WITH THE GENERAL ELECTION coming up on Tuesday, November 2, we will attempt to make some endorsements, for those who wish to compare notes, on the major races.

In the governor's race, we support **BILL CLEMENTS** for re-election. Clements has worked well with the Democratic legislature.

Clements has managed to keep our state showing a surplus in its state treasury, at a time with federal government and virtually every other entity is in the red.

With some 11.3 million Americans out of work, approximately 10.1 per cent of the nation's work force, the percentage of jobless in Texas is only 8.4 per cent--and some 800,000 new jobs have been created in Texas during the administration of Bill Clements.

Clements believes in pay-as-you-go. He holds his ground against federal programs which would hurt the state. He has shown more interest in the Panhandle than any governor other than our own Preston Smith. He is much aware of our need for a water import program.

He comes to Parmer County to hunt pheasants and rub elbows with the country folks. We doubt that Mark White knows that Texas has a Parmer County. Need we say more?

JIM COLLINS has to be an improvement over Lloyd Bentsen in the U.S. Senate. Although Bentsen's backers call him a moderate who votes across party lines and sometimes supports the president, we fell out with Sen. Bentsen for his vote which helped give away the Panama Canal.

Perhaps history will prove that this was a wise choice, but we never did understand why a nation the size of the USA had to give in to the demands of a two-bit dictator.

Bentsen's refusal to vote the wishes of his constituents on this and other matters should be good enough reason to retire him from office.

GEORGE STRAKE is our choice for lieutenant governor. Strake, a Houston businessman, was Gov. Clements' campaign chairman in 1978, and served as Secretary of State under Clements. We feel the governor could better function with a candidate from his own party, and that Bill Hobby, who has served ten years in office, has surely done enough harm by now.

From here down, we switch to the Democratic ticket, and favor **BOB BULLOCK** for re-election as Attorney General. Bullock has done a good job, we believe, in his position, and despite his problems, deserves another term.

ANN RICHARDS grabbed our attention while winning the nomination for state treasurer. A former Travis County Commissioner, she would be the first woman to win a statewide office since Miriam "Ma" Ferguson, who won her second term as governor in 1932.

GARRY MAURO is the only candidate for statewide office to come into our community, visit the publisher and ask his support. He defied a lot of odds by winning the party's nomination for land commissioner in May, so Garry, you have our endorsement.

We do not know **JIM HIGHTOWER** personally, but Ralph Roming has worked with him and thinks he would be a great Commissioner of Agriculture, working for the benefit of farmers. This would be a big improvement over the GOP candidate, Fred Thornberry, who thinks our state's farmers are all making a big profit. Thornberry has been a college professor, and perhaps he'd be better off to stay with his books, and not venture out into the real world.

It almost goes without saying, but we'd better say, that we favor **KENT HANCE** for re-election for congress, and **BILL SARPALIUS** for state senator. Both men have done outstanding jobs representing our district, and need to be allowed to continue.

Kemal Tongate Is Week's Winner

Kemal Tongate, Kenneth McLellan and Clint Mears were the top predictors in the Friona Star's weekly contest the past week.

Tongate was the week's champion. He was the only contestant to correctly pick 20 of the contest's 22 games, and that won for him the weekly first prize of \$10.00. Actually, Tongate picked 20 of 21, since the Canadian-Perryton contest was a tie and was automatically counted wrong for every contestant.

General Election Set November 2

The General Election will be held next Tuesday, November 2, with a number of races which should bring out the voters.

Perhaps the top race is the governor's race, where incumbent William P. (Bill) Clements is opposed by Democratic candidate Mark White.

Clements upset the appellation in 1978 by becoming the state's first Republican governor in a hundred years. White, who has served as the state's attorney general, won a tough primary battle in May, and has waged a tooth-and-nail battle for the office, which is expected to be close.

Lloyd Bentsen, liberal Democratic senator who has drawn the ire of Texas residents due to his voting record, is opposed by Republican Jim Collins. This should make for a good race, except for the fact that it may turn out that Collins has had about as poor a record in the House of Representatives as Bentsen has had in the Senate.

The Lieutenant Governor's race also has been heating up. Incumbent Bill Hobby, who has served four terms, is opposed by George Strake, and Strake has really carried the fight to Hobby.

