

**Superforts Collide High In Air**

**Four Of 22 Men Aboard Known Safe**

STOCKTON, CALIF.—(AP)—Two Air Force Superforts collided 26,000 feet above Stockton at midnight. One fell in flames. The tail of the other fell off and it crashed in the mud.  
Four of the 22 men aboard were saved.  
Seven were found dead in the wreckage.  
Eleven are missing.  
Detailed checking eliminated one survivor reported by Lodi, Calif., police. The four survivors—all at the Navy Annex of the Stockton Supply Depot after treatment for minor injuries—are:

**Chest Drive Total Climbs To \$27,376**

Contact work in the office buildings practically is complete. Leader Boyd Laughlin announced. The school contributions are approximately twice the 1948 total for that classification. H. D. Bushnell reported.

Plans for pushing the drive to a successful conclusion were mapped by the volunteer workers. Ryan pointed out contributions have been received from approximately 1,800 persons, as compared to a total of about 1,400 last year.  
The general chairman outlined the need for youth welfare agencies in combating juvenile problems. He said the youth welfare organizations financed by Chest funds deserve 100 per cent support.  
The drive has been underway here the last two weeks, with more than 200 volunteer workers engaged in the contact work. Residents in all sections of the city and county have been approached by workers for their Chest contributions.  
"GIVE . . . Give Enough" is the campaign slogan.  
Six youth welfare and charitable organizations—Boy Scouts, Youth Center, Girl Scouts, Goodfellows, USO and Salvation Army—participate in the Community Chest funds. The operating expenses of (Continued On Page 14)

**FBI Joins Manhunt For Glucoff Slayer**

LOS ANGELES.—(AP)—With the issuance of a federal fugitive warrant, the Federal Bureau of Investigation Thursday joined the international search for Fred Stroble, wanted for questioning in the sadistic slaying of little Linda Joyce Glucoff.

Meantime, police in this country and Mexico questioned scores of men who answered the description of the 66-year-old retired baker, a fugitive from justice on a charge of molesting a 10-year-old girl in nearby Highland Park. The district attorney's office has filed a murder complaint against him.

The slayer still was at large Thursday, more than two days after the six-year-old girl's strangled, stabbed and ax-bludgeoned body was found under a pile of rubbish near a neighbor's home.

The home was that of Mr. and Mrs. Reuben Hausman, daughter and son-in-law of Stroble, who was staying with them temporarily. Police took statements from the Hausmans Wednesday night.

Police pointed out that the slayer had a 14-hour start and easily could have traveled far before the crime was discovered.

Mexico police continued searching the Tijuana area, where Stroble was known to have stayed previously. Linda's parents, meanwhile, disclosed that there will be no funeral rites for the little girl. Her body will be placed directly in a crypt. The parents explained they wanted to remember the child as she looked that last afternoon as she ran happily out to play.

**Suspect Held At Galveston Released**

GALVESTON.—(AP)—Galveston police Thursday ruled out an elderly man held here as a suspect in the kidnaping and slaying of six-year-old Linda Joyce Glucoff in Los Angeles.  
They had picked the man up Wednesday night. His appearance was similar to descriptions of Fred Stroble, whom Los Angeles police are seeking.

"He's definitely not the man," Chief of Detectives V. J. Burns said Thursday. Burns said a check of fingerprints proved it.

**Idaho Girl Feared Victim Of Kidnaper**

BURLEY, IDAHO.—(AP)—Officers expressed fear Thursday that a seven-year-old girl, missing since late Wednesday, may have been kidnaped.  
Glenda Joyce Brisbane, daughter of a transport company driver, reportedly entered an automobile driven by a man at 5:30 p.m. Wednesday.  
Road blocks have been set up throughout Southern Idaho.  
Burley Chief of Police Bill Williams said a posse of 200 men had made a house-to-house canvass in an attempt to find the girl.

**Giant Air-Sea Hunt Goes On For Lost B-29**

HAMILTON, BERMUDA.—(AP)—The biggest peacetime air rescue search in history was underway Thursday for a lost B-29 bomber which ran out of fuel and crashed-landed in the sea somewhere near Bermuda Wednesday. Twenty U. S. airmen were aboard.

Almost 100 Air Force, Navy and Coast Guard planes from bases all along the Atlantic Seaboard criss-crossed above Bermuda's surrounding waters hoping for a sight of the stricken bomber or bobbing life rafts.

First search patrols Wednesday afternoon were fruitless.  
The last word from the Superfortress, whose navigation instruments failed on a flight to England, was a radio message. Going to ditch in five minutes.

After that message Wednesday morning a U. S. Coast Guard vessel heard weak SOS signals—spurring hopes that the crewmen had taken to rubber life rafts equipped with automatic distress signalers.

The plane, part of a B-29 group enroute to England from March Air Base, California, lost its way when its radio navigation equipment failed and it encountered bad weather. U. S. officials at Kindley Air Base here thought it probably went down 150 miles southwest of northeast of Bermuda.

