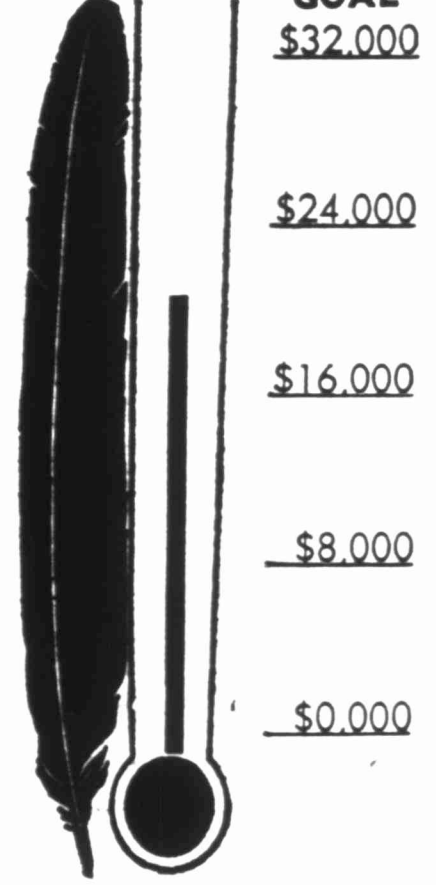

Neither of these possibilities is inevitable. Despite the rumpus raised at election time, the Soviet Union might continue on the council as before.

