## Steel Union Accepts Truce Plan

### Benedum Spread By Dual-Pay Producer

Dual completion from the Ellenburger for a three-quarter mile southwest extension and from the Fusselman section of the Silurian for more than a two mile spread to the southwest is planned at Warren Wright and L. T. Lohman No. 1 C. W. Chancellor, exploration in the Benedum multi-pay field of East-Central Upson County.

This venture, located 660 feet from north and east lines of the southeast quarter of section 5, A. W. Daugherty survey, has proven for production from both formations.

An application has been filed with the Texas Railroad Commission for a permit to dually complete. Hearing on the application has been set for July 15 at Austin.

### Cabot Moves Limits Of Tucker Southeast

Production from the Waddell formation of the Simpson in the Tucker field of southeast Crane County has been extended southeast one location to Cabot Carbon Company No. 1 State of Texas, offset to the pool, 800 feet from northeast and 1,002 feet from southeast lines of section 26, block 1, H-2-C survey.

A 26-minute drillstem test of that formation showed gas in one and one-half minutes, mud in seven minutes and oil in nine minutes. A steady stream of oil flowed to the 17 minutes, with no gauges or estimates being taken.

Open flowing bottom hole pressure was 1,800 pounds and shut-in pressure after 15 minutes was 2,400 pounds. While taking bottom hole pressure survey, the drill pipe was loaded to 900 feet. No water has developed.

### Gulf Completes Deep Well In Shafter Lake

Gulf Oil Corporation has completed its No. 3-E-QQ Texas in the Shafter Lake-Ellenburger pool of North-Central Andrews County for 878 barrels of 41.9-gravity oil per day.

The potential test was made flowing 16 hours through a one-quarter-inch choke, showing gas-oil ratio 199-1 and no water. The open hole pay formation at 11,725-11,820 feet had been acidized with 1,000 gallons.

### Midland Wildcat To Whiptock By Fish

Drilling by fish is planned for the Wildcat and Harper, Inc. No. 1 TXL. Central Midland wildcat projected to 13,800 feet to explore the Ellenburger.

It had lost drillpipe and some fishing tools on total depth 4,430 feet. A cement plug has been set from 4,100 feet to 4,275 feet. After cement cures, a whipstock is to be set, and drilling will continue in a side-track hole.