**Police Say Slayer Of Girl Sane**

DALLAS.—(AP)—Two members of the Dallas Police Department testified Thursday they believe Keith Petersen, 21, was sane when he killed his girl friend here last September 2.

They were L. G. Delk, city detective, and P. B. Leach of the Home Cide and Robbery Squad. They testified for the state at a sanity hearing for Petersen.

Petersen, former Southern Methodist University student, shot Carolyn Schofield, 20, in a downtown office building.

Reached Scene Quickly  
Leach said he reached the scene of the crime a few minutes after the victim had been shot. A pistol was on the floor near the table. Young Petersen was sitting on a couch in the room and volunteered to answer any questions.

"In my opinion," said Leach, "he was sane."  
Delk took a statement from Petersen following the slaying.  
"Do you think he (Petersen) knew it was wrong to kill that girl?" District Attorney Will Wilson asked.

"Yes," Delk replied.  
"In my opinion he was sane," he added.  
Other witnesses who testified for the state Thursday were R. C. C. Jamison, employe of a Dallas store, who said he sold a man, who identified himself as "K. L. Petersen," a pistol the day of the crime; and Ben Burch, negro porter at the Southland Life Building where the slaying occurred.

Psychiatrist Testifies  
Dr. P. T. Harrington, Dallas psychiatrist, said Wednesday Petersen is insane. Neighbors, a friend of the slain girl, and a college teacher pictured Keith as a moody, self-styled intellectual who hated his mother and worshipped the girl he shot.

Dr. Harrington said Keith is a paranoid-schizophrenic who thinks the world is against him, and whose thinking, emotions and actions fail to run parallel to reality.

Survivors, besides Dave Tidmore, are three sons, Morris Tidmore of Albany, Charlie Tidmore of Mount Pleasant and H. H. Tidmore of Fort Worth.

**Ex-Sergeant Is Indicted For Treason**

WASHINGTON.—(AP)—Attorney General McGrath Thursday announced the indictment of John David Provo, former U. S. Army staff sergeant, on charges of treason.  
The attorney general said the indictment was returned at noon by a federal grand jury in New York City. Provo has been under arrest there since September 2, when he was discharged from the Army.  
The indictment is based on alleged treasonous activities in the Philippines and Japan while Provo was a prisoner of war in the hands of the Japanese.

McGrath's announcement disclosed that about 15 witnesses were brought to this country from Japan after Provo's arrest, to testify about his activities before the grand jury.

The statement said that when Corregidor in the Philippines fell to the Japanese in May, 1942, Provo stepped forward and offered his assistance to the enemy. Thereafter he shaved his head and dressed as a Japanese Buddhist priest.

He was charged in the indictment with 12 specific acts of treason. Among these is an accusation that he caused the execution of Capt. Burton C. Thomson of the U. S. Army on Corregidor by reporting Thomson to the Japanese occupation force as "anti-Japanese and un-cooperative."

Subsequently the indictment said he aided the Japanese in various prisoner of war camps and prepared and broadcast Japanese propaganda scripts over radio Tokyo between 1943 and 1945.

The parade will move down Hill-nor Street to Main Street, down Main Street to Wall Street, up Wall Street to Loraine Street, up Loraine Street to Texas Street and back to the junior high starting point.

There will be a full police escort. Climax of the day will be a football game in Memorial Stadium at 2:30 p.m. bringing together the Eighth Grade Bullpups of Midland and a Colorado City eleven.

**Honolulu Shows Free Oil In Giorieta Zone Of Yoakum Wildcat**

Honolulu Oil Corporation No. 1 Paul Cobb, Central-East Yoakum County wildcat, 12 miles east of Plains, has indicated a possible discovery from the lower section of the Giorieta-Permian.

The petroleum came in a drillstem test at 6,031-6,144 feet, between two packers. Total depth is at 6,512 feet.

The tool was open four and one half hours. There was a strong to good blow of air at the surface during the test. Recovery was 200 feet of oil and gas cut drilling mud, 200 feet of mud cut oil and 2,050 feet of clean oil.

Operator re-set the packer twice during the test and the mud is thought to be the same as that in the drill pipe in the re-setting processes. There were no shows of water. The section in the hole between 6,144 feet and 6,512 feet logged no shows of oil or gas.

The venture is to drill ahead to explore into the Wasson 6800 and 7200 pay sections of the lower Permian.

Location is 660 feet from south and 1,980 feet from west lines of section 381, block D, John H. Gibson survey.

The 2,050 feet of clean oil recovered on the drillstem test was unloaded from the drill pipe as each joint was pulled and racked.

**Williams, Parham Set Cochran Prospector**

R. E. Williams and S. L. Parham of Midland No. 1 C. P. Starnes is to be a \$200-foot wildcat in Cochran County, nine and one-half miles south of Lehman.

The venture will be slightly more than one and one-half miles south of Lion Oil Company No. 1 Masten, recently completed three-quarter mile southwest extension to production from the San Andres in the Levalland field.

