Congress Drives For Adjournment

Air Chief Assures Solons B-36, Atom Bombs 'Can Do Job'

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Gen. Hoyt S. Vandenberg assured Congress Wednesday the B-36 bomber and atom bomb "can do the job." He said the fact the United States has them is forcing Russia to concentrate on defense instead of offense.

If this country should follow the Navy's advice and cut down on strategic bombing strength, he argued, the Russians would be free to concentrate their productive resources and technical skills on developing offensive power.

Vandenberg, the Air Force chief of staff, was before the House Armed Services Committee, firing back fiercely against what he called the "glib" Navy attacks against the Air Force and its strategic bombing.

But he ran into some heavy weather. Representative Short (R-Mo) told him once that what he was saying was "bosh." And Chairman Vinson (D-Ga) said that what is shaking the armed services is that the Navy isn't accepted into "full partnership."

"Mr. Chairman," Vandenberg said coolly, "the statement (he emphasized the word statement) that the Navy has not been taken into full partnership has shaken confidence in the military establishment."

As Air Force chief of staff, Vandenberg is a member of the policy-making joint chiefs of staff for the entire defense set-up.

He challenged Congress to take over the nation's strategy and defense planning themselves if they don't like the way the joint chiefs are doing it.

On deck behind Vandenberg were Gen. Omar N. Bradley, chairman, and Gen. J. Lawton Collins, the Army's representative on the joint chiefs of staff.

In measured tones, the general said "I have considered the question as to the capabilities of our strategic bombers and I have arrived at the clear conclusion that they can do their job. As the president."

