CONGRATULATIONS to the Friona Chieftains on making the football playoffs. They are the first Friona team in 17 long years to qualify for the football playoffs. Most of the players on this year's team weren't even born the last time Friona had a post-season game.

The Chieftains' 1982 season record of 6-4 takes on more significance when you realize that five teams—exactly half of their schedule—were teams who qualified for post-season play. They were Dalhart, River Road, Littlefield, Shallowater and Farwell.

After the team lost a game its coaches and fans felt it should not have lost, to Dimmitt, it was feared Friona might have lost a chance to represent the district as runner-up, in the UIL's new system of the top two teams advancing in the playoffs.

But some spectacular coin-flipping by Coach Tommy Moss made the difference after the three-way tie developed for second place.

At one point in last Friday's Friona-Littlefield game, a Littlefield school official remarked that the Chieftains had played the Wildcats tougher than any team since Post, which was the only team to blemish Littlefield's 9-1 season record.

So it was that many people, including a newsman who covers Littlefield games, felt that the two strongest teams advanced to the playoffs, even though a coin-toss was necessary. (You might get varying opinions from residents of Muleshoe or Dimmitt, however.)

Since Friona has managed to make the football playoffs only about once every generation, we were noticing while compiling this week's feature about former Friona playoff teams that a few father-son combinations have emerged.

A member of the 1944 team was Marvin Jordan, and his son Bobby was a vital cog on the 1965 district champion team. David Hough is a member of the 1982 team, and his dad, Charles, quarterbacked the 1957 district champs at FHS.

Hopefully, now that they have once again had a taste of playoff competition, it won't be another generation before the Chiefs make the playoffs. Especially with the new two-team rule.

While doing our playoff research this week, we realized that if the two-team rule had been in effect all along, Friona would have made the playoffs on a number of other occasions.

Sending two teams from each district is probably a good idea. You sure don't have any dissentions in Friona this year. Right away, it doubles the number of playoff games. The UIL may have learned something from watching the NFL playoffs.

In five playoff trips, the Chiefs have competed in classes B, A, AA, and now in class AAA.

Community Service Is Set Sunday

Friona's annual Community Thanksgiving Service is scheduled for Sunday, November 14, at St. Teresa's Catholic Church. The service will begin at 7 p.m.

Rev. Skip Sircic, a native of Friona and pastor of the Union Congregational Church, will serve as preacher for the 1982 service. Other local ministers will assist in the service, which is under the sponsorship of the Friona Ministerial Alliance.

A fellowship hour will follow the service, at which refreshments will be served.

All residents of the community are invited and encouraged to take part in the special service.

FHS Band Earns UIL Division I

The Friona Chieftain Marching Band received a "Division I" rating at the annual University Interscholastic League marching competition last Monday in Lubbock.

"We were thrilled with the rating. The kids really worked for it, and got the job done," said FHS bandmaster Jim Parker.

The Friona band also came in for some plaudits by the three judges of the UIL event.

"A real fine show! Very entertaining and well done. Congratulations—fine teaching (indicated) here," said judge James Mallow, who also complimented the band for having a "good full sound" on its fanfare opener.

"Good choice of music and variety...nice flag work on the Latin

number...very pretty flags...nice twirlers, good feature twirler," Mallow continued in his notes.

"I guess I just like the way you play and march. Great work in front of band. Feature twirler very fine. Hard work and good teaching equals a winner," said judge Gary Gray in his summary.

Gray also complimented the band's sound, its drill work, flags, feature twirler and twirling line. "It's a small band, but everybody plays their part and marches well," he commented.

"Nicely done...good choice of music—entertaining and well within your playing capabilities," commented a third judge, Isobel Briscoe. All three musicians judging the UIL marching event gave the Friona band a Division I (superior) rating.

Plans were also discussed to hold the election of Chamber directors.

Ballots are to be mailed out as soon as nominations for new directors have been completed.

Arrangements are being made to have Santa Claus visit Friona on Saturday, December 4. Further details on this event will be announced in the near future.