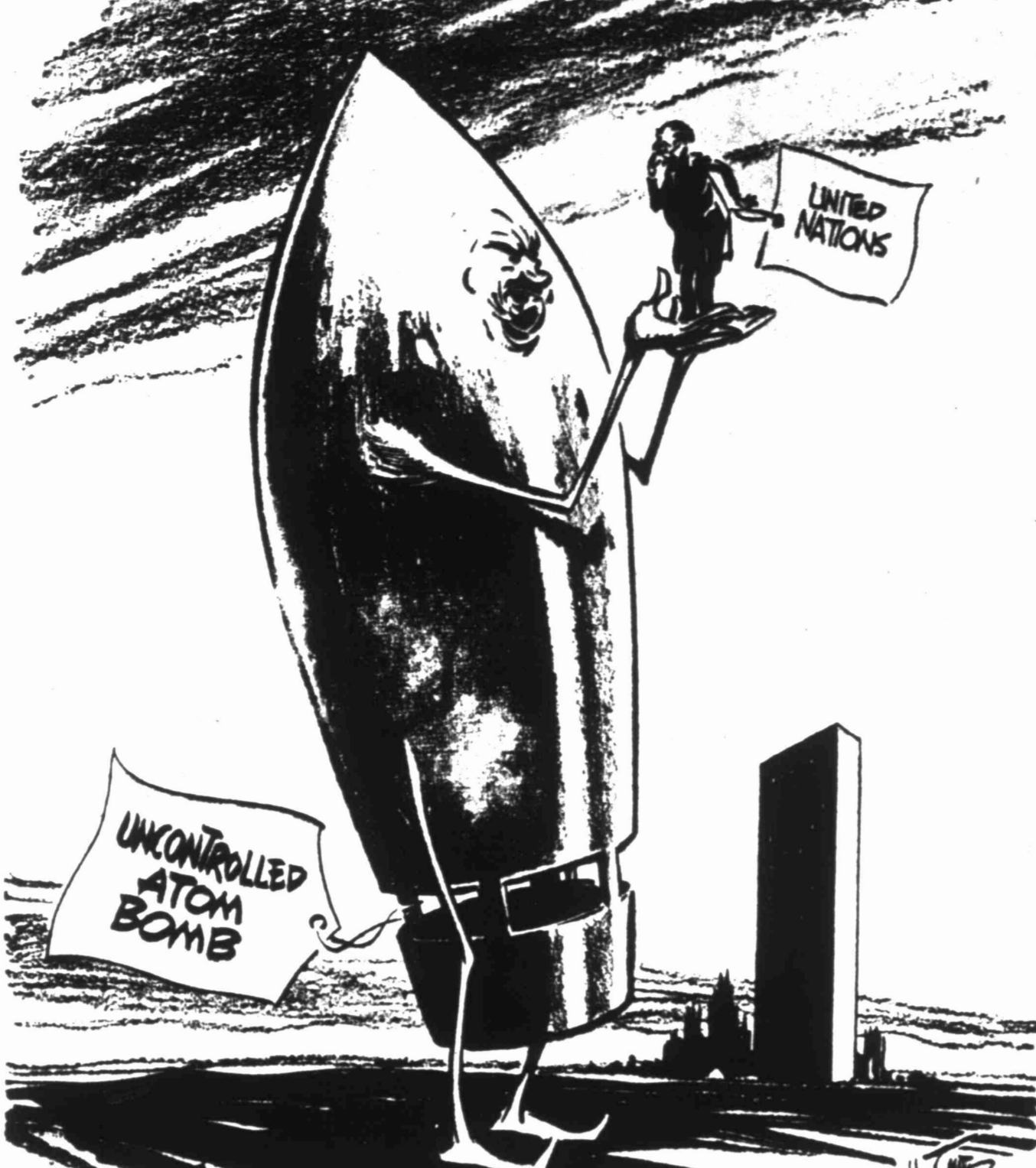

Uncle Sam Is Starting Out To 'Humanize' Federal Statistics

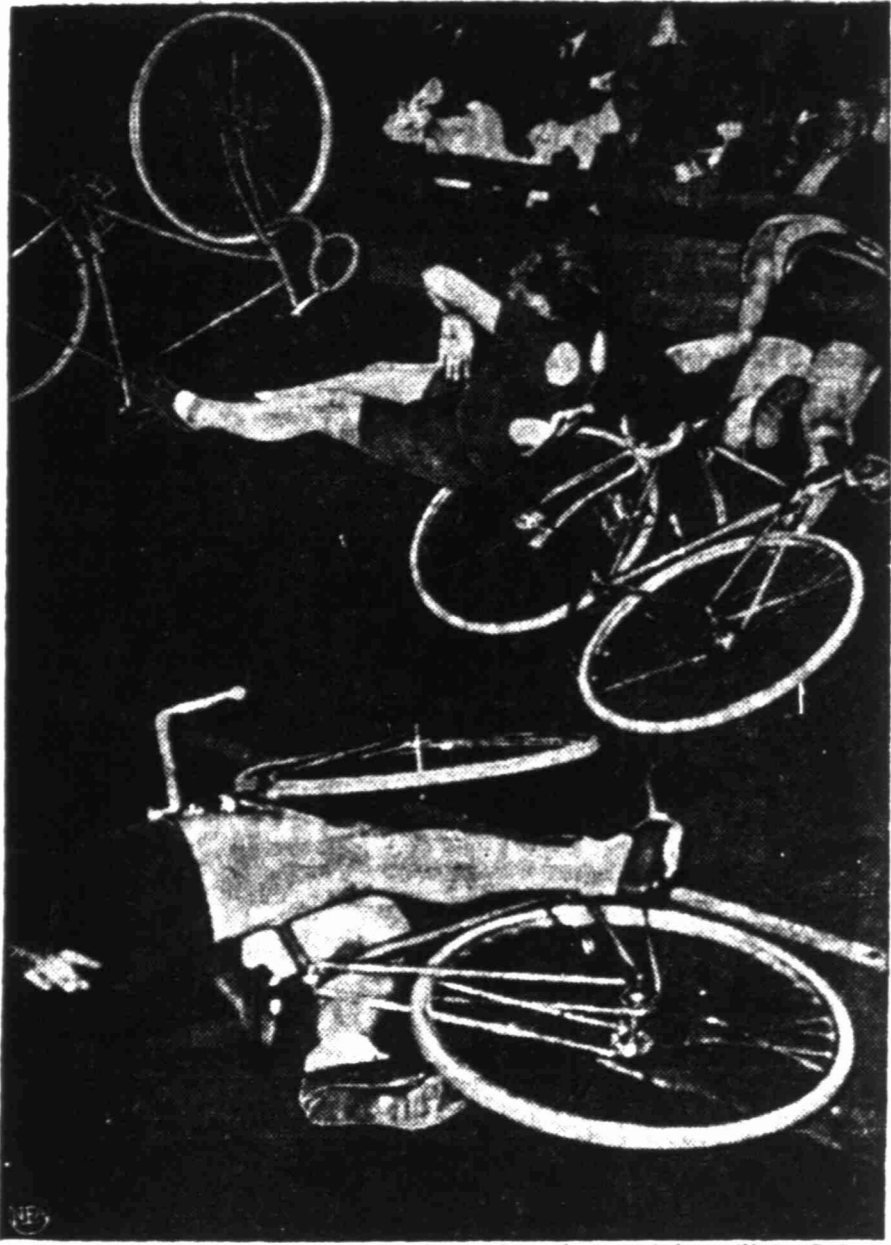

Making its power known, Rice moved into the top spot in team offense. The Owls have rolled up 2,821 yards in seven games for an average of 374. Texas has gained 2,664 yards in eight games for an average of 333.

When Texas and Texas Christian play at Austin Saturday, the two top passers of the conference will be matching throws. Paul Campbell of Texas leads with 1,052 yards on 71 completion in 139 attempts.

Lindy Berry of Texas Christian is five yards behind—because he has been in one less game than Campbell. Berry has connected on 77 throws in 154 for 1,047 yards.

The leading pass-receivers also will be playing against each other at Austin. Ben Proctor of Texas is the No. 1 man with 31 catches for 419 yards and four touchdowns.

Morris Bailey of Texas Christian is second with 29 for 417 yards and three touchdowns. J. D. Ison of Baylor has caught 30 but for only 315 yards.

Coach Turboat Jones Monday announced the Sixth Grade Bulldogs of John M. Cowden Junior High will play in the "Peanut Bowl" in Odessa November 19.