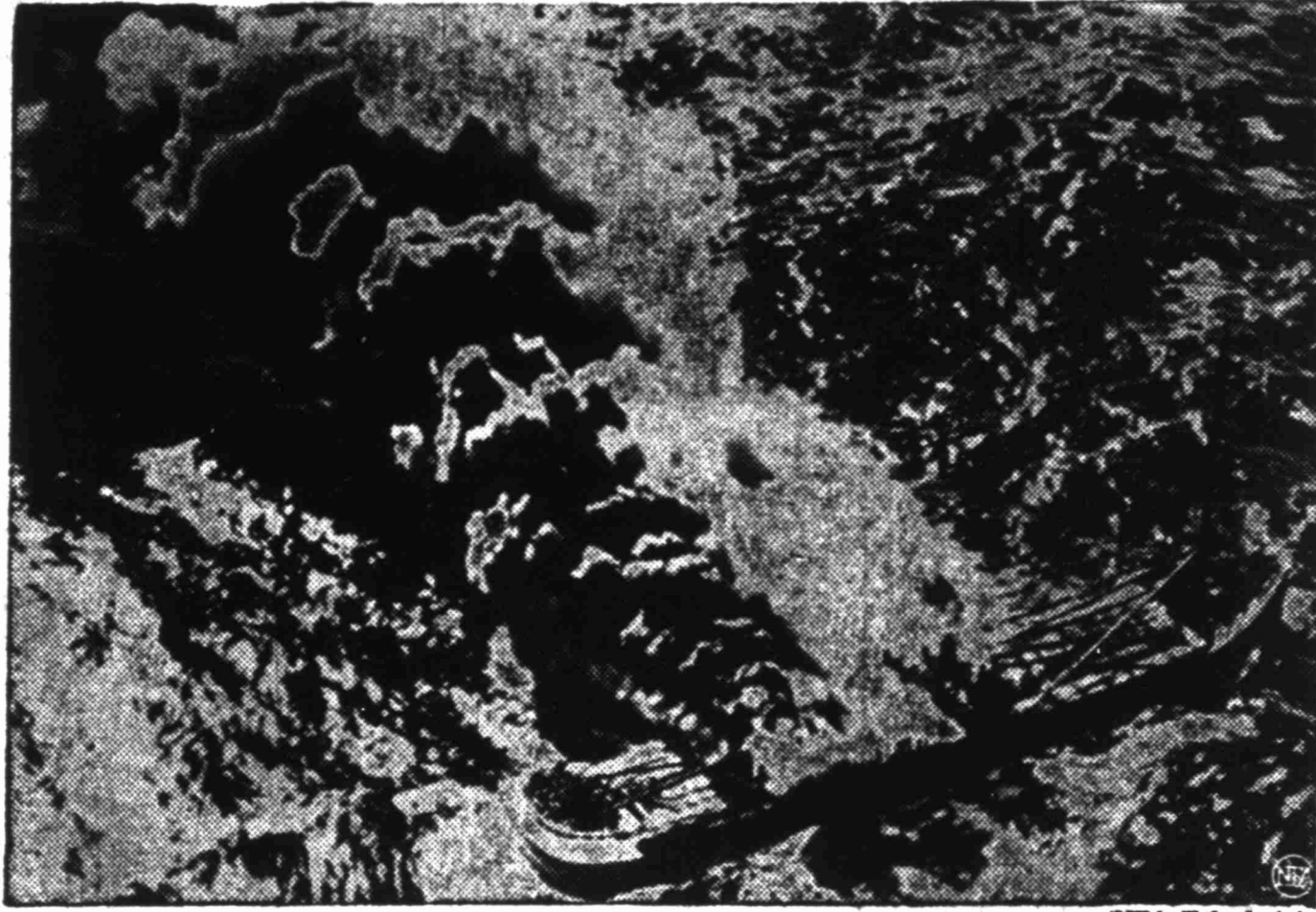

Drainage Talk Dominates Hearing On Paving Costs

Drainage rather than cost was the subject uppermost in the minds and questions of persons attending the public hearing on Midland's Group B paving project Tuesday night in the City Hall. It rained just before the scheduled meeting hour.

Mayor William B. Neely explained to the large group, which overflowed the council chamber, the purpose of the hearing was to determine if the proposed paving would enhance the value of the shunting property at least to the extent of the paving investment.

But drainage problems and suggestions bobbed up quickly. Only one or two questions from the audience concerned paving costs, which will be on the same basis as Group A paving. Brown and Root, Inc., of Houston has the paving contract.

City Attorney John Perkins handled the questioning of three witnesses called in the hearing.

T. G. Jenkins, city engineer, was the first witness. He listed the units included in the project, and explained the methods of making curb and gutter, and paving assessments. He also explained how payments may be made—in cash or one-fifth when the paving is completed and the remainder in four annual payments at an interest rate of five per cent.

Barney Graff and Floyd O. Boles, real estate dealers, were the other witnesses. They testified under oath that in general property values in the areas involved would be enhanced as much or more than the cost of the paving. They stated that in some isolated cases, particularly East Indiana Street and extreme South Colorado Street, the increase in values might not offset street improvement costs. Lewis Blasts Green For Refusal To Aid In Coal-Steel Strike

WASHINGTON—(AP)—John L. Lewis bitterly denounced AFL President William Green Wednesday for turning down a proposal to help finance a \$2,500,000 weekly strike fund for Philip Murray's CIO Steelworkers.

The mine workers chief's caustic note to Green said: "You cry loud for labor peace and labor security, but seldom do anything to achieve it."

Lewis had proposed that his own mine workers—themselves on strike—put up \$250,000 weekly to help Murray's steel strikers, and that nine AFL unions put up equal amounts.

Murray and Lewis have big strikes under way in the coal and steel industries. Government officials are showing new signs of worry about the ultimate effect of these strikes on the economy.

There were these developments: 1. After purposely staying away from coal negotiations in West Virginia Tuesday, Lewis drove over to take part in contract talks.

2. The government's top mediator, Cyrus S. Ching, went to New York for a personal chat with top officials of the U. S. Steel Corporation. Ching frankly said he wanted to see if U. S. Steel has altered its stand.

Farm, Money Bills Slated For Passage

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Congress drove hard for adjournment Wednesday. The lawmakers expected to finish action on the farm bill and a few other matters, then adjourn until next January.

One of the unfinished items was the nomination of former Democratic Senator Mon Wallgren of Washington to the Federal Power Commission. Senator Cain (R-Wash), an old opponent of Wallgren, hoped to delay action, but he didn't see much chance of success.

Wallgren, turned down earlier this year for the job of chairman of the National Security Resources Board, was expected to win approval this time. So was another by President Truman's nominee: former Democratic Senator James Mead of New York, named to the Federal Trade Commission.

Truman sent both appointments to the Senate just in time for action before adjournment. Both were approved by a Senate committee Tuesday.

First Real Norther To Chill Texas

The season's first genuine norther headed for Texas Wednesday.

Temperatures were expected to drop near freezing in the Panhandle Wednesday night. The Lubbock Weather Bureau forecast possible snow flurries in that area Wednesday night with winds increasing to 30 to 45 miles per hour as the cold front strikes.

By Thursday morning the cold front is expected to cover Northern New Mexico, the Texas Panhandle and Central Oklahoma.

"It looks like at this time it won't cover the entire state but just the northern half of Texas," the Weather Bureau said.

The official forecast called for considerable drizzle and showers in the Panhandle, South Plains and from the Pecos Valley eastward Wednesday night and Thursday. Much colder in the Panhandle Wednesday night with temperatures near freezing. Much colder in the Panhandle and South Plains and colder elsewhere in West Texas Thursday.

Low temperatures in the state Wednesday morning generally were in the 70's—mild for this time of the year. The Weather Bureau explained that this was caused by the low pressure area in front of the cold wave.