No. 1 Starnes will be 660 feet from north and east lines of section 23, Harrison and Brown survey.

Drilling is to begin by December 1.

**SW Midland Venture Enters Pennsylvanian**

General American Oil Company No. 1 Peck, Southwest Midland County wildcat, 30 miles southwest of the city of Midland, and at the center of the northwest quarter of the northwest quarter of section 21, block 41, T-4-S, T&P survey, had reached 10,075 feet in Pennsylvanian lime and was drilling deeper.

The prospector topped the Pennsylvanian at 10,022 feet on an elevation of 2,902 feet to make it 80 feet low to Magnolia Petroleum Company No. 1-A TXL, the discovery well of the Pegasus field, five miles to the southeast.

The venture is to continue to at least 13,900 feet to find and test the Ellenburger.

On the top of the Wolfcamp No. 1 Peck was 88 feet low to the Pegasus discovery. That formation was topped at 9,217 feet, according to some geologists.

**Upton Wildcat Gets Top Of Devonian Low**

Republic Natural Gas Company No. 1 American Republics Corporation, Central-North Upton County wildcat to 13,000 feet to explore the Ellenburger, topped the Devonian at 11,648 feet, on an elevation of 2,861 feet, to give a datum of minus 8,787 feet on that marker. It is drilling ahead below 11,559 feet in dry Devonian lime.

That makes it 80 feet low to the same point in Republic Natural No. 1 Powell, recently completed producer from the Ellenburger, one and three-eighths of a mile to the northeast.

The No. 1 American Republics Corporation is 660 feet from north and west lines of section 6, block 40, TP survey, T-5-S. It is three miles south of the initial producer in the Pegasus field.

Drilling is to continue at this exploration until it finds and tests the Ellenburger.

**Dawson Venture Has Fluorescence, Stains**

Reagan J. Caraway of Dallas No. 1 Lee, Northwest Dawson County wildcat, seven miles northwest of Wadessa, took a drillstem test in the Spraberry sandy lime at 7,390-7,411 feet.

There was a blow of air throughout the test. The tool was originally open for one hour. Apparently it closed at the end of that time. An effort was made to re-open it and it appeared to have started open for 30 minutes, after the re-setting. Recovery was 220 feet of gas cut drilling mud.  
The venture was deepened to 7,452 feet in sandy lime. The section at 7,420-18 feet showed fluorescence and stain and the interval from 7,418 feet to 7,464 feet was broken with stain and good fluorescence. It is understood that another drillstem test is to be run.  
The exploration is 660 feet from north and west lines of labor No. 1 league 3, Taylor County School Land survey. It was originally (Continued On Page 14)

Deficit Financing

The federal government is expected by President Truman to pile up a \$5,500,000,000 deficit in the fiscal year ending next June 30.

Whichever total proves right, it will be the biggest deficit ever recorded in the United States during a prosperous peacetime.

In January Truman predicted the deficit for the current fiscal year would come to just \$900,000,000.

Truman's budget review says the expected decline in revenues will be an outgrowth of moderate decreases in prices, corporate profits and money incomes...

The added expenses are ascribed mainly to unlooked for increases in veterans' benefits, government purchases of housing mortgages and farm price supports.

Economic crystal gazers who believe the President's deficit forecast too conservative note that the Bureau of Agricultural Economics sees a further drop in farm income in 1950.

Furthermore, some prophets foresee a sharper general falling off in tax revenues than the President's experts do.

This is not a cheerful picture, but one aspect of it lightens the gloom. These are not normal times of peace.

Yet there is no help for it—the money must be paid out if we are to continue our striving for a stable, peaceful world.

The average American might think that in the light of these colossal burdens the Administration and Congress would strain every effort to save money on other fronts.

The President says he sees no way out but higher taxes. But 1950 is an election year and few people believe Congress would vote heavier levies at such a time.

Barring a surprising switch to strict economy, there apparently is no hope of getting out from under deficit financing until our foreign and military expenditures begin to taper off, or unless U. S. national income soars to unimaginable heights.

Virgin Islanders Want To See A Native Son Made Governor

WASHINGTON—The 25,000 people of the Virgin Islands may get a governor from among their own number if President Truman continues his recent policy in dealing with America's island possessions.

The 50 islands, of which only three—St. Thomas, St. John, and St. Croix—are inhabited, were bought from Denmark in 1917 to protect the eastern entrance to the Panama Canal.

Another is Raymond Pace Alexander, a Philadelphia lawyer, who was considered for the judicial post which Hastie eventually got.

Dark Horse. A group of former New Dealers is said to be seeking the appointment of a "rugwell-type" governor. They believe that a man of the characteristics of Rexford Tugwell, former governor of Puerto Rico, is needed to develop the islands before a native governor is chosen.

Two Virgin Islanders are being considered for the post. One, Morris de Castro, is now acting governor, and has been endorsed by the Legislative Assembly. De Castro is not strictly a native, as he was born in Panama, but he has lived in the islands most of his life.

