City starting budget talks

Faced with major decisions, the Muleshoe City Council will begin 1998-99 budget discussions next month.

Muleshoe City Manager James Fisher said he plans to start budget talks with his department heads as soon as next week.

Last year's budget discussions were long and involved and Fisher hoped to get a headstart this summer.

"We need to sit down and make some hard decisions that confront us," Fisher said. "We need to separate the wants from the needs."

The City is operating on a "bare bones" \$2.6 million budget this year, but faces at least \$5 million in capital improvements in the next decade, Fisher said. "We're at a financial crossroads."

Budget discussions were the focus of Wednesday's City Council meeting.

After reviewing a six-month report on the 1997-98 budget, Fisher told the Council that the city is doing well. Only the police department was considered over budget because of overtime.

Fisher gave the credit to city employees, who realized the budget was tight and worked hard to stay within the budget constraints.

Fisher said a priority list of capital outlay projects includes expanding the city water treatment plant, extending a water line from the Sandorosa well fields to the 250,000 gallon storage tank at 9th & Ave. B, extending water and sewer services to the west city limits and painting the city water towers.

Several of the projects are required to meet state and federal laws.

"We're not going to do anything overnight," Fisher said. "We have to develop long term plans."

Fisher said the city is looking at ways to finance improvements without raising taxes or utility fees.

"We're looking at ways to get these projects done without putting an undue burden on the community," Fisher said.

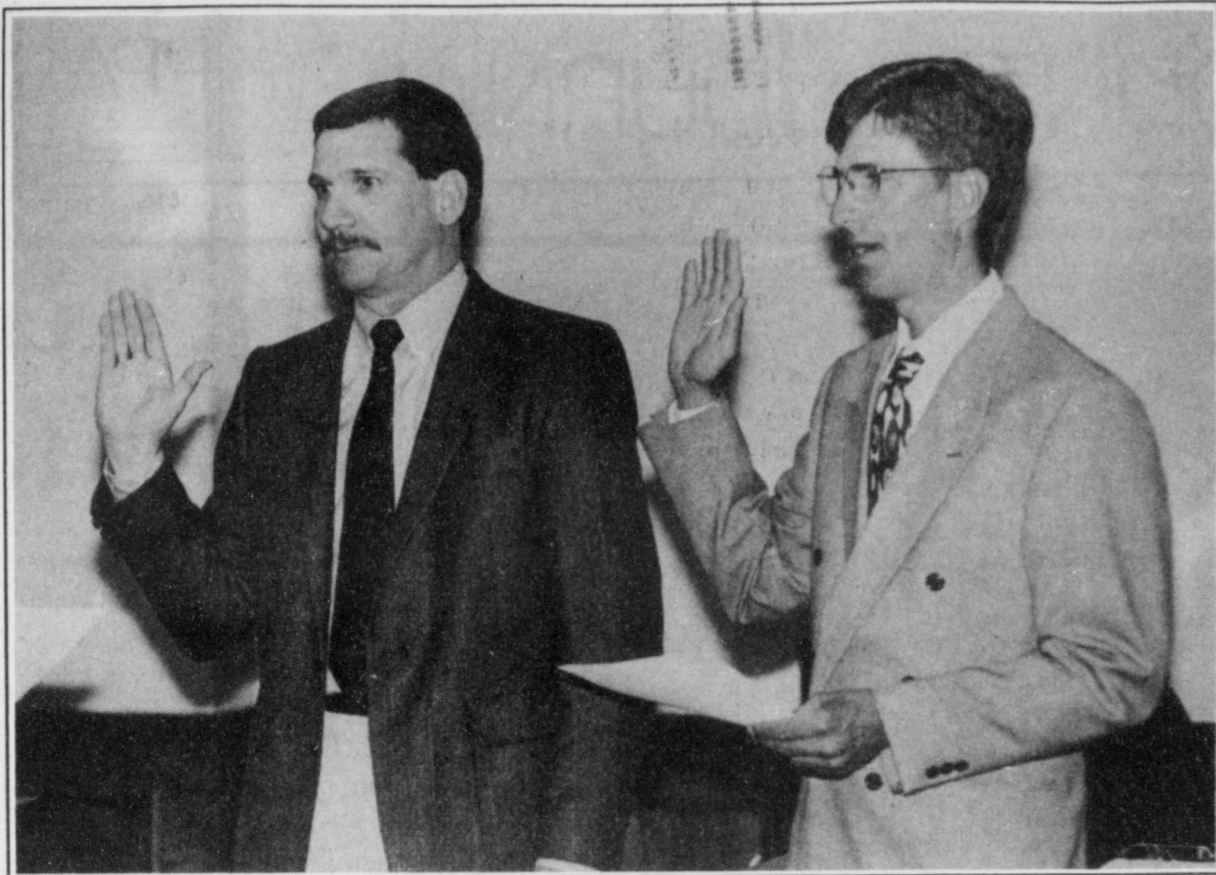

The third round of the meet will be May 22-24 in Greensboro, N.C. where the USA team will be named.

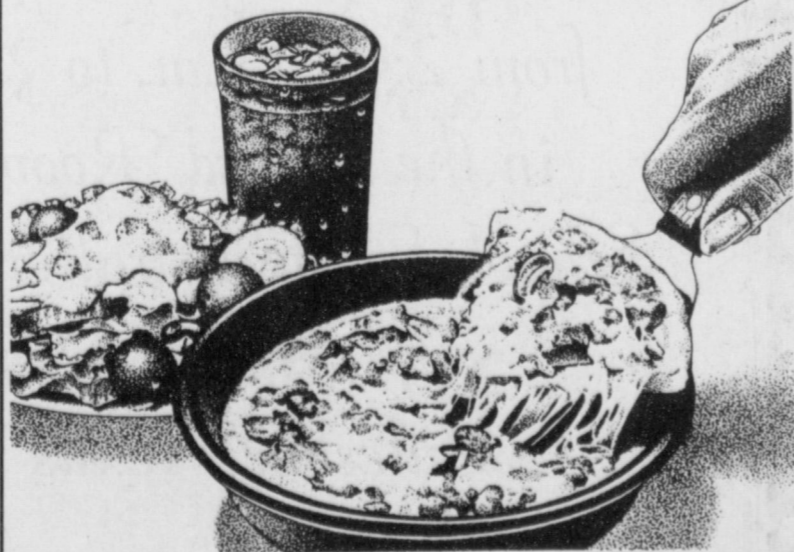

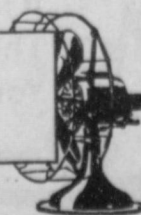
