Anti-Communist Dilemma

Ben Gold, president of the Fur and Leather Workers Union (CIO), is usually referred to in the newspapers as "an avowed Communist."

Gold is also a vice president of the CIO. But, fortunately for that organization, he is not one of the 11 officials who must sign an anti-Communist affidavit, under the Taft-Hartley Law, before any one of the CIO unions can initiate any action before the National Labor Relations Board.

However, he is required by the new law to hand in such a statement if he intends that his union should ever bring charges before the NLRB. With that background it will be interesting to see which of three courses he takes.

He can boycott the NLRB in advance, or he can refuse to sign the affidavit. The results would be about the same. Or he can swear he is not a member of the Communist Party. In that case the NLRB, by its own statement, will accept his affidavit and ask no questions.

The first two choices might work a hardship on Gold's union or any union which adopted similar tactics. Management could bring charges of unfair labor practices to the NLRB, or a rival AFL or independent union could submit a jurisdictional dispute to the tribunal.

But if Gold perjured himself—assuming that he is a Communist—he might conceivably put himself in the clear. The burden of proof would be on the complainant and the Justice Department to prove him a Communist, and to prove it beyond the existence of a reasonable doubt.

Gold could say that he resigned from the party and renounced its objectives the day before he signed his affidavit. He could destroy his Communist Party card. Since the party has never exhibited any regard for truth when truth didn't suit its purposes, it might back up Gold's story for reasons of expediency. In such an event the prosecution would have a difficult time proving its case.

All of which makes this provision of the Taft-Hartley Law seem rather silly. Yet there is a sound basis for its inclusion. The Communists are an obvious menace to the labor movement.

The CIO officials know as well as any outsider who are Communists and Communist-sympathizers. Yet they have refused to take a stand against them, and have even condoned their accession to positions of power. For this reason, Congress has felt compelled to legislate against them.

The legislation may be inept and full of loopholes. It can probably be gotten around. That possibility in itself makes it all the more imperative that the unions forget the smooth talk of these foreign agents and oust them, for their own good as well as the country's.

Four Senators Agree Rent Controls May Be Extended By Congress

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Four senators who often differ on legislative matters agreed Friday that Congress is likely to vote an extension of rent controls beyond next February 28.

Senators McCarthy (R-Wis.), Flanders (R-Vt.), Sparkman (D-Ala.) and Myers (D-Pa.) voiced their predictions in separate interviews.

Myers only Thursday said he believes Congress should be summoned into special session by early November to tackle the problems of rising costs at home and aid to Europe.

He declared it is "apparent that our economy is threatened by inflation today as it was by military aggression a few years ago." Sparkman commented that he has opposed proposals to extend and resume wartime controls "except as a last resort" but added: "It looks as though we are about at the last resort now."

Steel Shortage Will End In Two Years

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Two top steel executives predicted Friday the steel shortage will end within two years, and the industry then will keep pace with demand.

Benjamin Fairless and Eugene Grace, officials of the United States and Bethlehem Steel Corporations, respectively, told the Senate Steel Committee the industry is catching up with "abnormal demands."