Negro Gets 15 Years For Tavern Murder

Burnie McDonald, 49-year-old Midland negro, was found guilty of murder by a 70th District Court jury Tuesday night and sentenced to 15 years in the state penitentiary at Huntsville.

McDonald was indicted in May by a grand jury in connection with the fatal stabbing of Artry Lang during a fracas March 19 in the Red Bar Tavern in the Latin American section of the city.

Lang died instantly of a stab wound in the heart. The jury returned its verdict after an hour and one-half of deliberation. Stanley Claiborne was foreman.

The murder trial was the first case to be heard on the criminal docket of the October court term, which opened Monday.

A jury was being selected Wednesday for the trial of Marvin Herring, who was indicted by a grand jury for forgery.

A. C. Bulnes, 38, Dies In Houston Hospital

A. C. Bulnes, 38, 607 North D Street, died just before noon Wednesday in a Houston hospital where he had been the last 10 days.

He was area reservoir engineer for the Shell Oil Company in its Midland Area headquarters and was well-known in oil circles throughout the Southwest. He came to Midland six years ago from Houston.

Mrs. Bulnes was at her husband's bedside at the time of his death. Other survivors include three children, Jimmie, 8, Cathryn, 6, and Charles, 3. Funeral arrangements are pending.

"Why doesn't somebody tell them," she asks, "that there are many of us who have had chances to marry but are single for just one reason: We'd rather support ourselves for the rest of our lives, if necessary, than marry until we find the 'right man.'"

"We're not leftovers. We just have a few ideals. And we'd rather never marry at all than take second-best."

There's truth in what she says. The girls who marry young aren't necessarily the cream of the crop. The girl who is still single at 30 may have a lot more to offer as a wife than the girl who grabbed off a husband at 20.

If men don't realize that it probably is because so many of them still judge women by out-moded standards.

But that isn't true today. No smart girl today has to marry a man for a meal ticket.

So long as she can support herself she figures she can afford to be choosey.

So don't dismiss the older, unmarried girls as leftovers who never had a chance, you men. They may have had plenty of chances and are just holding out for somebody they think is good enough for them.

Call them choosey, if you like. They probably won't object to that. But don't think of them as being

left-over after the cream of the crop has been skimmed off.

## Newly-Developed Surgical Method Told By Professor

NEW ORLEANS —(AP)—A new surgical technique for exposing the pancreas—one of the body's most important organs but also one of the most difficult to explore in time of trouble—has been announced.

Prof. Ian Aird of the University of London reported that the operation allowed, for the first time, complete exposure of all surfaces of the gland.

The pancreas—which manufactures certain juices important for digestion and also insulin for maintaining a proper control of sugar in the blood—is a gland partly hidden by the stomach. It is covered by involved anatomical structures.

Professor Aird said the operation already had increased the opportunities for benefitting the patients suffering with a sometimes fatal condition called "hypoglycemia."

