Major North Snyder Extension Indicated

An extension of slightly more than one mile to the south and east for the North Snyder-Canyon field of North-Central Scurry County has been indicated at W. A. Moncrief of Fort Worth, No. 1 C. W. Buckabee.

This venture, located 660 feet from north and east lines of the northwest quarter of section 160, block 2, H&TC survey, is about four miles north of the town of Snyder.

It topped the Canyon lime reef at 6,656 feet, and topped the pay section in that horizon at 6,663 feet. Elevation is 2,417 feet.

Samples Show Oil
According to the correlation of some geologists this venture should have at least 250 feet of section in the Canyon above the water table.

The project has reached 6,690 feet in line and was temporarily shutdown for rig repairs. Samples from the pay so far penetrated indicate the prospector will make an oil well and be completed as a major extension to the field.

Operator was expected to drill to about 6,735 feet before stopping to run a drillstem test on the pay section.

Canyon Wildcat Set In C-N Scurry Area

Progress Petroleum Company of Texas of Houston, and others, have filed an application with the Railroad Commission of Texas for a permit to drill a 7,600-foot wildcat in Central-South Scurry County, 12 miles north of Snyder.

This venture, 660 feet from east and 467 feet from south lines of section 503, block 97, H&TC survey, is to be the company's No. 1 E. C. Carden. It is two miles north of the nearest drilling well on the north side of the North Snyder field.

Using rotary tools, the project will start immediately. The projected depth should test into the Canyon lime section of the Pennsylvania.

Garza Venture Will Test Upper Permian

Rogers Brothers and Stewart, of Wichita Falls, and others, have scheduled their No. 1 E. M. Washburn and others, as a 3,300-foot wildcat to test the upper Permian in Central-South Scurry County, just north of the Garza County line.

It is 330 feet from east and south lines of the North Snyder field, section 3, block D-15, WTRR survey, and 20 miles north of Post. Drilling is slated to begin immediately with rotary tools.

Tide Water Venture High On Canyon Reef

Tide Water Associated Oil Company No. 2 R. H. House, on the southeast side of the south extension to the North Snyder field, and 1,867 feet from west and 467 feet from south lines of section 384, block 97, H&TC survey, had reached 6,415 feet in the Canyon reef and was coring ahead.

This venture topped the reef at 6,385 feet, with an elevation of 2,448 feet. That makes it the highest well on the top of the reef in the south end of the field.

It is 19 feet high to Sunray Oil Corporation No. 3 Brown, a completed producer one-location to the southwest.

The project will core through the Canyon pay before it undertakes to complete as an oil well.

Scurry Prospect Is Flowing To Complete

King, Warren & Dye No. 1 Wren, on the south side of the North Snyder field, and 460 feet from north and 660 feet from east lines of tract 12, section 20, J. P. Smith survey, is taking potential test to complete.

The section at 6,520-6,730 feet in the Canyon reef, has flowed at the rate of 40 barrels of oil per hour natural during eight hours on a preliminary test.

The same operators have started drilling on their No. 2 Wren, to be one location south of the No. 1 Wren. The new project is 660 feet from east and 1,757 feet from north lines of tract 12, section 20, J. P. Smith survey.

It had progressed under 500 feet on its way to about 6,800 feet to try for production in the Canyon reef.

Humble No. 2 Permian To Test Canyon Reef

Humble Oil & Refining Company No. 2 L. N. Permian is to be a 7,000-foot exploration to test the Canyon reef on the northwest side of the North Snyder field.

It is located 1,860 feet from north and 660 feet from east lines of section 438, block 97, H&TC survey. Drilling is to start at once.

It is one location south of the same company's No. 1 Permian, the farthest out northwest well in the North Snyder field.

14,805,000 Bales Set As Cotton Crop Estimate

WASHINGTON—(P)—The Agriculture Department Monday forecast this year's cotton crop at 14,805,000 bales of 500 pounds gross weight each as of August 1.

This estimate compares with 14,868,000 bales produced last year, and with a 10-year (1938-47) average of 11,306,000 bales.

Being larger than prospective market requirements, the crop foreshadowed a return to prewar production controls for the 1950 crop. Supplementing this year's crop is a carryover surplus of about 5,800,000 bales from previous years' crops, a large part of which is held by the department under price support programs.

The yield of lint cotton per acre was indicated at 27.4 pounds, compared with 31.1 pounds last year and 25.4 for the 10-year average. The condition of the crop on August 1 was reported at 80 per cent of normal compared with 85 a year ago and 75 for the 10-year average.