He held that job for 10 years until Dr. Ralph Bunche, head of the United Nations trusteeship division, sponsored him as chief of the Caribbean section of the UN trusteeship division. In this position he has been conducting UN studies of all the non-self-governing islands in the Caribbean area.

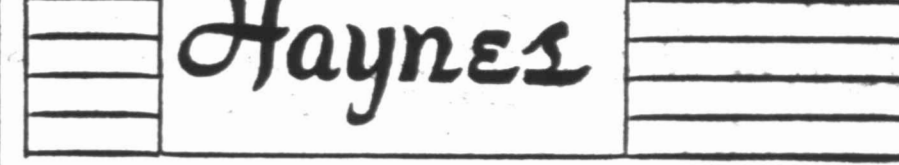

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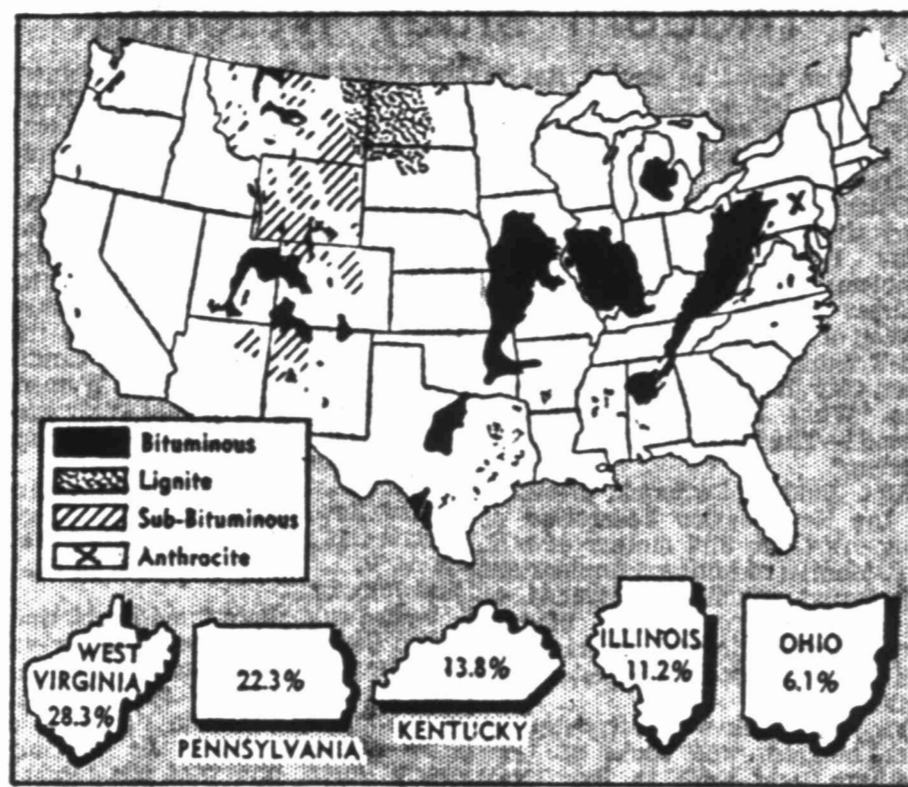
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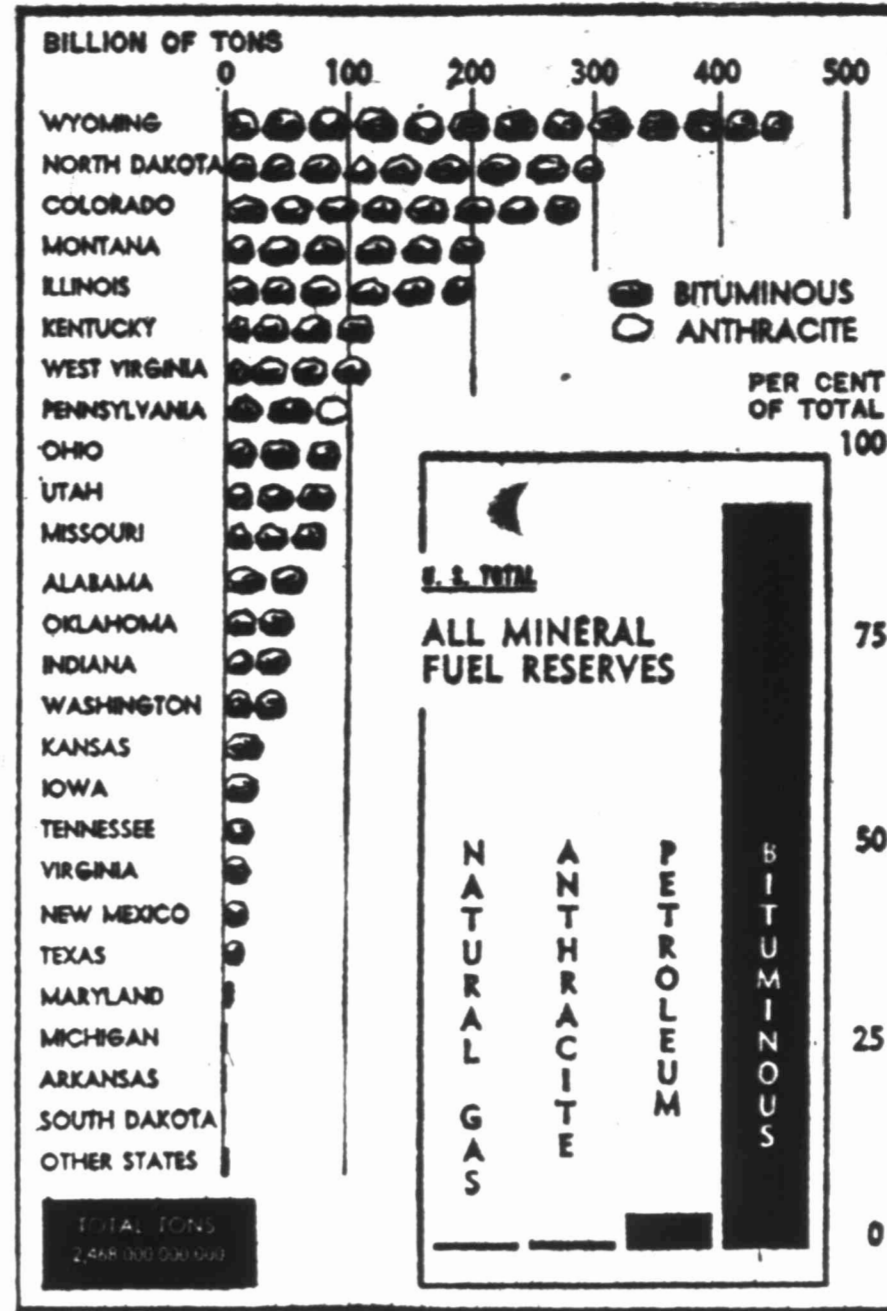

