

Truman Arrives In Brazil

BELEM, BRAZIL.—(AP)—President Truman's plane, the Independence, made a refueling stop here Monday morning on his flight from Trinidad to Rio de Janeiro.

The President, who is to spend a week in Brazil on a state visit, said he was happy to reach Brazilian soil. He was welcomed by Brazilian news men, members of the United States colony and Brig. Gen. Doyt Fontenelle, commander of the Venesias Air Base.

Rio de Janeiro planned a big welcome for Truman, who will address the closing session of the Inter-American Hemisphere Defense Conference at Quitandinha.

There was business as usual this morning, but employees were promised they could leave to witness the U. S. President's arrival in his plane, The Independence.

The President will come across the bay by yacht and be greeted at the dock by Brazil's President Eurico Gaspar Dutra and an official reception party. From the dock, the two presidents, with their wives, will travel through streets lined with 20,000 Brazilian soldiers to the U. S. Embassy where President Truman will take up residence until Friday, after which he will move to La Ranjeiras Palace, the residence for dignitaries visiting Brazil.

Monday night President Truman will pay an official visit to President Dutra at Catete Palace. That was the only official item on Monday's calendar.

Tuesday, President Dutra will call for Truman at the embassy and they will motor to the mountain resort at Quitandinha, where the U. S. President will speak to the Inter-American Hemisphere Defense Conference's final session.

At noon, he will be host to conference delegates at Luncheon aboard the battleship Missouri, now anchored in Guanabara Bay. Later in the afternoon he will be present when the Hemisphere Defense Treaty drafted at Quitandinha is signed at Itamaraty Palace, home of Brazil's Foreign Ministry.

Accident Death Toll Reaches 245

The Labor Day weekend accidental death toll was near 250 as the last day of the three-day holiday began Monday.

Death scythed 170 motorists from the highways since 6 p. m. Friday; 36 persons drowned, and 39 were killed in accidents, putting total fatalities at 245.

The National Safety Council had predicted a total motor accident toll of 250 for the long weekend.

The air age was reflected in the figure of 39 miscellaneous accidents—11 of the deaths occurred in small plane crashes.

Michigan, home state of the automobile industry, and Texas lead the nation in the number of automobile accident deaths—with 16 each.