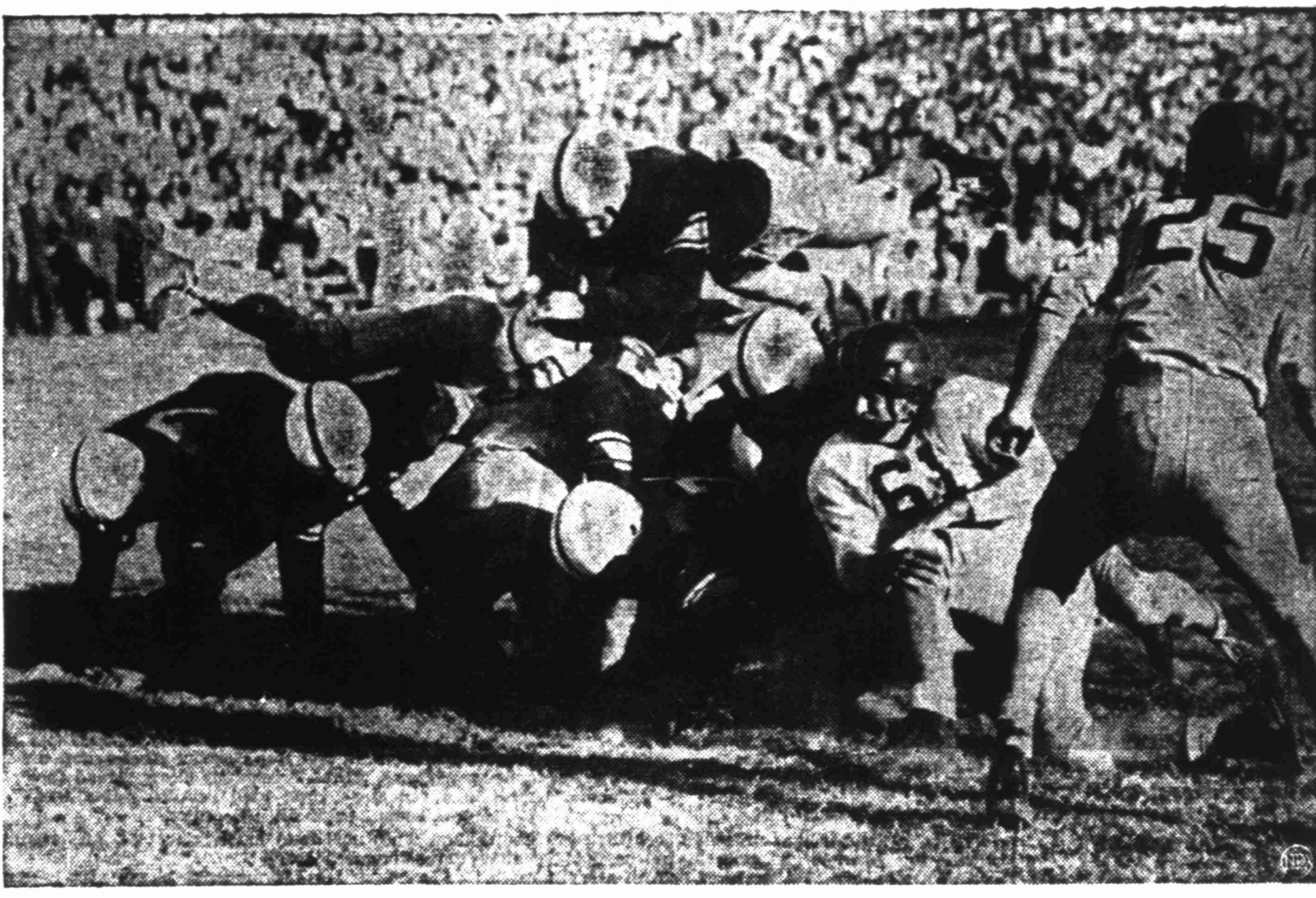
The game is scheduled in Broncho Stadium November 19 and is sponsored by the Odessa Kiwanis Club.

Bobby Layne Replaces Sammy Baugh As Top Pigskin Flinger In National Grid League

PHILADELPHIA—(AP)—Apparently all a man needs to lead the National Football League in passing is a good arm and the right call to Texas his home.

The latest NFL statistics released Tuesday disclosed that a Texan by the name of Robert L. Layne has replaced another Texan by the name of Samuel Adrian Baugh as the top aerial artist.

Baugh of Washington, who led the loop in the art of tossing the pigskin last week, now trails the adept Layne by a point and a half under the NFL's inverse system of rating. Charley Conerly of the New York Giants rated third and Johnny Lujack of the Chicago Bears fourth.

Layne, the former Texas University flash, pitched his New York Bulldogs to their first victory of the 1949 season last Sunday—

a 31-24 win over the New York Giants—as he completed 23 of 39 passes for 333 yards. It was the greatest day of Layne's pro football career. The Bulldog's "T" quarterback now has thrown 163 passes, completed 87 for 1,057 yards and four touchdowns. Only four Layne tosses have been intercepted.

Baugh's record now reads 132 attempts, 77 completions, 1,232 yards and 12 touchdowns.

Another Bulldog, End Bill Chipley, leads the pass receivers and he used Sunday's initial triumph to pad his figures. Chipley pulled in nine of Layne's tosses to make it 39 for the season and 456 yards gained. Tom Fears of Los Angeles held second place with 37 receptions good for 456 yards. Detroit's Bob Mann has gained 840 yards on 35 catches.

Harry Todd's all-Dallas team was second with a 64.

