NOAH ASSUMES DUTIES

Hire Administrator For Nursing Home

IF YOU READ Texas Monthly magazine, you may have already seen the article entitled "The Best, the Worst and the Fair to Middlin." It was an article which ranked the state's 22 representatives to congress, based on ability and reputation.

It probably came as no great surprise to longtime residents of his district that George Mahon, of our 19th Congressional District, was rated top man of the Texas delegation.

"The case for George Mahon can be put quite simply," the magazine said. "He is one of the half-dozen most powerful men on the Hill, and he does his job, with fairness and integrity, as well as it can be done."

The article went on to point out that with the recent death of Texas congressman Wright Patman, Mahon has become the dean of the entire Congress, the most senior of its 535 members (Mahon has served 21 terms).

As chairman of the House's largest committee, Appropriations, he has kept his power when others around him were losing theirs, the article says. And at the age of seventy-five, he is described by a fellow Texas member of congress as "at the height of his intellectual capacity. I note no decline in his ability."

But, laying aside his power and ability, the magazine article praised Mahon for his common touch. He shuns all the benefits which the Pentagon showers on favored congressmen, refusing to ride in their chauffeured limousines.

"In a recent TV appearance with a fellow Texas congressman, he wore an attractive suit purchased back in 1942 and now, he noted cheerfully, once again in style. When he plays golf with President Ford at Washington's exclusive Burning Tree Club, he has been seen on occasion bringing his lunch (a sandwich) in a brown paper bag," the magazine said.

"He has probably never said an abrasive thing to a fellow member in his life, and yet he's not a weak man," commented a Texas colleague.

Mahon writes poetry, knows classical music and loves literature and beautiful language.

The article says Mahon has one of the best constituent services in the delegation. Things like soil conservation and other looking-after-the-home-folks business are taken very seriously, it says.

When a patronage job comes his way, it goes to the first qualified person who applies. And when it comes to practical benefits for his West Texas district, says a Texas official who has dealt closely with Mahon, "You'd better be able to convince him that it's not a waste of federal money."

But even with his easy-going style, he packs a political clout, and as chairman of the Appropriations Committee, has managed to keep free-spending liberals off his committee.

One Texan in Washington summed Mahon up this way "I trust him to do the right thing despite all the incredible pressures of that job," which is a tribute hard to top.

Mervin Franklin Noah, 38, was employed this week as administrator for the Friona Nursing Home. His employment was approved at the regular meeting of the Friona City Council on Monday. He arrived in Friona Tuesday to begin his work.

Noah has had seven years of experience as a nursing home administrator. He comes to Friona from Marble Falls, Texas, where he had been administrator for the Wagon Wheel Care Center since 1972.

Noah, after spending two days on the scene, told the Friona Star, "We have all the ingredients needed for a successful nursing home—a good hospital, good doctors, community spirit and enthusiasm."

The new administrator complimented the nursing home board on its work. "Their decisions regarding the home reflect a great deal of

open-mindedness and progressiveness," said Noah. He also complimented contractor Delton Lewellen on his work, and everyone connected with the project who have as a goal "only the finest" for Friona's nursing home facility.

Noah indicated that the construction is well on schedule, and that there were a number of areas that are beginning to need attention, hence his employment prior to completion of the facility.

"We will need to train our nurses and staff," Noah said, pointing out that he would conduct a full training program for employees at the home.

"We appreciate the tremendous interest shown in the home by the community, and we want it to always be open to the review and comment of the community," the new administrator said.

The center in Marble Falls was a 110-bed facility. Previously, Noah served as administrator for the Hettinger Nursing Home, Hettinger, North Dakota, an 88-bed unit, for three years.

The new administrator is a former Baptist minister, having served as pastor of the First

Baptist Church of Mott, N.D. and the Grace Baptist Church of Hettinger, N.D. for seven years. He resigned his pastorate to enter the field of nursing home administration.

Noah is a native of Oklahoma. He was born in Enid, where he graduated from high school in 1955. He attended Oklahoma Baptist University, the University of Oklahoma, Bethel College and the University of Minnesota with major studies in sociology and humanities.

He was appointed to the Governor's Committee on Mental Health in North Dakota in 1971. He also served on a special committee on nursing home studies in the Austin area from 1973 through 1975.