### Spotlight On Coal



John L. Lewis' recall of the striking coal miners came just as many householders were about to feel the pinch of the coal shortage. ### T&P Truck Service To Non-Rail Cities Approved By Court

DALLAS—(AP)—The Texas & Pacific Motor Transport Company can go on giving truck service to towns now on the Texas & Pacific Railroad. A special three-judge federal court ruled Wednesday that the Interstate Commerce Commission has no right to enforce its order that the company must stop that kind of service.

Federal District Judge Benjamin C. Dawkins of Monroe, La., dissented, but he did not file a minority opinion.

Federal Judges William H. Atwell of Dallas and Edwin R. Holmes of New Orleans said enforcement of the order would be "confiscation... destruction."

The transport company is owned by the T&P Railroad. The truck line has been operating in Texas, Louisiana and New Mexico under ICC permits which allowed it to provide service that was "auxiliary to and supplemental of" rail service furnished by the T&P.

In January, 1948, the ICC ruled that the trucking company could not serve a point not on the rail line, that it must charge regular rail freight rates, and that it could not interchange freight with other truck lines.

The special ruling was to have gone into effect last August 4, but it was held up until after the hearing.

The transport company attorneys claimed the firm had almost \$400,000 invested in equipment and ICC permits.

"After permitting acquisition of these certificates, could ICC issue orders which destroy their value?" Judges Atwell and Holmes asked in the decision. "No one learned in the law could permit an affirmative answer to that question."

OIL CITY, PA.—(AP)—Residents marveled when they got the snow forecasters promised for Western Pennsylvania Wednesday night.

The Weather Bureau hadn't said anything about it's being black.

A torrent of soot flakes blanketed the downtown area for fifteen minutes. Police said they were unable to trace the source. Oh, yes—they got a few flurries of the white stuff Thursday morning.

### U. S. At Odds With Both Sides In Chinese Conflict

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The United States found itself at odds Thursday with both sides in the conflict in China. Secretary of State Acheson was trying to figure out what to do about the situation.

On the one hand he had the problem of taking new and if possible more forceful steps to get Consul General Angus Ward released from a Communist jail at Mukden.

On the other hand he was confronted with a need for decision on what position this government should take regarding the shelling of the American merchant ship, the Flying Cloud, by a Chinese Nationalist warship. The warship was seeking to enforce a blockade of Communist-held ports which the United States does not recognize as a legal blockade.

Acheson told a news conference Wednesday the State Department is doing everything it can and considering all possible steps to obtain Ward's release. What steps actually may be under study he did not say. Diplomats were trying to puzzle out whether there really was any effective action this government could take beyond trying to persuade the Communist authorities to change their tough attitude toward the whole case.

They are even causing trouble for the trappers themselves by following trap lines and damaging pellets of other animals, muskrats mostly. So the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service is sending 'coon pelts to factories and laboratories in a search for other uses that will cut down on the little masked animals again.