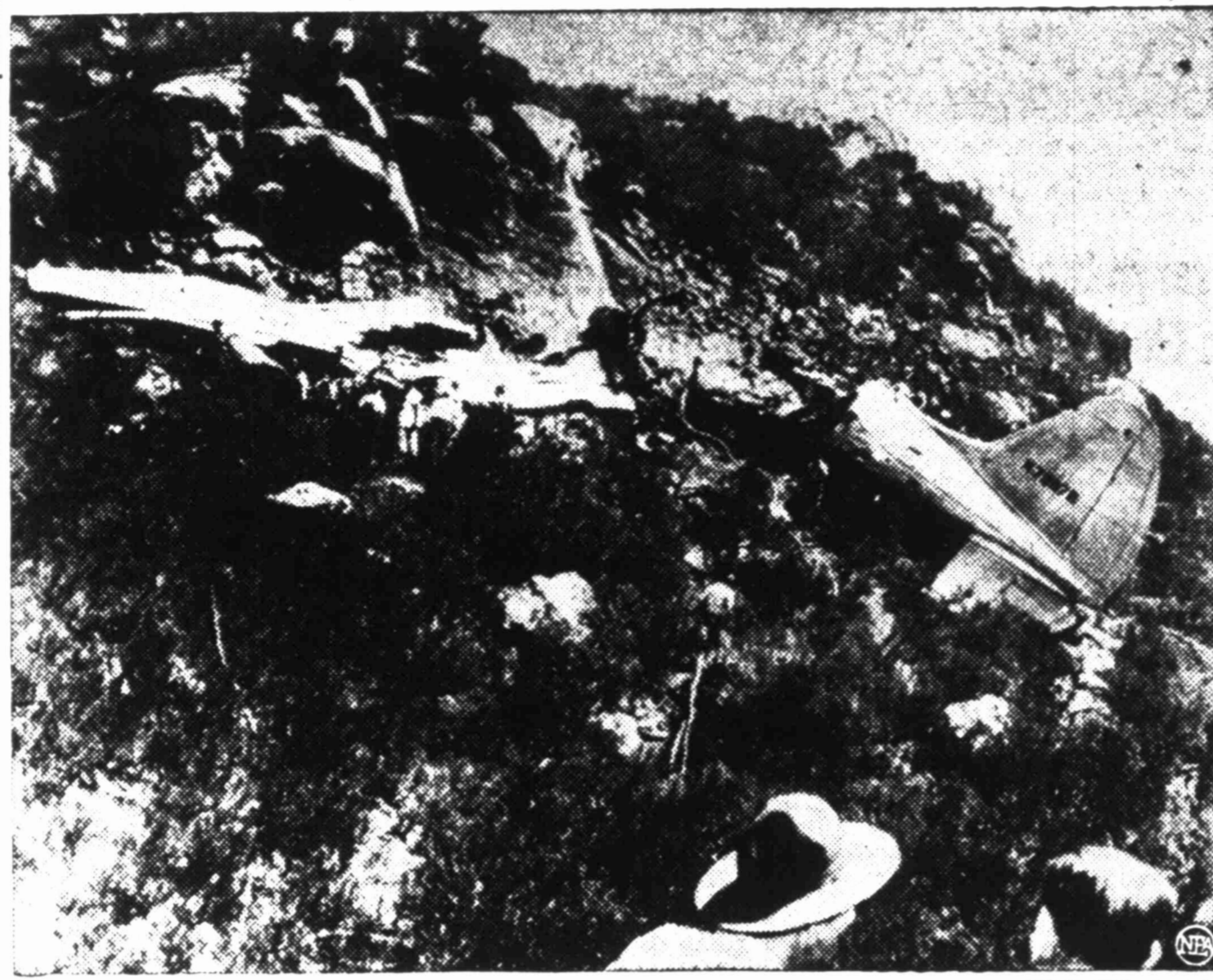

Specially coated paper wipers sold in a handy matchbook cover container can be tucked in a purse to go wherever your eyeglasses go. Soft chamois cloth wipers will remove smudges but heavy or fuzzy cloth is apt to leave lint or beclouding specks on your glasses.

Most sunglasses come in a case. If yours didn't—buy one! Even the most inexpensive eyeglass case will protect your sunglasses from sight-distorting blurs and scratches.

