that they were not happy with the educational system in the state. Most people agree that a first-rate

depends more on how we spend money, rather than how much we The special interests in Austin and in the local school districts are siphoning the dollars taxpayers give
to educate our children. Today our oo educate our children. Today our
public schools employ almost as public schools employ aimost
many non-teachers as teachers, and
on the average, pay non-teachers on the average, pay non-teachers
more. Txexans believe that their children deserve a first-rate education. They want true reform. We are tired of
shell games from our politicians. Did you know that when the current school finance plan was analyzed, it was found that the legislature failed to put in enough
money to cover enrollment growth and cut the state's basic allotment per student by $\$ 100$. Under the new plan, 80 percent of the school
districts will have to increase their districts will have to increase their
taxes.
Now we learn that the numbers showing how each school distric would be affected by the school funding bill were available before hhe bill was voted on? The insiders
in Ausitn withheld the real numbers in Ausitn wittheld the real numbers the public so that school finance plan could pass.
Did you hear about this? It was
never announced, debated never announced, debated or even
admitted. The ins
The insiders have their own
agenda. It is a never-ending soap opera. The characters and circumstances change slightly, but

But where sun will be reflected off sand, snow or water, special purpose lenses are recommended to block at least 99 per cent of UB-B, 60 per cent of UV-A and up to 97 per cent of visible ligh.