### Oldtime Spy Rings Lacked Efficiency Of Modern Setups

WASHINGTON —(AP)— America's old-time spies seem picturesque in retrospect. They had none of the large-scale organization and efficiency of our modern espionage system, the Central Intelligence Agency. They worked only in wartime; that helped give them glamor.

Spying was largely a one-man or one-woman operation. The national favorite is young Nathan Hale, the Connecticut school teacher and Yaleman who became a captain in George Washington's army. He crossed into the Dutch school teacher to obtain military information. He was captured and hanged the next day.

"I only regret that I have but one life to lose for my country," the patriot is reported to have said before the noose tightened. Perhaps the young scholar was recalling a line from Joseph Addison's play "Cato": "What pity is it that we can die but once to save our country."

Another brave but less well-known spy for General Washington was Colonel Barton. He and a few soldiers disguised as non-combatants penetrated the British lines and captured Brigadier Prescott. They brought Prescott back to Washington, who held him as a prisoner for some time.

Then there was Pvt. Charles Morgan, who spied on Cornwallis' army as an agent for General Lafayette. Women Gain Fame

Two women became famous as spies on opposite sides in the Civil War. The Union's Emma Edmonds and the Confederacy's Belle Boyd, who saved Stonewall Jackson's army by giving him timely information.

Allen Pinkerton and his famous detectives ran an extensive spy system for the Union army. Pinkerton, his men became famous when they foiled a plot to assassinate President Lincoln in 1861. Pinkerton after the war maintained a private detective agency. But out of his wartime organization grew the U. S. Secret Service.

Thomas Beach, an Englishman who fought on the Union side in the Civil War, spied for the British in this country in the 1860s and 1870s. His job was to keep Britain informed of activities of Irish agitators on this side of the Atlantic who at one time tried to invade Canada.

With the alias of Maj. Henri Le Caron, Beach joined Irish-American societies, earned the confidence of fellow members and then betrayed their plans to his employers. Beach's type of work leaves a bad taste in the mouth of most historians who admire most wartime spies.

The Secret Service earned quite a reputation as spy hunters during the Spanish-American War, breaking up one notable Spanish spy ring in this country. The organization also had charge of anti-sabotage and anti-espionage work in the first World War. But since then it has had little to do with such activities.

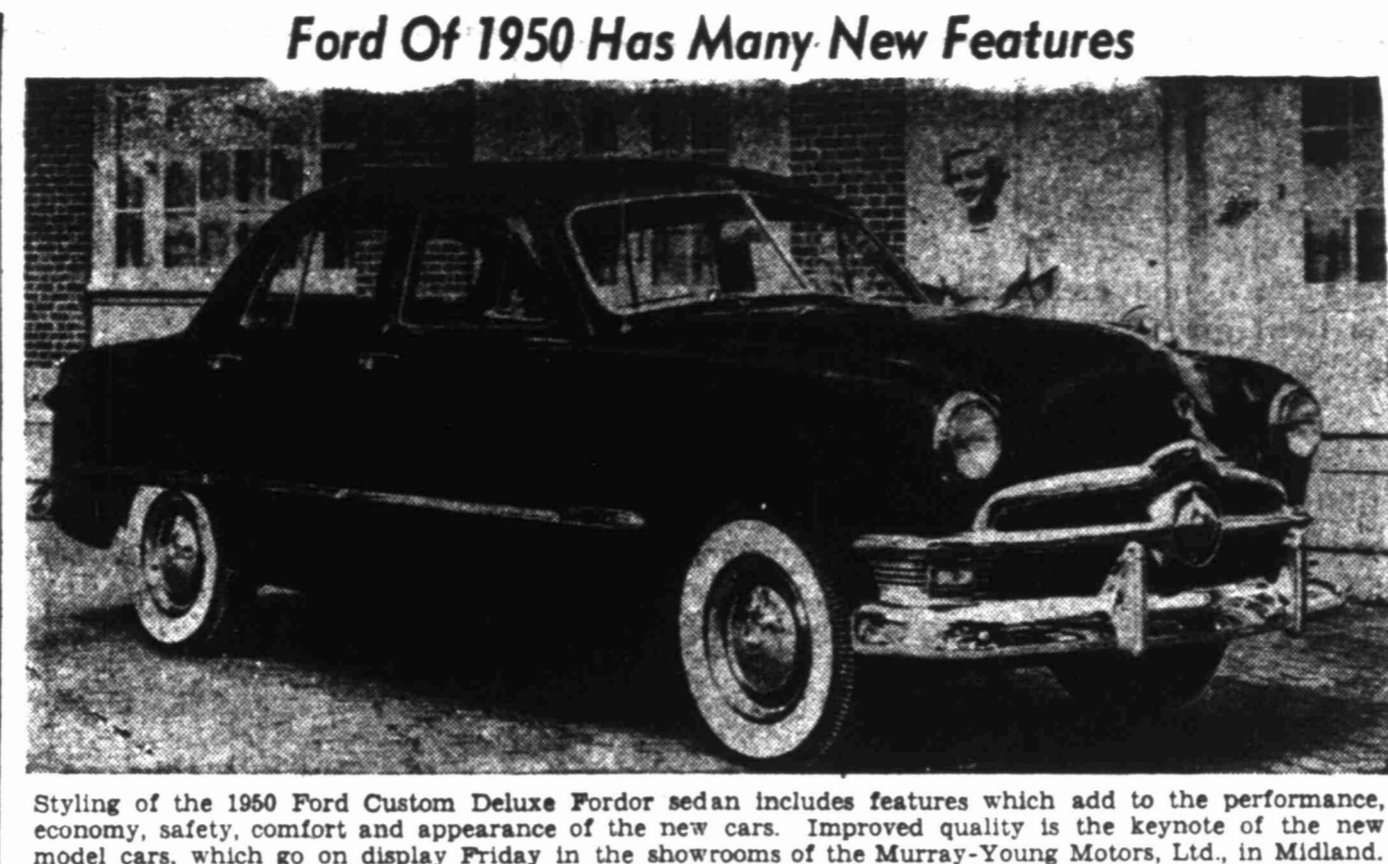
The Secret Service is normally charged with guarding the President and enforcing certain laws concerning the U. S. Treasury, like catching counterfeiters.