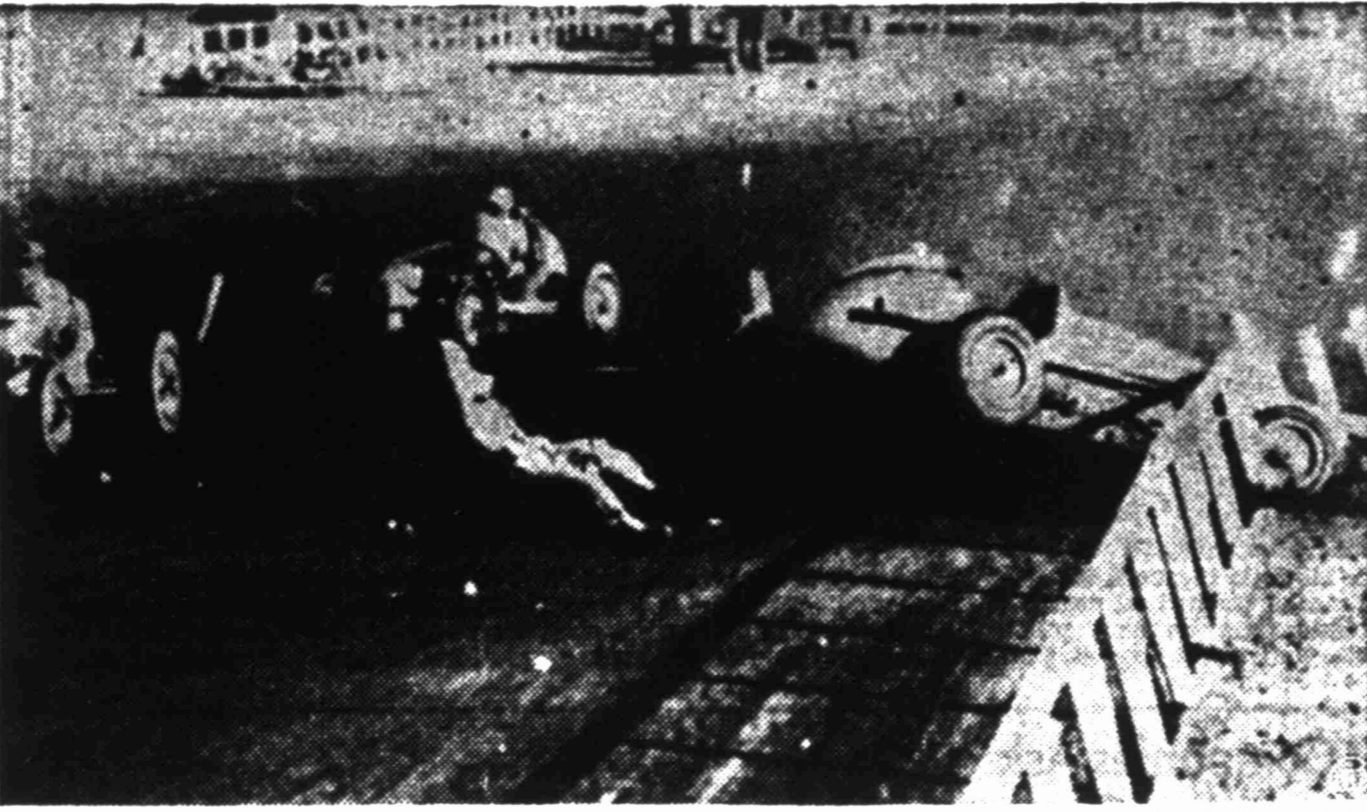
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Rex Mays Dies In Track Crash

