

Flogging Inquiry Dropped By Congress

WASHINGTON—(AP)—A congressional investigating group washed its hands Thursday of further inquiry into Alabama's hooded night-riders troubles.

After a brief hearing Wednesday, Rep. Byrnes (D-NY) said he had no plans for continuing an investigation into flogging incidents which already are under study by FBI agents and Alabama law enforcement authorities.

Byrnes is chairman of a House Judiciary Subcommittee, which heard testimony from three Alabama newspaper men Wednesday.

The newsmen witnesses related accounts of violence by hooded mobs. But they suggested that Congress let the home folks handle the situation.

NEW YORK—(AP)—Oh, I tell you New York is a wonderful town! It is not just a city, it is a world. It is so many people crowded here together to enjoy it.

It's really a terrible place to visit or die in, but a grand town to live in.

For here the poor man has courage, and fights for his rights. He's as good as a millionaire any day, and he'll stay up all night to tell you why. Yes, rich or poor, you're just another number here. And sometimes it's pleasant to wonder whether you're 8,753,341 or maybe 1,435,768. Who cares?

There is one thing sure: You can never be Mr. No. 1. Because nobody is big enough to be really important on this 394 island. You have to belong to it—it can never belong to you. This is a man's town, and it's cut for size. It has outgrown everybody who ever lived in it—and it's still growing.

People Growing
And the people who live in it are growing, too. The fat-voiced tourists come here and look around and shake their heads and leave again, saying "After all, New York is my America."

But New York City is America, and there is no town more American. Because here people are really working toward the kind of democracy the rest of the country reads about in high school civics books.

There are only a few cities in the world that are really cities—London for courage, Paris for loveliness, Calcutta for misery, Shanghai for sin, Rome for healing and hurt. Athens for blue tales in an hour of fear. And never an evening sun sinks down without my spirit wearing from the sight of some ugliness that dwells here, too, in men and buildings.

Keeton Will Be Dean Of Texas Law School

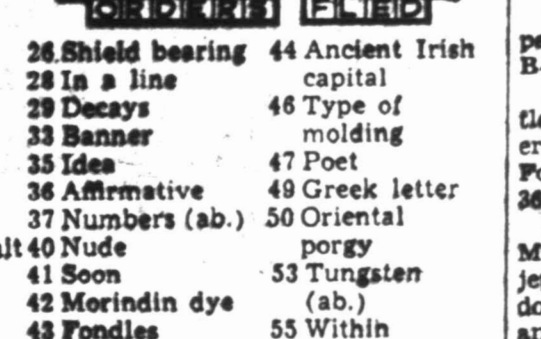

Public Works Shelf Stocked Against Possible Lean Years

WASHINGTON—As unemployment hangs around the 3,000,000 figure, doggedly refusing to drop, demands for an increase in government public works spending get louder and more insistent. Nobody in his right mind believes any more that leaf-raking or public works spending will cure a depression.

From this has grown some belief that if the construction industry can be stabilized, it will help avert slumps in other times. Another lesson learned from the last depression is that it takes time to get a construction program going. Public Works Administration had \$3,000,000,000 to spend on useful projects in the 1930's.

Church Of Christ Building Moved, To Build New One

The old Northside Church of Christ building was moved Wednesday from its former location at 800 West Tennessee Street to the corner of Lee and East Wall streets for use by a negro congregation of that faith.

The Northside Church, pastored by J. Woodie Holden, will meet in its educational building located at 708 West Tennessee Street, until completion of a new auditorium at the site of the old building.

New Structure Planned

Work is to begin on the new building within the week, church authorities said.

The old building, bought by the Church of Christ colored congregation, was moved Wednesday after the brick veneer had been removed. Plans call for the brick to be replaced in the future.

Built in 1928, the building has served the Northside people well during its 20 year history. Recent growth of the church however, made necessary additional space that the old building could not furnish.

Plans for the new building have been complete for several months and the delay was to allow time for the removal of the old building to a new site.

Vishinsky Declares Russians Forced Western Retreat

LONDON —(AP)— Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Y. Vishinsky disagreed sharply Thursday with Dean Acheson's analysis of the Paris Big Four meeting and declared Russian firmness forced a Western retreat.

Vishinsky said the agreements reached at Paris differed "seriously" from the original proposals put forward by Britain, France and the United States.