The Chamber board voted to once again sponsor the Christmas Lighting Contest. Prizes will be awarded to the first four places in residential competition. The board also decided to have a business window display contest.

Friona City Manager Jerry Lewis has recommended that Friona adopt as its sesqui-centennial project the beautifying of Reeve Lake.

Next meeting for the board will be December 14, at Gee's Snack Bar, beginning at 7 p.m.

IN FRIDAY'S PLAYOFF

River Road Grabs Win Over FHS, 26-17

A tremendous defensive performance by the River Road Wildcats in the second half overcame a 14-12 Friona halftime lead, and knocked the Chieftains out of the playoffs Friday night in Hereford.

The Wildcats, now 9-2 for the season, shut Friona down with only three first downs and 63 net yards in the second half, to snatch victory away from the scrappy Chieftains.

Friona, bidding for its first playoff win ever, carried a 14-12 lead into halftime, and led by five, 17-12, with 7:58 to play in the third quarter.

But the Wildcats came on with a two-touchdown outburst in the third quarter to regain the lead, and held on to advance in the state class AAA playoffs.

Friona received the opening kickoff, made one first down and punted. River Road then marched 87 yards for a touchdown, with quarterback Jeff Reynolds running 22 yards. The PAT kick was wide, for a 6-0 score, 4:32 left in the quarter.

After a high snap on a punt gave the Wildcats great field position, the Amarillo team was driving for a second touchdown when Jeff Lundy intercepted a pass at the Friona 17.

Montoya then boomed a 55-yard punt to back the Wildcats up to their own five, and Friona got good field position. The Chiefs took over on the RR 42 following a short Wildcat punt.

Charlie Morgan, who had missed the Littlefield game with a hip injury, raced 31 yards to the RR five, and then bolted into the end zone for a touchdown to tie the score.

Montoya's kick gave Friona a 7-6 lead with 6:42 left in the half.

A defensive gem by Roddy Berend and Michael Deaton gave Friona the ball on the River Road 30. Berend hit the quarterback and forced a fumble, and Deaton recovered.

Five plays later, Max Perea ran 13 yards up the middle, and Montoya's kick gave Friona a 14-6 lead with 4:29 left on the clock.

But the Wildcats didn't fold. They proceeded to drive 80 yards, helped by a 15-yard penalty against the Chiefs, and scored again. The TD came on a pass from fullback Gary Martin to halfback Allen Sanders.

A pass try for two points was caught out of the end zone, and Friona retained its 14-12 lead.

The Chieftains held the Wildcats on the first series of the third quarter and caught a punt, taking over at their own 44 yard line after the kick.

Perea broke into the secondary and ran 38 yards to the River Road 18. But a motion penalty stalled the drive, and Montoya came on to kick a 30-yard field goal, for a 17-12 score at the 7:58 point of the third quarter.

River Road drove 82 yards, with Martin going the final yard on a tough series inside the Chieftain five. A two-point run by Martin gave the Wildcats the lead, 20-17.

Friona's luck suddenly went sour. A short punt gave River Road the ball but the Wildcats picked up a penalty to move back to their own 30. They didn't stay there long, however.

Sanders broke up the middle and outraced the Friona defense 70 yards for the score, and although the PAT try was stopped, River Road suddenly

had a 26-17 lead. The TD came with one second left in the third quarter.

That was to be all the scoring, as Friona never collected its second first down of the half until Charlie Morgan's fourth down plunge did it with less than three minutes remaining in the game.

Bruce Patterson was forced to the airways, and was able to complete only one of five desperation passes, as time ran out on the Chieftains' season.

River Road adjusted its defense well at halftime to stop the Chieftains' big weapon, Charlie Morgan. The junior runningback had gained 76 yards in the first half, but was held to only 16 in the second half, on eight carries.

Martin, who had 62 yards at the half, added 53 yards in the second, and caught a pass for 23 more, which set up the first Wildcat TD of the third quarter. He also had thrown a TD pass, just before halftime, as versatility and better balance spelled the difference for River Road, making its first playoff appearance in history.

The Chieftains proved to be opportunists, forcing two first-half turnovers, and scoring each time, to grab the lead and thrill their many followers who came out to watch the game, played in crisp weather.

