Guidelines Are Given For Disaster Money

THE DISASTER PROGRAM, announced last Thursday by the Reagan Administration and Secretary of Agriculture John Block, may turn out to be the salvation of hundreds of High Plains farmers in 1982.

Of course, the program can never take the place of a growing and harvested crop, because all of the service industries, workers, truckers, etc., are denied the revenue they might otherwise have had.

But it was heart-warming to see the administration step in and make an attempt to help our farmers during their time of need. As one Lamb County farmer was quoted as saying "We may have cried 'wolf' at times in the past, but this time we were serious."

The farmers should appreciate the work of virtually all of their elected officials in getting the disaster program approved. This includes our "West Texas" delegation in Washington, led by Kent Hance and also including Jack Hightower and Charles Stenholm.

Governor Bill Clements also used his political power to get the program established, as did Senator John Tower. Even Sen. Lloyd Bentsen spoke in favor of the program, which proves that the age of miracles has not passed.

Congressman Hance lauded the program, and credited its creation by the ability of everyone concerned working together to see it materialize.

As it has been stated by Hance and others, now, while the nation's farmers have the attention of their elected officials, would be an excellent time to pass a new farm bill, to hopefully include provisions which would help the prices on farm commodities.

Even with the disaster payments, most farmers are facing the prospects of a second consecutive "losing" year, and unless something can be done to improve the prices they receive for their crops, then the future of the small to medium-sized farm operator may still be in jeopardy.

Getting the necessary farm legislation passed may be a hard fight with a small stick, because as Congressman Kent Hance pointed out at his last Town Hall meeting, the problem in passing legislation dealing with agriculture is that you can't always get even the various sectors of agriculture to agree on what's best for them, plus the fact that less than one-fifth of the legislators have any type of farming in their home districts.

ON THE LIGHTER side, those of us with small children, grandchildren, and even an abundance of people who don't have either of these categories but just want to see a good movie for a change, have been praising the hit movie of the summer, "E.T."

The movie has been showing in Clovis, N.M., recently, and almost everyone has had the opportunity of seeing the movie.

It is refreshing to have proof that the motion picture industry can still produce a quality movie, without sex, violence, blood or strong language, that causes such an appeal to moviegoers as to produce lines at the movie theatre.

It's a credit to the producer, Steven Spielberg, to have the "guts" to produce such a movie. It should be an award-winner, but even if it's not, the movie should be making Spielberg and his studio a bundle of money this summer.

Meeting Set On Farm Aid

A meeting has been scheduled for Tuesday, July 27 at the Bailey County Civic Center in Muleshoe, beginning at 2:30 p.m., to help explain the disaster program.

Officials from the National Cotton Council, the USDA in Washington, FmHA, etc. will be on hand to speak and answer questions. All area farmers are urged to attend the meeting.

Area farmers who have suffered crop losses during 1982 and are eligible for their portion of the \$400 million in disaster relief announced last week by Secretary of Agriculture John Block, were given some guidance this week by county agriculture officials as to how the program will operate.

Claims for the disaster program will be handled through the county ASCS office. Prentice Mills, county executive director of the ASCS, says that the program should work the same as the "one we had in 1981 and a few years before that."

"You must file your claim for disaster program benefits before you destroy evidence of the affected crop. The ASCS people need to have the chance to inspect the acreage before it is put to other use. Also, you need to report the acreage of the crop affected and what use will subsequently be made of the land," Mills said.

Mills added that "You are not any place unless you file your acreage report on time. Your farm's program eligibility depends upon you filing an accurate and timely acreage report.

The final date for filing is August 2, 1982, unless a farmer has applied for measurement service, in which case they will have five working days to certify their correct acreage.

Those who have had hauled-out crops and re-planted to other crops need to inform the ASCS office as to what their follow-up crop is.

As to when to expect payments, the ASCS spokesman said that they would be made at the earliest possible date, but that they could not be made until all of the county's acreage determination has been made.

Since the announcement of the relief program, corn and grain sorghum producers have protested the disparity of the relief formula between cotton and feed grains.

"We are screaming discrimination," said Carl King of Dimmitt, president of the Texas Corn Growers Association. "We are proud for the cotton farmer. We just want a fair shake for the corn and grain sorghum producers."

The corn association, and Grain Sorghum Producers Assn., headquartered in Abernathy, have launched a letter-writing and phone-

calling campaign to urge reconsideration of the matter.

In a letter to Block, the corn organization said "Due to an apparent error, we request reconsideration of the corn disaster level to make it equitable to cotton."

It was pointed out that the formula proposed to figure losses on grain crops, based on last year's yields, would have paid \$1.35 per bushel for corn, \$1.30 per bushel for grain sorghum and barley.

Area Gets Another Good Rain

The Friona area received another good rain this past Tuesday afternoon, with close to three inches reported in some places.

Farmers welcomed the moisture, as virtually all row crops are at their peak water consumption.