Noah served as a clerk-typist in the United States Air Force from 1956 through 1960. He was honorably discharged with the Good Conduct Medal and the Longevity Ribbon.

The new Friona nursing home administrator is married and he and his wife Bonnie Louise have two daughters, Sharon Louise, 15, and Susan Marie, 14.

Noah established temporary office quarters at the City Hall.

City, School Conclude Tennis Court Details

The Friona City Council held their regular meeting May 10, 1976, at 7:30 p.m. at the City Hall.

Among the many items under consideration was a proposed lease-contract agreement with Friona Independent School District for a building site for two tennis courts, immediately adjacent and east of the existing high school tennis courts. John Black, City Attorney, having proposed the

agreement, recommended that the contract be approved upon the inclusion of a prorated depreciation schedule should the school see fit to terminate the contract.

Percy Parsons and the Board of Directors, Friona Nursing Home, presented to the council technical points for tentative administrative policy for the nursing home and recommended the employment of

Call Special Meetings On School Financing

A special committee on Alternatives to Public School Financing will hold a public hearing in Canyon on Monday, May 24, it was announced this week by County Judge Paul Fortenberry. The meeting will be held at the Ballroom of the Activity Center at West Texas State University, beginning at 9 a.m.

The committee is seeking testimony from interested citizens regarding alternatives to the tax on real property for public school funding.

Judge Fortenberry also announced that a special meeting has

been called for the County School Boards of Trustees, for Wednesday, May 19 at the County Courtroom in Farwell, beginning at 10 a.m.

"We are asking the county commissioners, the superintendents of the four county school districts, and their school boards to meet with the county board as we seek guidance and information to take with us to the meeting on May 24," Fortenberry said.

All citizens interested in the problem of school financing are invited and urged to attend both the meeting May 19 in Farwell and the meeting in Canyon May 24.

Pioneer Declares 30 Cent Dividend

The Board of Directors of Pioneer Corporation at their meeting held last week in Amarillo declared a regular quarterly dividend of 30 cents per share, payable June 3, 1976, to stockholders of record on May 20, 1976.

Consolidated net income and earnings for Pioneer amounted to \$11,007,947 compared to \$6,586,914 during the same period of 1975.

In making the announcement of the income, K.B. Watson, company president said that first quarter income was up notably over the previous year due to several factors. He pointed out that Pioneer Nuclear made a sale of stockpiled uranium concentrate to Philadelphia Electric Company from the company's inventory and generated revenues in excess of \$4.6 million. He said that there was a significant increase in the net income of the production companies in the first quarter of 1976, due to marketing of increased production including the

increase in the Jennings Townsite Field in Louisiana.

Watson went on to say, "The acquisition of International Tool and Supply Company, Inc. (ITS) was finalized on April 1, 1976, with an effective date of January 1, 1976. ITS is included in the consolidated figures for the first time."

Watson said, "Sale of gas for pumping irrigation engines was up because of an unusually dry period. Additionally, a change in meter reading and billing dates for a large number of irrigation accounts resulted in accelerating more than a million dollars of gas sales from the second quarter of the year into the first quarter with the related gas purchase costs being already recorded. This will benefit both the customer and Pioneer as volumes will be more closely related to the fiscal month."

The quarterly report for Pioneer Corporation will be mailed to stockholders this month.

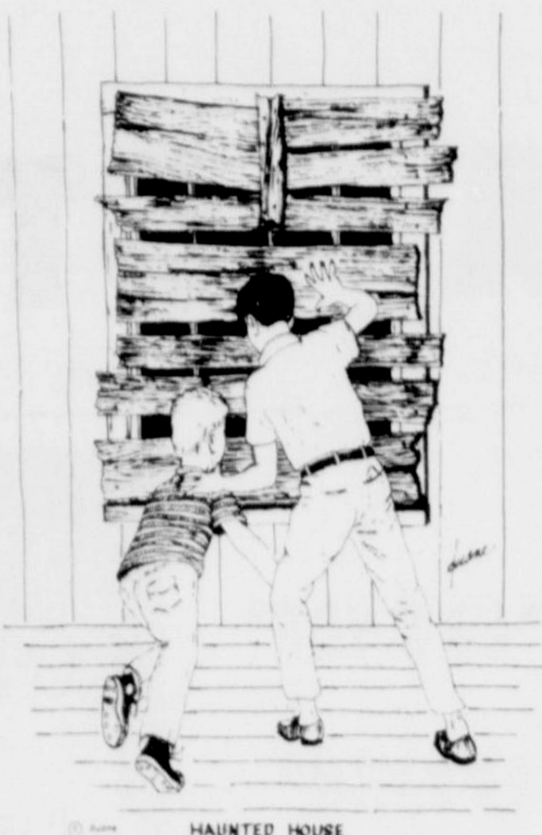

Haunted House

Mother used to travel once a month to different churches outside our community to what were called worker's conferences and we usually got to go along.