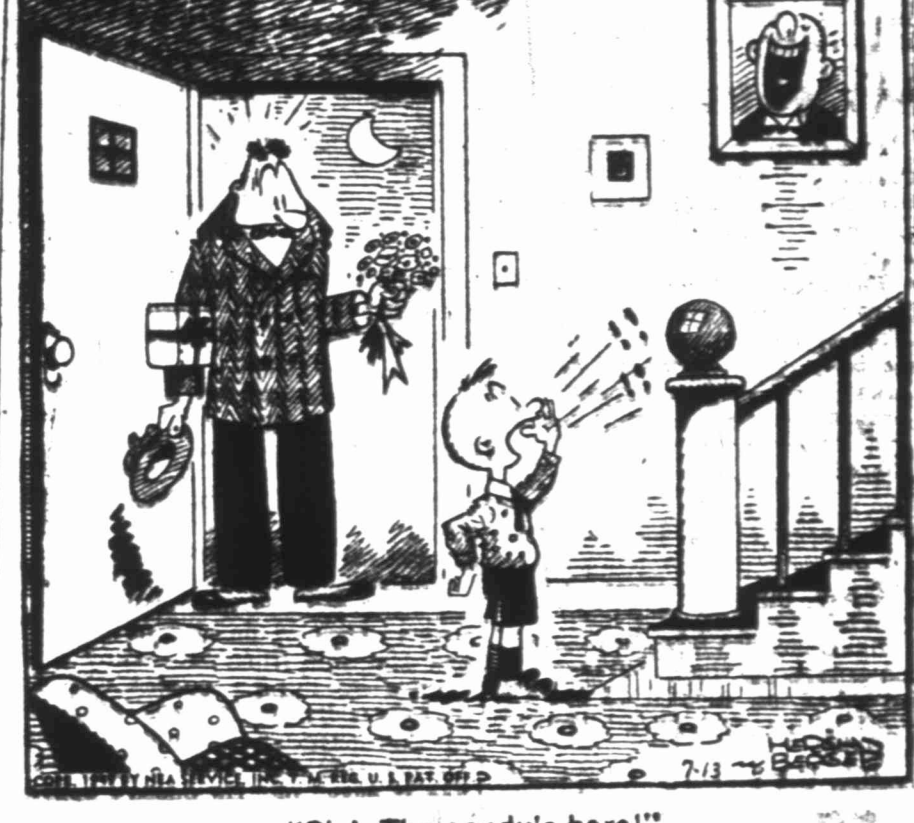

THE DOCTOR SAYS Sunstroke, Heat Exhaustion Dangerous, But Easily Avoided

Both sunstroke and heat exhaustion are serious conditions. It is far better to prevent than to treat them. All that is necessary is to avoid exposure.

Heat exhaustion, the principal symptoms are dizziness, excessive sweating, decrease in the amount of urine, a feeling of great weakness, paleness and a rapid pulse rate and breathing rate.

Heat exhaustion tends to come on much more slowly than sunstroke; headache, loss of appetite, constipation and muscular weakness may precede for several days the development of characteristic symptoms.

## Two Rival World Government Plans Differ Over UN; One Says Weak, One Says Okay



THE UNITED NATIONS, says the United World Federalists, should be strengthened to keep the peace.

**NEW YORK—(NEA)—**The people of 22 states have expressed their desire for some form of world government, either in formal votes through the ballot or in formal action by their legislators. The people of two states, through their legislators, have rejected the idea.

The 22 states that have formally approved world government contain more than 51 of the nation's 132 million inhabitants (1940 census) and the two states that have rejected it—New Mexico and Vermont—contain less than 900,000. Resolutions are awaiting action in Delaware, Pennsylvania and Wisconsin, with more than 13,000,000 inhabitants, and are to be introduced in Ohio with another 7,000,000.

Connecticut, Maryland, New Jersey, North Carolina and Tennessee have adopted two different types of approval. The people of Massachusetts voted nine to one, in 1946, and the people of Connecticut almost 12 to one, in 1948, in official referenda. The other actions were taken by legislators.

In every case, approval was given to the general idea of world government, and not to a specific plan which gave enemies a chance to pick flaws and play one group against another. But the fact remains that in the 24 states that have considered the matter, 22 have acted favorably and only two have positively rejected the idea.

**What For?**

What did the voters and the legislators of the states think they were voting for? There is no sure way of knowing. But two principal plans have been publicized widely for some time now, and it must be for the general philosophy of one of those plans that the people expressed their acceptance.

One is the Federal Union Plan, first produced by Clarence Streit in three lectures at Swarthmore

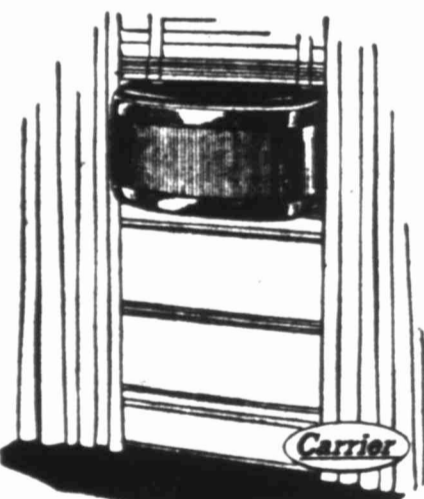

### Democratic Bloc Threatens Fight On Brannan Farm Plan

**WASHINGTON—(AP)—**A rebellion broke out in Democratic ranks Wednesday against the Administration-supported farm bill.

This threatened to defeat even a three-crop trial run for the controversial Brannan plan of production payments or subsidies to support farm prices.

Rep. Gore (D-Tenn.), usually an Administration supporter, announced a bi-partisan group and some farm leaders are drawing a substitute bill to continue the present farm program in 1950.

Gore's bill would reject the Brannan production payment plan entirely and set aside the Alken Law enacted by the Republican-controlled 80th Congress and scheduled to become effective next year.

Gore disputed claims of overwhelming Democratic support for the Brannan plan trial run and predicted a bi-partisan group will ram through his substitute bill keeping the "time-tested" present law.