Congressman Kent Hance, Lubbock Democrat, has only taken opposition from Republican E.L. Hicks and Libertarian party

candidate Mike Read, neither of whom has campaigned seriously.

Otherwise, Jim Mattox (R) and Bill Meier (D) are battling for White's vacated Attorney General's post; and incumbent Bob Bullock (D) is opposed by Mike Richards (D) in the race for Comptroller of Public Accounts.

Ann Richards, who defeated incumbent state treasurer Warren Harding in the Democratic primary, now faces Republican Allen Clark in the General Election.

Garry Mauro (D) and Woody Glasscock (R) are battling for the General Land Office commissioner's position; and Jim Hightower (D) is opposed by controversial Fred Thornberry (R) for Commissioner of Agriculture.

Jim Nugent (D) is battling John Henderson (R) for the Railroad Commission, and Ted Robertson (D) is opposed by John L. Bates (R) for justice of the Texas Supreme Court, place 1.

On the County Commissioner's level, Tommy Williams, who defeated incumbent commissioner Jack Patterson in the Democratic primary in May, now is opposed in the general election by Dale Hart of Friona.

Precinct 2 was enlarged due to the reapportionment of precinct lines, to include a portion of western Friona.

Marjorie Watkins, who won the Democratic nomination for County Clerk, is unopposed in the general election, along with the other county and precinct officials.

Bovina voters will be voting in the American Legion Hall, with Jay Sherrill as election judge and Gloria Atchley as alternate.

Rhea voters will vote at the Rhea Parish Hall, with Raymond Schueler as judge and Carl Schlenker, alternate.

Halloween Moved Up

Parents of youngsters are reminded that the City of Friona had urged and decreed that all trick or treat activities be held on Saturday, October 30 this year, rather than on the actual date of Halloween, which falls on Sunday.

One of the benefits of holding the trick-or-treat a day early will be getting to use the final day of Daylight Savings Time, for the children's benefit.

Parents are also urged to closely supervise their youngsters, have them visit homes they are familiar with, and inspect their "goodies."

Daylight Time Gives Way Sun.

Central Standard Time returns early Sunday morning, giving residents back that hour of sleep they lost last spring when Daylight Time began.

Residents are reminded to cause their clocks and watches to "fall back" an hour before retiring, or to follow the custom of most people, and change each timepiece as they get to it--usually taking about a week's time.

Bi-Wize Drug Is Health Mart Member

Mike and Claudia Hanes of Bi-Wize Drug recently announced their plans to join the Health Mart voluntary cooperative for independent drug stores.

The Health Mart cooperative also provides numerous advertising and promotion programs that the local retailers may utilize.

The Haneses said they hope to have their store completed by January 1, 1983. They are planning a large promotion when the remodeling is completed, and in the meantime, they ask the indulgence of their customers while the work is going on.

DPS Warns Motorists To Watch Trick Or Treaters

On Sunday, October 31, miniature monsters will invade the neighborhoods and the cry, "trick or treat," can be heard throughout the land.

Major C.W. Bell, Region 5 commander for the Texas Department of Public Safety, said today, "Motorists and parents need to take precautions to protect children and prevent disasters this Halloween."

He suggests that small children be accompanied by older children or

adults and tricks or treating be confined to their own neighborhoods.

Major Bell also stated, "Costumes should be light in color, short enough to prevent tripping and also be non-flammable. Facial makeup should be used instead of masks or hoods that restrict vision." Parents should not permit youngsters to carry jack-o-lanterns with lighted candles.

Children should be told to look in all directions before crossing streets and to walk, never run. A flashlight carried by the child can serve as a warning to motorists, and children should be instructed to use sidewalks when possible. Motorists should use extra caution in residential areas and look for children crossing streets in a haphazard manner. Parents should remind older children not to vandalize residences, businesses or vehicles. Drivers should take caution on this night and not permit passengers to throw objects such as water balloons, paper, etc., from the vehicle.