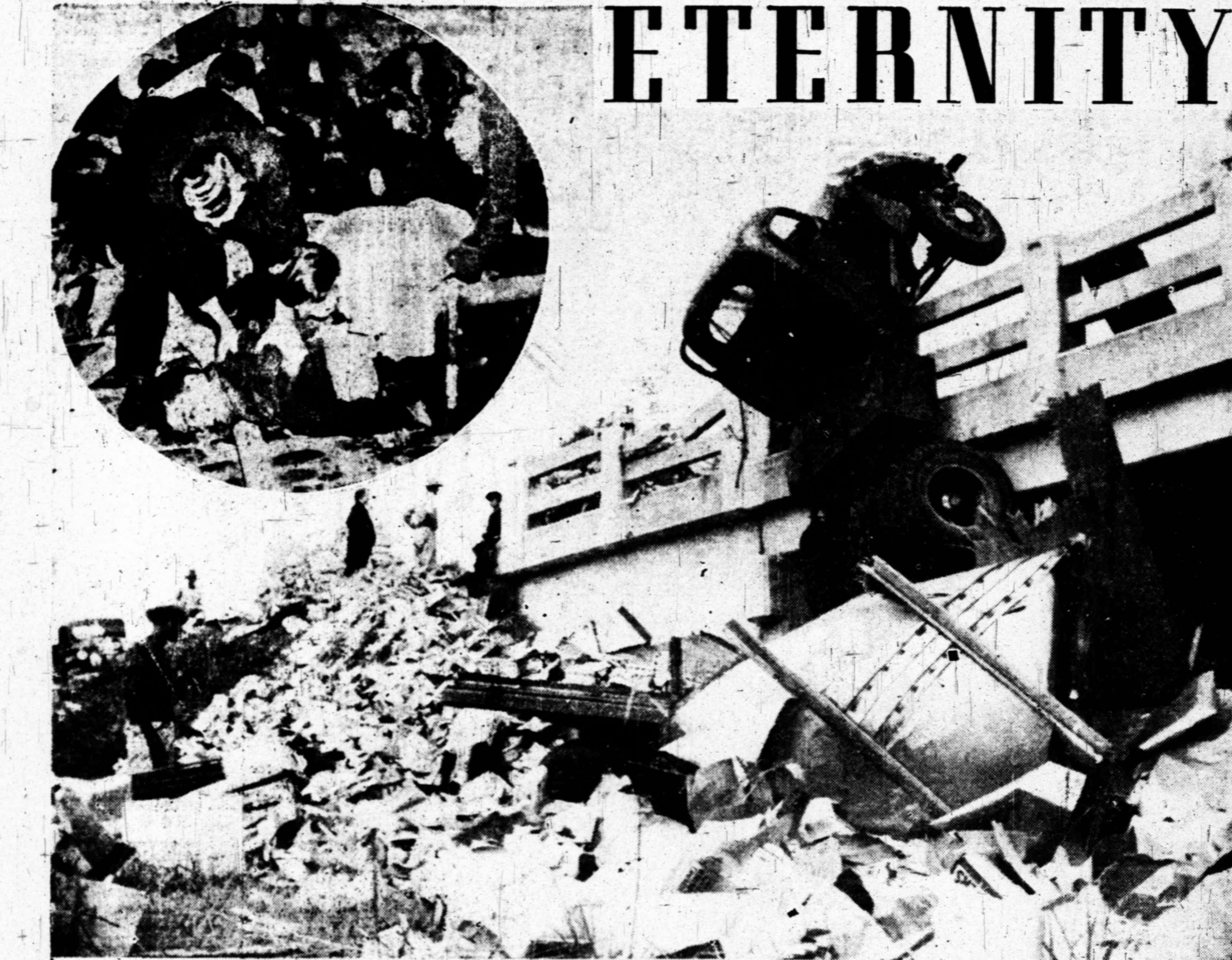
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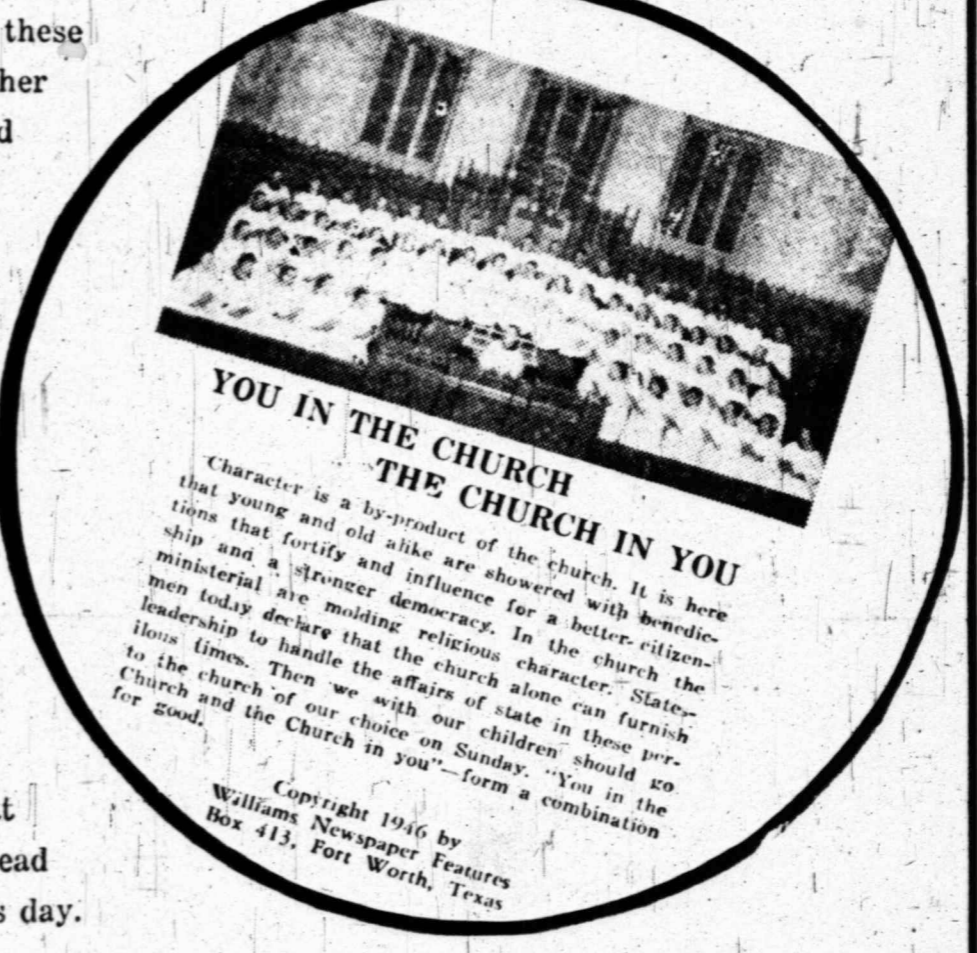

### Thompson Says U. S. Must Control Oil

YOKUM — The Persian Gulf Oil Fields must remain controlled by the United States and its allies, Col. Ernest O. Thompson, chairman of the Texas Railroad Commission, said in a talk at a barbecue here Thursday night.