At one such meeting we were standing around the church yard wondering what to do when a local boy came up and asked if we wanted to have some fun. "Sure!" we said. He told us of a big house at the edge of town that everyone said was haunted. He had never been in it but he would like to if we weren't scared and wanted to go in with him. "We ain't a scereed," sides, we don't believe in ghosts anyhow."

Shortly we were standing in front of the old house, breathing heavily from our run, not at all sure of our previous statement. It was a two story house, dark and unpainted. The windows were boarded up and the doors had big rusted padlocks. The yard was overgrown with weeds and littered with rubbish. We glanced around to see if anyone was watching, then bravely went up to one of the windows to peek inside. There was a musty smell as we neared the house like old rags or a cellar. The boy we were with said the smell could be dead bodies under the floor.

Through a crack between the boards on the window we could see the front room. Our view was hazy because we were looking through a thick, dusty spider web but we could make out a stairway and a few pieces of old

furniture. The boy said he was pretty sure we could get into the house through a loose board by the back door.

That's how a friend of his, who was being initiated into a secret club, had gotten in. On the way around the house he told us how the owner had been murdered there several years before and that no one would ever live in the house after that. Lots of folks in the community had heard screams coming from the house on dark nights and a light sometimes glowed from the upstairs window, the only one not boarded up. He told us that many people had seen huge bats flying out of holes in the roof.

In the driveway by the side of the house the ground was saturated with oil but upon inspection our friend said it looked more like blood stains to him, probably human blood. A cloud covered the sun about that time and the old house turned dark and more forbidding. We came to the loose board he had spoken of. He said, "Are you guys ready?" My brother said he didn't believe he could get through such a small hole. I said I could but I had my best Sunday clothes on and Mother wouldn't like it if I got 'em dirty. "We better be gettin' back anyhow 'cause it's just a few hours before time to go home."

The boy called us chickens and said he would just have to go in by himself. But as we stood there he suddenly remembered he was supposed to meet a friend to play baseball.

School Finance Hearing May 24

Representative Tom C. Massey announced today the scheduling of a public hearing of the Special House Committee on Alternatives to Public School Financing, to be held in Canyon Monday, May 24. The hearing will begin at 9 a.m. in the Activity Center Ballroom of West Texas State University.

The hearing will be the seventh in a series of meetings throughout the state being conducted by the Special Committee. Others have been held in Houston, Edinburg, Dallas, Nacogdoches, San Angelo; hearings are also planned for Haskell, May 13; San Antonio, June 4; and Austin, June 25.

The Special Committee was appointed by House Speaker Bill Clayton to look into revenue sources other than the tax on real property for funding public schools. The group is seeking recommendations from school personnel, tax assessors-collectors, city and county officials, and the general citizenry on this subject. The committee requests that written copies of testimony be provided if possible.

Rep. Massey is chairman of the Special Committee. Other members are: Rep. Fred Agnich, Dallas; Rep. Wilhelmina Delco, Austin; Rep. Roy Blake, Nacogdoches; Rep. Frank Hartung, Houston; Rep. W.S. (Bill) Heatly, Paducah; Rep. Dan Kubiak, Rockdale; Rep. Camm Lary, Jr., Burnet; Rep. Ruben Torres, Brownsville.

"When we started this study, Speaker Clayton told us this inquiry was 'one of the most important in recent legislative history,' and the response brought about by these public hearings indicates that many people agree with him," Massey said.

"The local share of school funding has been increasing, and the local share is dependent totally on the tax on real property. Education costs are higher, because of inflation, necessary salary increases, and additional programs, so the pressure has really been on local districts to increase their ad valorem levies. This is putting a squeeze on our land owners, home owners, and businesses, who are shouldering the burden of education cost that should be shared by those possessing other forms of wealth," he added.