In an accompanying report, the Census Bureau said 297,843 running bales of this year's crop had been ginned prior to August 1. This compared with 238,972 ginned to the same date last year and 193,638 year before last.

Boll Weevils On Rampage
The indicated crop is 0.4 per cent less than last year's production despite an increase of 14 per cent in acreage. The department said unfavorable weather and heavy boll weevil infestation in central and eastern states more than offset unusually favorable prospects in Texas and the Far West states.

Prospective production is smaller than in former years in all cotton belt states except Texas, Oklahoma, Virginia and Florida.

The Texas forecast: Condition 89 per cent of normal; 210 pounds per acre yield, and production 4,450,000 bales.

Earthquake Rocks San Francisco Area

SAN FRANCISCO—(P)—A wide area around San Francisco Bay was shaken by an earthquake at 3:02 a. m. Monday.

The jolt rattled windows and dishes and awakened some people. No damage was reported.

University of California seismologists said the quake centered 18 miles from Berkeley. It was felt most strongly on the east side of the bay.

Nephew Of Midland Man Reported Dead In Big Timber Fire

HELENA, MONT.—(P)—Five hundred fire fighters hurried their night Monday at the flaming three-mile front of a timber blaze that has killed 13 Forest Service men and burned nearly 6,000 acres since Friday.

Armed with axes and shovels, two separate battalions of smoke-blackened men attacked from the North and South on 7,500-foot Willow Mountain. They struggled to seal off the fire's northeastward movement toward more heavy timber in the gates of the mountain forest 25 miles northeast of Helena.

Wilderness area hills and small parties of fire fighters had checked the flames in the rest of the 21-mile perimeter sealed by the blaze.

Showers slowed the advance of the flames Sunday but a 20-mile-an-hour wind fanned the fire in the northeastern section.

The fire devastated from 800 to 1,800 acres Sunday.

John S. Harrison of Midland said Monday he had been notified that his nephew, James Harrison had been burned to death in the forest blaze. Young Harrison was a parent chaper. He was a graduate student of the University of Montana.

Death Of Abilene Fireman Shatters City Safety Mark

FORT WORTH—(P)—Abilene's normal safety record of 788 days without a traffic death came to an end Monday.

The victim was a city fireman, O. W. Sanders, who died in a Fort Worth hospital.

The 30-year-old fireman was injured July 31 in the crash of a fire truck with a bus. He suffered a skull fracture and was brought here for treatment.

He had been unconscious since the accident.

Bold, One-Armed Georgia Mayor Resumes Shooting War Against Robed Night Riders

IRON CITY, GA.—(P)—A one-armed Georgia mayor and some of his friends renewed a shooting war against robed, night-riding Ku Klux Klansmen Sunday.

To top it off, the mayor chased a Klan official into Alabama at a 100-mile-an-hour pace and had him jailed.

The shooting spree started, said Mayor C. L. Drake of Iron City, when 12 or 15 carloads of robed Klansmen rolled into this little Southwest Georgia hamlet in the dark, early Sunday morning hours. One unidentified Klansman received a flesh wound. Drake reported none of his fighters was hurt.

The mayor, a Klan foe of long standing, declared "Some of the bullets whizzed by within five feet of me" while he hastily scribbled down the robed figures' auto tag numbers. Drake said he didn't have a gun but that some of his friends did and they peppered the Klan convoy with shotgun and pistol fire. The night riders retaliated, he related.

County Building Proposed

Midland County was asked Monday morning, at the meeting of the Commissioners' Court, to take steps immediately to provide a suitable county park building where fairs, exhibits, entertainments and conventions may be held.

A Midland Chamber of Commerce Committee, headed by R. L. (Bob) Miller, and R. D. (Bob) Scruggs, Chamber of Commerce president, met with the county judge and commissioners.

After a study of the proposal, the court acted favorably and sent word it would cooperate fully to bring about erection of the structure.

Irby Dyer, a member of Miller's special committee, and Delbert Downing, Chamber of Commerce manager, also attended the meeting.

Miller outlined the needs for the structure, saying it is necessary for the staging of county fairs and other events as well as a county park building. He told of the importance which has been gained by the Midland County Fair and the need for adequate facilities for it.

Conventions, conferences and other events also need a suitable structure, he continued. The Chamber of Commerce Committee estimated the building will be used at least a hundred nights each year.

The committee presented plans for a building, these were prepared by the Extension Division of Texas A&M College. Its dimensions would be 308 feet in length, 140 feet wide in the rear and 160 feet wide in front.

The estimated cost of the building is \$140,000. Miller estimated that a bond issue for \$200,000 would cover adequately the cost of the building, plus other facilities and furniture.

