to take a stand on this and demand a review of our China policy. When America realizes its mistake, Bridges argued, then the Republicans could pin the blame upon the Democrats.

Vandenberg retorted sharply that it was easier for Bridges to snipe against our foreign policy because he didn't have the responsibility as GOP foreign-policy spokesman.

Vandenberg admitted that the picture is dark for the Chinese anti-Communist, but argued that it was too late to interfere without jeopardizing the chances of salvaging what is left.

Tempers flared up at the height of the debate, but cooled off by the time the meeting adjourned.

Bricker's original anti-segregation amendments would have cut off federal funds, including FHA loans, for any segregated housing project.

USE OF THE DADO

Customers are continually asking about Dados—and how they can be used. Like baseboards, wood dados were once purely functional and may still combine functional with decorative qualities. A dado is simply a low paneling running around the walls of a room, from 2 feet 3 inches high to 3 feet—usually up to the line of the window sills, designed to protect perishable wall finishes from injury. It also provides a useful base for mural decorations by lifting the pictures above too much interruption from pieces of furniture placed against the wall. They may also be purely decorative bands of paint, wallpaper or other finishes. Sometimes the dado cap or chair rail is merely a flat board or a molding, or even a narrow trimming border applied at the dado height to break up a too-high wall.

A really protective dado of wood or some other substantial material is especially useful in halls, children's rooms, bathrooms—wherever wearability is important.

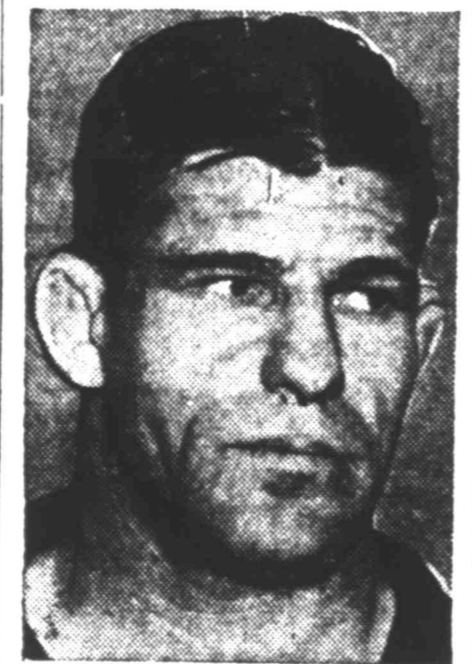

The rest of the league is close enough to figure better days are ahead.