The rain was heavier to the east and south of Friona. It was stated that Floyd Reeve received around 2.9 inches, and that Eugene Bandy received 2.6 inches.

The official measurement in Friona was 1.27 inches, according to Rodney Dunnam, official weather recorder. This brings the month's total to 2.63 inches of rain.

The past week's rain was not as general as the one which soaked the area nine days earlier on July 11. It did not cover quite as large an area, and did not extend too far to the west. In fact, some farmers to the north and west reported very little moisture at all.

Another freak aspect of the afternoon thunderstorm was that it left considerable hail damage in the northern portion of the city, where trees and gardens along 14th and 15th Streets were badly beaten, although most of the city received hardly any hail at all.

The hail apparently did not extend into the country as far as crop damage was concerned, at least no great damage was learned about by the Star.

50 YEARS AGO--JULY 29, 1932

Returns from last week's Democratic Primary in Parmer County showed that Ferguson received 698 votes for governor, Sterling 420 and Hunter 207. Aldridge led the voting for county judge with 716 votes, Goodwine received 651, and Ray 268. Hall was elected Sheriff with 1002 votes, to 515 for Hawkins and 131 for Hawks. Rushing received the nomination for County and District Clerk with 980 votes, to 666 for McCuan. Witherspoon led the ballot for District Attorney, with 1005 votes, to 520 for Richards.