On the other hand, he added, after careful reading of the communiqué issued by the Big Four, "it is not difficult to see x x x the basic ideas of the proposals submitted by the Soviet delegation in the council of foreign ministers during the very first days of its work."

In a 4,200-word statement distributed here, Vishinsky differed with the U. S. secretary of State on the progress of the Marshall plan and whether it was Russia or the West who wanted to give the Germans more freedom.

Reds On Defensive

Acheson told a Washington news conference after his return from Paris that Russia had been put on the defensive in the struggle for Europe and was afraid to relax its iron grip on Eastern Germany because they knew they would no longer be able to control the German people if they did so.

Acheson said the reason for the strength of the West in the Paris session was "the progress that has been achieved in the restoration of Western Europe."

Vishinsky, taking a complete opposite view, said:

"I think that precisely the failure of the Marshall Plan should be regarded as one of the reasons for the departure of the three (Western) ministers at their original so-called 'firm policy'."

Vishinsky charged Acheson with a "groundless" assertion in saying the Russians were afraid to grant freedom to the Germans.

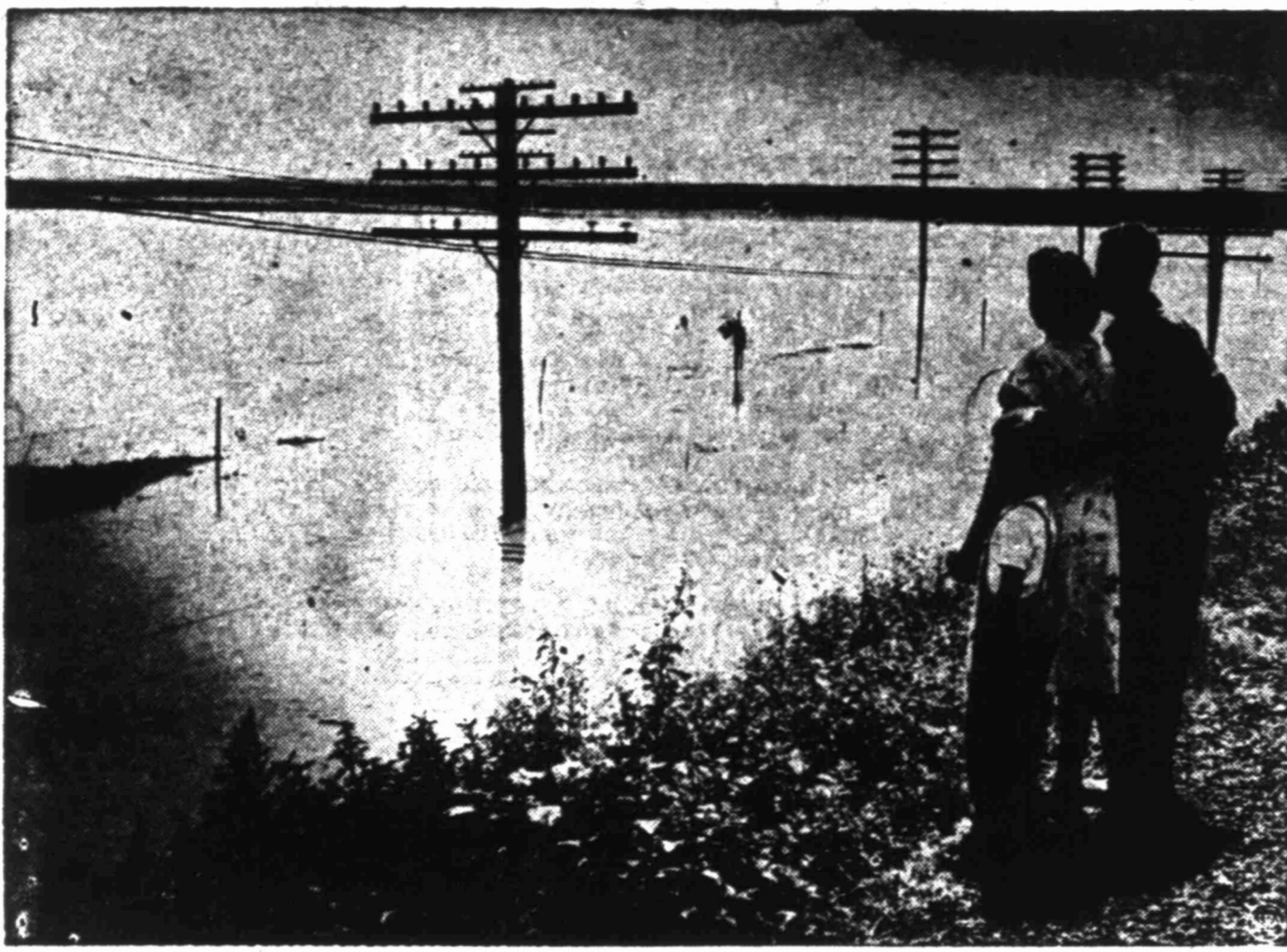
Asks Explanation

"How," he asked, "is one to explain the fact that both he and his Western colleagues resolutely objected to all the proposals of the Soviet delegation directed precisely at restoring the unity of Germany and giving the Germans freedom in their own affairs?"

The Soviet spokesman said the most important result of the Paris meeting was "the undoubted failure of the policy of splitting Germany and of aggravating international relations and the undoubted success of the policy of restoring the unity of Germany and of improving international relations for international cooperation."

"No matter how the three Western governments may try to deny this," he said, "the fact remains that the communiqué (issued by the four powers) x x x is drawn up in the spirit of the Soviet proposals."

Chinese Child Afforded Big U. S. Welcome

NEW YORK —(AP)— A crowd of 1,000 turned out at La Guardia field Wednesday night to welcome a six-year-old Chinese girl to her new country, and her new home.

Among them was the child's new foster father-to-be Frank J. Chisari, a 24-year-old radio technician. He wept as he hugged and kissed the girl, known only as Ann.

Four years ago when Chisari was a GI in Kunming, China, he found the girl wounded beside the body of her mother. He took care of her, nursed her back to health.

For a long time, Chisari had been fighting to get the girl to this country. Learning of his efforts, the New York Daily News sent a reporter and photographer to get her.

Cheer Goes Up

As they landed at the end of the 12,000-mile flight, a loud cheer went up from the crowd, which had waited for hours at the field. They included members of a Chinese American Legion post.