Major Bell reminds Texans that there were 752 pedestrians killed and 6,300 pedestrians injured in Texas during 1981. A pedestrian's chance of getting killed or injured are increased by 800 per cent at night. There were 83 youngsters under the age of 11 years killed as pedestrians last year. There were seven pedestrians killed on October 31, 1981. Major Bell stated, "If parents and motorists join together and think of children's safety, Halloween 1982 can be a safe and enjoyable evening for everyone."

Troy Christian Is Named Parmer SWCD Director

Troy Christian of Farwell was recently elected to the Parmer County S.W.C.D. board of directors on October 5. Christian represents Zone 4 of the district.

The purpose of the Parmer County S.W.C.D., with headquarters in Friona is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on farm and ranch lands within the district and to serve as a voice for farmers and ranchers on conservation matters and other issues affecting private property rights of landowners.

The board of directors coordinates the conservation efforts of various local, state and federal agencies and

other organizations and has authority to enter into working agreements with these governmental agencies and private concerns to carry out its purposes.

As one of five individuals serving on the district board of directors, Christian will be responsible for district policies and procedures for carrying out the district program within the framework of the Texas soil conservation district law.

In other areas of leadership, Christian is active in the High Plains Underground Water District and the Texas Farm Bureau.

He has been recognized as the Conservation Farmer of the Year for Parmer County.

Troy and his wife, Lillie, have three children, Vick who is 21, Sharmy who is 19, and Todd who is 16.

In Texas there are 201 soil and water conservation districts. Each is a legal subdivision of state government organized by local agricultural landowners with the assistance of the Texas Soil and Water Conservation Board. Unlike most other legal subdivisions of state government, SWCDs do not have the powers of taxation or eminent domain. All conservation programs managed by the districts are of a voluntary nature to the landowner or operator.

I understand that there was some confusion concerning Union Congregational Church's hosting of a program on witchcraft.