Friona's defense played commendably, with only a couple of breakdowns. But those small lapses made the difference.

In the race for grand prize, with three weekends left in the race including the current weekend, Clint Mears leads with a score of 157. FRIONA'S FIRST COACH

Golden's Career--Varied And Distinguished

If Floyd D. Golden had waited 20 more minutes one day in 1916, the past 66 years would have been quite different.

Golden, a West Texas State University graduate who served as parade marshal for the 1982 Homecoming celebration, "The Spirit of West Texas," on Saturday, October 2, remembers September 6, 1916, because "it was a very important day."

The 18-year-old Golden had spoken with two friends at Ira community near Snyder where he spent his early years. They were leaving the following Monday morning to enroll at West Texas State Normal College at Canyon.

At the breakfast table that Monday morning, Golden told his father about his friends and his father asked if he would like to join them. While his mother packed his clothes, Golden's father hitched the team to the wagon for the 12-mile ride into town and Golden boarded the train for Canyon.

"I just knew 20 minutes before that I was going to college," said Golden.

When he arrived on campus, Golden said he saw the largest building he had ever seen. The administration building, which had burned two years earlier, had been rebuilt and reopened for the summer session of 1916. He said several of the barracks buildings which had been used as classrooms remained.

His first courses were in English, mathematics, science, history and agriculture. He also was active in "organizations and courting."

In January of 1921, Elsie Arlene Pool finished her two years of college work and moved to Friona to teach high school home economics. She and Golden had been "courting."

He had been elected captain of the football team for the next fall semester. After Elsie had taught for five weeks, she told him that "some of the big boys" had run off the principal and the superintendent had asked her if she knew anyone who could "take care of those boys." She said she did.

The superintendent of schools visited Golden at Canyon.

"The more he talked, the more I knew I didn't want it," he said. "I had planned to be a banker, not a teacher. I couldn't think of an honorable way to get out of it."

Golden quoted a large salary figure hoping that the superintendent could not meet his offer. They left on the train that evening for Friona and Golden's career as an educator began.

At Friona, he was the first football coach and principal and became superintendent of schools the following year. He and Elsie married in 1921.

He later served as principal at White Deer from 1922-24 where he also coached the first football team.

In the fall of 1924, Golden returned to WTSU to complete his education. He set a record which he claims has not been broken. He enrolled in 18 semester credit hours, taught two freshman courses in the education department as a graduate assistant, played tackle on the football team and was listed on the dean's honor roll. He had lettered in basketball, football, baseball and tennis to earn 13 letters.

In 1925, he received a bachelor's degree in education and industrial arts with a minor in English. He later received a master's degree from the University of Colorado and a doctorate.

He then returned to public school as superintendent at Miami, 1925-28, and Portales, N.M., 1928-35. In 1934, he became dean of the new Eastern New Mexico Junior College, now Eastern New Mexico University, at Portales where he was to become the second president and remain for 20 years.

ENMU changed in more ways than the young WTSU, Golden said, because he was there when ENMU was a sign in a pasture declaring the site as the future home of ENMU.

He retired as president emeritus of ENMU in 1960, but he found that he just "couldn't slow up." An Amarillo architectural firm, Rittenberry, Rittenberry and Associates, convinced him to serve as an educational consultant for nine

years. He opened his own consulting firm, Floyd D. Golden and Associates, in 1971.

Both universities have remembered Golden and his contributions to education. He has written a history of ENMU, titled "The Golden Years," and is a member of the New Mexico Education Hall of Fame.

He served as one of 17 members of the Committee of '67 at WTSU. Members met once each month for two years to make recommendations to the WTSU administration and Board of Regents. Golden said he has been disappointed that many of the recommendations have not been implemented.

In 1970, Golden was named as the Distinguished Alumnus by the WTSU Alumni Association.

He said his greatest honor has been as one of 30 education administrators chosen to tour the Soviet Union's education system. Golden was the only university president in the group which visited schools in the Soviet Union, Poland, West and East Germany for six weeks in 1959.