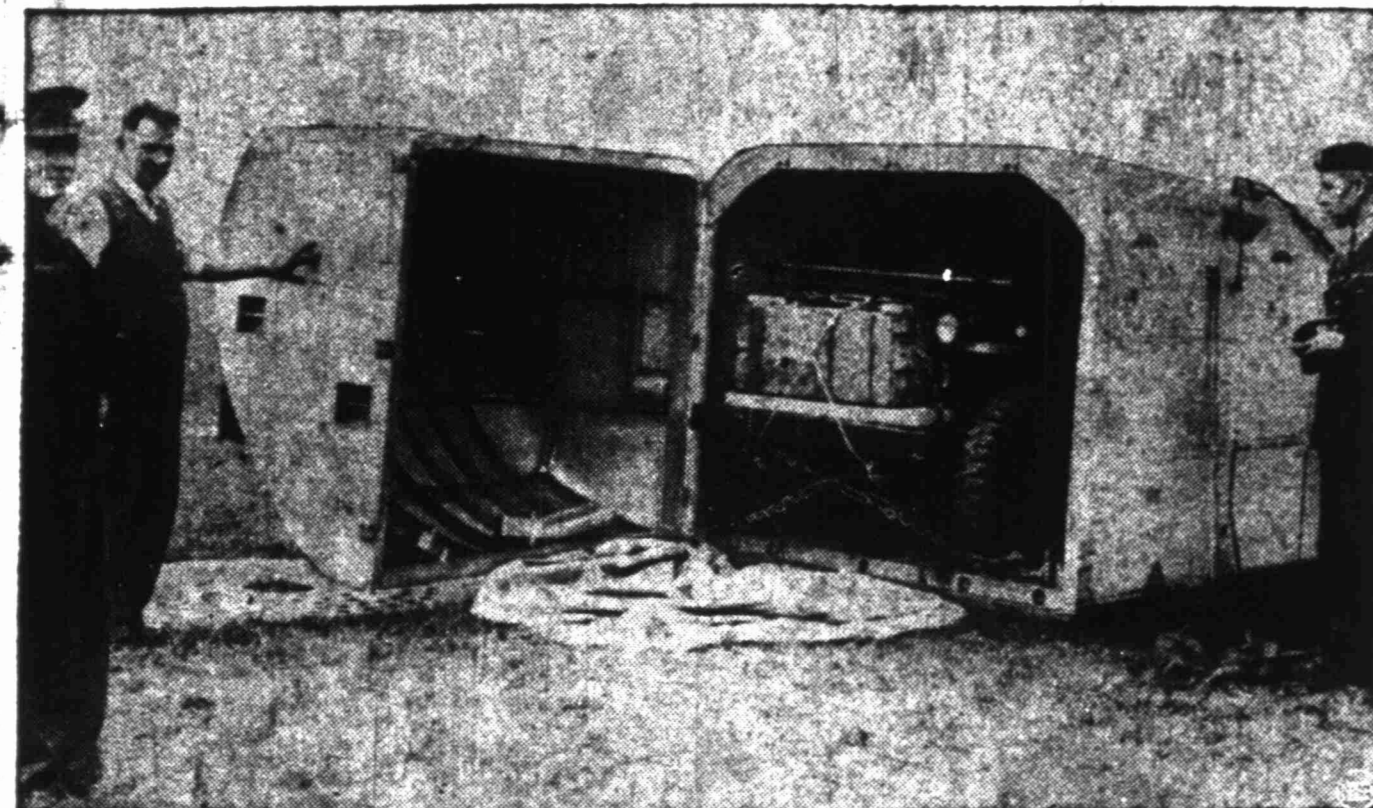

### Was 81st Congress Good Or Awful? Just Take Your Pick

WASHINGTON—(AP)—By this time Thursday Washington ought to be strangely quiet. Congress expected to go home Wednesday night. Thus the 81st Congress, a little hoarse and self-conscious from talking since January when its session started, was ready to quit for 1949. Was it a good Congress? It was, if you listen to the Democrats who had a majority and were supposed to run it. If you listen to the Republicans, it was terrible. And both sides already have started throwing stones and singing praises.

### Phones Double

Forty million telephones now are in service in the United States—about double the number in 1939—according to a survey by the U. S. Independent Telephone Association. About 22,000,000 of the phones are served by the Bell System, and the remainder by independent companies.

### U. S. Student Dies In Plunge From Tower

PARIS—(AP)—The body of Patricia Hunter, the Port Chester, N. Y., art student who plunged to her death from the Eiffel Tower Tuesday, will be flown to New York this weekend, the U. S. Embassy said Wednesday. The embassy said this was requested in a cable signed by Alexander Hunter of Sewickley, Pa. Hunter was described as the girl's uncle. The embassy said the body probably will leave Paris Sunday for Rye, N. Y. The girl's mother is Mrs. Joseph F. Hunter of Rye.

**Facts Vs. Claims**  
Trying to disentangle the facts from the attacks and the claims is a job tough enough to baffle any ordinary citizen. This Congress has passed such major legislation as rent control, housing, the Atlantic Pact, renewing the Marshall Plan, renewing trade agreements, crop insurance, and government reorganization. In foreign affairs Congress, with Democrats and Republicans more or less working together, followed the urgings of President Truman. But it was different on some of the things that affected the people at home. President Truman wanted Congress, controlled by his Democrats, to repeal the Taft-Hartley Law. Congress didn't do it. Nor did it listen to his request to revise and broaden the social security law. He wanted Congress to vote money for federal aid to education. But this got lost in a religious argument and Congress didn't do it. And this Congress took no action on Truman's request for various civil rights laws.

**Abandoned Child Gets Foster Home**  
STAMFORD — Karen Elaine, found a few hours after her birth near the back doorstep of the J. C. May home here September 18, has been assigned to a foster home and the care of a couple who want to become her adoptive parents. There were tears in many eyes at the Stamford Sanitarium when she left. Nurses there gave her name and cared for her tenderly, as she adjusted herself to a motherless world. Temporary custody was vested in Miss Catherine Lavelle, sanitarium superintendent, by District Judge Owen Thomas, as he sifted dozens of requests for her adoption. Adoption still is a matter for future decision. A rather complete layette went with Karen Elaine, who was wrapped in a newspaper when she was abandoned here.