The State Department later gave the child special consideration to get in under the Chinese immigration quota.

Ann was little more than a baby when Chisari left her in a Lutheran orphanage in China. But when he picked her up Wednesday she threw her arms around his neck.

Chisari and his wife, Antoinette, 25, have two other children, a girl the same age as Ann and a boy two and a half. He said he planned to bring up Ann as his own daughter in a strictly "American way."

Presidio Is State's Hot Spot With 104

Few clouds were in Texas Thursday to blunt the rays of the hot sun.

Skies were clear except along the Gulf and in the San Antonio and Austin areas.

However, the weather bureau predicted some local thundershowers in West Texas Thursday afternoon and evening, and in East Texas Friday.

Temperatures climbed as high as 104 at Presidio Wednesday and rainfall was negligible. Salt flats reported 28 of an inch and El Paso 0.8. Thursday morning's low temperature was 62 at Guadalupe Pass and Marfa.

Reds Block Trucks At Gates Of Berlin

BERLIN —(AP)— German police Thursday reported Soviet sentries have refused to let some 80 West German truck cargoes enter Berlin in the last 24 hours because of alleged irregularities in travel papers.

The Russians, however, have not completely stopped incoming trucks. Several dozen were allowed to go through this morning.

The Russians claimed that the trucks required a Soviet signature underneath the Soviet stamp which was put on their travel orders when they crossed into the Soviet Zone at Helmstedt.

The 80 halted trucks were advised by Soviet guards to obtain a clearance signature at the Soviet Kommandatura at Paknow, after which they would be allowed to proceed to Berlin.

A British official said one truck already had completed and had been allowed to complete its journey to the city.

West Berlin's rail system is still idle but the Russian-directed Reichsbahn said it hoped to resume service tomorrow.

Inspection teams have finished a checkover of the system, stalled by five weeks of strike and the power has been turned on.

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Most Of Holiday Mishaps Expected On Country Roads

AUSTIN —(AP)— The Texas Highway Patrol is expecting most fatal traffic accidents during the July 4 weekend to take place on rural roads and highways.

"Twenty-two of the 27 persons killed from Saturday through Monday are expected to be victims of accidents on rural roads and highways," said Homer Garrison, director of the Department of Public Safety.

"Many of these accidents will involve only one car which runs off the road or hits a bridge head or other fixed object," he said. "Many of the drivers will be driving too fast for common sense. Several of them will have been drinking. A few of the victims will be pedestrians who, either drunk or sober, stagger out into the path of traffic."