Several items of WTSU memorabilia decorate Golden's small office in Amarillo's Barfield Building. He still attends WTSU football and basketball games and is an active member of the Touchdown Club.

"I don't know of any man who has enjoyed living 84 years as much as I have," he said.

Home Loan Interest Rates Drop Again

Interest rates for loan programs of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Farmers Home Administration, which were lowered last month, will drop again effective November 1, Secretary of Agriculture John R. Block announced this week.

Block said the additional reductions, which are as much as two percentage points for some loans, are possible because of the general move toward lower interest rates across all sectors of the economy.

"Lower interest rates for Farmers Home Loan Programs will be of great benefit to the entire rural economy and particularly for the nation's farmers who depend on credit so heavily," he said.

In the Farmer Programs, the interest rates for farm operating loans will go from the present 13.25 per cent down to 11.5 per cent. Farm

DPS Investigates Twelve Accidents

Sergeant Billy Don Scott, Area supervisor of Parmer County, reports that for the month of October the Texas Highway Patrol Troopers investigated a total of twelve accidents in this county.

There were three injury accidents with a total of eight persons injured, and nine property damage accidents.

In District 5B, which includes the top 31 counties of the Texas Panhandle, there were 229 accidents investigated by the Texas Highway Patrol. Highway Patrol Captain Bob Russell reports that the Texas Highway Patrol Troopers investigated eight fatal accidents with a total of nine persons killed, 87 injury accidents with a total of 127 persons injured, and 134 property damage accidents.

ownership loans will be reduced from the present 13 per cent to 11.5 per cent. Interest rates for limited resource farm operating loans will be lowered from 10.25 per cent to 8 per cent and limited resource farm ownership loans drop from 6.5 per cent to 5.75 per cent.

Some loans to help farmers recover from natural disasters will have a lower interest rate. The rates for production loans to farmers who need financing above the actual loss but who cannot get credit elsewhere will be lowered from 15.5 per cent to 14 per cent. The rate for actual loss loans remains at 8 per cent. The rates for economic emergency loans will also be reduced. Economic emergency production loan rates will be reduced from 13.25 per cent to 11.5 per cent and economic emergency real estate loans go from 13 per cent down to 11.5 per cent.

Interest rates for single family housing loans will drop from 13.125 to 11.5 per cent except for those who can afford the rates charged by the Department of Housing and Urban Development. Their rates will drop a full point from 13.5 to 12.5.

Loans for multi-family housing will be reduced from 13.125 to 11.5 per cent.