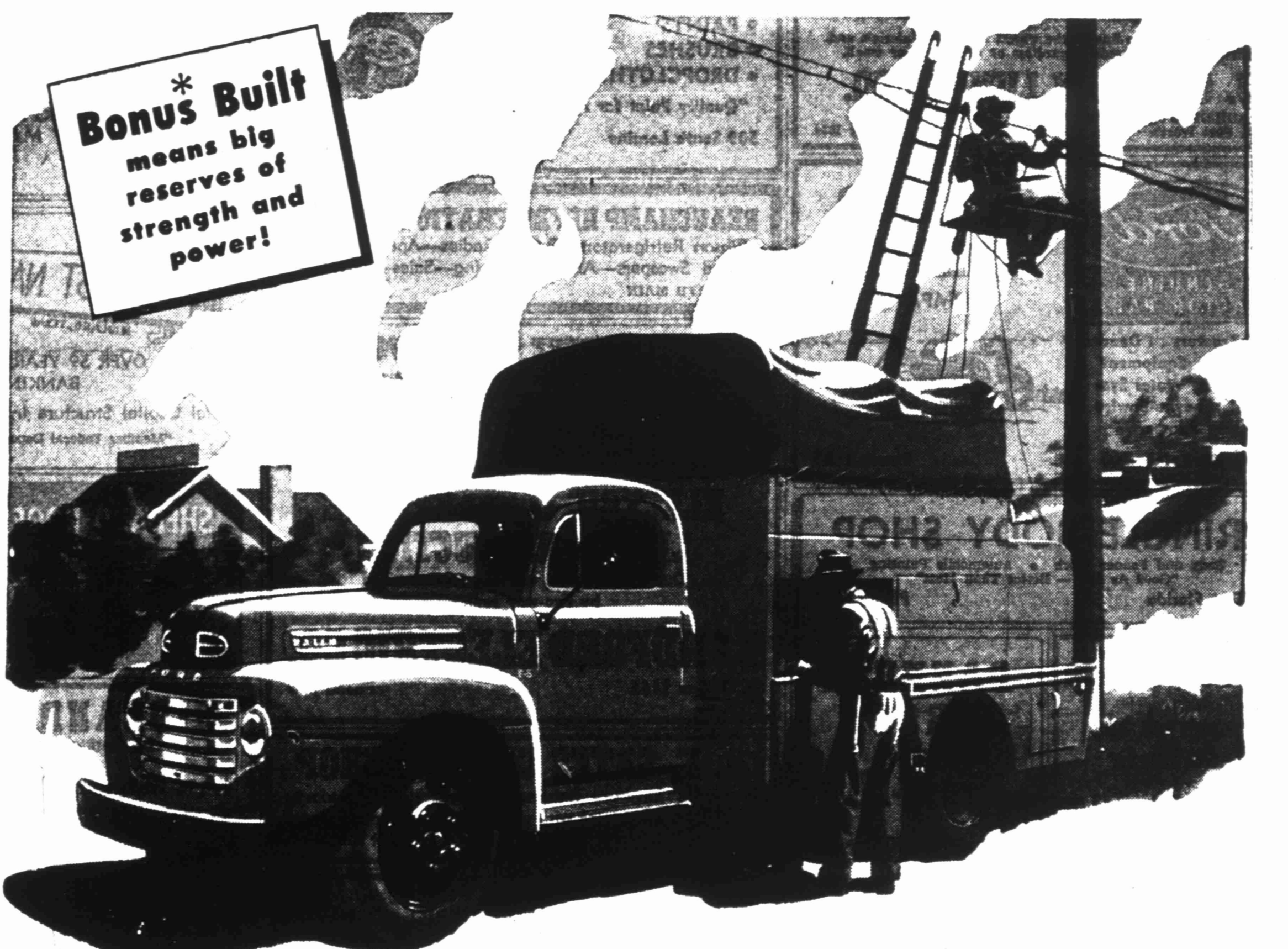

Reds 'Help' Czechs Exploit Uranium Deposits For Peace

PRAGUE, CZECHOSLOVAKIA—(AP)—Premier Antonin Zapotocky said Monday night that Russia is helping Czechoslovakia use her uranium mines "to ensure the peace of all the world."
Speaking at a Prague celebration of the Soviet Bolshevik Revolution, Zapotocky made public officially what has been reported reliably for some time—that Russians are exploiting the nation's important uranium mines. Zapotocky said the mines were being worked "with the help of the Soviet Union and its science."
"I think we have nothing to hide and nothing to be ashamed of," Zapotocky declared. "There are uranium deposits on our territory. We are proud of being able to use them to block the aggression and bandit greed of the warmongers, to help ensure the peaceful work of all progressive powers, to ensure the peace of all the world."
Uranium, principal element in making atom bombs, is known to exist in important deposits in the Jachymov (Joachimstal) region near the Czech-German border.
By size, Austria ranks nineteenth among the nations of Europe.

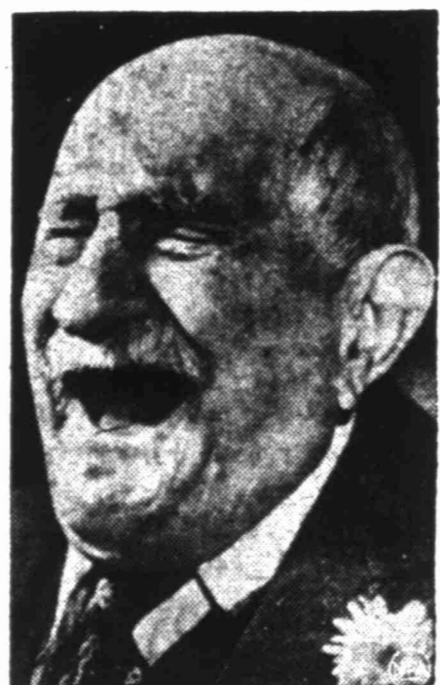

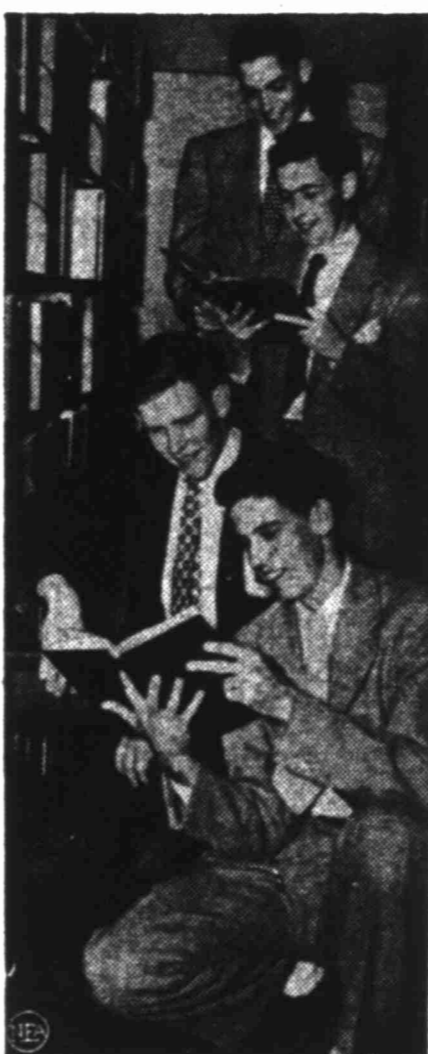

A close look at the loon launching showed the Navy's missile development has reached a stage where submarines can carry a number of jet weapons in normal undersea operations. The missile launching ramps are made of light steel framework easily taken down and stowed. A government report said the group, shouting pro-Russian and anti-government slogans, opened fire on the police when they tried to disperse the demonstration. The police fired back and were showered with bottles and stones. Some 500 demonstrators were marching toward Plaza de Armas Square, which was already jammed with hundreds of youths celebrating a traditional students' holiday, when the clash occurred. Police began a roundup of suspected leaders of the demonstration and said they had seized a large quantity of Communist propaganda leaflets. The Communist Party is outlawed in Chile.