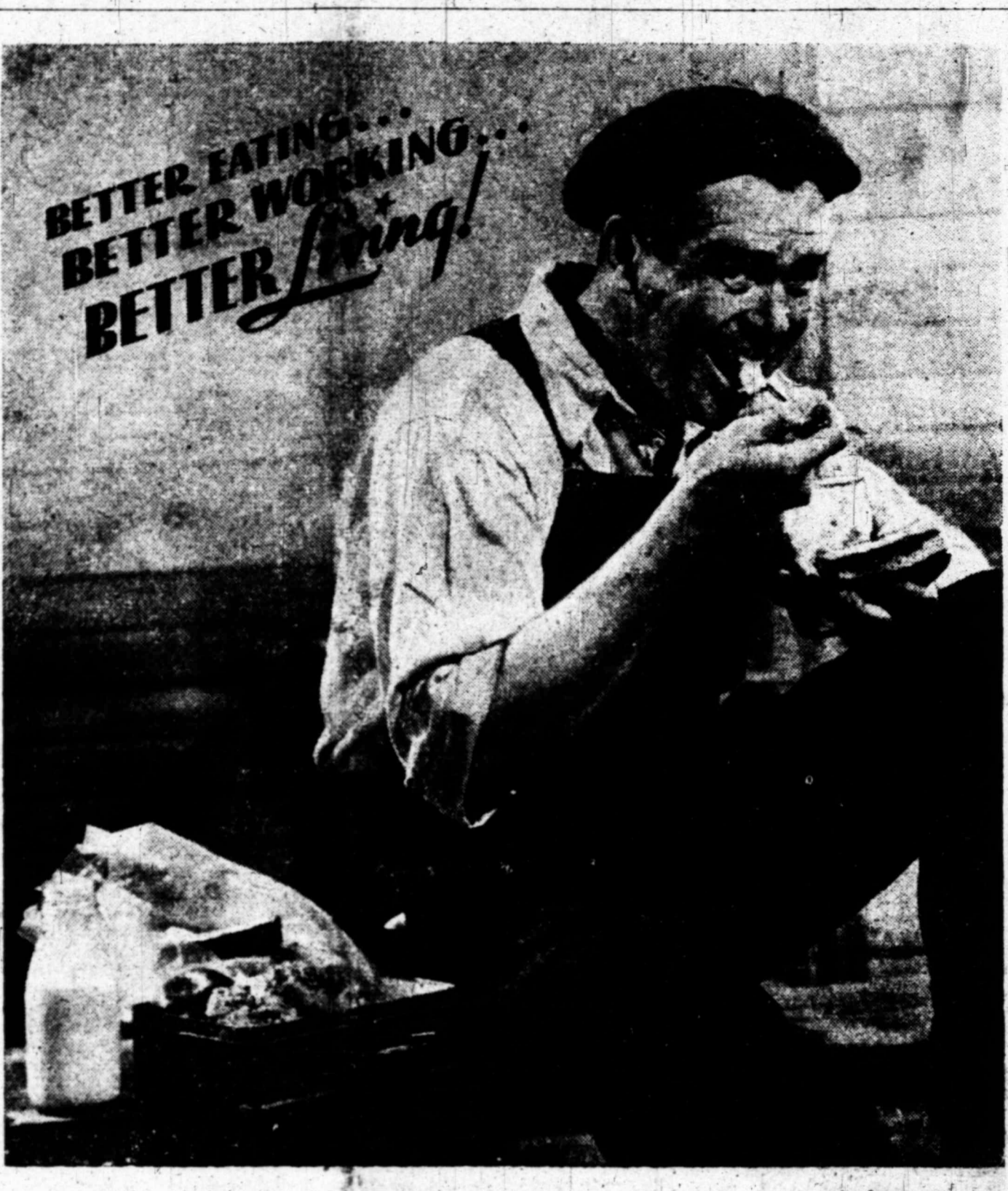

The Perils Of Strength

Labor Day this year finds the organized workers of the United States in a position of strength—numerical, political and financial—which is unsurpassed in the nation's peacetime history. Thus far the Taft-Hartley Act has fulfilled none of the dire predictions made about it. There are no indications as yet that the labor movement is being destroyed, or set back 25 years, or even seriously hampered.

In spite of this law, some unions have negotiated the best contracts in their history. And one might even say that because of this law, the great body of union members has become a political force to be reckoned with as never before.

There is great hope in this power for the workers whose efforts have so largely contributed to making America the world's greatest and most progressive nation, a tower of strength and hope for freedom-loving peoples everywhere. But the same power also carries with it an increasing element of danger.

Speaking in general, organized labor has won its fight for recognition as a permanent part of American life. The threat that anti-union employers will destroy the movement now is so remote as to seem impossible. The threat that labor's strength may invite power-hungry or subversive leaders, however, is already present and increasing.

The union officials who have exploited their position for extravagant, personal, destructive purposes may be few. The Communists in key union positions may constitute only a minute percentage of total union membership. But both reflect discredit upon all of labor, the millions of loyal, respectable men and women whose interests they claim to have at heart.

The Communist menace in the labor movement is no pipe dream. The campaign against it, in and out of labor's ranks, is no witch hunt, as the Communists would like to have the county believe. The unions are the ideal and traditional place for them to do their greatest damage.

Behind a smoke screen of misrepresentations and lies they strive to create the dissension, unrest, and self-pitying class consciousness which help to sap the country's economic health and create a major depression. It is only in depression and chaos that communism stands any chance of gaining a real foothold here.

Neither Senator Taft nor Representative Hartley, nor anyone else tagged as an "enemy of labor," begins to deserve that title as do the Communists within the labor movement. For their purpose is to destroy all freedom, tear down our democracy and prosperity, and substitute the regimentation and terror of Soviet "democracy."

So on this day of honor to labor, the organized workers might well take stock of the dangers which threaten them as well as of their hard-won and well-deserved advancement. For as labor's strength increases, so does the need to operate its unions in a truly representative, democratic manner, to avoid gullibility, and to recognize its greatest enemies.

Jester Declares Prison Conditions Will Be Improved

AUSTIN — (AP) — Texas Prison Board members realize the State Prison situation is "deplorable," although they refute Penologist Austin H. McCormick's charges that it is the worst in 20 years. Gov. Beauford H. Jester declared in a prepared statement to the press Sunday.

The governor said he felt certain his Saturday meeting with the board "will prove to have been wholesome and beneficial and that it will prove to be another step in the direction of improving conditions and operating practices in the state's penitentiary system."

Jester met with the board in private conference Saturday after McCormick, executive director of the Osborne Association, Inc., New York, charged in two telegrams to him that the Texas Prison system is in "an intolerable state of affairs." The Osborne Association is a private foundation seeking to improve prison systems throughout the country.

Governor Starts Tour
The governor's statement, issued before he left for San Antonio, his first stop on a trip which will take him to Louisiana and Mississippi this week, said all members of the board "are determined to correct the weak and bad spots and to do that with all possible expedition."

"All members of the board have agreed, at my suggestion, to bring to their meeting in Houston Monday, a list of defects and deficiencies in the penitentiary system as they see them, and their suggestions for remedying and improving these with the present facilities and funds available for the next biennium. The board, as a whole, will report these recommendations to me," he said.