"We in the Legislature are

working hard to hold government spending to reasonable levels. But these hearings are bringing out that the slogan of 'no new taxes' has come to be a sore point with some folks who tell us that while they're not paying more taxes to the State, there's a lot more coming out of their pockets at the local level, to the city and the school district," Massey said.

"We can't close our eyes to the plight of these people. We may very well, at some point, want to look toward increasing the state's share of funding for our public schools. But to accomplish any sort of relief for the property owner, we must look to increased revenue from some other source—and this is the realm of the Special Committee. We

have received many suggestions for alternative revenue sources, and there will no doubt be more forthcoming during the rest of these public hearings. It will be our responsibility to look at each in terms of dollars and cents, and make appropriate recommendations to the 65th Legislature, which convenes next January.

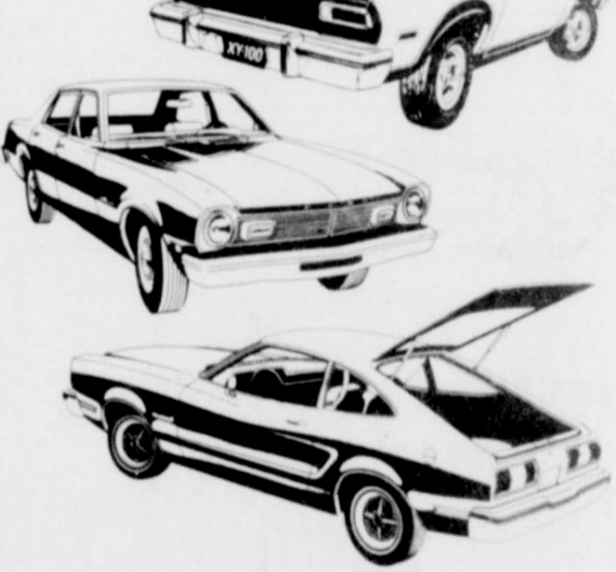

Jones Plans To Restore Antique Engine

"The first time I saw that thing, it was a beautiful looking fire truck...it sure was," said Opal C. Jones.

He nodded his head toward a pile of old tires, inner tubes, and a set of bedsprings, under which sat an antique Sears and Scoville hearse-turned-fire truck in the middle of his motor repair shop.

"It's a 1916 or 1917 model," Jones said. "In 1933 or '34 was the first time I saw it, but it was a hearse to begin with in McKinney, before it ended up a fire truck at Plano."

"I was at a family reunion at Plano when I saw that fire truck sitting in the station...there were two of those antique trucks, but this one was the one I wanted," Jones said. "Later my uncle found out that I wanted it, and when it went up for sale he got it for me."

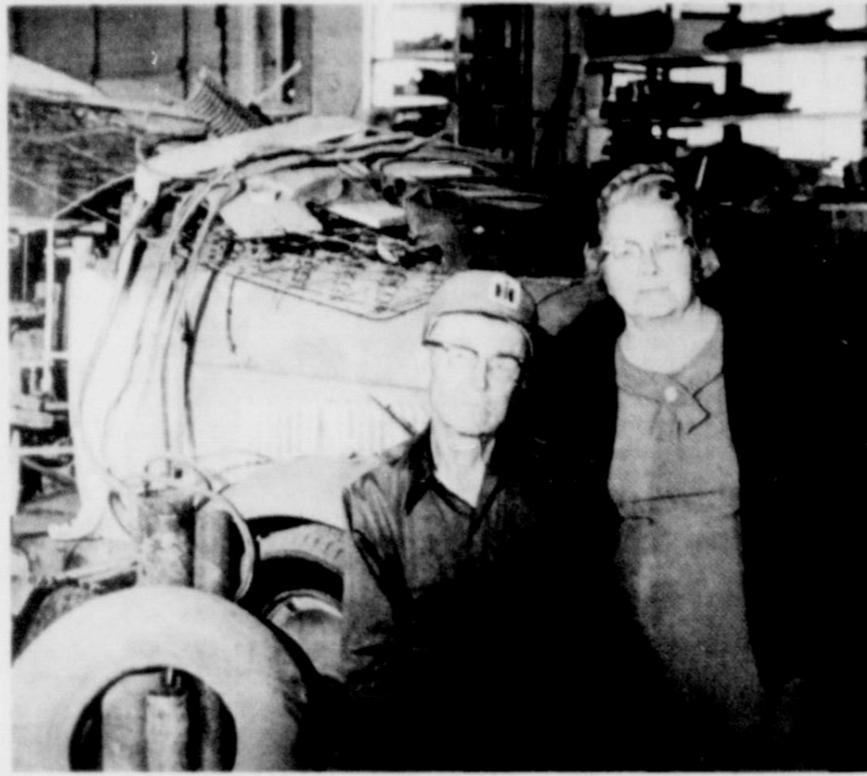
"I went and got it on a flatbed truck five or six years ago and brought it here," he said.