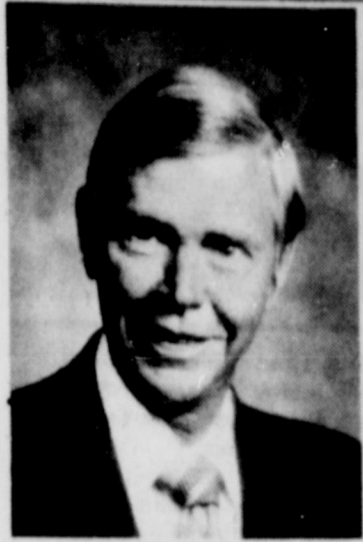

Senior Stars Lose Pair In Tourney

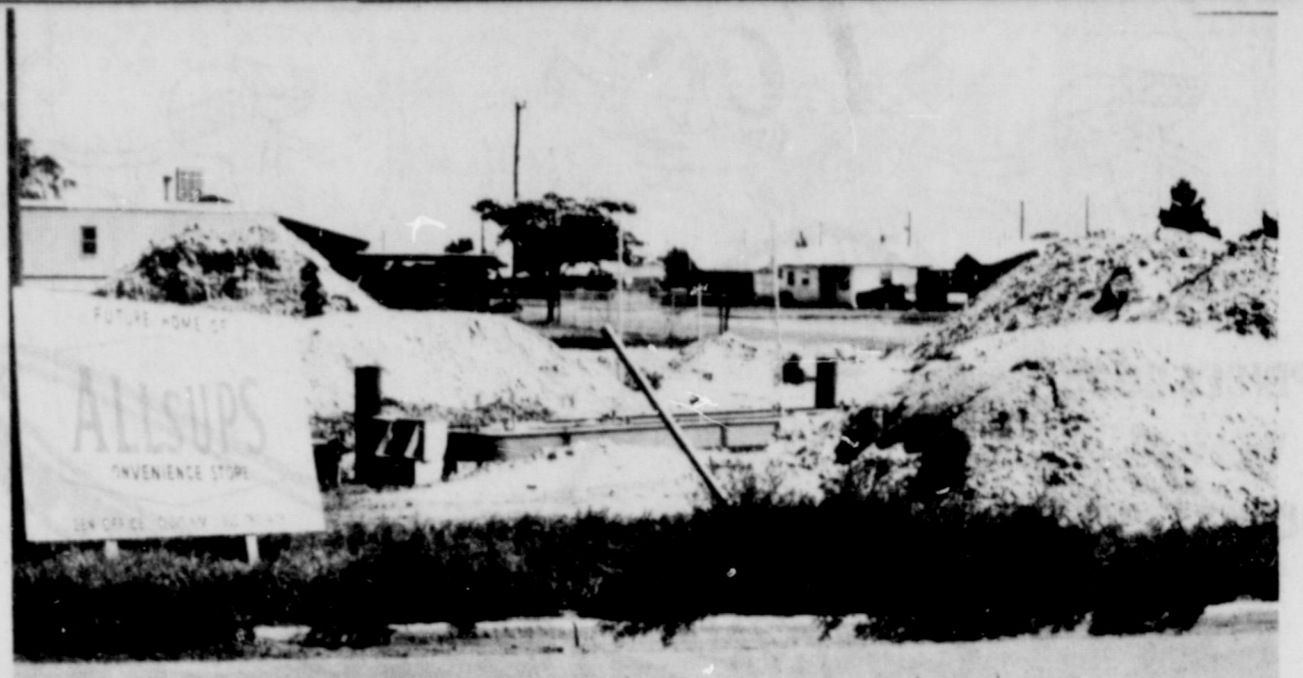

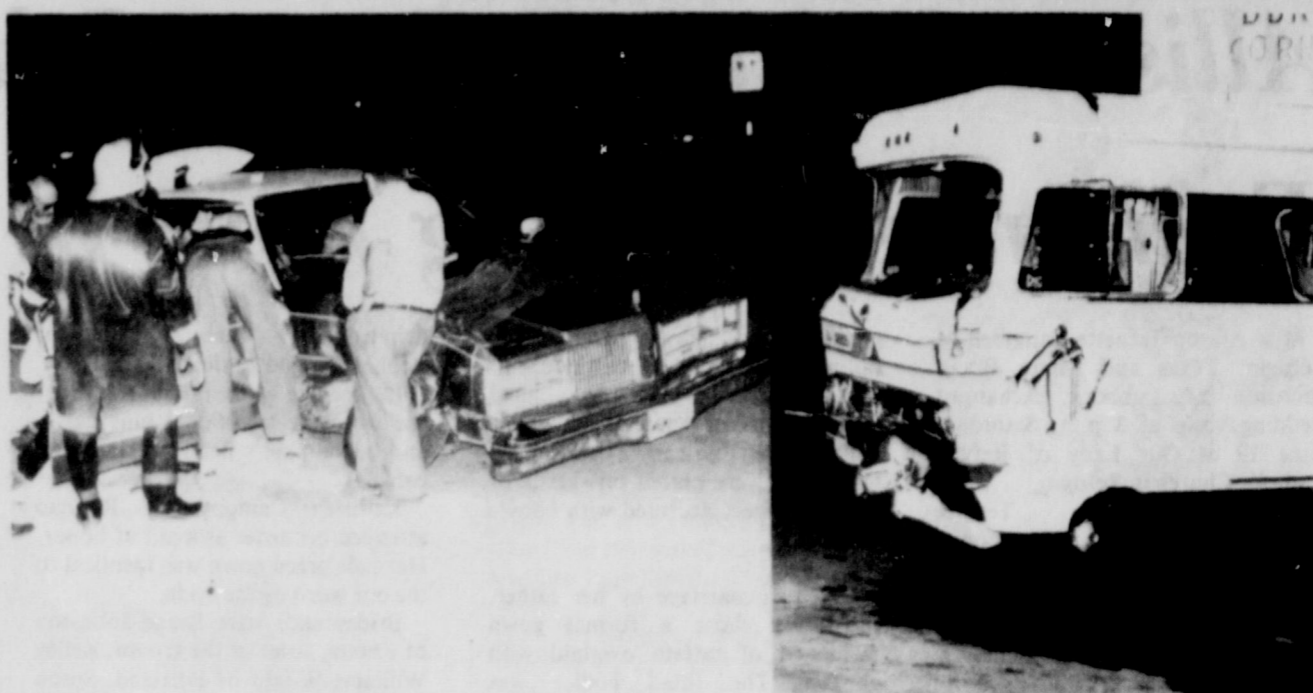

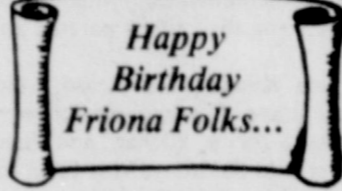

The first unit of Roy Tolk Station, Southwestern Public Service Company's new coal-fired generating plant near Muleshoe, Texas, will begin manufacturing electricity this month. The unit has the capacity to generate 561,000 kilowatts of electric power—it's Southwestern's largest. A second unit, the same size as the first, is being built next to the one which will be fired up this month. The units cost more than \$200 million apiece. They can each provide enough electricity to supply a city of 225,000 people.

Ben Green, Plant Manager, Muleshoe.

Tolk Station will burn coal — ground as fine as talcum powder — to produce electricity. The coal SPS uses comes from mines near Gillette, Wyoming. It is a low-sulfur coal. Tolk Station Unit No. 1 will burn approximately 315 tons of coal per hour. That's about 7,560 tons per day. The coal is delivered by 110-car trains directly from the Wyoming mines. Coal-fired plants are significantly more economical to operate than natural gas-fired plants.

Morris Rantz, Fuel Administration Manager, Amarillo.

The "stack" at Tolk Station is 400 feet high. The "smoke" it emits, however, is "smokeless." Although burning coal naturally produces "smoke" (flue gas and fly ash), our state-of-the-art environmental protection equipment cleans up the emissions long before they get into the air. The protection system, called a baghouse, contains 13,000 fiberglass bags. They filter the boiler's emissions and remove the ash residues, making the coal "smokeless."

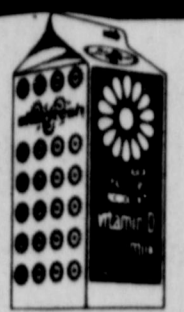