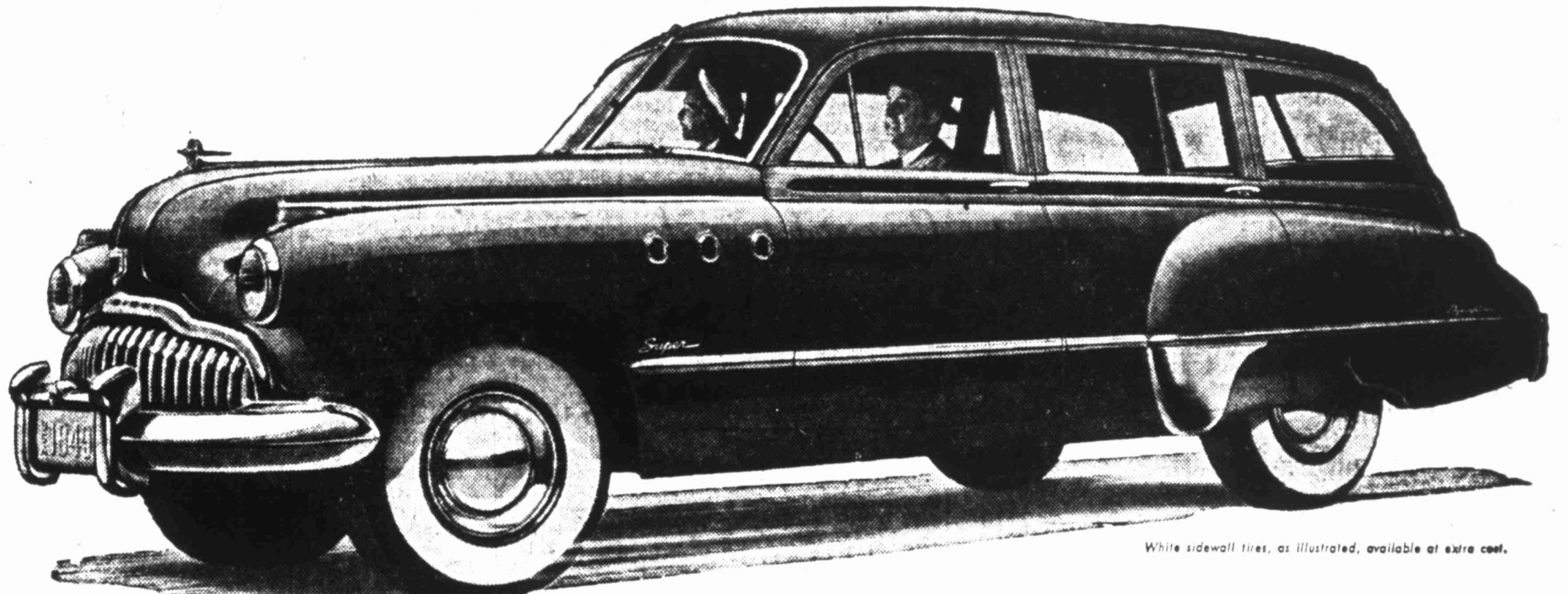

**PETER EDSON'S Washington News Notebook**

**Unification Already Covers Plenty; Urge More Understandable Budget**

WASHINGTON (NEA)—Unification finally has arrived. Army, Navy and Air Force personnel will hereafter all wear the same kind of underwear. Also, they'll all drink the same kind of coffee. Navy is now roasting coffee beans for all three services at its Brooklyn, N. Y., plant. These are just two of the many odd reforms resulting from merger and reorganization of the armed services. Among others, all officers now receive the same sized commissions. Previously there were 48 different forms. They ranged from a small sheet for ensigns and second lieutenants, up to big parchment jobs for generals and admirals. Now they all get the handy second lieutenant's size.

**'Largest' Budget Advocated**  
Bureau of the Budget is urging issuance of a simplified, 30-page budget summary next January. The idea is to toll down the 1,400-page budget into such simple terms that the average citizen will be able to understand it. Budget Director Frank Pace also is suggesting that President Truman make a major address on the budget, later this summer. The President usually issues a budget review in August, after all appropriation bills passed by the Congress have been studied and added up. With a \$1,800,000,000 deficit staring him in the face for the year ending June 30, the President will have more to talk about than usual.