Texas Sets Pace As Nation's Crude Production Climbs

TULSA, OKLA. —(P)—Daily average crude oil production in the United States during the week ended November 5 was 5,999,575 barrels, up 94,300 barrels from the previous week, the Oil and Gas Journal reported Tuesday. The biggest gain was 102,300 barrels in Texas, where allowables were revised for November. The state's total daily average was 2,128,500 barrels. Other sizeable increases were in Illinois, up 5,200 barrels to 182,000; New Mexico, up 4,285 to 131,185; and Indiana, 1,000 to 29,500. The Eastern area increased 50 barrels to 80,000, Kentucky gained 100 to 24,900, Louisiana advanced 450 to 531,775, Arkansas was up 250 to 73,200 and Colorado added 200 to 65,300. California Off California had the biggest decline, down 11,900 barrels to 870,000. Other major losses were Kansas, off 8,800 barrels to 266,800; Michigan, down 4,800 to 44,500; Mississippi, 1,500 to 94,200, and Wyoming, 1,100 to 127,800. Florida dropped 35 barrels to 1,015, Oklahoma slumped 200 to 425,850, Nebraska fell 50 to 960, Montana was off 150 to 26,900, and Utah declined 500 to 2,800. Production in Alabama was unchanged at 1,300 barrels.

Left Wing Union To Lose Many Members

PITTSBURGH —(P)—The United Electrical Workers, expelled from the CIO only last week for its left wing policies, was threatened Tuesday with the immediate loss of more than 107,000 members. At the same time the CIO announced that the new Union of Electrical Workers—Organized to supplant the UEW—had won its first employer recognition in a contract signed with two firms employing 1,075 workers at Yonkers, N. Y. The survey covered scores of locals in 12 states—California, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Massachusetts, Minnesota, Missouri, New Jersey, New York, Ohio, Pennsylvania and West Virginia. It showed that 107,482 UE members have voted to secede from the parent union or otherwise have indicated strongly they intend to do so in less than a week since the UE was expelled by the national CIO for left wingism. A total of 68,608 UE members in other locals have voted to stick by the parent organization or have announced that is their intention.

14 PERSONS KILLED IN TRAIN COLLISION

MADRID, SPAIN. —(P)— Two electric trains collided near here Monday night, killing at least 14 persons and injuring more than 30. The crash occurred between Las Matas and Las Rozas stations 14 miles north of Madrid.

CHICAGO —(P)—Vice President Barkley, who in 10 days is to become a bridegroom at 71, Monday was named "grandfather of 1949." The award was presented to Barkley who has seven grand-children—by the National Federation of Grandmothers and Grandfathers Clubs. Barkley, who came to Chicago to address the American Petroleum Institute, said he had visited Mrs. Carleton Hadley, his bride-to-be, in a St. Louis hospital where she is confined with the flu. He said she was "feeling better" but would be in the hospital several days. The vice president declined to discuss any honeymoon plans he and his 38-year-old fiancée have made. "We may just travel from place to place," Barkley told reporters. The wedding is scheduled November 18 in St. Louis.

Man Wins Out In Silence Marathon

HOLLYWOOD —(P)—A man can keep quiet longer than a woman. This age-old biological fact was proven scientifically Monday by a radio show (People Are Funny). WASHINGTON —(P)—The FBI arrested a former Army aircraft inspector Monday night on charges of sending a \$200,000 extortion letter to an official of the Fairchild Aircraft Corporation. It identified the arrested man as Joseph R. Roth, 40, of Washington, and said he apparently harbored some resentment against the firm. The extortion letter was received by Sherman Fairchild. Fairchild now is on the company's board of directors, but he was not associated with the firm while Roth was working there. The FBI also accused Roth of trying to extort \$25,000 from A. J. Eckhardt of Baldwin, N. Y. Fairchild said Eckhardt had worked at the company's Ranger Engine Plant as an inspector, and added that apparently was Roth's superior. The executive said Roth's letter gave the impression that he was "obsessed with the idea he's not had a fair deal." "His argument is with the Air Force," Fairchild said, "not with Fairchild."

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Man Who May Succeed Joe Stalin Heads Purge Of Nation's Officials

NEW YORK (NEA)—A new purge of top Party officials is reported taking place in Soviet Russia under the personal supervision of Lavrenti P. Beria, chief of the all-powerful MVD and the latest leading contender for Stalin's job. The purge seems to involve mostly friends and followers of the late Andrei Zhdanov. Only vague reports have reached usually well-informed Communist circles in Europe. It is attributed to a new struggle for power which recently has developed inside the Politburo. Members of Stalin's immediate entourage have long been cautiously maneuvering for a place in anticipation of his death. The late Andrei Zhdanov generally had been regarded as a possible successor. But now Zhdanov is dead and Molotov apparently is in eclipse. The two leading actors in this unfolding Soviet drama are Beria and Georgi M. Malenkov, one of the younger and more able members of the Politburo.

Lavrenti Beria: Strong measures and direct action.