### Hearings Scheduled On New Gas Statute

AUSTIN—(AP)—The Railroad Commission Tuesday scheduled hearings between November 16 and January 13 on variable factors affecting gas measurement in Texas oil and gas fields. The hearings are in compliance with the state's new standard gas measurement law requiring gas in all fields to be measured in uniform manner. The full schedule of hearings: District 1, Southwest Texas—November 16. District 2, Southwest Texas—November 17-18. District 3, Gulf Coast—November 22-23, 29, 30. District 4, Southwest Texas—December 1-2, 6-9. District 5, East Central Texas—December 13. District 6, East Texas—December 14-16. District 7-B, West Central Texas—December 20-21. District 7-C, West Central Texas—December 22. District 8, West Texas—January 3-8. District 9, North Texas—January 10-11. District 10, Panhandle—January 12-13.

### Water Code Revision Panel Starts Study Of State's Problems

AUSTIN—(AP)—Work was underway Wednesday toward official study of the state's controversial water laws. Senator Rogers Kelley of Edinburg Tuesday was elected chairman of the Legislative Water Code Committee empowered to make the study and recommend changes to the next Legislature. Rep. Byron E. Tinsley of Greenville was named vice chairman and John D. McCall of Dallas secretary. Kelley told the committee it faced "a devil of a hard job." He said he knew of no subject more highly controversial. Kelley named Senator George Moffett of Chillicothe to head a steering committee of five to recommend nominees for executive secretary and suggest a possible salary. A meeting of the sub-panel was called for October 24 in Dallas. On it also are Senator John Bell of Cuero, Rep. Preston Smith of Lubbock, Rep. W. S. Fly of Victoria and McCall. The next meeting of the full committee was set for November 14 in Austin to act on the Steering Committee's recommendations. A written report from the Steering Committee to each member of the full committee was instructed to precede the meeting by eight days. There are 21 members on the full committee, including six senators, six representatives and nine laymen. They were administered the oath of office prior to Tuesday's meeting by Supreme Court Chief Justice J. E. Hickman.

**NEW TULSA-AMARILLO MAIL SERVICE SCHEDULED.**  
PORT WORTH—(AP)—Central Airlines will begin mail service between Wichita, Kan., and Oklahoma City November 10 and between Tulsa and Amarillo November 16. Central is Texas' newest airline. Its headquarters are in Fort Worth.

### Dallas To Construct Building For Pioneer

DALLAS—(AP)—Dallas is getting ready for Pioneer Air Lines to move here from Houston. The City Council Tuesday ordered sale of \$240,000 in airport revenue bonds to build a hangar, shops and administration buildings for the airline. 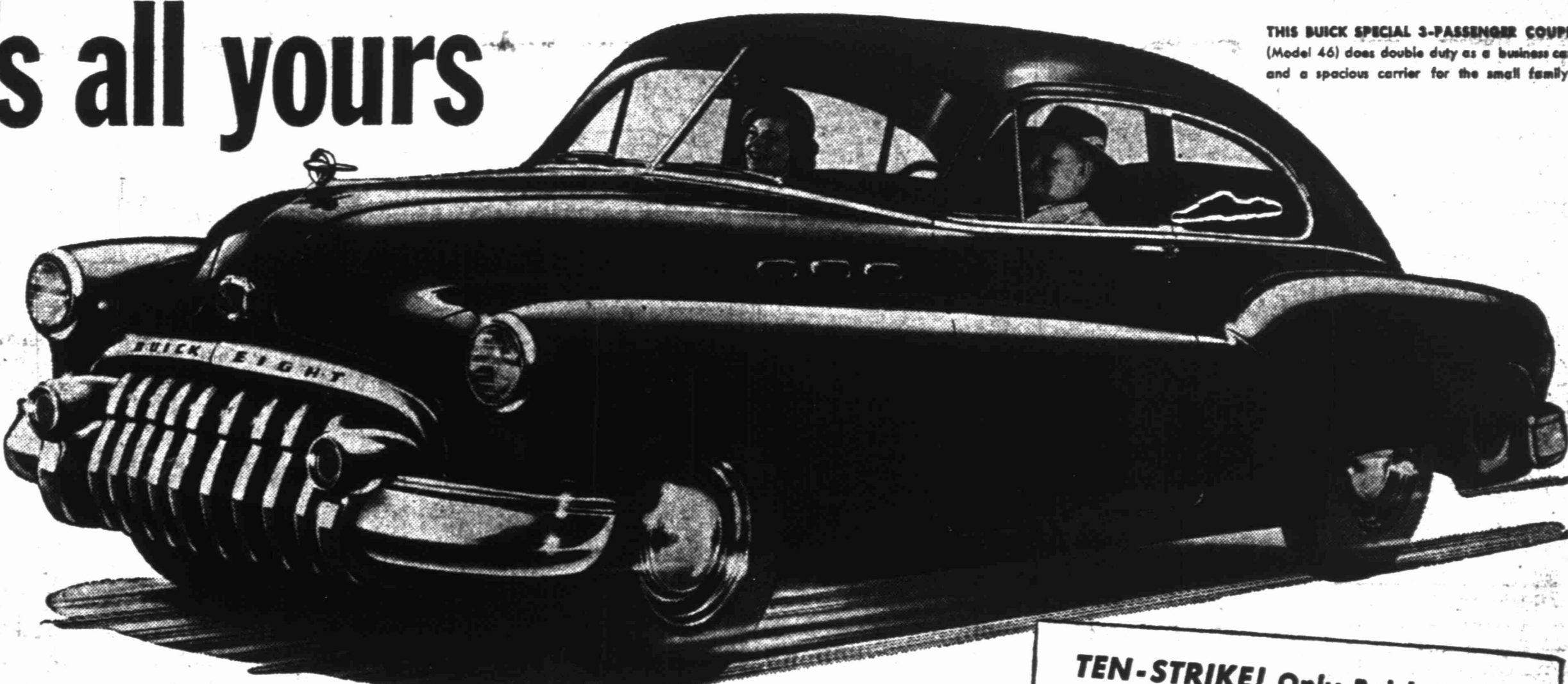