**Labor Law Holds Few Laughs**  
Senate debate on the Taft labor law was in such dead seriousness that it produced only a couple of chuckles. At one point Vice President Barkley announced: "The question is on agreeing to the substitute offered by the senator from Ohio for titles I, II and IV. Those in favor will vote 'aye.'" There was no response. "Those opposed will vote 'no,'" said Barkley. There was still no response. So Barkley announced: "The substitute not having been voted on, therefore it is a tie, and the substitute is rejected." Everybody laughed, recognizing the gag, and Barkley later officially

corrected his own ruling, to set the record straight. But when the Taft amendments finally were passed, Barkley announced: "All that now remains of the original Taft-Hartley repeal act are the first nine lines." **High Cost Of Matrimony**  
West Virginia Senator Matthew Neely, who can shake his head harder, wave his arms more wildly and quote more poetry than any other old-fashioned orator in Congress, told this one: "J. P. Morgan once became interested in a witty tramp and told him that if he would come to the Morgan banking office every Monday morning, he would be given \$5. The tramp never failed to make his appearance at the appointed time. But eventually Morgan decided to reduce the weekly donation. Thereupon he instructed his secretary to explain to the tramp that the reduction was necessitated by the fact that one of the great financiers' daughters was to be married soon and that her father considered it his duty to give the young lady some valuable wedding presents. The clerk obeyed instructions to the letter.

"The tramp, overwhelmed with disappointment and despair, said: 'I suppose I had to submit to this highway robbery. But please tell Mr. Morgan I hope that he will not marry off any more of his daughters at my expense.'" **Too-Rapid Recovery**  
Marshall Plan troubles now before the U. S. Congress and the heads of European governments are in part due to the fact that recovery has been faster than anticipated. The change from a sellers' to a buyers' market in Europe was not expected before 1951. Since it has arrived now, it must be solved now. How to meet this changed situation will require as much study and planning as it took to put the Marshall Plan into operation.

Some American experts are inclined to believe that the solutions to the new problem lie largely in what the European countries themselves do to break down their own

trade barriers, reform their currency and foreign exchange arrangements, modernize their own industrial methods and lower their costs of production so as to sell in the competitive world market. **Cloudy Forecast**  
Secretary of State Dean Acheson, when asked a press-conference question to which he did not know the answer, was handed an aide-memoire—piece of paper, to you—an assistant. The secretary studied the document for a moment then cracked: "The crystal ball at which I gaze is not clear."

**Still Plenty Of Planes**  
Endorsement of the 48-group Air Force plan budget by Secretary Stuart Symington and Gen. Hoyt Vandenberg doesn't mean that the 70-group idea has been abandoned. The 48 groups would divide into 14 medium and heavy bomber groups, 10 reconnaissance groups and 24 regular Air Force fighter groups. But the National Guard would have 27 additional groups of fighters. That would make 75 groups in all. Of the 14 bomber groups, four would have B-36's, 10 B-29's or their successors—the B-50 and B-54. Thirty planes make the average bomber group and 75 the fighter group. At the same time the government-sponsored English language Prague News Letter threatened action against Archbishop Josef Beran and his Catholic hierarchy for alleged anti-state activities.

**Hallanan Warns Of Perils Of Government Growth At Pipe Line Dedication**

CUSHING, OKLA.—"America has little to fear from its business giants, as compared to the very real and imminent peril that it faces from the giant of government growth," Walter S. Hallanan, of Pittsburgh, Pa., chairman of the National Petroleum Council, declared here Wednesday.

The government, he said, now owns one-fourth of the land in the continental United States, is the largest employer in the world with a payroll of six billion dollars a year, and "provides benefits, subsidies and hand-outs in such abundance that one out of every six adult Americans receives some form of government payment regularly from Washington."

**Pipe Lines Dedicated**  
Speaking at the dedication of the Basin and Ozark Pipe Line Systems, the Petroleum Council head said the enormous demands of the American people for services could be met only through integration of resources, talent and effort. "American corporations have grown big because there were big jobs to be done," he declared.

Tracing the expansion of the American economy from the time when public needs were supplied by the corner grocer, the livery stable proprietor and a horde of other individuals and small business enterprises, Hallanan said that in the last few decades the demand for "services" had reached astronomical proportions. "These enormous demands could not have been supplied by individual effort," he declared. "If we had clung to the methods of the kerosene age, America would have been stalled on dead center. As our economy expanded, it became necessary for individuals to integrate their capital and their

effort. This represented free competitive enterprise. This, he said, had brought improved petroleum products to consumers at reasonable prices.