The proposed building would be of tile and concrete with hardwood floors, a stage, auditorium, livestock pens, and exhibit rooms.

Five acres of land have been offered by Midland Fair, Inc., for a site for the building at the rodeo grounds. However, it was pointed out, a definite location probably would be decided after a sounding of public opinion.

Study Made By Dyer
Dyer, who has made an extensive study of the legal aspects, told the commissioners he had found that the statutes authorize a commission to levy and collect a tax for a county park project.

The issue would be submitted to a vote of taxpayers.

Scruggs told the commissioners the project probably is the greatest need of the community at the present time and predicted an overwhelming majority of citizens would favor it when the issue comes to a vote.

Downing said the building would be erected by Midland Fair, Inc., for years to come. He also referred to fairs, conventions, conferences, and other gatherings which would be made possible by erecting the facility.

County Judge Clifford C. Keith, presiding over the Commissioners' Court, said a thorough study of the proposition will be made.

Miller urged prompt action, saying the matter was long overdue.

Mrs. Sumner Welles Dies In Switzerland

LAUSANNE, SWITZERLAND—(P)—Mrs. Sumner Welles, wife of the former U. S. Undersecretary of State, died in her hotel here Sunday night, hotel officials disclosed Monday.

Mrs. Welles, the former Mathilde Townsend, was the former official's second wife.

The former Undersecretary and his wife sailed to Europe a month ago on a trip planned to restore his health, which was damaged by exposure when he fell unconscious last Christmas night in a snow-covered field near his Maryland estate.

Earthquake Area



A violent series of earth tremors killed more than 4,600 persons and injured untold thousands in an area about 70 miles south of Quito, Ecuador. Center of the quake was reported at Ambato (1), where 400 or more died. Also hard hit were the towns of Latacunga (2) and Guano (3). Pelileo, near Ambato and not shown separately, was hardest hit with an estimated 3,200 or more dead. Experts at the Quito Observatory said it is presumed an entire range of the Andes Mountains is collapsing.

Rains Splash West Texas; Midland 1.25

The students having filed out transfers to Courtney will attend Midland schools, Keith said. He declared the action was in keeping with provisions of the Gilmer-Alkin Act.

Doctors, Nurses, Medicines Rushed To Quake Victims

QUITO, ECUADOR—(P)—A call went out Monday to all U. S. Air Force and Navy freight planes in the Panama area to join a mercy airlift flying doctors, nurses and medical supplies into the earthquake-ravaged sections of Central Ecuador.

The death toll of the quake was reported soaring above 4,600. Damage estimates from some 29 mountain towns reached \$20,000,000. Countless thousands were injured.

The U. S. Caribbean Command Headquarters alerted all freight planes in the Panama area to join the relief operation. A military spokesman said if there were not enough Air Force and Navy freight planes in Panama to carry the required supplies, additional planes will be drawn from the Antilles bases. Some American planes already have participated in the relief work.

The earthquake, which struck Friday, battered communication and transport lines. Two thousand Ecuadorian troops are on duty in the earthquake zone. Communications now are being restored slowly.

In the first hours after the disaster the Ecuadorian Air Force began the task of flying relief equipment into the region. Two planes of the U. S. Air Mission joined planes lent by commercial airlines in the operation, making flights from Quito to Ambato, one of the hard-hit cities.

The Ecuadorian Cabinet voted in emergency session Sunday night to take immediate action on President Gelo Plaza Lasso's plans to reimburse the cost of the relief work.

Three U. S. Caribbean Air Command planes from Balboa took six tons of relief supplies to Quito Sunday. They included blood plasma, serum, insulin, and other medicines.

The president, back from a tour of the ravaged areas, said some of the scenes of suffering rivaled even the "most Danesque" imagination.

Four towns which virtually disappeared from the map were Guano, Patate, Pelileo and Pillaro.

Eyewitnesses returning from Ambato, largest city to receive the full force of the shocks, said the number of dead and injured undoubtedly had been underestimated. New Shocks Reported

These witnesses said the ravaged area now is only a cemetery where the odor of death is almost unbearable.

They said the number of persons buried along the slopes of Tungurahua Volcano may never be known. They reported that when the quakes struck, masses of earth slid down from the mountaintops and the volcano erupted.

Quakes again shook the slopes of the Andes Sunday. Shocks were felt in Ambato and Riobamba, where rescue workers were digging through the debris in search of bodies.

The catastrophe was responsible for another tragedy late Saturday when a mercy plane crashed in the quake area, killing all 34 persons aboard.

The dead were identified as four government officials, two crewmen and 28 Shell Oil Company employees.

Some 3,000,000 persons live in the area affected by the quake. It embraces about 2,500 square miles.