"Not long after we got it up here a guy who used to drive it a lot when it was a hearse...name was Jack Hill and he was a little older than me then," said the 75-year-old Jones. "Well, he was having trouble with his car in Friona and he came back in the garage and saw it and said, 'I've often wondered where that thing got off to.'"

"I said to him, 'Jack, you don't know a cotton pickin' thing about that,' and he said, 'I do too. I've drove it lots of miles.'"

"Then he asked me if I remembered anything about that negro lynched at Plano years ago," Jones said. "That negro was real mean and got drunk and killed a sheriff or white man or someone, and Jack told me, 'I carried him to his resting place in that thing right there.'"

"I could tell you something 'bout that funeral, but I don't think you'd want to put it in the paper or not," Jones remarked. "Jack told me that was the awfulest funeral he'd been to in his life. He said he backed up to the door and four negroes threw him in the back of the hearse...no coffin or anything...and when they backed him up to the grave, they just rolled him out the

goners, but the team just kept pulling till we got out."

"We'd camp out and cook on fires on the ground...it was a wonderful experience to me...I'll never forget it," Jones said.

"We lived close to Paul's Valley south of Oklahoma City, and there's an old dugout there the first people that lived in Paul's Valley lived in that they say is still there."

"I went to school at Paul's Valley...that was 1917...and there was an old fella lived there in that dugout then, and he'd invite us kids to come in and visit, so I've been in that dugout," Jones told.

"In them days they had horses to pull fire trucks in town, and I'd go down and watch 'em when that whistle would blow and those horses would break out and get on each side of the tongue. They'd come right in under the harness and they'd drop the harness on them, and the horses were calm until they were in the harness...then they'd better get in that wagon fast or they're gone!" Jones said.

"One of the firemen rode a bicycle to work, and I'd go down after school and give him a nickel and ride it for an hour or two, then take it back and walk home for a mile and a half...that nickel was well spent. I really enjoyed that..." he smiled.

"We all done well to just stay here and live when we first come here to Friona," Jones said of his early days here. "We come here the last day of December 1925. I lived on a farm in '26 and '27, and since 1928 we lived right here on this property," Jones pointed west to take in his home as well as his business. "I own the northern half of the first original townsite of Friona and have been here since the first half of 1928."

"The first two years me and Raymond (brother-in-law) used to come in and unload coal to feed our families. Crops wasn't very good

back into the hole and said, "Go to you son-of-a-so-and-so!...The negroes hated him, too...he was MEAN, I'm tellin' you!"

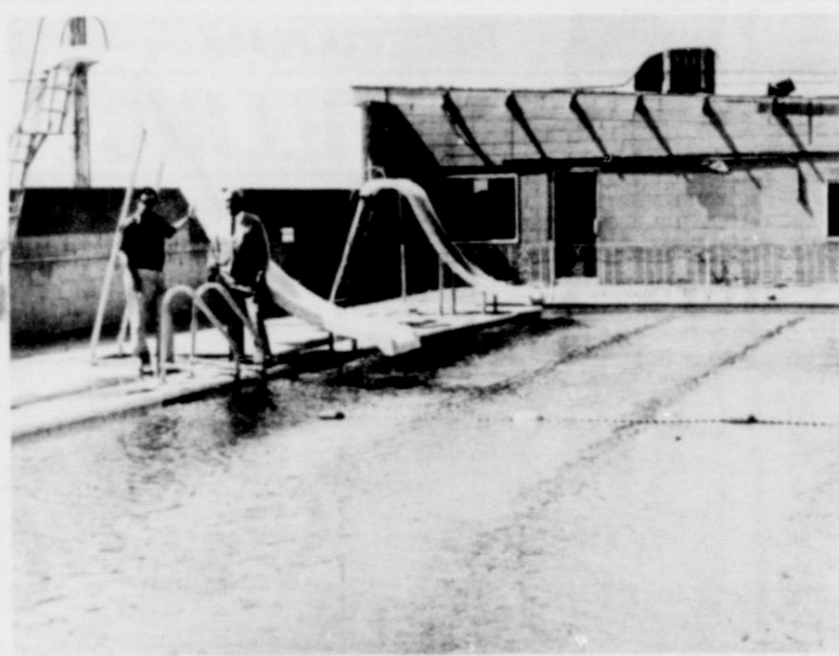
"Jack was so happy being able to see that fire truck again," Jones said. "He'd walk around it, raised the hood...I'd like to know where ole Jack is now..."

