





# Should Have Been Explained

Has this country saved \$183,000,000 in the decision to cancel the super-carrier United States, or has it lost a vital component of its future defense forces? That is the biggest and least discussed question in all the storm that the cancellation stirred up. And it seems to us that most people would like to know as nearly as possible whether it was a good or bad move, and why.

In his letter of resignation, Navy Secretary Sullivan complained that Defense Secretary Johnson had not consuited him in the final decision. But it hardly seems possible that the Navy Went unheard in the matter. The car-Fier was first proposed in 1945. Since then the Navy must have had abundant opportunity to say all it had to say about the need for the giant vessel.

The Air Force likewise has had its chance to make a case against it. There has been talk about Air Force "pressure" behind the move to stop construction on the carrier. How sound was the reasoning behind this "pres-sure?" The country, we believe, would be more interested an the arguments than in the technique of presenting them.

Some members of Congress have complained that the President is obliged to spend the money that the legislature appropriates, and that he is exceeding his authority by refusing to do so in this case. But Congress hardly can argue at this late date that all its appropriations are wise and necessary.

There is nothing sacred about a congressional decision to spend a few hundred millions, if the spending is not needed. The important thing is whether Congress or the

Defense Department has more logic on its side.

The whole controversy reveals a type of thinking that is unhappily typical of Washington. It is thinking bounded by the confines of the District of Columbia. WASHINGTON -(AP)- Hundreds of thousands of landlords are filling cut forms needed to increase rentsbut that doesn't necessarily mean a general lifting of rent ceilings. This double announcement came over the weekend from federal rent

officials. They said: 1. At least 500,000 landlords already have taken out official forms to petition for a rent increase, and the government is printing an additional 400,000 application sheets to meet the demand.

2. The rush for such forms is due to the fact that, if an increase is granted to a landlord, it dates back to the time he filed his petition. However, each petition will be

The new rent control law directs federal officials to set ceilings that will reflect a fair net operating income for landlords. Housing Expediter Tighe Woods released his formula for determining such a fair income a week ago.







(1) Manpower at least equal to Russia's; (2) steelmaking capacity ten times greater; (3) petroleum production six times greater; (4) lead in science, invention and industrial skill "that cannot be measured in tons or cubic feet."

"In the presence of that combined strength in the resources it takes to wage war," Patterson said, "the autocrats in the Kremlin will see no prospect of victory and will not give their soldiers the words to march."

And he added: "The case for ratification of the North Atlantic Pact, I submit, is as simple as that. It is a pact to preserve peace."



AUSTIN - (AP) - Election law changes designed to result in honest reports of campaign expenditures and to eliminate "suspicion and guilt" in vote-counting were recommended to the Legislature

The recommendation came in a report of a committee named jointly by the House, Senate and governor to suggest changes in the election laws.

Two of several bills suggested by the committee were introduced in the Senate. One would raise the limit on campaign spending in races for U.S. senator and governor from \$10,000 to \$40,000 and other offices in about that propor-