R. L. Miller Will Head USO District
R. L. (Bob) Miller, Texas Electric Service Company district manager, Monday was named USO chairman for District 28, Midland, Glascock, Reagan and Upton Counties, by M. C. Uimer, co-chairman of the fourth area which extends from Brownwood to El Paso.

Miller was active in USO work during World War II years and is familiar with its organization. He said campaign quotas for the counties of the district this year will be Midland County \$1,512.50, Glascock \$105, Reagan \$187.50 and Upton \$387.50.

After accepting the appointment, he immediately started making plans for the campaign.

Reactivation of USO was requested by President Truman to serve the 1,865,000 men in the armed forces.

Committee Proposal Restricts Marketing Of Public Power

WASHINGTON—A huge joker has been found in Senate Appropriations Committee recommendations against the building of government transmission lines from Bureau of Reclamation power dams.

The Senate Appropriations Committee would put similar restrictions on Anderson Ranch dam in Idaho. Its power generators are not yet in operation.

The Senate Appropriations Committee action would force the government to make a Texas Power and Light-type contract with Idaho Power Company to restrict the marketing of the vast public power capacity.

A Senate floor battle has been promised by Senators O'Mahoney of Wyoming, Johnson of Texas, Sparkman of Alabama and others who want committee restrictions on the public power program removed.

The Texas contract was drawn up to handle only the public power developed at Denison dam. This is a flood control dam built by the Army engineers on the Red River, which forms the boundary between Southern Oklahoma and Texas.

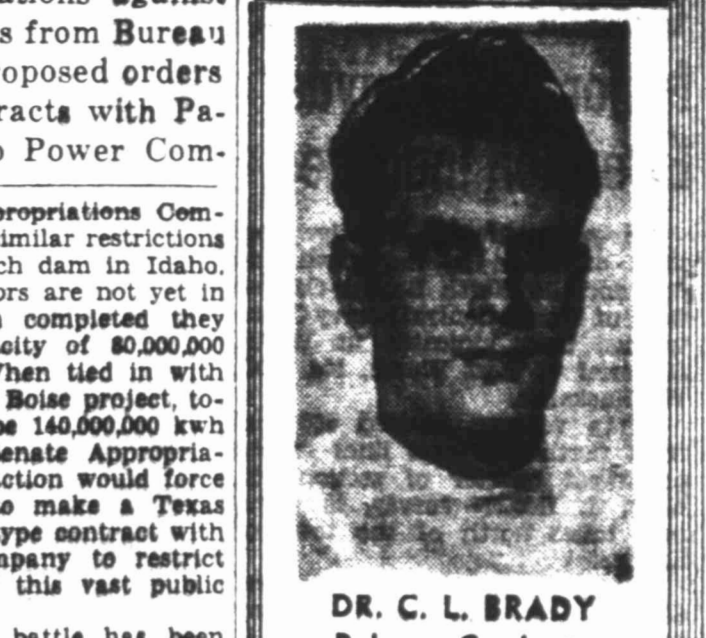
On the other hand, Texas Power and Light was in the position of needing reserve power for its peak load periods in the afternoon and evening. So here were all the elements of a good trade.

Under the law Department of Interior is selling agent for power generated at flood control dams built by Army engineers. So in April, 1947, Southwestern Power Administrator Douglas Wright made a contract for the department with Texas Power and Light.

In brief, Southwestern Power swapped its secondary power for delivery at peak-load periods, in exchange for firm power from Texas Power and Light for delivery to the government co-op customers.

Unless the Senate Appropriations Committee recommendations are defeated, the government will be forced to make a Texas Power and Light-type contract with Pacific Gas and Electric Company. The government will also be prevented from building a steam plant to firm up its power. And it will be prevented from building transmission lines to serve any of its preferred customers save reclamation project pumping stations.

Here they come down the stretch with St. Louis and Brooklyn neck and neck in the National League race and 52 games to go.

Brooklyn, which moved into a first place tie by double dumping Cincinnati while St. Louis was winning a single game from New York, may have a slight edge in the schedule. The Brooks have 28 home games left while the Cards must play 28 on the road.

Boston's role may be that of a "spiller" for the Brooks. Now 11 1/2 games behind, the 1948 champs appear to have little chance of catching the leaders. But they do have 12 to play with Brooklyn. The Pirates, likewise, may be the stumbling block for the Cards, who meet them 11 times before October 2.

Cincinnati, loser 14 of 18 starts against Brooklyn, was the stepping stone for Burt Shotton's men to regain a piece of first place. Joe Hatten snout out the Reds in the opener 7-0 and came on to work the last one and one-half innings of the 2-1 second game when Rex Barney got into trouble.