**Cities Oklahoma's Progress**  
Speaking of the rapidly with which Oklahoma's natural resources have been developed, the speaker said, "More progress has been made here in forty years than any Socialistic state has ever made or ever will make in forty centuries."

The Petroleum Council chairman said that the pipe line represents a vital link in the nation's oil economy, assuring the producer of a ready market for his oil and giving the public the benefit of cheap transportation. He said that the petroleum industry's pipe line system represents an investment of two and three-quarter billion dollars and covers a distance of 150,000 miles. "This labyrinth of pipe lines," he said, "is constantly being expanded to meet the growing demands of the American public, as is shown by the fact that 15,000 miles of petroleum pipe lines were completed and put into service last year."

Before the dare-devil experts go to work the neighborhood will be cleared, subway trains will be diverted and gas will be cut off in the area.

Optimistic workmen went ahead Wednesday putting new glass in basement windows of the hospital, less than 50 feet from the bomb.

Or that a rare rose-breasted tree scratcher doesn't drop into the back yard with a broken wing. Then the weekend is spent nursing same back to health with toothpick splints and a steady diet of methelgin which the writer just happened to be brewing against the day.

It's a poor writer who can't acquire all the hummingbirds in his native state, and what's more, tame them so well that they crawl all over him in love and affection.

**Find The Thing**  
If he has a house pet, it has a cute name (I read about someone who had twin cats named Shall and Will because no one could tell the difference between them) and is forever alerting him to the nature-planned family of golden-tipped bald eagles who are saved just in time.

When nature-writers go for walks, they invariably stumble over whole treasures of rare orchids that nobody believed could possibly grow in northern New Hampshire. They stagger home with rucksacks (nature-writing for knapsacks) full of the rarest wild flowers which they successfully transplant into their own north 40's.

All this stuff goes right into the diary, along with old country recipes for brewing delicious nostrums out of old skunk cabbages and poison sumac, which a certain tribe of Indians, now extinct, maintained gave immortality to man.

**Don't Get Hope High**  
This makes interesting reading, and it rather stimulates one to go out and explore one's own back yard and nearby glades. I'm warning you, don't get your hopes up too high.

There was a rumor about a pair of cardinals, and I know someone who swears he saw a bluebird. Me, I have spotted one blue jay, and it was a great thrill. Not even a little wren.

I heard that humming birds were attracted by an herb called bee-balm. At considerable personal expense, I acquired several large hummers of same, and sat down on the terrace to watch for the arrival of humming birds. When they didn't, I read up some more and learned they'd go for sugar-water in shallow containers. Two pounds of sugar later, I can say that either I don't have a bird thumb, or they don't like our yard.

### Doctors Meet To Discuss Location Of Medical School

AUSTIN —(P)— Members of the Texas State Medical Association's House of Delegates met here at 10 a. m. Wednesday to study the question of where the new medical branch of the University of Texas should be located.

The House of Delegates, which has 177 members, will act only in an advisory capacity to the University Board of Regents. The regents are directed in a bill enacted by the 51st Legislature to select the site and establish the new school for which \$1,000,000 was appropriated.

Dr. Milford O. Rouse of Dallas, chairman of the House of Delegates' Council on Medical Education, presented results of a survey of facilities offered by Dallas, San Antonio and Temple.

These three cities waged strong battles to secure legislative favor during the session ended last week.

Dallas proposed a merger of the Southwestern Medical College with the new state school. San Antonio offered a surplus Army arsenal. Temple suggested the state take over the surplus McCloskey General Hospital there.

The university regents will hold a special meeting here Thursday to hear bids of all cities interested in securing the medical school.

### Big Spring, Odessa Approve Creation Of Water District

BIG SPRING —(P)— Big Spring and Odessa approved Tuesday a Colorado River Municipal Water District authorized by the 51st Legislature.

Big Spring voters approved the district 522-31, and Odessa gave it 365 votes to 16.

The next step is for the cities to name a board of eight directors. The board will look in to the possibility of impounding a lake on the upper Colorado, 25 miles northeast of here.

