Hundreds Of Japs Die In Big Floods

TOKYO-(A)-Thousands of Japanese worked Tuesday night erecting temporary dykes in an effort to stem floodwaters 20 miles north of Tokyo as unofficial estimates placed the number of dead and missing

Earlier incomplete American Military Government reports said the floodwaters, rising on the broad plain north of Tokyo in the wake of a typhoon, left almost 1,700 Japanese dead or missing and damaged about 100,000 houses.

Japanese newspapers said residents of Kasukabe were working teverishly on temporary dikes egainst advancing waters of two rivers which had ripped through their banks. The reports added that fai.ure to halt the flood at Kasukabe would expose the eastern section of Tokyo to the onrush of water, described as three feet high Damage Is Heavy

Storm damage was reported from 15 prefectures stretching more than 500 miles across two-thirds of Honshu Island-rom Mie Prefecture southwest of Nagoya to Akita on the extreme Northwestern Coast. Damage to homes, crops, bridges, railroads and highways was expected to total several hundred million yen. At the official rate 50 yen equal \$1. Two medium-sized towns were wiped out and many villages f ooded as the Tone and Arakawa

rivers spilled out into the flatlands. The military government reported 150 dead in Gumma Prefecture and 86 dead in Tochigi Prefecture, to the west. The number of missing was placed at 1,402.





Another Try

It may be that President Truman is hoping to stir Congress to action by his appointment of former Immigration and Naturalization Commissioner Ugo Carusi to a new post in the State Department, where he will handle all phases of the displaced persons problem.

Certainly there cannot be many such problems confronting this government today. The number of homeless unfortunates entering under present immigration quotas must not be very taxing. But both branches of Congress have tucked away, deep in the limbo of forgotten things, bills which would admit 400,000 DPs to the United States over a four-year period.

The House bill to that effect is quietly buried in committee. The Senate bill didn't get that far. Apparently some of the members were frightened by a few outcries that the impact of 100,000 persons a year on a country of 140,000,000 would turn 100,000 veterans out of their parade. Displays will be arranged homes and cost them their jobs.

Carusi may be able to produce some evidence to show legislators it would be possible, as well as charitable, to admit those displaced persons who, more than two years after peace, are still living under the conditions of war prisoners. His first undertaking in the new post will be a survey of the whole problem.

It cannot be denied that there would be many perplexing difficulties if Congress did see fit to enact the DP event. bills. But the loudest critics of such legislation seem not to have bothered to give their criticism much thought. They have reacted emotionally, assumed the worst, and concluded that it all must be so. Some even went so far Be Held In Midland; as to claim that these refugees would poison the American mind.


So it might be recalled again that the almost 900,000 displaced persons in Europe are not a Communist international brigade. They are persons uprooted by the war who, either through disgust or fear of reprisal, refuse to go home to countries which have become Communistdominated since the war.

Thus far, these DPs have received little sympathy for their stand against communism or their fear of a police state. Most of them have been confined in camps since the war ended. They were cared for by UNRRA, while it existed. Now they are technically under the wing of other school matters, was approved the UN International Refugee Organization.