Home runs by Bruce Edwards and Jackie Robinson in the first game and by Spider Jorgensen in the second drove in eight of the nine Dodgers runs. Edwards bashed his way to the lead in the sixth, George Redmond pitched the Cards back on the win path as he stopped New York with seven hits and 9-2. It was the fifth straight victory for the husky righthander and his eleventh of the year. Four Giant errors helped.

Boston broke a five-game losing streak by trampling Chicago 11-0 on Bill Voiselle's seven-hitter but fell back into its tailspin in losing the second game in 10 innings 4-3. Dick Sailer helped the Phillies to a double triumph over Pittsburgh with a three-run pinch homer in the ninth inning to take the second game 5-4 after the Phils won the opener 7-3.

The New York Yankees continued to fatten their American League lead at the expense of the St. Louis Browns although they had to be satisfied with a 2-2 tie in the second game. WHITE SULPHUR SPRINGS, VA. —(AP)— Tuition for "cross education of the admirals and generals" comes dear at the Greenbrier, one of the nation's swankiest and most expensive resort hotels.
"Cross education" was Secretary of Defense Louis Johnson's own term for this meeting of big brass. It was his idea that getting the top military minds away from the Pentagon tensions and together in a more convivial atmosphere would help them to forget their feuds.
Much more of this rich brand of higher learnin', however, and the Joint Chiefs of Staff will go bankrupt.
Admiral Louis E. Denfeld, Chief of Naval Operations, General Hoyt S. Vandenberg, Chief of Staff of the Air Force, and General Omar N. Bradley, Chief of Staff of the Army, were the key participants in this work-play session for about 15 top officers.
\$225 Per Day
Their billet was the hotel's Presidential Suite, which regularly goes for \$225 a day without food, which was another \$16 per day per person. These plush accommodations include five bedrooms, two living rooms, baths, a kitchen and dining room.
Other facilities on this palatial layout are just as expensive. According to the hotel's rate schedule, golf costs \$3 per day per person, riding is \$3 for the first hour and \$2.50 for each additional hour. Swimming is 75 cents per day. Badminton, archery, horseshoes, shuffleboard and croquet are free, but none of the military paid much attention to those diversions. Golf is their favorite sport.
These prices created a minor problem for the armed services bookkeepers who had to balance the accounts when this wing-ding was over. Technically, all but Denfeld, Vandenberg and Bradley should have been getting along on \$7 per day. That's the government's allotment for employes and military men when they are out of town on business. The three exceptions, because they are the top men in their services, get an additional \$4000 per year for such expenses.
Incidental expenses of the meeting included air transportation for everyone to the hotel, two flights a day from the Pentagon with papers to be signed, and such things as the cost of one man at the hotel all the

time in charge of handling special telephone connections.
This meeting set a precedent in the away-from-the-Pentagon-strain series. The first two were at Naval installations, at Key West, Fla., and Newport, R. I.
It's easy to see that this non-military atmosphere was more in line with what Johnson had in mind, however. During a typical day business took up two or three hours in the morning. These were secret meetings. After that the conference took off to one of the hotel's three golf courses. Only Gen. Alfred M. Gruenther, Director of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, doesn't play golf. But he is a whiz on the tennis court.
Whatever the total cost of this relaxing and refreshing meeting finally adds up to, if it "cross educates" the generals and admirals toward better unification, Secretary Johnson will consider it highly worthwhile.

Government Trying To Assist Closing Of Business Loans

NEW YORK —(AP)— The government is moving to make it easier for businessmen to borrow money—and easier for Uncle Sam to borrow, too.
The idea is a double-barrel one to put a brake on the recession and to make the Treasury's start of deficit financing less painful. It comes at a time when buying-on-time is climbing again, when past-due accounts are increasing, and when taxes are at an all-time peak.
No wonder the financial picture makes you dizzy.
The Federal Reserve Board is going to free \$1,800,000,000 of bank reserves in a four-week trickle, at a time when businessmen presumably should be looking for bank loans to prepare for Fall and Winter business.
Skeptics Doubtful
Some skeptics doubt if this will do much to brake the recession. They point out that business loans are down \$2,700,000,000 from the first of the year, and that the \$1,800,000,000 rise 10 days ago from the year's low scarcely indicates any great demand for business loans which the banks can't meet easily as it is. These observers contend the banks already have plenty of money to lend, and that the real shortage is in borrowers.
However, by freeing the reserves at this time, the Federal Reserve Board once more makes it plain it has switched from fighting inflation to fighting deflation, and will make certain that money is easy, and presumably stays cheap or gets cheaper.