The Federal Bureau of Investigation had charge of counter-espionage and anti-sabotage work in the last war. It also extended its counter-espionage and intelligence work to Latin America for the duration of the war. The espionage work in the last war was done by the armed forces and the Office of Strategic Services (OSS). Many half-truths came out of post-war publications of OSS.

Spying is as old as history. You read about it in the Bible. The English are said to have created their intelligence system about 1330. Edward III established it so he could learn about continental intrigues. He was interested in promoting his little kingdom's foreign trade, and he found he needed to know what was being planned and plotted in the courts of Europe.

America about 600 years later has reluctantly set up a peacetime intelligence agency, partly for a similar reason—for guidance in playing successfully its new role as a leader in world affairs.

### McKenney On Canasta

Each week I interview John R. Crawford of Philadelphia, Pa., who has long ranked as one of the leaders in bridge, and is now conceded to be one of the best Canasta players in the country. He is a great strategist at the card table and one of the points I have asked him to explain today is the defense to be employed when you are down to a few cards.

Suppose you have in your hand only two fours, a queen and an eight, and you must make a discard. Your opponent has a six-card meld of natural queens, a six-card meld of mixed eights, but no meld of four-spots. However, your opponent's side has many other melds of the table and complete control of the pack. What cards should you discard?

Crawford explained that your discard would depend upon certain factors in the situation. If your partner has a chance to go out, you would split your fours and discard one of them. But if your partner already has been forced to make some valuable discards to the opponents and obviously will have to continue to make uncomfortable discards, it would be foolish play to split your fours.

On the next round you may draw another eight or another queen and you will have no chance to go out. In a bad situation, lose as little as possible. Give them the eight-spot, completing a canasta for them. In the hope that on the next round or two you will draw another four or a deuce. You may even have to complete a second canasta for the opponents, but do not give up your chance to go out too quickly, as they may then run the deck out on you.

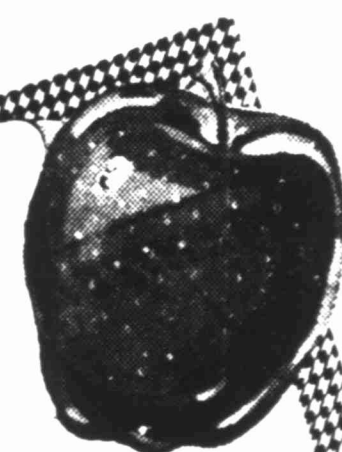

### Connoisseur Praises Low-Cost U. S. Wine

HOLLYWOOD—(P)—There is room for both French and California wines on America's dinner tables, says Ernest Des Bailléts, a vintage connoisseur. France has yet to be surpassed in making "really fine" wines, but it can't compete with lower cost wines produced in the U. S.

### Boyle Explains Why So Much Business Is Done In Restaurants

NEW YORK—(P)—What makes the tired business man tired? "His office," said Leonard Hutton, interior decorator.

"A man's office should be like his den at home—comfortable and relaxing. But what is the average office like? It has an oversized desk—that's to show he's an important man—a swivel chair, two stiff chairs for visitors, and a leather-covered sofa. On the wall is a map of the United States—with flags stuck in it to impress his customers with how many salesmen he has across the country."

Hutton chuckled disapprovingly. "It's too sober—too dull. It gives him no lift. Badly designed rooms make people tired and nervous—but they don't realize why. A man can work more efficiently, and make a better impression on his associates, if his office doesn't look like an office."