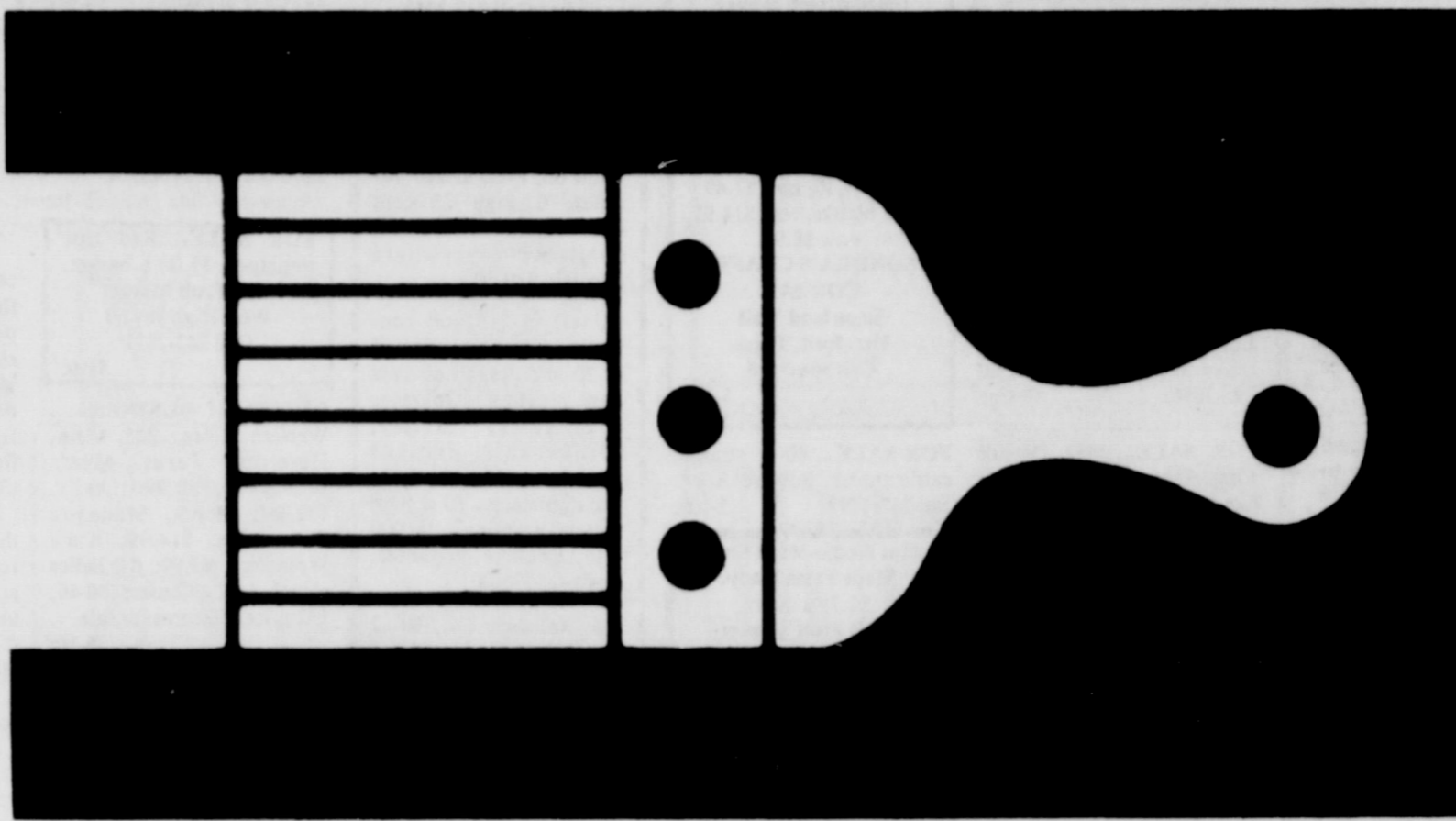

Dimmitt Bobcats Take 14-7 Victory Over Friona Chieftains

Apparently, the Dimmitt Bobcats don't like the role of underdogs--or on second thought, maybe they don't mind it so bad after all.

Seems every time the Bobcats are underdogs against Friona, they come up with a cracker-jack performance. Such was the case last Friday, when Dimmitt scored two first half touchdowns--one before fans had a chance to get settled in their seats--enroute to a 14-7 victory at Chieftain Field.

The loss by Friona was a serious blow to its playoff hopes, since now the team not only must beat either Muleshoe or Littlefield (or both) on the road, or else hope for some help from the likes of Tullia and Abernathy in the remaining season games.

Dimmitt won the toss, and elected to receive. No team the Chieftains have played this season had done what the Bobcats proceeded to do.

On first down, Richard Guzman passed for 24 yards to Jeff Watts, to the Dimmitt 45. On the next play,

wingback Bill Johnson ripped off a 23-yard gain, to the Friona 31. Then, Sid Sagesar broke up the middle for a touchdown. Just to add the clincher, Guzman dove in for a two-point conversion.

Dimmitt had taken an 8-0 lead in the first half, as Dimmitt had Charlie Morgan's running well scouted. Friona had a net of only 13 yards gained in the first quarter.

Dimmitt fired up again midway through the second quarter, and on a third and 20 situation, Guzman lofted a pass which Watts smothered, and ran into the end zone for a 50-yard TD play. The running try for two more points failed, but the Bobcat lead had become 14-0 with 7:17 left before halftime.

Friona's best scoring chance of the half came late in the first quarter, after Alfredo Mata returned a Dimmitt punt to the Bobcat 20. Three plays gained only two yards, and on fourth down Mark Montoya was called on to try a field goal.

The kick was well within Montoya's range, but the Chieftains rushed the play rather than calling time out, and Mark's kick sailed wide to the left. A 7-3 score at that point could have turned momentum Friona's way.

The Chiefs put together a pair of first downs late in the first half, driving to the Dimmitt 40, but on fourth down a Bruce Patterson pass was intercepted to end that threat.

On Friona's second possession of the third quarter, the Chieftains drove from their own 39 to the Dimmitt 18, where they again appeared to stall.

On third down, flanker Mike Neill tried a pass which fell incomplete. That brought up a fourth and five.

Neill went deep, and Patterson lofted him the ball. Neill made a nice catch while falling backward, to put Friona on the scoreboard. Montoya's kick made the score 14-7, with 2:53 left in the quarter.

But that was to be Friona's only bright spot of the game, as the Chieftains could not get another scoring drive going. They faced third and one from their 45 midway through the final quarter, only to have Morgan run into his own blocker a half-yard shy of the first-down marker. Starting to go for the yardage, a Friona lineman moved, and this stymied the effort and the Chiefs had to kick.