Near-Record Cotton Income In Prospect

WASHINGTON —(AP)— Farm income from this year's cotton crop may be the second largest of record despite the prospects for lower prices for both cotton and cottonseed.
Assuming cotton and cottonseed brings no more than government price guarantees, the total income from the 14,805,000-bale crop estimated by the Agriculture Department Monday would be almost \$2,440,000,000. Such an income would be second only to last year's record of \$2,841,000,000.

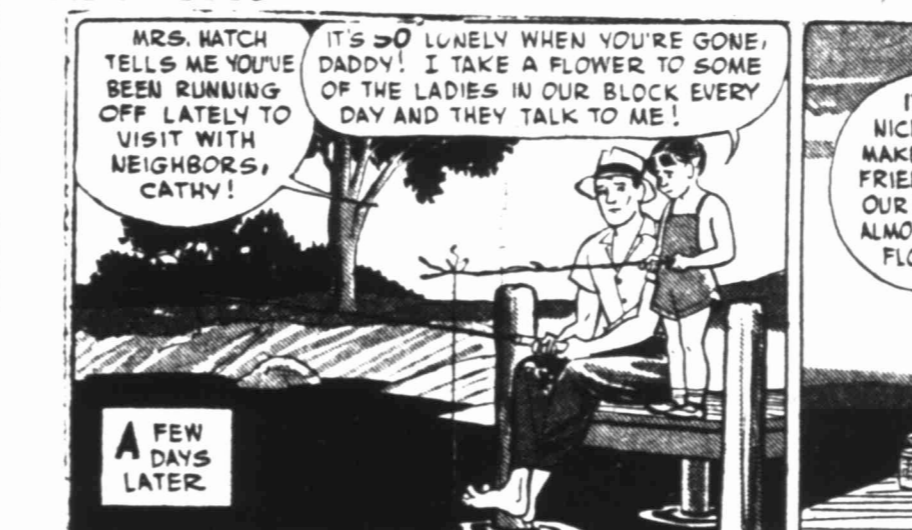

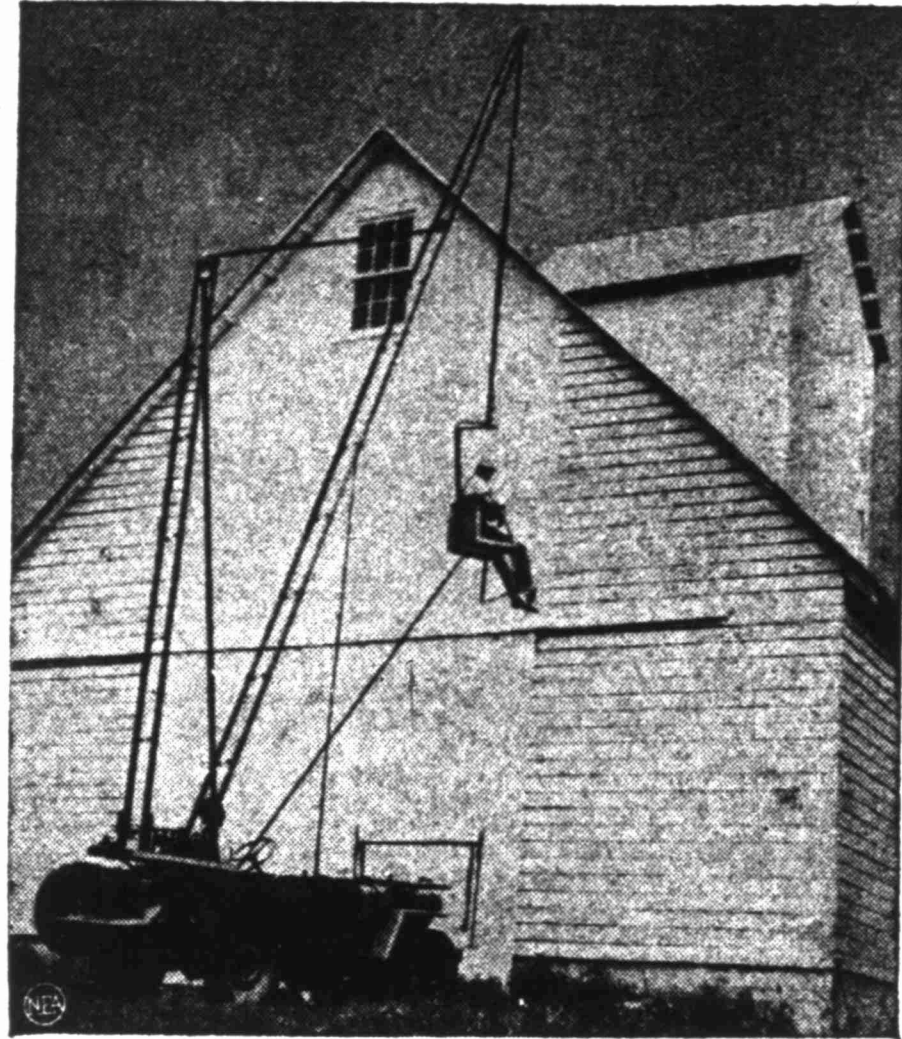

Gen. Herman Feldman, chief of the Army Quartermaster Corps, and Maj. Gen. Alden Waitt, chief of the Army Chemical Corps. Both officers have been suspended by the Army pending outcome of the five percent investigation. In the case of both officers, Grindle said, Hunt told him he had access to their offices at "any time."

House Wades Into Minimum Wage Bill

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The House waded Monday into its second labor debate of the year. This one is on whether to hike the national minimum wage from 40 cents an hour to 75. The Democratic