World War II was fought over the oil in the Persian Gulf area, Thompson said, and "the only reason we didn't have to fight both Germany and Russia was that those two countries fell out over who should have that oil."

"We won the war because we had an adequate supply of oil and Hirohito did not. But Persian Gulf Oil is still in Stalin's eyes the most prized possession on earth. This oil must not be allowed to fall into his hands."

The Persian Gulf area oil is now controlled by U. S., British and French companies, he said.

In 1945, Thompson was the secretary of war's personal representative to study the oil situation in the Persian Gulf area.

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### Commissioners Up Upton Tax Rate

MCCAMEY — Members of the Upton County Commissioner's Court raised the Upton County tax rate from 46 to 99 cents at their regular meeting last Monday.

After submitting the proposal 15 days and holding a special session for discussion with the public invited to attend, the commissioners gave unanimous approval to the new tax rate figure.

The following breakdown of tax revenues was given: jury fund, 3 cents; general fund, 25 cents; road and bridge fund, 15 cents; permanent improvement fund, 14 cents; furniture fund, 10 cents; park opening and maintenance fund, 15 cents; lateral road fund 15 cents.

### U. S. Hopes To Gain Commanding Position

NEW YORK — Indications mounted Friday that the U. S. delegation to the United Nations, operating under the personal direction of Secretary of State George C. Marshall, hoped to move into a commanding spot in the early days of the General Assembly opening here Tuesday.

The entire delegation was summoned this morning to start mapping strategy and Marshall is due to arrive Friday night to join the conferences.

### FEDERAL SUPERVISION FOR SCHOOL LUNCHES

AUSTIN — The Texas school lunch program will go under federal supervision this year because the 50th Legislature's \$27,000 appropriation for supervision of the program was \$73,000 short of what federal officials consider necessary, Gov. Beauford H. Jester said.

The federal government is contributing \$2,980,000 to the Texas program this year, in addition to which Texas schools will receive \$550,000 worth of commodities through the Department of Agriculture, Jester said.

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## McKenney on Bridge

While it takes only five or 10 minutes to play a hand in a tournament, some hands are discussed not only after the game, but all through the tournament and for months afterwards. Today's hand came in for its share of discussion. The question was, could five diamonds be made with a diamond opening?

Several West players did open a diamond and in those cases declarer went down. However, when discussing the hand after the game, we found that five diamonds could be made with the following line of play.

Declarer must win the opening lead in his own hand, then trump a heart in dummy with the seven of diamonds. He leads the deuce of spades and wins with the king, then trumps the six of hearts in dummy, with the eight of diamonds. The ace of spades is cashed

and the queen of spades led, declarer discarding the three of clubs. Now he ruffs dummy's deuce of clubs, and ruffs another heart in dummy with the ten of diamonds. He discards the eight of hearts on the jack of spades, and West trumps with the nine of diamonds. West then can cash the ace of hearts, but when he leads a club, declarer trumps, the ace of trumps picks up West's king, and South loses only a diamond and a heart.

Declarer would have had no chance to make the contract if West had opened a club. East would win and lead the diamond. Naturally South would take the finesse: West would win and another diamond would come back. Then declarer could not do enough cross-ruffing. With the diamond opening he needed only careful timing to ruff out three hearts.

**Moon Refuses To Turn Green**

PHILADELPHIA — Landlord Abraham Weiner, who vowed last August 27 he would stay in jail until the moon turns green, rather than refund \$1,279 rent overcharges, has vacated his jail cell although the moon stubbornly refused to change color.

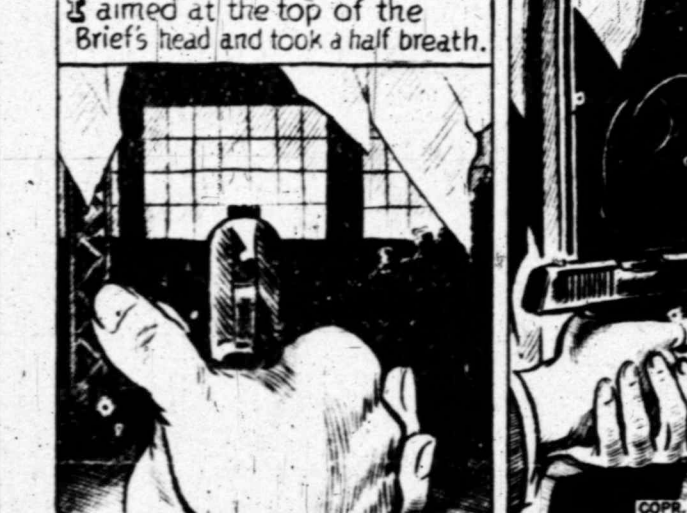