A little later, Friona had held Dimmitt and should have gotten the ball on a punt, but the over-zealous Chieftains were called for roughing the kicker.

That enabled the visitors to almost run out the clock. Friona got the ball back in the last minute, but Patterson's long pass was intercepted at midfield, and that wrapped it up.

The Chieftains could not buy a break. Early in the game, Montoya was knocked flying while punting, but no penalty flag was forthcoming.

Then, following the Friona touchdown, the Chieftains clearly recovered a Bobcat fumble at the Dimmitt 28, but the officials refused to turn over possession to the Chieftains. Films showed that the ball popped out before the ball carrier went down, but that was another judgement call going against the Chiefs.

The loss left Friona with a 5-3 season mark, and 2-1 in district, and worse, increased Dimmitt's gaudy lead in the old rivalry to 33 wins to 13 for the Chieftains and one tie.

Perhaps it's like one observer commented after the game: "Some teams would rather beat Friona than win district."

Thanks to a good second half, runningback Charlie Morgan again had a 100-yard game, having 124 yards in 31 tries, the workhorse on the team. That put Morgan over the 1,000-yard mark with 1,051 yards, and two games to go.

Chieftains, Mules To Knock Heads Friday

The Friona Chieftains were to meet the Muleshoe Mules in a game vital to the District 2-AAA standings Friday night in Muleshoe.

Both teams were fighting to stay in the district's playoff picture; Muleshoe having lost last Friday to Littlefield, 27-12, while Friona was dropping its 14-7 decision to Dimmitt.

As usual, Muleshoe will provide plenty of opposition for the Chieftains. The Mules and Chiefs have identical records, both for the season (5-3) and in district play (2-1).

The Mules had scored 148 points (18.5) and allowed 110 (13.8) in eight games, compared to Friona scoring 125 (15.6) and allowing only 83 (10.3) per game.

Muleshoe is one of the top-rated offensive teams on the South Plains, averaging 260 yards per game, ranking seventh, to Friona's 234 yards. The Chieftains rank tenth in the area.

On defense, however, Friona went into the game allowing just 203.6 yards per game, ranking the Chieftains fifth in the area, and Muleshoe was yielding 214 yards per outing. One difference might be that the Mules have already played potent Littlefield.

The Mules' leading ground-gainer is Alex Paez, runningback who had gained 779 yards (111.3 per game) going into Friday's tussle.

Muleshoe had passed somewhat more than the Chieftains, 535-230, in fact Muleshoe quarterback Sam Gonzales entered the game as the area's sixth leading passer with 33 completions, including three touchdowns.

Coach Tommy Moss had "good news and bad" this week as to the health of his players. Wide receiver Mike Neill re-injured a knee, and will miss the balance of the season. Neill scored Friona's only TD against Dimmitt.

Meanwhile, runningback-linebacker Max Perea, out the past three games, will be back in the lineup, and Richie Malouf was running well in practice.

It's always a tough game when the old rivals meet on the playing field. Muleshoe holds a lead in the series with 19 wins to 11 for Friona and one tie. The Mules have won the last four times the teams have played. Friona's last win was a 13-7 win here in 1977. Counting since 1971, the Mules have won six times and Friona five.

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Pros & Cons Given For Proposed Amendments

AMENDMENT NO. 1:

FOR: *Without this amendment, millions of dollars of back taxes will have to be collected from property owners across the state.
 *Present formulas for distribution of tax money to these universities is unfair and not based on need.
 *The 17 universities should receive funds through the appropriations process which allows the legislature to assess needs.
AGAINST: *This tax probably should be reduced from 10 pct. to 3 pct. per \$100 market value, not repealed completely.
 *Current funding insures the high priority of higher education.

AMENDMENT NO. 2

Authorizes the legislature to provide by law for assistance grants, medical care, and services to needy persons. Places a higher ceiling on aid to dependent children and their caretakers. After 1982-83 biennium, the ceiling is set at 1 pct. of the state budget for each biennium.
FOR: *State funding would no longer be tied to federal funding which may soon be eliminated for dependent children (AFDC).
 *Provides flexibility in determining the ceiling for payments.