Garrison said the maximum strength of the patrol would be on duty. He estimates the patrolmen would hand out a record number of tickets for speeding, reckless driving and drunken driving from Saturday through Monday.

Officers Lose Trap After Shrubs Uprooted

KANSAS CITY —(AP)— Police have lost one of their favorite speed-trap hideouts here—parkway shrubbery in a 20-mile-an-hour zone.

They jumped out from behind it and stopped John Warrington, park maintenance superintendent.

Warrington told them if they didn't stop hiding behind it he was going to have the shrubbery cut down.

Wednesday it was uprooted. Park Supt. J. V. Lewis gave this explanation:

"A traffic hazard."

WICHITA FALLS —(AP)— James Richard Rogers, 32, Fort Worth, was sentenced to 35 years in prison on a robbery by assault indictment.

The sentence was returned Wednesday in 89th District Court. It will run concurrent with three sentences totaling 35 years Rogers received in Tarrant County on similar charges.

Rogers was charged with robbing W. L. Graves, Byers banker, of \$1,700 last April 1 in an alley behind the Kemp Hotel in Wichita Falls. He was arrested in Seymour less than 24 hours after the robbery.

TEMPLE —(AP)— The State Medical Association's house of delegates will study possible sites for a new branch of the University of Texas School of Medicine.

Dr. G. V. Brindley, president of the association, said Wednesday he would call the house of delegates to meet on the matter as soon as Governor Jester signs an appropriation bill for the school.

San Antonio, Dallas, and Temple gave bids for the school.

The bill authorizing the legislature provides that the house of delegates of the state medical association shall study possible sites and make recommendations to the board of regents of the University of Texas.

Club officers were not named in the book.

CIO Chiefs Glumly Realize T-H Act To Stay Until 1950

WASHINGTON (AP)—CIO officials, stunned by the Senate's approval of anti-strike injunctions Wednesday, resigned themselves to keeping the Taft-Hartley Act for two more years.

With Truman forces deep in gloom, the Senate tackled the rest of Senator Robert A. Taft's labor program after adopting his plan for setting "national emergency" strikes in a hectic session Tuesday.

The Ohio Republican predicted a similar victory for the rest of his program, which is designed to keep the "essentials" of the Taft-Hartley act while making a number of changes.

Arthur Goldberg, general counsel of the CIO, said: "We might as well face the fact that we have the Taft-Hartley Act until after the 1950 elections."

He said the senate's crucial decision on emergency injunctions apparently forestalls adoption of the rest of the Taft bill. And he said that if Taft's ideas are approved by the Senate and House, the bill "would have to be vetoed."

He would leave the present law intact. An AFL spokesman said only that the Senate's action "is a setback but not a defeat in our long-run drive to get the Taft-Hartley act repealed."

He was not optimistic over action this year, however. Senator Lucas of Illinois, the Democratic leader of the senate, told a reporter the outlook "doesn't look too bright" in view of what happened Tuesday.

He meant the 50-to-40 vote in favor of the Taft plan to delay critical strikes by Taft-Hartley style injunctions or government seizure of plants, or both.

Senator Morse (R-Ore) said the action made the labor bill so "unworkable and anti-labor" that any further efforts to improve it would be "a waste of time."

An influential Democratic Senate official told reporters privately he is positive the final measure emerging from congress will be vetoed.

Lucas Wednesday was seeking to dispose of the labor debate quickly. Overnight he tried to get unanimous senate agreement to vote by 2 p. m. Thursday on the "Taft substitute" for the entire administration labor bill except the national emergency provision.

When he reached the sty he found the pig still conscious with the two thieves unconscious beside him. They had been knocked out by their own chloroform.