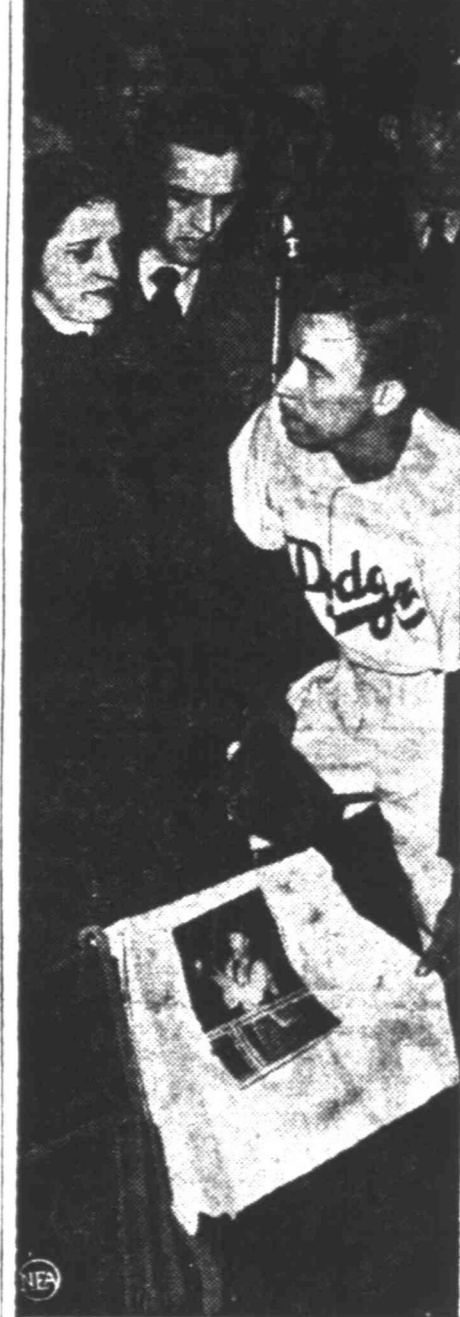

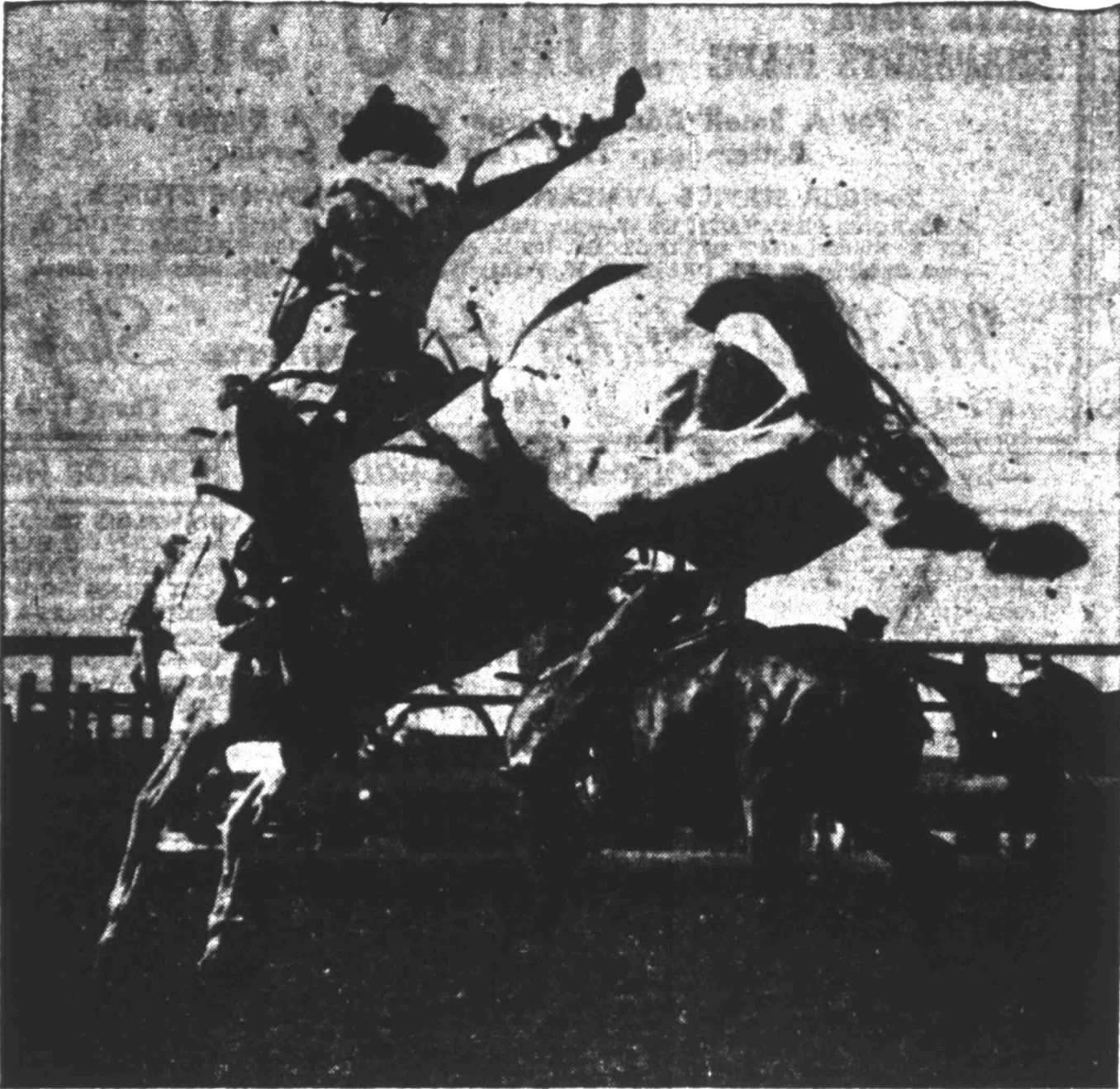

Girl Photographer Reveals Communist Secrets For FBI

NEW YORK—(AP)—A dark-haired girl photographer, appearing as the first female witness at the Communist conspiracy trial, says she has been a "very active Communist" seven years.
But throughout that time, Angela Calomiris testified Tuesday, she has slipped regular reports to the FBI about secret party meetings, schools and activities.
The slender, attractive Miss Calomiris, who operates a photography studio in her Greenwich Village apartment, said that at one Communist school she was taught that "Socialism could not be achieved by evolution, but that it was necessary to violently overthrow the existing government. All branches of the state would have to be abolished, smashed and a dictatorship of the proletariat would follow."
Connections Well Shielded
Miss Calomiris, about 25, said her FBI connections were so well shielded she was a party member in good standing up to the time she began testifying.
At one point she stepped down from the stand and placed a finger on the shoulder of Gil Green, one of the defendants, to identify him.

Russia's Offer: Is It Mirage Or Real Oasis?