Rural Telephone Bill Clears Last Hurdle In Congress

WASHINGTON —(P)— A bill to expand telephone service in rural areas was past the final congressional hurdle Wednesday.

The Senate sent the measure by Representative Poage of Texas to the White House Tuesday after approving changes which represented a compromise with the House.

The bill provides financing for new and expanding phone systems along the lines of the Rural Electrification Administration loans. The 30-year loans would not be limited in size, and would carry two and one-half per cent interest. Preference would go to existing phone companies and cooperative groups.

In its final form, the measure omitted a Senate amendment banning loans to companies with more than 2,500 rural subscribers.

An equitable severance tax on natural resources.

Coach John Hildon reports his Pups in good shape for the tilt.

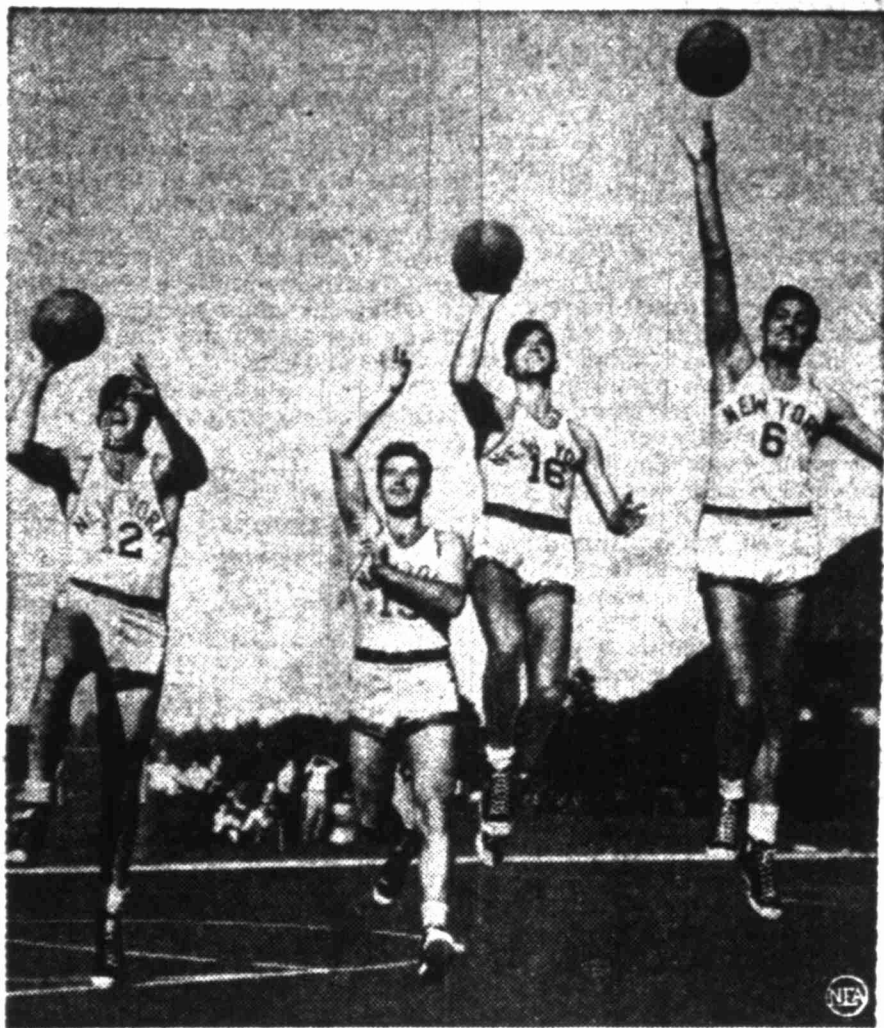

# Scoring First Is Kiss Of Death In Modern Grid Wars

DALLAS—(AP)—Back in the days when defense was part of football, the team that scored first could reasonably expect to emerge the winner.