If the business man must have files in his office, Hutton said, they should be recessed into the walls. "Files only remind the visitor he goes to work, but they don't tell him what he's doing."

Hutton thinks the tired business man doesn't fare much better when he goes home to rest from his dingy office.

"He comes into a living room 'decorated' exactly in a what-does-they-use-these-days manner. Then the poor man has to sit in some uncomfortable reproductions of some ugly style that never was a style but just a period.

"There is no place for him to lie down, because his wife won't let him rest on her good living room sofa or on the bed—the bedspread might get wrinkled.

"So the man's unhappy at his office, unhappy at home—and that's why so much business is done in restaurants and cocktail bars."

### Oysters Enrich Holiday Fare

Turkey is not the only American food to be thankful for. Our oysters are wonderful, too.

Today, thanks to modern refrigerated transportation, air freight and quick freezing, oysters can be found in almost every part of the country. So include them in the regal all-American Thanksgiving dinner.

**Oysters Rockefeller**  
Ask your dealer for one dozen oysters on the half shell. Serves 4 as appetizer, 2 as main course.

Cream 1/4 cup butter and mix in 1/4 cup fine bread crumbs. Add 1/2 pint chopped spinach, 2 tablespoons minced onion, 1 tablespoon finely chopped parsley. Mix together thoroughly. Season with salt and pepper to taste. Spread generously over the top of each oyster in the half shell. Place filled oyster shells in a large baking or broiling pan, or in individual pie pans. Place in hot oven, (400 degrees F.) for 20 minutes. Serve immediately.

Note: Save leftover frozen spinach to serve following day. A wonderful way to prepare it is to mix 1 can condensed mushroom soup with the chopped spinach. Heat together until smooth—about 10 minutes if spinach is completely thawed.

**Baked Oysters**  
(Serves 6)  
Drain and pat dry with paper towel 1 quart oysters. Arrange oysters in buttered baking dish or 6 individual baking dishes. Sprinkle with salt, pepper and paprika. Cover with 1 cup grated sharp cheese. Drain liquid from No. 2 1/2 can tomatoes and spread thick pulp over the cheese. Sprinkle again with salt, pepper and paprika. Top with remaining grated cheese. Bake in

a moderate oven (350 degrees F.) about 30 minutes.

**Tidewater Oysters**  
(Serves 4)  
Cover bottom of buttered casserole with 1/2 cup cooked rice. Add 1/2 pint chopped oysters and 1/2 can of condensed celery soup. Dot with butter and sprinkle with salt and pepper. Repeat layers. Cover top with buttered bread crumbs. Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees F.) for 30 minutes.

### Pioneer Air Lines Plans Educational Trips For Students

A special program of Air Educational Flights to permit the youth of the Southwest to experience actual airline operation at a minimum cost has been announced by Pioneer Air Lines.

This is the first time in the history of the aviation industry that an airline has made available to the school children of the Southwest the opportunity to fly on a regularly-scheduled flight at a cost based upon three cents per mile or less.

Harding L. Lawrence, Pioneer's vice president of traffic and sales said in announcing the program that "this answers a need of hundreds of schools in Texas and New Mexico where aviation is of prime importance yet it has been economically prohibitive to actually experience airline operations."

**Avalis CAB Approval**  
Pioneer submitted to the Civil Aeronautics Board on November 7,

a request that effective December 7, the company be permitted to transport groups of eight or more passengers between the ages of eight and 19 years, including one adult leader or teacher, at the low fare rate.

He pointed out that a typical trip would be from Plainview to Amarillo, a round-trip distance of 146 miles. The cost, without federal tax, would be \$4.40 or three cents per mile.

"These trips can serve a two-fold purpose. In addition to providing the students with an actual experience in commercial aviation operations, inspection tours of major industries or points of interest can be arranged by the schools," Lawrence added.

Midland Flights  
It was pointed out that the fares

are based upon short trips and are not applicable for such flights as from Houston to Albuquerque or from Dallas to Amarillo.

Dave Clark, Pioneer's Midland traffic and sales manager, pointed out that Midland school students will have the opportunity to travel to Big Spring and Austin under the Air Age Plan.

The round-trip fare from Midland to Big Spring will be only \$2.50 and to Austin and back only \$17.45.

An administrative drill is slated for the unit at 3 p.m. Saturday in the Navy Building.

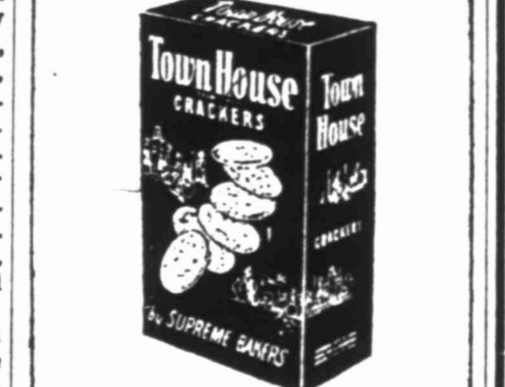
