# Deficit Financing

The federal government is expected by President Truman to pile up a \$5,500,000,000 deficit in the fiscal year ending next June 30. Other forecasters think the final figure may be closer to \$7,000,000,000.

Whichever total proves right, it will be the biggest deficit ever recorded in the United States during a prosperous peacetime. Many Americans may be somewhat shocked to realize that even when times are good and there is no war, the government cannot operate on anything near a pay-as-you-go basis.

In January Truman predicted the deficit for the current fiscal year would come to just \$900,000,000. The President's latest report blames the changed outlook largely on an anticipated drop in tax revenues of \$3,000,-000,000. But spending also will be higher than planned-\$1,600,000,000.

Truman's budget review says the expected decline in revenues will be an outgrowth of moderate decreases in prices, corporate profits and money incomes that accompanied the 1949 recession.

The added expenses are ascribed mainly to unlooked for increases in veterans' benefits, government purchases of housing mortgages and farm price supports. It is estimated the farm price props now will take \$1,400,000,000 this fiscal year, compared to an original guess of only \$600,000,000. Thus this item accounts for \$800,000,000 or half-the expected higher outlay by government.



# Spotlight On Coal



John L. Lewis' recall of the striking coal miners came just as many householders were about to feel the pinch of the coal shortage. Here is graphic evidence of the vital role coal plays in the nation's life. At left, symbolic of the approaching coal squeeze was this picture of one of the last truckloads of coal leaving an empty retail supply yard in Cleveland, Ohio. The UMW has warned "private householders and public institutions" to stock up on coal between now and November 30, in the event "a further suspension" of coal mining is necessary. Above, this map, based on data from the U.S. Geological Survey and the Bituminous Coal Institute, spots the known coal reserves of the United States. The five leading states in bituminous coal production are sketched, with their percentage of the

**T&P Truck Service** To Non-Rail Cities Approved By Court

DALLAS-(P)-The Texas & Pacific Motor Transport Company can go on giving truck service to towns not on the Texas & Pacific Railroal. A special three-judge federal court ruled Wednesday that the Interstate Commerce Commission has no right to enforce its order that the company must stop that kind of

Federal District Judge Benjamin C. Dawkins of Monroe, La., dissented, but he did not file a minority

Federal Judges William H. Atwell of Dallas and Edwin R. Holmes of New Orleans said enforcement of the order would be "confiscation destruction."

The transport company is owned by the T&P Railroad. The truck line has been operating in Texas, Louisiana and New Mexico under ICC permits which allowed it to provide service that was "auxiliary to and supplemental of" rail service furnished by the T&P.


In January, 1948, the ICC ruled that the trucking company could not serve a point not on the rail line, that it must charge regular rail freight rates, and that it could not interchange freight with other truck

The special ruling was to have gone into effect last August 4, but it was held up until after the hear-

When done, place rounds cut from a roll of snappy cheese on each point where the lattice crosses and return to the oven for 2 or 3 min-

# Proposal To Adopt Red Plan Rejected

The Maulana claimed that he was not a member of the Communist Party but only a sympathizer with Communist principles. The assembly voted for the official preamble of "constituting India into a sovereign democratic republic.