Now it's almost the kiss of death to get a touchdown or two before the opposition starts moving.

The Southwest Conference has played 25 games this season to date. In eight of them the team that racked up points on the scoreboard first got licked.

Last Saturday was a good example. The conference had four games. In two of them the team that made 14 points before the other could score was defeated.

Southern Methodist jumped out to 14 points against Rice. But the Owls won the game 41-27 going away.

Arkansas scored 14 points before Texas hardly realized a football game was going on. Texas roared back to win 27-14.

Other examples: Wake Forest scored first on Southern Methodist; SMU won 13-7. Texas Christian was 19 points behind Oklahoma A&M; Texas Christian finally gained a 33-33 tie. Missouri scored first on Southern Methodist; SMU won 28-27. Rice got a touchdown so quick it made Louisiana State's head swim; the swimming sensation didn't last long, however—Louisiana State won 14-7.

Texas scored first on Oklahoma; Oklahoma won the game 20-14. Arkansas scored first on Baylor but got licked 35-13.

Coach Jess Neely of Rice, who can speak from immediate experience, looks at it like this: "You don't get ahead and try to hold them. Who ever heard of passing on the second down, two to go, for a first down, a few years back? Rice scored a touchdown in that situation against Southern Methodist."

Probably the most unusual shut-out game in World Series history took the 10-hit job Yankee Spud Chandler turned in against the 1943 Cards.

For the first time in longer than most Southwest conference coaches like to remember, SMU presently is down next to Texas A&M at the bottom of the heap in the standings, in conference play. Rice put the Mustangs there Saturday night.

It's an unfamiliar picture, looking from top to bottom. We find Baylor, Rice, Texas, TCU, Arkansas, SMU and A&M in that order.

Midland's Bulldogs are getting down to serious business about this coming game with Odessa. Using their own initiative, they are doing extra duty learning plays for the tilt.

Jimmy O'Neal, first-class center and linebacker, led a class in a blackboard session Monday night. It was attended by players only.

Coaches didn't know a thing about it until O'Neal requested the keys to the field house so "we can have a meeting here tonight."

A team like that deserves all the backing we possible can give it. Never before has a Midland football team taken it on itself to spend extra time trying to learn something that would help stop a heavily-favored opponent.