AGAINST: *Welfare spending would be increased if the ceiling on assistance grants is increased.
 *Emphasis should be placed on assuring that present welfare monies are spent for the truly needy.

AMENDMENT NO. 3:

Exempts from ad valorem taxation implements of husbandry used in the production of farm or ranch products.
FOR: *Provides needed tax relief for farmers and ranchers with little adverse effect on local governments' tax bases.
 *Taxing on agricultural equipment and machinery costs more than it is worth because it is difficult to assess and collect.
AGAINST: *Recent tax breaks for farmers and ranchers sufficient.

AMENDMENT NO. 4:

Authorizes legislature to set four-year maximum terms of office for members of governing boards of certain water districts and other conservation & reclamation districts.
FOR: *Reduces cost of having to hold more frequent elections.
 *Less frequent elections would generate more voter participation.
 *Longer terms allow members to develop expertise and efficiency.
AGAINST: *Frequent elections assure that members are responsive to voters needs.

AMENDMENT NO. 5:

Abolishes the office of county treasurer in Tarrant and Bee counties and transfers duties to county.
FOR: *Allows voters of each of these counties to hold a local election to decide if they want an elected county treasurer.
 *Eliminating one office would save county revenue.
 *Many cities have appointive treasurers.
AGAINST: *Separation of functions is needed to safeguard against misapplication of county funds.
 *Diminishes voter's control by eliminating an elective office.

AMENDMENT NO. 6:

Raises the weighted average annual interest rate from 6 pct. to 12 pct. on general obligation bonds for water quality enhancement, water conservation, park development and student loans.
FOR: *6 per cent interest ceiling is too low to sell previously authorized state bonds in current bond market.
 *Does not mean that interest rates will be increased necessarily to 12 per cent; bond interest rates are set by the bond market.
AGAINST: *Payment of interest rates above 6 per cent is too costly.

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City Gets 1 Per Cent Tax Check

State Comptroller Bob Bullock sent \$35.6 million to 967 Texas cities as their share of the one-per cent city sales tax for October.
 The 1982 statewide total so far this year is up 11 per cent over the 1981 total up through the same date of last year. This payment reflects taxable sales made in August and reported to the state by the end of September.
 The City of Friona received \$4,121.98 for the current period, compared to \$4,815.89 for the comparable period a year ago. However, the city's payments for 1982 to date stand at \$75,038.79, which is up by 3.68 per cent over the figure of \$72,374.76 for the same time in 1981.
 Houston received \$7.7 million. So far in 1982 Houston's payments are up 14.1 per cent over 1981.
 Dallas got \$4.2 million, up 8.9 per cent so far in 1982.
 San Antonio got \$1.9 million, up 10 per cent for the year.
 Fort Worth received \$1.2 million, bringing the total for 1982 to \$19.9 million, up 4.5 per cent for the year.
 Austin received \$1.3 million, up 14.3 per cent for the year.
 El Paso received \$841,937 up 6.6 per cent for 1982.
 Bullock also sent October rebates to the state's two Metropolitan Transit Authorities. The Houston MTA received \$8.5 million, bringing the total received this year to \$136.1 million, up 10.9 per cent over last year. The San Antonio MTA got a check for \$955,526, bringing the 1982 total to \$16.6 million.
 These statewide figures included the impact in border cities of the August peso devaluation. Past devaluations have had an immediate negative impact on border sales but have returned to pre-devaluation levels within a year, Bullock noted.

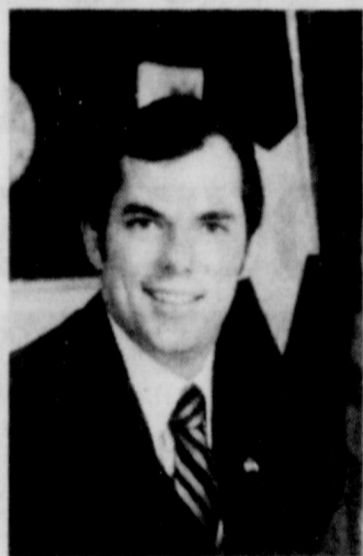

As you've been driving around the area lately, you've no doubt noticed a lot of pumpkins for sale at roadside stands. Perhaps this has started you thinking about pumpkin dishes for your family meals.