He adjusted himself on his makeshift stool and began to reminisce. "I was born in 1900...I'm just a spring chicken...and moved to Indian Territory in 1903 and left in 1906. Oklahoma didn't become a state until 1907, you know," Jones said.

"I don't know why we lived there...my daddy took a notion to go to Indian Territory...why, I don't know...but I remember living among the Indians."

"I've got a sister who was born in Indian Territory," Jones grinned. "I call her the girl without a country 'cause there's no such thing as Indian Territory anymore."

"We left in 1906 and moved back to Texas, but in 1908 we moved back to Indian Territory. I remember that trip. It was in a covered wagon, and we had to forge the Red River...the team hit quicksand and I thought we was all

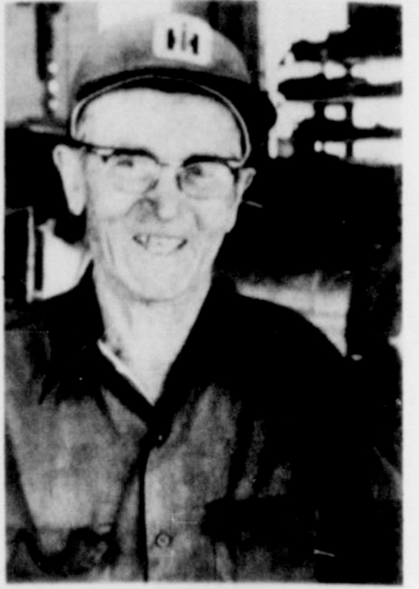

Other business included the

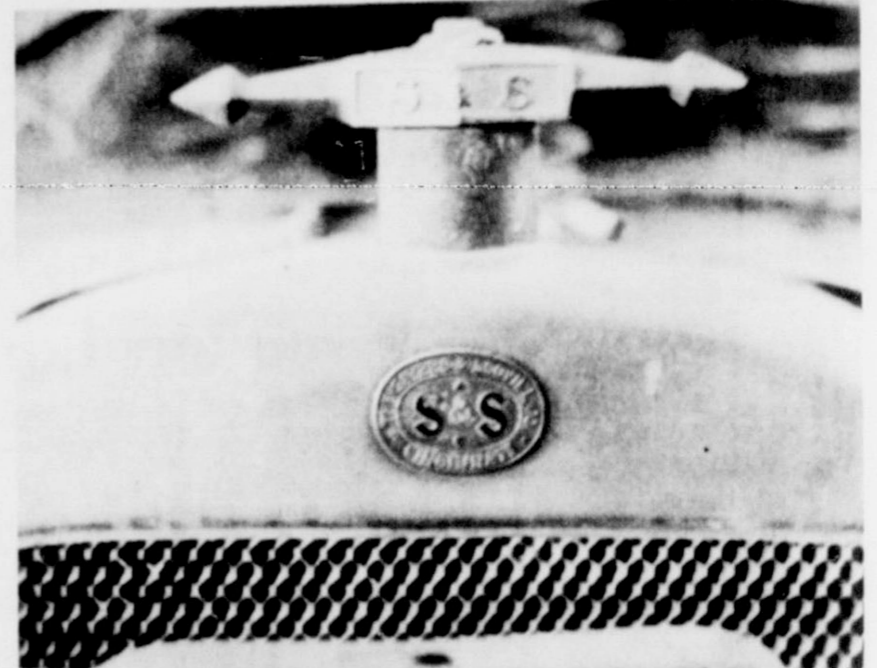
approving of \$2,000 in Revenue Sharing Funds to be allocated to the Friona Cemetery Association for the paving of the road to the Friona Cemetery.