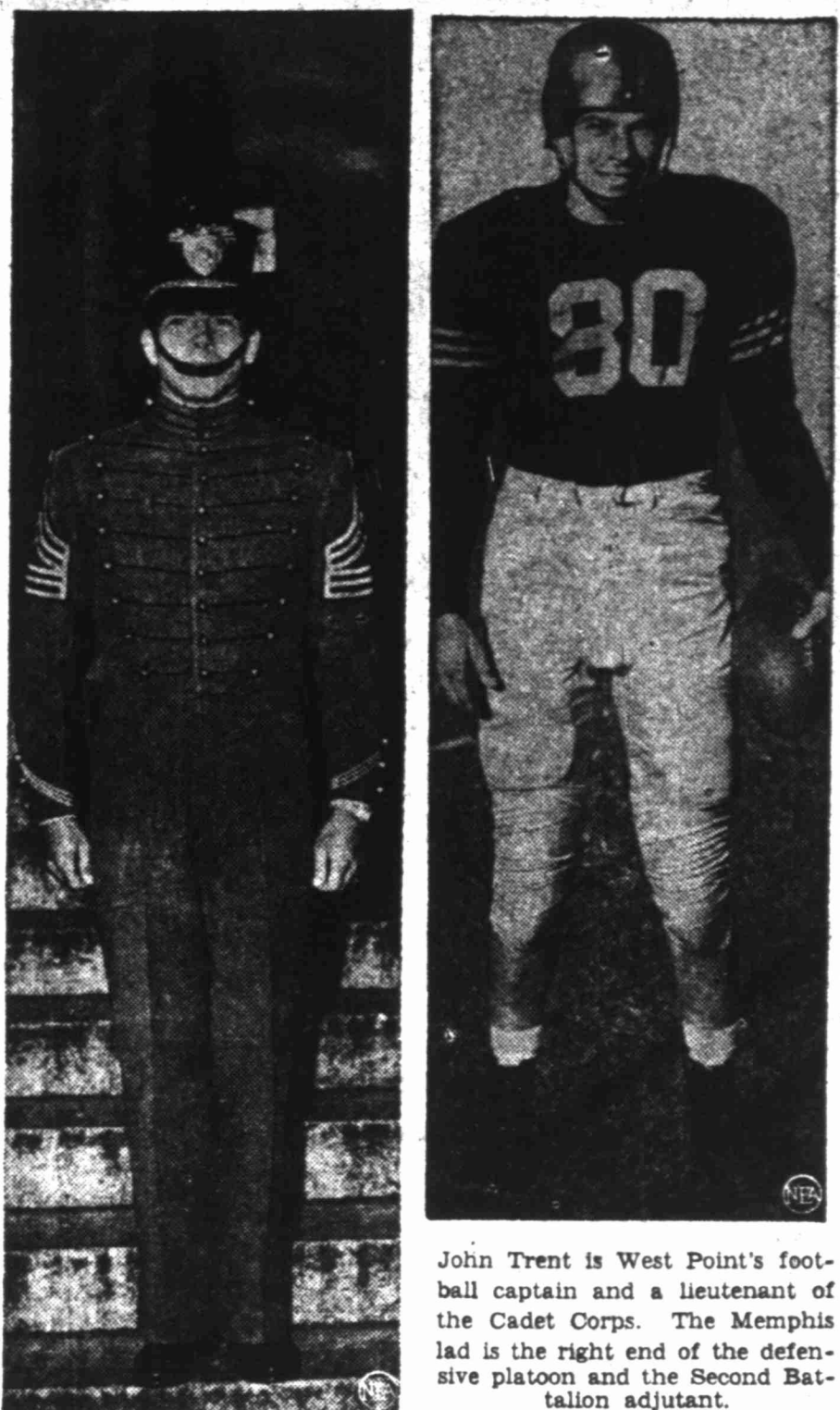

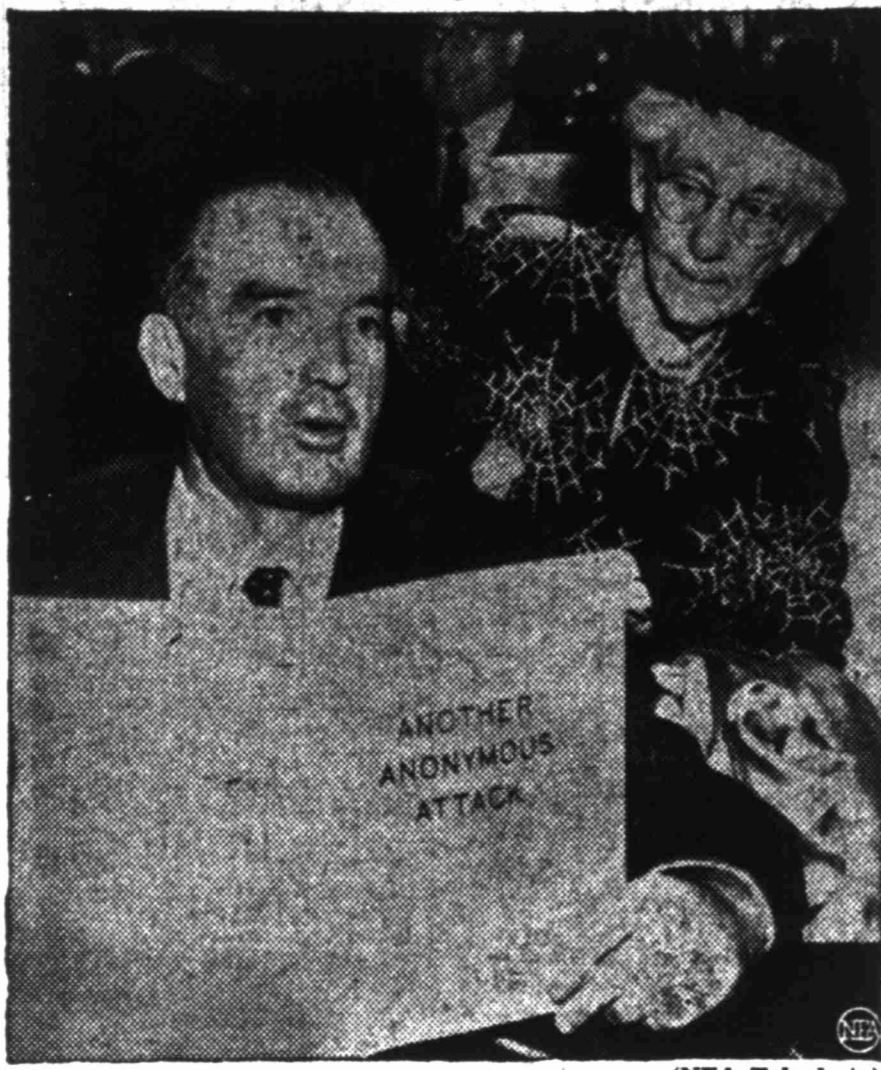