The board also will seek transfer of water appropriations already secured for the project to the district.

Preliminary surveys indicate a lake capable of supplying the two cities with 30,000,000 gallons of water a day could be impounded in Southwest Scurry County.

The district could finance an \$8,000,000 outlay by revenue bonds. Subject to approval of the cities, supporting tax bonds could be floated.

The eastern timber wolf once ranged east throughout the Atlantic states as far south as Georgia.

### Anti-Communist Union Planned By Chiang And Quirino Is Far Short Of Pacific Pact

As the cold war grips East Asia, it is only natural that political leaders there should get together on how to stop the spread of communism.

This is one reason, but by no

means the only reason, that the "Korea stands ready to join." Chiang Kai-Shek and President Elpidio Quirino of the Philippines have met and agreed to form an anti-Communist union of countries in the Western Pacific. It could serve a variety of other purposes.

Before we go into these, here are the salient facts about the proposed union:

It is far short of the Pacific Pact. Quirino and others called for last Winter when the Atlantic Pact was announced. It does not mention the military aid necessary to give it teeth, but could set up an organization capable of being converted to handle such aid if and when the United States gets around to it.

Korea Is Ready  
President Syngman Rhee of South Korea already has said "Korea stands ready to join." While he was saying this, his envoy to the United Nations was asking permission to raise the Southern Korean armed force from 100,000 to 400,000 men.

In Washington, the State Department says it views such movements as the proposed Pacific union "with sympathy" but stands on Secretary Acheson's earlier statement that a Pacific Pact at this time would be premature.

Getting the United States as a member is a prime objective of the union. Australia, New Zealand, Siam, Indonesia, and Burma also will be sought as members. Japan is not considered eligible now, being technically at war with all the proposed members. Gen. Douglas MacArthur has said nothing publicly either to encourage or discourage the idea of the union.

However Japan is the scene of growing Communist activity. The supreme commander is a personal friend of Quirino and recently took occasion, according to one correspondent, to send private greetings to Chiang just before Chiang went to the Philippines to confer with Quirino.

To Prolong Setup  
A dispatch to the Associated Press from Hongkong indicates that Chiang may be promoting the Pacific union from his "retirement" as another way of prolonging his refugee government in Canton as the recognized government of Nationalist China.

This dispatch, quoting competent but not otherwise identified observers, says the news already has given Canton a "shot in the arm."

"What the Nationalists would like, of course, would be an outbreak of war between the United States and Russia," says the dispatch. "Since this appears unlikely, the next best thing would be some sort of common anti-Communist front among Asiatic nations which would be a big moral if not a substantial boost to the Kuomintang position."

### Shivers May Receive Oath At Farm Home In Southeast Texas

AUSTIN —(P)— Texas' new governor, Allan Shivers, may take the oath of office Saturday morning at his farm home, Magnolia Hills.

He said Tuesday that was his preference in the matter. He was unable to make official announcement of the time or place of his induction. He said details remained to be worked out, and he wished to stay out of the limelight while Texas still mourned the death of Beauford H. Jester.

Presumably the only hitch to holding the induction ceremonies for Shivers at the 103-year-old homestead near the Southeast Texas community of Woodville was the problem of setting up radio broadcasting facilities.

Announcement Due Thursday  
"I'd like to have it there so my children and my mother and the folks who have known us down there all our lives wouldn't have to come to Austin in this terrific heat," said Shivers.

His mother, Mrs. R. A. Shivers, resides in Port Arthur, slightly more than 60 miles from Woodville. The Shivers children, Shary, Allan Jr., and Marialice, have been at the farm since the 51st Legislature adjourned last week.

Should the swearing-in ceremonies be held at Woodville, it is believed District Judge Clyde Smith will administer the oath.

Shivers said a definite announcement of his plans probably would be made Thursday morning.

### Engineers Map Plans For Pecos Watershed

DALLAS —(P)— Army Engineers polished plans for development of the Pecos River watershed in a meeting here. The plans will be submitted to Congress, possibly at the next session.

Paul A. Wilson, chief of the engineer division at Albuquerque, N. M.; R. G. McGlone, chief of the Dallas office, and R. C. Baird, chief of the Civil Works Branch of the division office, met here Tuesday.

McGlone said the plans never have been made public but said they include flood control, conservation, power and irrigation.