Party's campaign pledge of last Fall to raise the minimum and broaden coverage of the 1938 Wage-Hour Act was up for redemption. It faced the same determined, well-organized foes as the still-unredeemed campaign pledge to repeal the Taft-Hartley Law. Democratic Leaders were backing a compromise bill introduced last week by Chairman Lesinski (D-Mich.) of the House Labor Committee. Many Southern Democrats and Republicans were lined up tentatively behind a measure sponsored by Rep. Lucas (D-Texas), a Labor Committee member. House members reported labor unions active in drumming up support for the compromise. The debate was expected to rage most, if not all, of the week.

Truman Drives Back From Summer Camp

WASHINGTON—(AP)—President Truman drove back to Washington Monday morning after spending two and a half days at his Cotacotín Mountain Camp near Thurmont, Md. With Mrs. Truman sitting in the front seat beside him, the President was behind the wheel all the way. He averaged about 45 miles an hour on the highway. Twenty-four rain reports, compiled by oil companies, showed good showers at Hobbs, N. 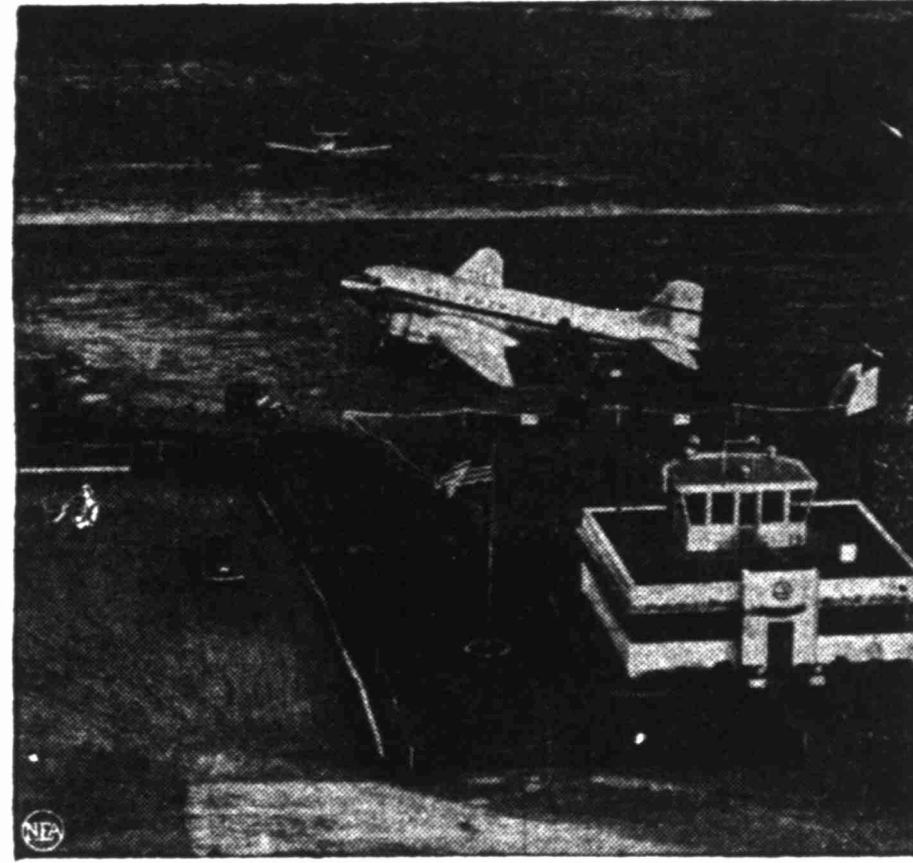