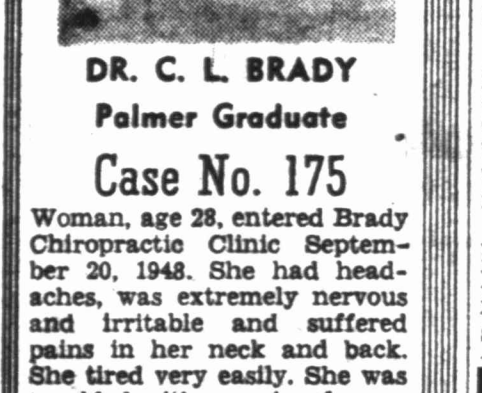
Odds On Beria
For the moment, the odds are on Beria, balding, stocky, former student of architecture. As head of the secret MVD, he wields unlimited power wherever the Kremlin's agents operate. While Malenkov controls the Party machine which now is being purged, Beria, in addition to the MVD, is said to have also the support of Stalin's "inner cabinet." This includes Marshal Kliment Voroshilov and the Caucasian-born Armenian, Mikoyan—but not Malenkov and Molotov.

The son of a poor peasant, Lavrenti Pavlovich Beria was born 50 years ago in the Georgian village of Merkhouli in the Sukhum region, which also is the birthplace of Stalin. Poor though he was, his father scraped together enough money to send him to the Sukhum high school and the Baku Polytechnic.

He cast his lot with the Bolsheviks at the age of 18—henceforth mixing his studies with conspiratorial activity. Science and engineering always have been Beria's hobbies and he is generally credited with having procured the atom bomb for Russia.

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ber of the Supreme State Defense Committee. By a combination of scientific planning which he had learned as a student of architecture, and by the most ruthless disregard for human life, he kept the Soviet war industries humming. By keeping the firing squads working overtime he assured the safety of the Communist dictatorship.

Of all the members of the Politburo, Beria alone was recently singled out by Stalin for special honors. He was awarded the coveted Lenin Order "for outstanding services to the Party and Soviet people."

Unlike Malenkov, who ostensibly represents a "moderate" wing of the Politburo which believes in postponing the day of reckoning with the "capitalist democracies," Beria is a firm exponent of strong measures and direct action. His rise to power, Communist circles in Europe believe, will soon be followed by Soviet military pressure against Yugoslavia and Finland.

With Moscow facing grave difficulties in the satellite countries and a showdown with Tito imminent, Lavrenti P. Beria seems the logical successor to Stalin.

Responsible To Beria
Many chiefs of state behind the Iron Curtain and some of the top ministers—Erno Geroe in Hungary, Anna Pader and Bodnarenko in Rumania, President Bierut in Poland, Rudolf Slansky in Czechoslovakia, and Walter Ulbricht, Vice Premier of the recently-created Eastern German Republic—are actually Soviet citizens and long-time agents of the MVD and MGB (Soviet Ministry of State Security), responsible directly to Beria.

Beria has mild manners and even milder appearance. He usually wears a pince-nez which makes him look like a pre-revolutionary divinity student. However, he is a firm believer in terror. After his visit to Germany in June 1947 correspondents at once noted an increase in Soviet arrests, kidnapping of dissidents and other typical methods of "ideological persuasion."

Kept Industries Going
The same was true of the other satellite countries visited by him. But Beria himself never takes chances. Wherever he goes he usually drives a long black Packard with bullet-proof windows and is flanked by a host of MVD agents.

In 1941, when Hitler was already knocking at the gates of the Kremlin, Stalin again put his confidence in Beria and appointed him a marshal of the Soviet Union and mem-

Poetry Poor Way To Earn, Says Author

By HAL BOYLE
NEW YORK (AP)—Millions of Americans want to be successful authors. But only 1,000 really are. What defeats the rest? Robert Penn Warren, Pulitzer Prize winning novelist, says this is one of the chief reasons:

"Lack of nerve or hard work. You have to be willing to take a beating."
Warren is an expert at taking the beating of popular indifference to his work. For 20 years this Kentucky-born poet, editor and university professor has been hailed by critics as one of the nation's finer literary craftsmen.

But over a 17-year period he wrote a biography, three books of poetry, and three novels before the public woke up to his merit. He hit the jackpot with the third novel, "All the King's Men." This study of a Southern political dictator won him the Pulitzer Prize. Since 1946 it has sold more than 100,000 copies and has just been made into a movie by Columbia Pictures.

Ten-Year Slight
"Some people say I patterned my dictator after Huey Long," grinned Warren, a lanky, red-haired man of 44. "But it could just as well be Bilbo, Mussolini, Hitler—or a thousand other dictators."
He is a slow writer and pecked out "All the King's Men" over a ten-year period.

"I know how it feels to be a frustrated writer—at least six days a week," he said. "I write with a typewriter. Can't read it if I don't. 'Poetry? Well, I do scribble a little bit of that by hand—then get it on the typewriter fast so I can look at it. But poetry is really sound. You compose it out loud as you pace the floor mumbling. No Profit In Rhyme"

"Writing poetry is more pleasant than prose. You can lie on your back and mumble longer before you have to get up and go to the typewriter."
Warren never has made as much as \$1,000 from a poetry book and doubts if any poet in America—except possibly Robert Frost—gets a livable income from verse alone. In fact he thinks it's a mistake for serious young authors to try to earn their way from the start by their writing.