By DeWITT MACKENZIE
AP Foreign Affairs Analyst
The Western Allies are moving cautiously (though hopefully) to make sure they are seeing a real oasis and not a mirage in the startling Soviet offer to lift the German blockade.
The Russians have stated their willingness to abandon the blockade if the Democracies in turn will end their counter-blockade and agree to a meeting of the Council of Foreign Ministers to consider the whole German question. It was the Muscovites who ended the Foreign Ministers Council some sixteen months ago by walking out on it.
The Western powers—America, Britain and France—are prepared to agree, provided the Russians have no further conditions up their sleeve. This caution is inspired by the fact that, by striking coincidence, the Soviet offer comes as the other three Allies conclude the agreement for the establishment of a new German republic out of the three Western zones, with Russia holding out its Eastern zone.
Clay, Murphy Wary
The Western Allies are asking themselves: "Can Moscow's offer be a trick to disrupt the formation of the German government so Russia can get complete control of a unified German regime which would include the Soviet zone?" Both Gen. Lucius D. Clay, U. S. military governor in Germany, and U. S. Ambassador Robert D. Murphy, Tuesday expressed wariness over the offer. They have made it crystal clear they are going ahead with the creation of the new anti-Communist German republic.
A tremendous stride towards the rehabilitation of Western Europe would seem to have been made in the agreement to establish this government. The date for its inauguration has been set for July 15. The accord naturally ignores Russia, which occupies close to one-third of the old Reich.
Of course there's another way of looking at the Russian offer to lift the blockade. It could be the Soviet finds it is being hurt more than it is hurting the Western Allies by continuing the blockade. It won't be long before that point is cleared up.

Magnolia Petroleum Company and Humble Oil and Refining Company are other purchasers who have cut prices on low gravity crude in Northeast Texas this week.
E. R. Turner, president of Pan American, said Tuesday the price reduction would be effective Wednesday—in the Cayuga, Manziel, Merigale-Paul and Qulman fields.
The new posting for low gravity crude for the four fields is \$1.95 per barrel on oil below 20 gravity. There will be a two-cent per barrel differential upward to a top price of \$2.21 a barrel for 32 gravity oil and above.

LUBBOCK—(AP)—Two officers carried Richard W. McGee from the courtroom here, where he is on trial for murder.
The handcuffed, 34-year-old youth, charged with slaying a Lubbock grocery executive, was carried out Tuesday after a mild scuffle.
Last Friday he staged a wild outburst in the court and it took officers ten minutes to subdue him. McGee, forced to wear handcuffs since that outburst, earlier Tuesday told chief Deputy Sheriff George Eubank and Deputy Earl Horton he was "going to blow his top" if the handcuffs weren't removed.
The scuffle came immediately after the jury had left the court room late in the afternoon.
Judge Orders Removal
District Judge Dan Blair told Eubank to remove McGee.
When Eubank placed his hand on McGee's arm, the prisoner broke away. City Police Sergeant J. T. Alley grabbed him around the legs and Horton locked his arms around McGee's body. McGee gave up after a brief struggle. He was carried to the elevator, across the court yard and to his cell in the county jail.
McGee became quiet again on the way to the jail.
"If you will put me down I'll be a good boy and walk the rest of the way," he said. The officers carried him anyway.
McGee is charged with shooting R. L. Allston, 42, on July 7, 1948. Allston was the father of McGee's sweetheart.
Dr. Roy C. Sloan Tuesday testified McGee is insane and does "not know the difference between right and wrong."
Records of McGee's stay in mental hospitals were read.

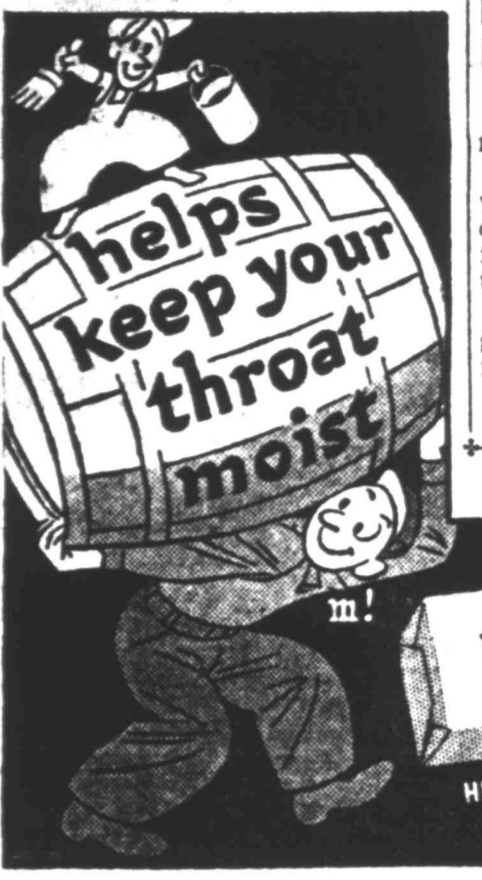

Midland County 4-H Clubbers Will Hear Details Of Contest

Midland County 4-H boys and girls will hear details of the 1949 Texas 4-H Electric Contest explained in a meeting at 2:30 p.m. Saturday. Records of all projects must be submitted to the county agent or home demonstration agent not later than September 1. Awards will be made in each of the 14 extension districts of Texas as follows: First place winner, boy or girl, \$60 cash; second place winner, boy or girl, \$45 cash; third place winner, boy or girl, \$25 cash; and fourth place winner, boy or girl, \$20 cash.

An award of \$50 cash will be made to the county 4-H Club fund in each extension service district judged to have carried out the best organized 4-H electrification activities program in 1949. Judging of all entries for the awards will be the responsibility of the Texas Extension Service. Electric service companies of Texas are sponsoring the contest. Parents of 4-H members also are urged to attend the meeting here.