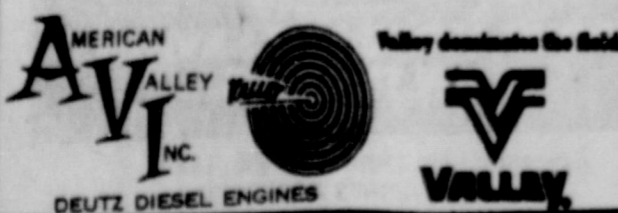

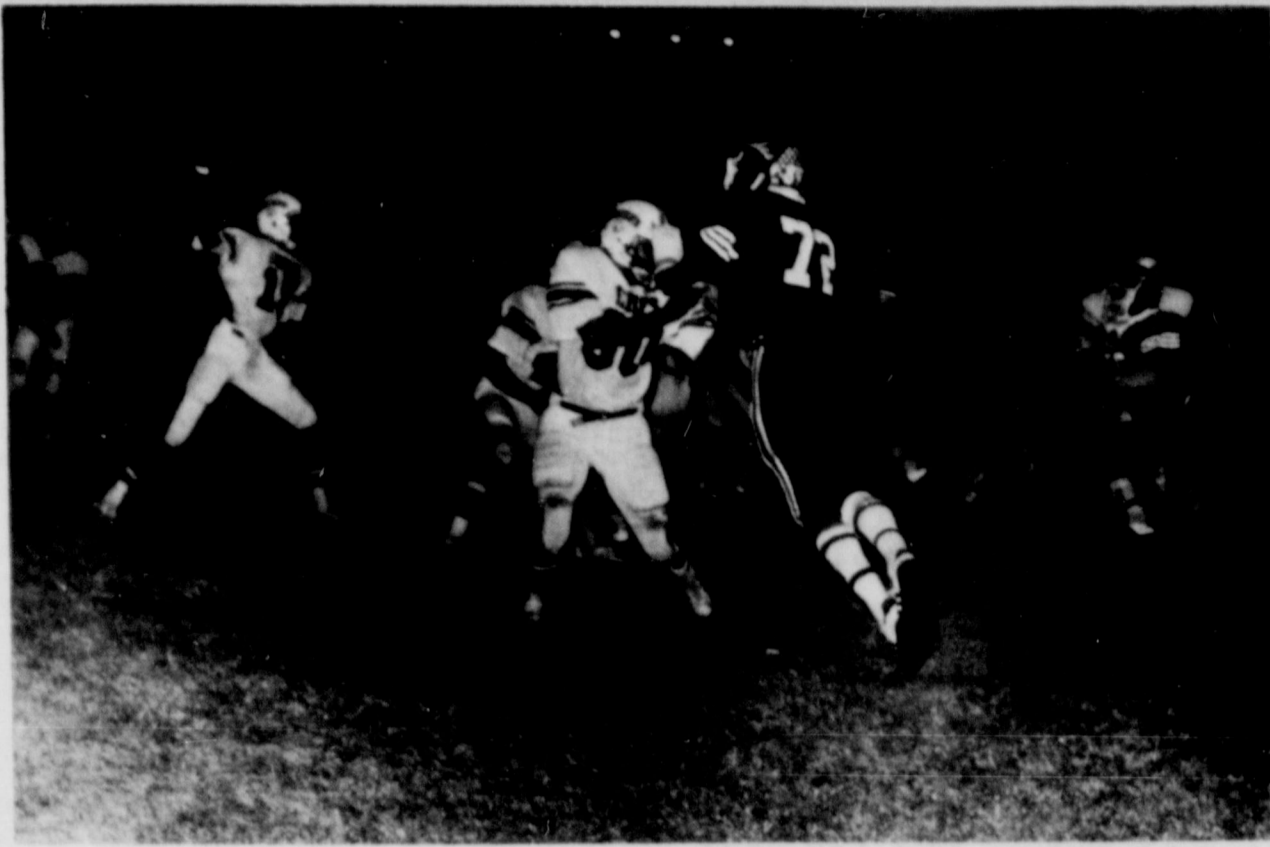

PLAYOFF TEAMS NOTED

1982 Chieftains Mark Rare Event For F.H.S.

For some schools, getting into the football playoffs is practically an annual affair. It's just the accepted thing to do when the regular season has been completed.

It's not exactly that way at Friona, where prior to this Friday's bi-district game pitting Friona against River Road, the Chieftains had been in post-season play only four times in all of its football history.

And it almost took an act of congress for the Chieftains to make it their fifth time, as coaches from Friona, Dimmitt and Muleshoe did the coin-toss routine FIVE times before the situation was at last settled and Friona won the toss.

The records show that the first time Friona ever ventured into post-season play was 38 years ago, in 1944. That playoff also resulted from a three-way tie in district play, after Friona, Dumas and Hereford came out tied with identical district records.

Friona and Hereford matched coins for the right to hold the playoff on Thanksgiving Day, and in one of the most exciting games ever played by the Chieftains, Hereford scored on a long pass in the closing minutes to capture a 14-13 victory.

Members of that 1944 team included Wayne B. Stark, W.B. Norwood, David Johnson, J.D. Johnson, Smith Pope, Harry Weis, Jimmy Baxter, Robert Laceywell, Bob Roden, Junior Renner, Dean Hall, Bill Buchanan, Marvin Jordan, Emmett Day, Jr., Marvin Saxon, E.W. Mayben, Robert Leach, W.C. Reid, Charles Weis, Dan Roberts, Jiggs Womack, R.B. Miller and Herbert Day.

Coaches for the World War II year team were Buck Short and Kenneth Houlette, who volunteered their services to coach the team.