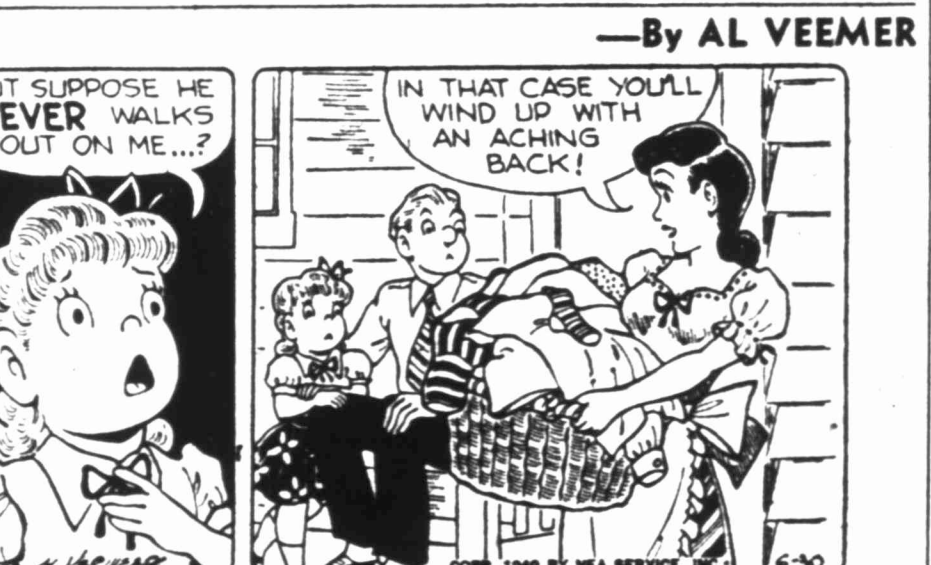
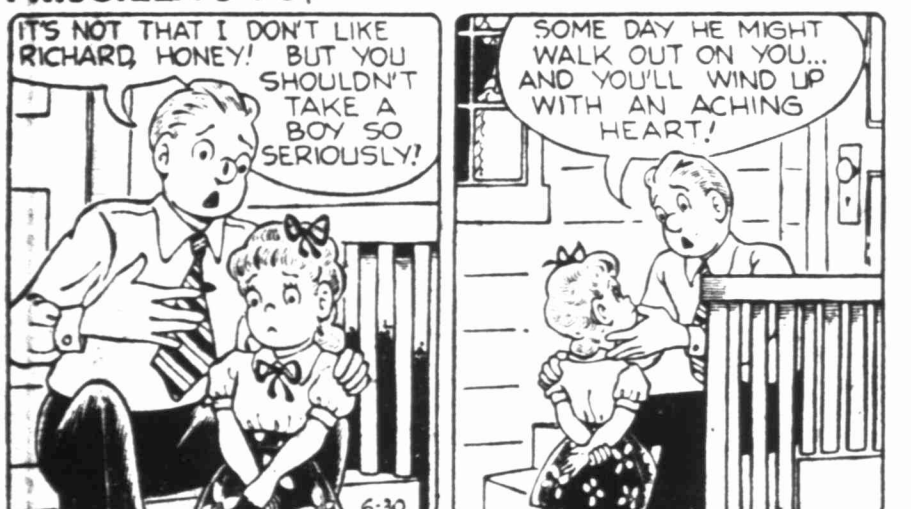
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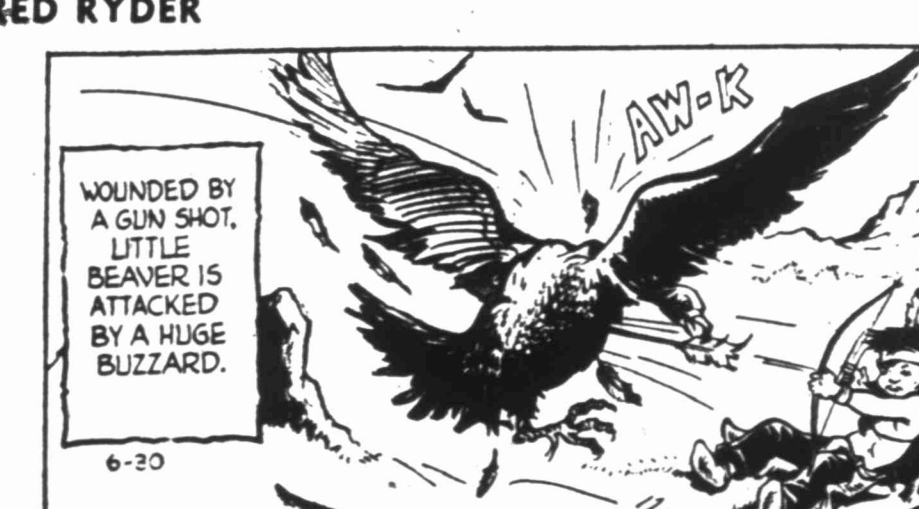
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