"Get a job," he advised. "Then try to write and see what happens. I always had a teaching job. 'When you have a job, you can write the way you want to and hope for the best. You don't have to count on it for the groceries.'"

Ultra-Modern Store Models To Be Displayed In Midland

Models of 12 ultra-modern "open-front" stores, typical of the commercial shops scheduled for the "American Main Street of Tomorrow," have been scheduled for showings here Wednesday and Thursday under the sponsorship of the Chamber of Commerce. The outdoor exhibit will be staged directly from two specially designed vans parked at the corner of Lorraine and Wall Streets in downtown Midland.

Developed by the Pittsburgh Plate Glass Company's department of architectural design at a cost exceeding \$250,000, the models are enroute here in two display trailers. Planned as a service to architects, merchants, and civic groups interested in mass modernization of their community, the model stores required more than a year to develop and build.

According to Delbert Downing, Chamber of Commerce manager, both showings are open to the public although primarily intended for Midland area architects, builders and merchants. The exhibit is scheduled from 5 p.m. to 10 p.m. both evenings.

Because 10 of the 12 stores in the exhibit are of the "open-front" type, lighting of the models is of particular significance. General Electric lighting scientists collaborated in engineering the lighting arrangements used in the models. The simulated store lighting has been arranged to enhance the display effect of the store interior as seen from the street.

Model Stores
The model stores are constructed to one-eighth scale with the displays being executed in minute detail. According to Elmer A. Lundberg, director of architectural design for the firm, the models shown can be used as basic designs by architects for any locality in the U. S. A.

In describing the "open-front" stores featured, Lundberg said, "Architects throughout the nation are becoming increasingly conscious that 'display' is one of the most important words in any merchant's vocabulary. Display of the entire store is what the merchant wants. And it's what he gets in the 'open-front' type of store."

"As planned by a great mass of American merchants, store-front modernization programs are designed primarily to lure customers into the business establishment. Mass modernization, however, will result in solid business areas being transformed from drab and austere shopping districts into block-long centers with sparkling, jewel-like exteriors," the Pittsburgh Plate Glass Company official stated.

The models include a tavern, pharmacy, women's apparel store, jewelry store, food market, theater, restaurant, bakery, hardware store, shoe shop, floral shop and men's apparel shop.

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Rubber-Tire Train Serves In Europe

NEW YORK—The Paris-Strasbourg railway route in Europe now carries a train equipped with pneumatic rubber tires says Product Engineering Magazine in a report from abroad.

The McGraw-Hill publication states that the rubber-tired, "silent" train first appeared in 1929 when the Michelin Company conducted experiments and produced the "Micheline" rail coach. But the manufacture of trains equipped with pneumatic tires was soon abandoned since there was no method in the event of a blowout of keeping the train operating at full speed.

French engineers resumed work on the revolutionary train in 1939 and continued their experiments during the German occupation. A new ten-wheeled coach was perfected to permit the spreading of the coach's load to the other nine wheels when one wheel is damaged, enabling the train to continue at its normal speed to a service depot.

"Silent" Coaches
The pneumatic tire requires that the railway cars be of lightweight construction, and therefore the "silent" coaches of the French State Railways are not as massive as standard cars. Stainless steel construction guarantees the passenger's safety, in spite of the lighter weight of the coaches.

Additional passenger safety is provided by a combination of devices. In the event of a collision, the pneumatic shock absorbers enclosed in the ends of the car walls, and other mechanisms would absorb some 14,800 foot-pounds of energy before the frame work of the train would be damaged.

Evansville's Teen Landlords Run Real Community Project



Railroad freight yard is the backdrop for Evansville's Community Center, but the 3,000 teen-age landlords have erased the railroad atmosphere from their unique project.

EVANSVILLE, IND. (NEA)—The Evansville Community Center, Inc., has 3,000 "landlords." It entertains 20,000 teen-agers a month. It is open from nine in the morning until 10 at night, six days a week. It is the scene of dances, parties and just plain fun. Yet there's not one set of initials scrawled on the walls.

The center is unique in many ways. Physically, it may not be as attractive as some; it is converted from a 50-year-old railway station that had later served as an automobile salesroom and a wartime USO. Its location, too, is not physically attractive—it is on a busy downtown corner next to busy railroad tracks—but that location makes it more convenient. Another factor that makes this center unusual is the complete lack of any restrictive signs. The youngsters decided on their own to ban smoking, for example, but no signs were tacked up.

Smoking Not Allowed When asked why smoking was outlawed, one girl said: "There is enough to do here without it. Besides, it is another way to get in more solid with the adults." Finding "enough to do here" is the job of the center's director, Arthur J. Grady, and his wife, Margaret, who serves as program supervisor. Grady emphasizes one point: "The kids are free to do what they want."

They function in small groups, rather than in masses. This, Grady feels, allows them to engage in the activities in which they are interested and encourages them to make their own friends. There is dancing indoors and out with a 12-piece orchestra two nights a week, volleyball, pool, shuffleboard, basketball court, ample places to lounge, shops, snack bar, table tennis, badminton, ping-pong and a complete kitchen. Hold Memberships "Landlords" of the center are 3,000 teen-agers and young adults who hold \$1 memberships. Seventy-five adult groups, including Alcoholics Anonymous, hold their regular sessions in the meeting rooms of the former depot. For this privilege there is no charge, but in re-