The second FHS team to make the football playoffs was in 1952, when a young Friona teacher-coach, Raymond Cook and his team won District 3-B with a perfect 4-0 record. The team was 7-2 for the season, losing only to Hereford, 7-19 and to Springlake, 13-19. District wins were over Petersburg, 32-6; Bovina, 53-6; Farwell, 38-7 and Anton, 61-33.

In the bi-district game, played on a cold, snowy day at Plainview, the team lost to Idalou, 19-0. Cook's 1951 team might have been slightly better, averaging 30 points a game and yielding only 5.2. But a 14-7 loss to Happy cost Friona the district title.

Members of 1952's district championship team included Wayne Cribbs, D.O. Robason, Arnold Fangman, M.C. Osborn, Ben Wayne Jordan, Darrell Robbins, Virgil Phipps, Glenn Reeve, Jr., Kenneth McLellan, Teddy Fangman, Roy Haney, George Price, Gaylon Rhodes, Keith Battey, Doyce

Hammett, Wayne Houlette and Jerry Zachary.

In 1957, the Chieftains put together a six-game winning streak which carried them to the District 3-A championship under the tutelage of Colie Huffman. District wins were over Farwell, 18-0; Sudan, 13-6; Springlake, 35-6; and Morton, 12-7.

But once again, the bi-district title remained elusive as the Chiefs dropped a 21-12 decision to Ralls in a game played at Plainview.

Team members in '57 included quarterback Charles Hough, Leon Massey, Larry Fairchild, Jerry London, Jackie Sheek, Gary Brooks, Weldon Fairchild, Owen Houston, Jon Mack Roden, Jimmy Mabry, Larry Truax, Chauncy Woody, Larry Moyer, Monroe Young, Gary McLaughlin, Bryant Dukes, Rodney Weis, Weldon Tatum, Kim Caffey, Bomar Stacey, Gary Goetz, Gary Bradley and O'Neal Greeson.

Eight years later, after Coach Don Light had turned Friona's football fortunes from 27 straight losses to eight straight wins (in 1963), the Chieftains won a district title. The title came in 1965 after near-misses in '63 and '64. The near-miss in 1964 was due to the team being edged, 7-6 in a game at Floydada. If the runner-up rule had been in effect in 1964, both the Chiefs, who were 8-2 for the year, and Whirlwinds would have advanced. Friona shared the district title with Floydada, but the 'Winds went to the playoffs.

The '65 Chiefs had a "Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde" year, losing four out of five non-district games before getting it together to beat Dimmitt 21-6; Lockney, 12-7; Abernathy, 13-12; Olton, 20-18; and Floydada, 27-0, to capture the District 3-AA crown.

Coach Light's team included Lonnie Ellis, Larry Graves, Joe Mabry, Larry Johnson, Bobby Jordan, Eldon Long, Tim Herring, Johnny Claborn, Brian Evans, Terry Fite, Tommy Sherley, Bill and Gene Weatherly, Bing Bingham, Rex Wells, Bob Sims, Billy Perkins, Ray Braxton, Mike Smith, Tommy Jarecki, Dwayne Procter, Travis Graves, Mike Riethmayer, Jesse Shirley, Hugh Latham and Ray Lynn Murphree.

Once again, the team had the misfortune of running into a buzz-saw in their bi-district game, and in the only playoff game ever held at Chieftain Field, the Denver City Mustangs pulled away for a 42-13 playoff win.

The 1977 Chieftains were another "near miss" playoff team. Coach

Lonnie Phillips and his crew had a similar season to the one described for 1965, although they went one better by losing all five of their non-district games.

But the Chiefs put it together for a 4-1 district mark, losing only to Littlefield. The season ended with Friona, Littlefield and Muleshoe in a three-way tie. That coin-toss was not a happy one, with the Wildcats winning it, and advancing in the playoffs, where they won several games.