Freshly baked pumpkin dishes are a sheer delight. But it may surprise you to learn that pumpkin is an excellent source of many nutrients.

Rich in Vitamin A, pumpkin also contains iron, potassium and Vitamin C, plus it is low in calories, sodium and fat.

As for just how popular the pumpkin really is, it's estimated that over 88 million pumpkin pies were baked by Americans in 1981.

Dessert lovers will delight in the flavors of a glamorous "Pumpkin Peace-Pipe Pie" garnished with caramelized almonds.

PUMPKIN PEACE-PIPE PIE

1 pint vanilla ice cream, softened
1-10 inch pie shell, baked
1 can (16 oz.) solid pack pumpkin

1 1/2 cups sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon ground ginger
1/4 teaspoon ground cloves
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 1/2 cups whipped cream
1 cup slivered almonds
1/4 cup sugar

Spread softened ice cream in cooled pie shell; place in freezer. Mix pumpkin with sugar, spices and vanilla; fold in 1 cup whipped cream. Pour filling over ice cream. Cover with foil; freeze about 4 hours. Combine nuts and 1/4 cup sugar in small skillet. Stir constantly and rapidly as the sugar begins to turn color. Remove from heat when almonds are caramel-colored and spread on greased cookie sheet. Break apart when crisp. Garnish pie with remaining whipped cream and caramelized almonds. Yields one 10-inch pie.

