

Germany Grows Stronger

Grave risks attend the mounting competition for German between the Western Powers and the Soviet Union. Although still divided into eastern and western zones, Germany today is stronger than it would have been without such spirited rivalry. Tomorrow it may be far stronger if the East-West tug-of-war goes on.

There is bitter irony in this situation. The Allied nations felt they had been too soft on Germany after World War I. They believed their postwar course actually had spurred the rise of nazism and opened the way to another war. And they were determined it should not happen

The decisions taken at Yalta and Potsdam by the Allied leaders were designed to create a postwar Germany which would be robbed forever of its war-making power. In those days there was even serious talk of reducing Germany to an agricultural nation.

What the West did not expect was Russia's uncooperative policy in Germany. This attitude quickly wrecked all hopes for smooth progress toward a peace treaty and threw East and West into a strenuous struggle for the people, the industry and the land of Germany.

Naturally this contest sharpened rather than lessened the division of its territory into two opposing camps. Each contestant made concessions to Germans under its control, not only to keep them in hand but to woo Germans from development has taken place inside checks in Thomas's kickback deals, opened Rosenberg, sitting South, the other side.

No Limit On Debate Before the filibuster started, this was the situation in the Senate; there was no limit on debate—or a filibuster—unless two-thirds of the senators on the floor voted to stop it. were present on the floor, two-thirds plus one of them could stop the filibuster. But, before the 1949 filibuster was over, this happened:

The Senate, with Republicans joining the Southern Democrats, made this rule for the future: Now a filibuster can't be stopped unless two-thirds of the total 96 senators vote to stop it, whether or not all 96 are present on the floor.

That's tougher to get than just twothirds of those merely present. That's what the Trumanites face in 1950 if they try to bring up the FEPC bill and a filibuster starts.







Advance nominations for Texas crude for January presented prior to Wednesday's proration hearing were down 80,389 barrels per day from advance demand figures a month ago. They totaled 2,353,569 barrels daily for January. Oil Stocks Increase

Thompson indicated a two-day cut would be necessary to keep production in line with market demand. The current average daily allowable is 2,134,321 barrels. Fields are producing on a statewide schedule

of 18 days, with East Texas on 16. Thompson said Texas stocks of crude above ground increased 1.-936,000 barrels the week ending December 3, an average daily advance of 131,000 barrels. National stocks totaled 258,489,000 barrels, a relatively high figure.

Evaporation of amount of the fine, as long as the punishment is not unreasonable, cruel or unusual. The law varies among the state courts, but most of them follow the federal practice about all New York could do was

The power of a court to punish for contempt is as old as the history of law. You couldn't get orderly administration of justice if attorneys and others in the court could persist in disturbing and delaying the proceedings and making the judge look like a fool. And if the judge had to start complicated legal processes, including a jury trial, each time he found someone guilty of contempt, it would be possible to delay the completion of a trial indefinitely. Also there is no need for a jury to determine the facts, since the judge witnessed the

There are, in fact, a lot of ways a person can be legally imprisoned without a jury trial. In military courts, for instance. And in prosecutions for petty offenses which were deemed petty at the time the Constitution was adopted.

The question of how far a judge should go in convicting someone for contempt is a live issue. Legal scholars are debating it. The Supreme Court has given split decisions several times when the matter was brought before it. A chief complaint is about the vagueness of the legal definition of contempt. It is felt that the limits of contempt should be closely and clearly defined, since it is an exception to the great principle that trial by jury is essential to due process of

A famous case, Fisher versus Pace, was decided by the Supreme Court early this year. Five of the justices upheld a Texas judge w.o convicted a lawyer for contemptuous conduct during a trial. Four justices dissented, criticizing the judge for acting in a fit of temper. Justices Douglas and Black, in dissenting, said the power to punish for contempt in open court "must be narrowly confined, lest it become an instrument of tyranny."