Players in 1977 included Mike Hutson, Chris Barnett, Todd Bandy, Kevin Kothmann, Jeff Whiteside, Milon Dixon, Glenn London, David Fleming, Eddie Brailiff, Kevin Pope, Ernest Mills, Terry Wilcox, Luis Rodriguez, Roger Coffey, Perry Church, David Merrell, Brian Landrum, Tommy Schilling, Kody Kothmann, Curt Miller, Eddie Allen, Park Weatherly, Jeff Peak, Alan Monroe, Raul Brailiff, Joel Hight and Sandy Peters.

So the Chieftains were hoping to change tradition somewhat as they met River Road Friday night.

After 17 long years of sitting on the sidelines when playoff time rolled around, the Friona Chiefs are glad to still be playing. They would also like to score a playoff win, just to see what it feels like.

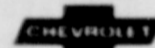

Cotton harvest is here and the Co-op urges extreme caution when operating farm equipment near electric lines.

In recent years, many incidents have involved cotton module builders. The extended portion of the cotton module builder can easily come into contact with overhead electric lines if the operator is not careful. The same problem exists with overhead baskets on cotton strippers.

We urge farmers and their employees to be alert to these potential hazards and take every possible precaution to avoid serious injury or death. When moving a module builder, be sure the packer arm is lowered as far as it will go. When using a stripper with an overhead basket, be sure to check for overhead lines before dumping.

Lower packer arm as far as it will go before moving module builder.

We have had lines torn down with cotton harvesting equipment this year. Also, some incidents have resulted in injury to the operators; but, fortunately, no fatalities so far.

If some piece of equipment does contact these 7200 volt overhead lines, it's important that you or the operator not try to simply back away. The line could break, or if it's already broken, it could tangle in the equipment and break again, compounding the problem and increasing the danger.

Jump clear of the machine, being sure not to touch the ground and the machine at the same time. Move quickly away at a right angle to the power line. Then Call Bailey County Electric Cooperative at (Area Code 806) 272-4504 whether the line is broken or not.

The couple has twenty-one grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