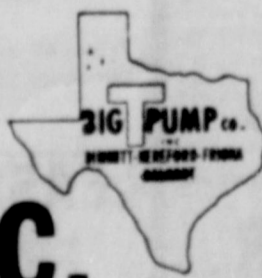

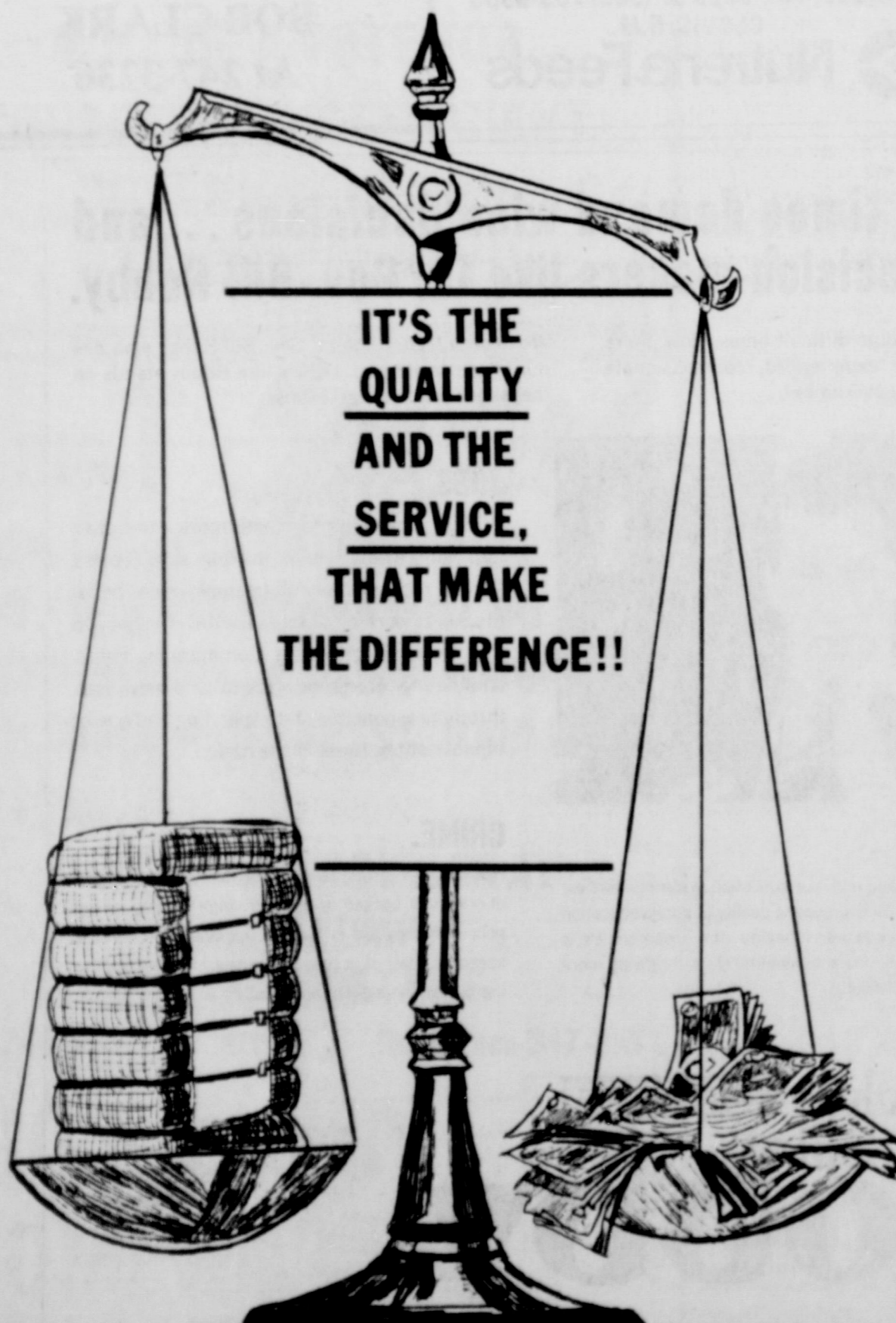

Austrian Girls Visit Relatives In Bovina

Loyd and Irma Nabors and daughter Tamie of Bovina have had as guests in their home this week two of Irma's nieces from Enns, Austria. They are Irma Janecek, 20, and Tanja Janecek, 18.

The young ladies are daughters of Irma's only sister, Margaret Janecek of Austria.

Since their arrival locally, the two have been amazed at the distances—the flat land, and have been surprised to find that the people here are so friendly.

They also have been impressed by the giant shopping centers in the large cities, which offer much more in the way of retail goods than they are used to in Austria.

The girls started their journey by train from Enns to Frankfurt, Germany, then flew by plane to Chicago, thence to Oklahoma City, where they spent a weekend with Loyd and Irma Nabors' daughter and family, Sharon and David Sherrill. Another of the Nabors girls, Karen Walsh, drove up to meet them.

Since arriving in Bovina, the girls have driven to Keys, Oklahoma, where Mr. Nabors is harvesting maize; they attended a pep rally, where they were able to see their first cousin, Tamie, in action as a cheerleader, and attended their first American football game.

Other things which have impressed the young ladies since their arrival here include the large grain elevators and the pretty sunsets.

Mrs. Nabors has been to Austria three times in the past 30 years. Mr. and Mrs. Janecek came here four years ago for a family wedding. It is the first time for the two girls to be in this country. They began saving their money—when they went to work, and when they had enough, planned their trip.

Tamie to have had her cousins here, since she had not met them previously," Mrs. Nabors says.

This weekend, Mrs. Nabors and daughter Margaret plan to take the two Austrian visitors to the Houston area to see NASA, the coast, and all the sights in the Houston vicinity. They will then fly into Dallas for a get-together with an Austrian friend, prior to their return home.

They will be gone from home a total of three weeks. The trip, Austria to Texas, requires approximately 27 hours travelling time.

DIRT IN THE EYE?

Few things are as annoying as getting a speck of dirt into the eye. Sometimes, the tears stimulated will wash out the speck. But if they don't, here's a first-aid procedure--

If you can see the speck of dirt on the white part of the eye (sclera), use the corner of a moistened tissue or Q-tip to lift it out.

If the speck is on the clear window part of the eye (cornea) try to wash it out with a good eyewash. However, if it is embedded in the cornea do not try to get it out but rather consult a doctor for help.

If you can't find the speck, hold the upper lashes while looking downward, and gently pull the upper lid away from you and down over the lower lid. This will usually sweep the speck down to the lower lid, where it can be removed easily.

If you still can't find or remove the speck, STOP. Don't try more difficult procedures yourself. Cover the eye with a clean handkerchief or a dry sterile dressing to prevent blinking and consult an eye doctor.