SCS Report

Are you interested in your irrigation well production? Leon Grissom, chairman, of the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District says, "We have a service available to the farmers in Parmer County that is not too well known. This service is measuring irrigation well production."

About fifteen years ago the district purchased a flow meter. This meter is adopted to about any size discharge. The preferable way to check a well is to attach the meter to a short piece of pipe coming from a valve. The well or wells being checked should have been running at least twenty four hours and preferably more.

This service has been used by a lot of producers who plan to put in center pivot systems. It is necessary to know your GPM before buying a system.

With the gas bills going so high, a lot of producers are interested in how efficient their operation is.

"If you have a well or wells that you'd like checked, contact the Soil Conservation Service, Friona," Grissom concluded.

During the last half of May, a random sample of some 24,000 Texas farmers will receive a crop acreage questionnaire from W.H. Walter, Agricultural Statis-

ician in charge of the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, Austin, Texas. This information will be the basis for determining the planted acreage for the state of Texas and for each county. Texas covers such a wide area that state totals alone do not provide adequate information on Texas' most basic industry-agriculture. The Texas Legislature has provided a program of estimates for each county. This is a cooperative effort of USDA's Statistical Reporting Service and the Texas Department of Agriculture. Accurate estimates are of great importance to farmers in planning production and marketings and in providing an unbiased picture of Texas agriculture. Farmers who receive questionnaires are urged to complete and return them by mail. All individual reports are confidential and are used only for state and county totals.

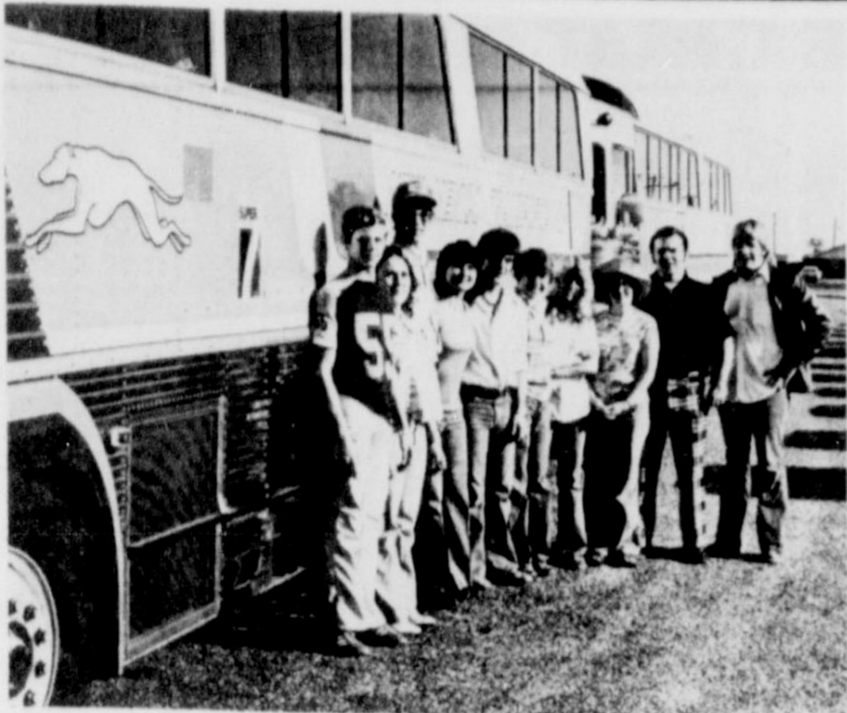

Although many sociological and psychological studies have been made of marriage, the family, children, and divorce, there are few studies of remarriage and almost none of stepchild-step-parent or step-sibling relationships. This book is the first to be written in nearly twenty years on the subject of remarried couples and their children.

The decided increase in divorces and remarriage and the number of children involved justify the study of these phenomena. Step families are difficult for Americans to

categorize. No general characteristics are attributed to them, and they are viewed with disapproval and suspicion.

The author's conclusions will provide professionals, and interested laymen with fresh insights concerning the reconstituted family in today's society.