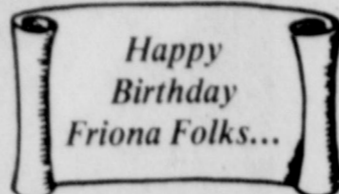

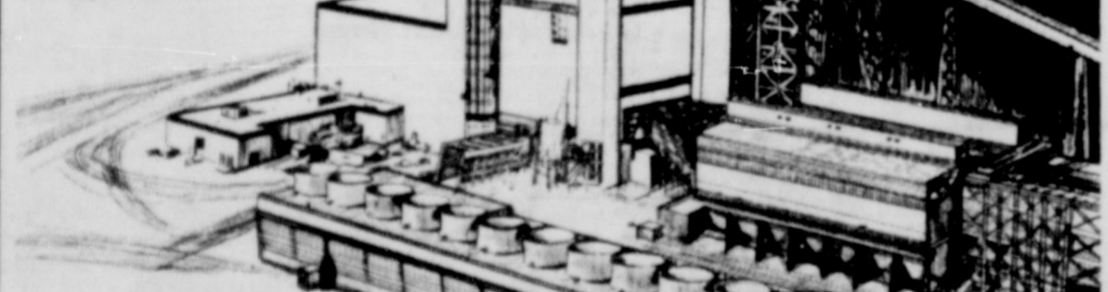

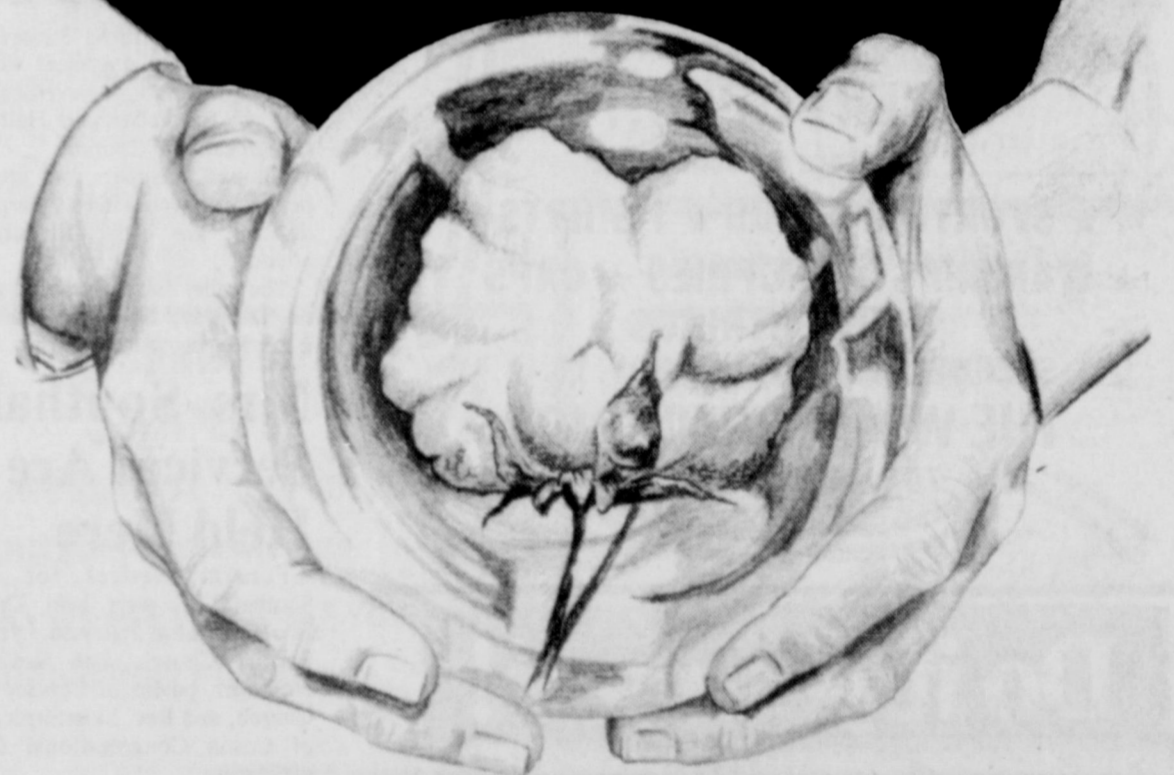

Agency Offers Aid To Disabled Workers

The Texas Rehabilitation Commission is the state's principal authority on matters relating to the vocational rehabilitation of the handicapped. It is one of the largest agencies in the state government but one of the youngest (it became independent from the Texas Education Agency in 1969).

The commission's main mission is to assist vocationally handicapped people to enter or return to the work force to become productive, taxpaying citizens.

The disabled population of Texas, some 1.6 million strong, is a diverse group of people with sometimes complex needs. To meet the varied needs of this group, Texas Rehabilitation Commission offers a variety of services.

Most people, whether they realize it or not, are disabled in some way. Some have relatively minor disabilities, such as nearsightedness or a speech impediment. Others have more severe disabilities, such as paralysis, an amputated limb or deafness.

People with relatively minor disabilities, such as nearsightedness, can generally find a simple solution to overcome the disability, such as eyeglasses. Some people have disabilities that interfere with their lives to a greater extent. For instance, some disabled people find it difficult to maintain employment because of their disabilities. They are the people the Vocational Rehabilitation Division serves.

A person must meet two requirements to be eligible for Vocational Rehabilitation Division services: (1) he must have a physical or mental disability which results in a

substantial handicap to employment, and (2) there must be a reasonable expectation that rehabilitation services will result in gainful employment.

Not all disabled people are candidates for vocational rehabilitation services. A lawyer who becomes a paraplegic can probably continue in a legal practice. The lawyer is disabled, but not vocationally handicapped. A professional ski instructor who becomes a paraplegic probably cannot continue in that profession. He is disabled and vocationally handicapped.

Not all cases are as cut and dried as these examples. That's why eligibility for vocational rehabilitation services is determined on an individual basis.

The Texas Rehabilitation Commission counselor is responsible for making the determination. The counselor works to assess the client's needs, develop a vocational rehabilitation plan and follow up on the client's success.

During the fiscal year ending September 30, 1981, a total of 107 disabled persons in Parmer County were provided services by the Texas Rehabilitation Commission.