Big Air Lines Watching Short-Haul Experiment

WASHINGTON—(NEA)—Daily air passenger, freight and mail service to almost every town in the U. S. with a population of more than 5,000 may be in the offing as a result of a new operation by an airline that once carried only mail and freight. All commercial airlines are carefully watching the new experiment. The busy short-haul line is All American Airways, which is now establishing commuter service to 52 small and medium-sized cities in seven eastern states. Populations of these communities range from 5,000 to 50,000. Routes connecting more than 40 of them with the big metropolitan centers have been in operation for several months, and most are increasing business daily. The longest single hop is 36 minutes. The plane is only on the ground two minutes at each stop. Steps are carried in the plane to save the time of wheeling up a ramp. Two round trips daily is the minimum service planned for each city. No food is served on the planes, and the fares average slightly higher than comparable pullman rates. The planes are redesigned two-engine DC-3s. They can carry 24 passengers, 500 pounds of mail and 535 pounds of freight, and cruise at 180 m.p.h. Had to Educate The new service had to do a job of educating the people on the benefits of flying. At first most of All American's passengers were persons who never flew before. An increasing number of passengers now are women going shopping in the big cities and businessmen who have to make irregular trips. A big fraction of the customers are those who have transferred from the long-haul airlines and whose final destination is one of the smaller cities served by All American. With warm weather, there has been a big boom in traffic to the Atlantic shore resorts. The route from Pittsburgh to Atlantic City through Philadelphia is now the company's busiest. When it was planned, officials thought it might be the worst because it competed with especially good rail service and the famed Pennsylvania Turnpike. The freight service has caught on faster than the passenger service, leading to the possibility of making some of the flights exclusively for cargo. Many of the stops are one-industry towns and the big companies there are making extensive use of the new service to speed deliveries. Some local restaurants, grocery stores and flower shops, for example, are using the new air freight to provide perishable products to their customers. President and sparkplug of All American is 40-year-old Robert M. Love. A former colonel in the Air Force, he served as deputy chief of staff of the Air Transport Command. Before going into the service he was a pilot and had established several short, inter-city airlines in the East. Before Love led All American into its present venture, the company specialized in short hauls of air mail and in "pick-up" cargo. It developed the "snatch" method of air pick-up which later was used by the Civil Aeronautics Board. The completion of airports in a few cities is all that is holding up some of the routes. The company now has more than 300 employees and 11 airplanes. The office in each city requires a minimum staff of two persons.

Condemned Slayer Praises God For Three-Day Reprieve

HUNTSVILLE—(AP)—"I believe in the power of God as my defense," W. Fred Jones, condemned murderer, said in the death cell here Monday.

Jones, who won a dramatic three-day stay of execution Sunday morning as he prepared to enter the death chamber, said: "Saturday night the atmosphere was charged with the power of God. I still believe in the power of God as my defense. I know the truth will come, so help me God."

Even as Jones gave an interview to Don Reid, Jr., Huntsville newspaperman, the State Board of Pardons and Paroles prepared to hear pleas to commute Jones' sentence to life imprisonment. Unless Jones' attorney is able to convince the board here Monday afternoon that there should be further clemency, the Floydada grocer is scheduled to die in the early hours of Wednesday morning. Jones was sentenced to death for the shotgun slaying of H. C. Love, Jr., outside Jones' grocery store in Floydada in 1946.

Murder Charges In Poison Deaths Of Three Dismissed

FORT WORTH—(AP)—The indictments which charged Mrs. Ada Bilbey with the poison deaths of three members of her family were dismissed Monday by Criminal District Judge Willis McGregor on recommendation of District Attorney Stewart Helman. In the surprise move, Helman prepared a three-page written motion which discussed the aspects of the case and ended by saying, "I cannot ask a jury to convict this defendant when I myself am not convinced that she is guilty. I will not ask any jury to do that which I would not do myself."

In the statement, Helman reviewed in great detail the proceedings of the indictments charging Mrs. Bilbey with the deaths of her husband, G. C. Bilbey; her daughter, Dortha Duke, and her son-in-law, Richard Duke, last October.

Five Jump To Safety From Air Force Plane

DENVER—(AP)—Five Air Force men bailed out of a limping amphibious plane 32 miles northwest of Cheyenne, Wyo., early Monday. Enroute from Alaska to Biggs Air Force Base at El Paso, they had left Great Falls, Mont., Sunday night. The plane, an Army version of the Navy's famed Catalina flying boat, developed engine trouble and the men parachuted to safety shortly before the plane crashed.
